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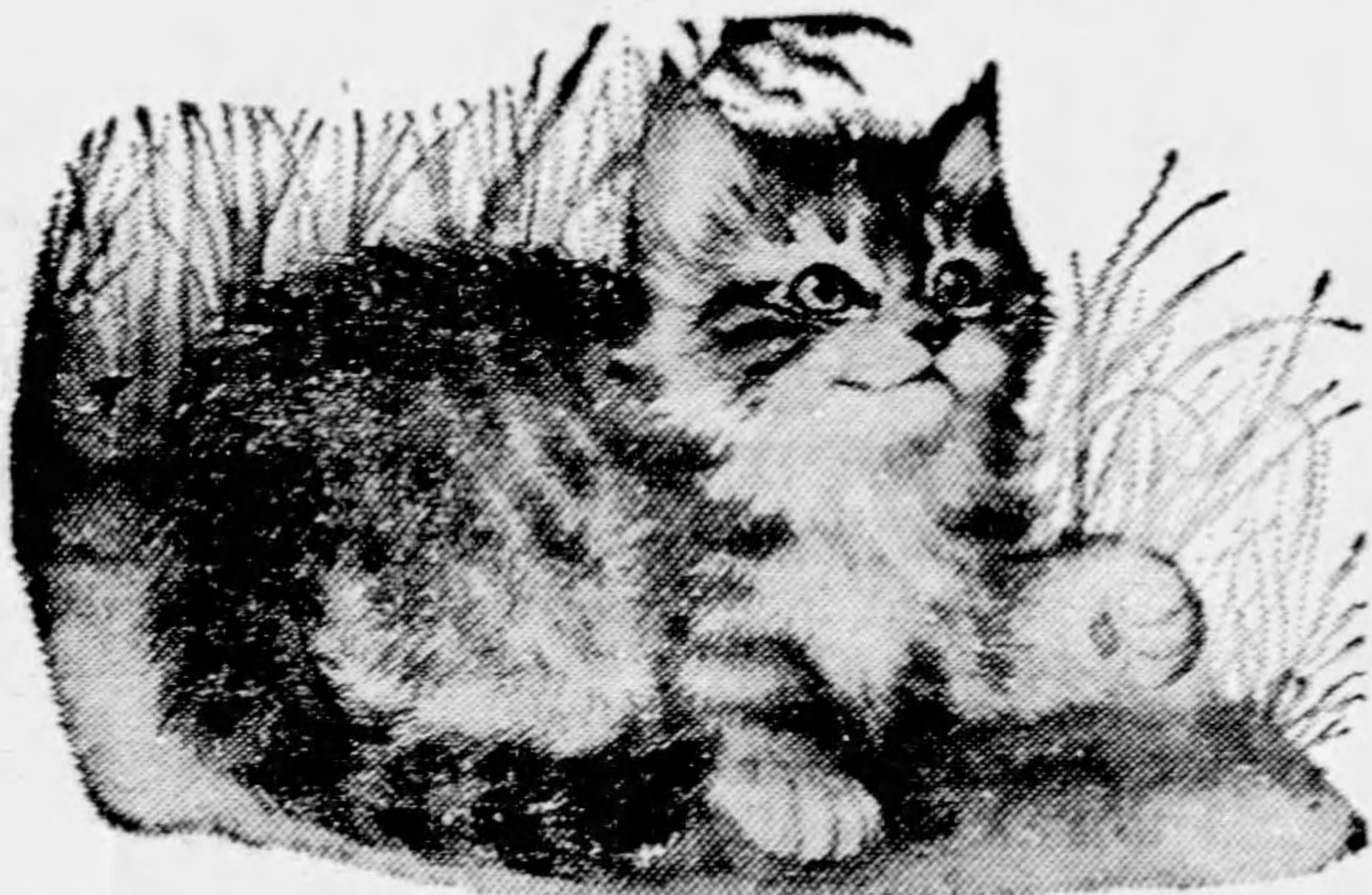

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# U.S. Traces Bacteria, Recalls All 'Chunky' Chocolate Bars

New York—Millions of the square-shaped Chunky chocolate bars were being recalled from candy counters and other retail outlets on Long Island and across the nation today because of sus-

pected contamination by bacteria that can cause extreme cramps, nausea and, in rare cases, death.

The contamination was traced by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to a large batch of imported chocolate used in the manufacture of the candy in the only plant of Chunky Corp., in Brooklyn. Bernard A. Loftus, acting deputy district director in charge of food inspection, said the plant had been closed down until all traces of the contamination are removed. He said no cases of illness from eating Chunky bars had been reported.

The Chunky Corp. announced yesterday that it had agreed to go along with the FDA directive to shut down production and to notify 4,393 wholesale and retail outlets that all unsold Chunky bars must be returned. The action involves \$750,000 worth of the product manufactured since October.

Loftus said the FDA had asked state and local health departments to assist in policing the removal of Chunky bars from sales counters. A spokesman for the Nassau County health commissioner, Dr. Joseph Kinnaman, said inspections would begin next week after retailers have had a chance to return Chunky bars to their distributors. George Milles, chief of the milk and food control division of the Suffolk Health Department, said county inspectors had begun making spot checks for Chunky bars still on sale.

FDA officials reported discovering salmonella bacteria in a routine sampling of Chunky bars two weeks ago.

# LIRR Strike Delayed by U.S.

New York—The Federal Mediation Board agreed yesterday to enter contract negotiations between the Long Island Rail Road and the Brotherhood of Railway Carmen, thus delaying a strike against the LIRR that had been called by the union for Monday.

The mediation board's decision to get into the case means a strike would be postponed for at least 90 days while the agency tries to get the two sides to agree on wage terms. A mediator for the dispute has not been named and no meetings have been scheduled yet, a spokesman for the mediation board

said yesterday. The board's intervention had been sought by the railroad after the union announced that its 1,200 members would begin a strike Monday morning.

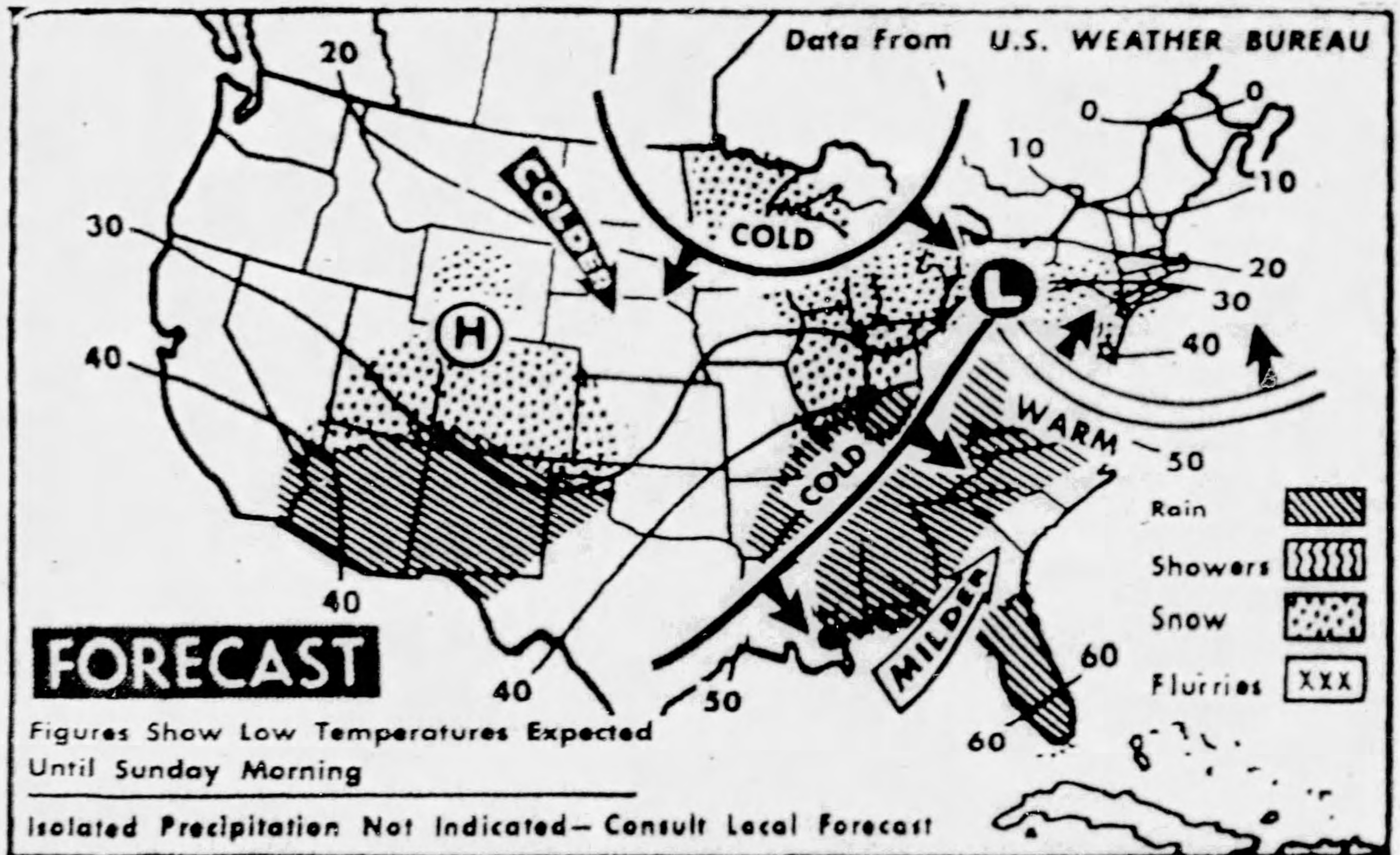
The carmen's union, whose members include painters, upholsterers, welders and maintenance men, has been negotiating with the LIRR on wage terms for the past seven months. The union is seeking pay raises of approximately 20 per cent over the next three years. The LIRR has offered the union raises totaling 15 per cent over the next three years, a spokesman for the railroad said.

# Convicted Franzese to Appeal

New York—The attorney for John (Sonny) Franzese, the Cosa Nostra chieftain convicted of conspiring to rob banks, refused yesterday to give any details of the appeal of Franzese's conviction he plans to make to the U.S. Court of Appeals.

Maurice Edelbaum, who represented Franzese during the five-week trial that ended in Albany early

yesterday, said he would make no statement beyond confirming that Franzese's conviction would be appealed after the sentencing, which is scheduled for April 14. Franzese, whose address was given as 47 Shrub Hollow Rd., Roslyn Heights, could receive a maximum sentence of a 65-year prison term and a \$30,000 fine. Four co-defendants were also found guilty on the same charges.
