

# Julie's Lawyer Asks To Shift Trial Again

New York—The attorney for Julius F. (Julie) Klein, whose trial for alleged jury bribing was moved here from Suffolk because of newspaper publicity, said yesterday that he will now seek to have the case moved upstate because of publicity Klein received concerning his recent murder indictment.

Edward Bobrick, Klein's attorney, told State Supreme Court Justice Jacob Grumet that he will "move in the Appellate Division for a change of venue out of the New York (City) area to anywhere in the state where he can get a fair trial." Bobrick also told Grumet that Klein's indictment Saturday for the 1966 murder of go-go dancer Irene Brandt was

timed "for the sole purpose of preventing a fair trial." Chief Assistant District Attorney Maurice Nadjari called the charge "ridiculous."

Bobrick also said that if Grumet denies his motions for dismissal of the charges against Klein, he will move the change of venue and also move to have the murder indictment go to trial before the bribery case.

Bobrick made a motion yesterday to dismiss the indictments on the ground that the grand jury that indicted him was prejudiced. He also moved to have a hearing held to determine if any wiretap evidence was used against Klein, and to have Klein's past criminal record kept from the jury if Klein testifies. Grumet reserved decision on all motions and set a tentative trial date for April 22.

Klein and his former bodyguard, Robert Cook, are accused of bribing Ferdinand Goldbach, a juror on the 1966 jury that acquitted Klein of forgery charges involving the Fort Neck Drainage Co. of West Islip. Klein was convicted of bilking Fort Neck of funds and was given a five-to-six year prison sentence.

## Franzese Trial Witness Admits to Another Lie

Mineola—In a continuing attack on the credibility of a key prosecution witness, defense attorneys for John (Sonny) Franzese got John Cordero to admit again yesterday that he had lied to federal authorities investigating his bank robbery activities.

Cordero, serving a sentence for robbing seven banks, has previously testified that he overheard reported Mafia figure Franzese and co-defendant John (Johnny Irish) Matera planning a June, 1965, Oceanside house robbery. Cordero had taken the stand last Friday when the conspiracy trial started. He admitted Monday that he had lied to a federal grand jury regarding his history of narcotics addiction. Cordero

has been under cross examination by attorneys Maurice Edelbaum and Jack Evseroff most of the week. He left the stand Tuesday complaining that his "mind was spinning" during Edelbaum's questions.

Answering Edelbaum yesterday, Cordero, formerly of Lynbrook, admitted that he had lied to the jury about his testimony to the FBI agents, who confiscated \$9,300 in a suitcase when they arrested him for the bank robberies. Previously, Cordero had said that he told the agents that the money was bank loot but testified to the Franzese jury that none of the money was loot. Yesterday, he said that part of the money was stolen.

In answer to other defense questions, the slim, dark-haired witness, usually self-assured in his testimony, admitted that he lied to the federal agents when he told them he was present when an accomplice in the bank robberies bought two semi-automatic rifles. Cordero said yesterday that he was not present, but then admitted that one of the rifles was seized when he was arrested. He was then excused. The trial is to resume today.

## Police in Nassau Arrest 14 More in Drug Roundup

Mineola—Nassau narcotics detectives, continuing their crackdown on street sales of drugs, arrested 14 persons this morning on charges of sale and possession of dangerous drugs.

Police said among those arrested was Paul Armstrong III, the 20-year-old son of Levittown Postmaster Paul Armstrong Jr. The younger Armstrong listed his occupation as "unemployed." Also taken into custody were three Uniondale High School students, one of them a girl, a Long Beach High School student and a student from the University of Miami. All were to be arraigned in County Court.

Raiders, armed with warrants issued following grand jury indictments returned last Friday, made arrests at suspects' homes. The charges, which could bring sentences from five to 20 years, involved heroin, marijuana, hashish and amphetamines ("pep pills").

Detectives had launched three previous drug raids beginning Tuesday in which they arrested 20 persons in various Nassau locations.
