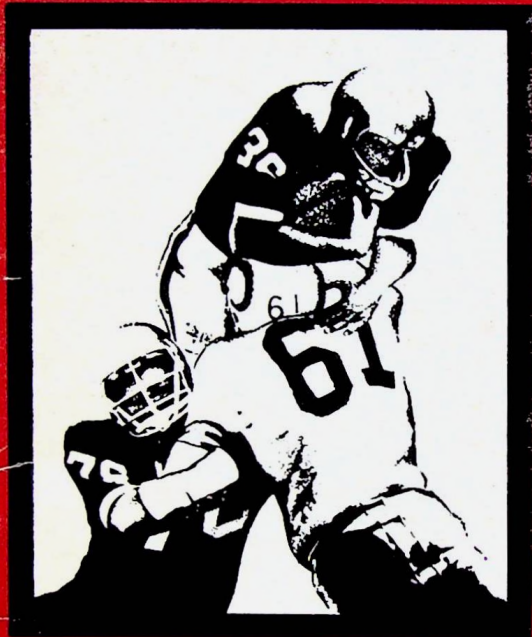

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Ferdinand A. "Andy" Geiger

Brown's youthful (33) director of athletics Andy Geiger is entering his second full year at the helm.

Born and raised in Syracuse, N.Y., Geiger attended Thetford Academy in Thetford, Vt., and received his B.A. degree in physical education from Syracuse University in 1961. He rowed bow during his four years at Syracuse and, in his senior year, was president of the Syracuse Rowing Club.

Geiger was named freshman crew coach at Dartmouth College in 1961 and remained there until the summer of 1964 when he returned to his alma mater as assistant director of athletics. He held that position until mid-1970 when he joined the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference as an assistant commissioner, just prior to his appointment at Brown.

Geiger is a member of the board of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen and is the founding editor of "The Oarsman," the association's official publication for its more than 4,000 members. In addition, he is president of the E.A.R.C. and secretary of the



United States Olympic Rowing Committee, whose chairman is Vic Michalson, Brown's crew coach. Ironically, Michalson was Geiger's freshman crew coach at Syracuse.

Brown's A.D. is married to the former Eleanor Rollings of Washington, D.C.

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

Robert A. Seiple

Bob Seiple '65, an outstanding two-sport athlete during his undergraduate days at Brown, was appointed the school's assistant director of athletics last July 1.

Seiple was an end on the football team and won All-Ivy League and honorable mention All-East honors his senior year while being voted the team's "Most Valuable Player." Altogether during his three varsity seasons he caught 54 passes for 545 yards and 5 touchdowns.

During the spring, he was a first-line middle for Coach Cliff Stevenson on the lacrosse team.

Seiple, who left a position in the Brown Admission Office, acts as a liaison between the admission office and the athletic department as well as providing a similar service for the Alumni Office.

The end result should be an improvement in Brown's athletic recruiting efforts.



The 29-year old Seiple still pursues his personal athletic interests with the Providence Rugby Club.

He is married to the former Margaret Ann Goebel and they have two children, Chris four and Amy two.

HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Leonard C. Jardine



Still the youthful epitome of energy, enthusiasm and optimism, Len Jardine is beginning his sixth season as director of Brown's football fortunes.

A native of Chicago, Jardine was an outstanding student and football player during his undergraduate days at Purdue. A strong, two-way end, he was captain of both his freshman and varsity elevens; in his final semester he earned a perfect, 6.0 scholastic index in the School of Science and was graduated with a distinguished rating.

He was named the "Most Valuable Player" on the 1959 Purdue squad and was selected for the Academic All-America and the Big Ten academic teams. Jardine also served as co-captain on the Blue Squad in the Blue-Gray game and received Purdue's Nobel E. Kizer Scholastic Award as a fitting climax to a brilliant college career.

Jardine accepted his first football coaching job at his prep school alma

mater, Loyola Academy of Wilmette, Ill., which had been the doormat of the strong Catholic Chicago League with a record of only 5 victories in 33 games during the previous 4 years. During the next 4 seasons under Jardine, Loyola captured 2 championships and compiled a 28-2 record.

Then came the call from his college alma mater and he re-joined Jack Mollenkopf's staff as coach of offensive backs and receivers. In this assignment, he established himself as the developer of Purdue's fine corps of pass catchers and, in his final effort, he saw his Boilermakers defeat Southern California in the 1967 Rose Bowl.

Shortly after this conquest, it was off to Providence and Brown University in the Ivy League.

Jardine is married to the former Marianne Brown, whom he met at Purdue, and the couple has four children: Lenny (13), Nancy (11), Elizabeth (9) and Tom (6).

THE ASSISTANTS

ALEX NAHIGIAN -- LINEBACKER COACH



Currently serving his 24th season as a member of the Brown staff, Alex is the lone holdover from the regimes of Rip Engle, Gus Zitrides, Al Kelley and John McLaughry. A graduate of Holy Cross, '42, Nahigian played football there until an injury ended his grid career, and was an outstanding baseball player for three seasons. After graduation he played pro ball in the New England League for several seasons. He has been associated with the Pawtucket school system since 1942 as a teacher and coach, though his football coaching has been restricted to Brown since 1949. A versatile man, he coaches the varsity baseball team at Providence College in the spring. Alex is regarded as one of the best scouts in collegiate football today. He is married and the father of three daughters.

JIM HEALY -- DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

One of Holy Cross' all-time football greats, he won just about every conceivable postseason honor. When the 1959 season was completed, Healy had been selected to the All-New England, All-East and Catholic All-America teams, besides an honorable mention All-America. He played a year of professional football with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League and briefly with the Denver Broncos of the American Football League. Like Jardine himself, Healy compiled an imposing schoolboy coaching record. In six seasons at St. Peter's High in Worcester, Mass., he was 45-12-2 and his career record was 68-16-2. At St. John's High in Washington, D.C., he was a four-sport letterman and was selected the best football player in the Washington area. He was included in "Who's Who in American Colleges" in 1959. Healy is married and has three children.



JOE FARAGALLI -- OFFENSIVE LINE COACH



Former All-East tackle at Villanova in the early 1950's. Graduated from Villanova in 1954 with a B.S. degree in education. Captained football team as senior and was voted their most valuable player two years in a row. Selected to aforementioned All-East eleven in 1952. During the years 1954-56, he was a player-coach with the 11th Infantry Division stationed with the U.S. Army in Germany. From 1957 to 1961, he was head football coach at St. Thomas More High School in Philadelphia and served as the line coach at Villanova from 1962 to 1966. For two seasons, Faragalli was the line coach for the Canadian Football League's Winnipeg Blue Bombers in Winnipeg, Manitoba. He is married and the father of three children.

TOM URBANIK -- OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD COACH

Multi-honored performer at Penn State, class of 1964. Besides being mentioned on A.P. and U.P.I. All America teams, the fullback was selected first team All East, played in the prestigious North-South All-Star game and was picked on Penn State's All-Time football team. Urbanik was drafted by both the Washington Redskins of the N.F.L. and the Buffalo Bills of the A.F.L. Eventually played the 1965 season with Washington. In 1966 Urbanik played for the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League. Upon leaving pro football, he served as an instructor in business education in the Philadelphia school system and was the summer program director for Friends Neighborhood Guild of that city, an organization that worked with youths in poverty areas. The 30-year older received a Master's Degree in Health, Physical Education and Recreation from Temple University. He is married and has no children. His coaching experience includes stints at Villanova and Temple.



GARY BLACKNEY -- DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD COACH



The youngest member of Jardine's staff at 27, Blackney replaced Dick Selcer who became head coach at Xavier University in 1970. He attended Wesley College from 1962 to 1964 and was captain and most valuable player on the football team. He transferred to the University of Connecticut where he graduated in 1967. He starred in football for UConn and was selected to a weekly All-Conference team. For four seasons, he was an assistant freshman football coach at UConn, and, for three years, an instructor and varsity basketball coach at the Mansfield Training School. Married and the father of two children, Blackney received a Master's Degree in physical education from Connecticut in 1968.

JACK DILLON -- RECEIVERS

A rugged 5-10, 190-pound offensive guard during his playing days at Brown, Jack Dillon ('60) is in charge of the team's receivers. Dillon was sidelined his entire sophomore year at Brown with a broken leg but made a complete comeback and logged 384 minutes of playing time in 1959. Prior to his joining the Brown staff, Dillon was a most successful high school coach at Bishop Hendricken in Warwick. After an initial 3-5-1 campaign in 1967, his 1968 squad went 8-1 and captured Hendricken's first Class A title. His 1969 Hawks finished second with a 7-2 record which made Dillon's 15-3 slate the best among Class A coaches for those two years. Married and the father of three children, Dillon is a native of Torrington, Conn., the same town that produced Brown's head basketball coach, Gerry Alaimo.



JACK GEORGE -- HEAD FRESHMAN COACH



The Boston native came to Brown after a highly successful high school tenure in the Westchester County (NY) area. He is a graduate of Boston Latin High School, where he starred in football and baseball and was named to the National Honor Society. He earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education from the University of Massachusetts in 1958 after interrupting his education to serve two years in the Army. At UMass George was a varsity letterman three years in football and lacrosse and was named to the Dean's List several times. Upon graduation, he was awarded a teaching fellowship at Penn State University, where he received his Masters Degree in Physical Education and served as freshman backfield coach. He was backfield coach at Archbishop Stepinac High School in White Plains, N.Y., before moving to Fox Lane High School as head football and wrestling coach. Competing in the Northern Westchester League, his football teams placed second three times and his wrestling team won one league championship. He is the brother of Brown's head athletic trainer, Frank George.

BILL RUSSO -- FRESHMAN ASSISTANT, VARSITY SCOUT

A native of Glasgo, Conn., Bill Russo coaches Brown's freshman linemen and teams with Alex Nahigian to give the Bruin varsity a superb scouting combination. Although only 5-7, 190, Russo was a bruising offensive guard at Brown ('69) for three varsity seasons. He was a dean's list student who majored in philosophy and was a member of the committee that formulated the school's new curriculum. A former captain and All-League selection at Griswold H.S., he received the Kaman Aircraft Corp. Scholarship Award and the Bausch and Lomb Science Award upon graduation. Married to the former Susan Fowler, Russo has his sights set on a future head coaching position.



RICH SCOGGINS -- FRESHMAN ASSISTANT

The 1970 defensive captain for Wesleyan University. Rich Scoggins is in his second year as an assistant freshman coach -- and his second majoring in chemistry in Brown's graduate school. A linebacker in his playing days, he earned three varsity letters in football and three in track; in the spring of 1971 he placed fifth in the 440 hurdles at the New England Track Championships. In his senior year he received two cherished awards -- one for outstanding loyalty and sportsmanship and another for outstanding work in the field of chemistry. Rich was voted Most Valuable Player honors in football and track while attending Chelmsford (Mass.) High School. He is a bachelor.

MEDICAL STAFF

Dr. G. Edward Crane -- Team Physician



An immensely popular physician, "Doc" Crane has served in this capacity for Brown teams for more than a quarter of a century and has witnessed 232 consecutive Brown football games. Dr. Crane carved out a fine athletic career in hockey and baseball at Classical H.S. in Providence and at Brown, from where he graduated in 1931. He was elected to the Collegiate Hockey Hall of Fame in April of 1971 in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the sport. He introduced the protective face mask for goalies which is mandatory equipment under N.C.A.A. rules today. As further testimony of his invaluable services, he was made an honorary member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

Frank George -- Head Trainer

The younger brother of Brown's freshman football coach, Frank George has been the head trainer for the Bruins since 1966. He is a 1962 graduate of the University of Massachusetts and is the District I Director of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

Prospectus

New England "Coach of the Year" Ed Doherty played Cinderella in '71, picking up the remains of a team that had been destroyed by hepatitis and not won a game in two years — and guiding it to a respectable 4-6 record. Bruising fullback Joe Wilson heads the list of 28 returning lettermen but, after this, the talent drops off considerably. Lack of depth, obviously, will be Doherty's main concern — along with finding a consistent quarterback. Juniors Pete Vaas and Bob Orth, along with senior Colin Clapton, are the prime candidates. This marks the first meeting between the Bruins and the Crusaders since 1953 when Brown won 6-0.

Although an unusually low number of only 14 lettermen are returning, the Rams could show more of the improvement that has marked each of Coach Jack Gregory's first two years at the helm. The offensive nucleus contains backs Sylvester "Molly" McGee and soph Dan Whitaker and "flyboys" Grant Denniston and Dan Weed. Linebackers Younis Zubchevich and Tony Keris will lead the defense. The Rams graduated a fine quarterback in Bob Ehrhardt so filling this hole may create some problems. Gregory's men will hit hard and could be explosive on offense but a Yankee Conference title may still be a bit premature.

The receivers are there to catch the ball, the leading rushers return, the defensive interior did not lose a man and the best prospect at quarterback in several years is healthy again — just a few of the pluses that lead Coach Harry Gamble towards optimism in 1972. Junior QB Tom Pinto will direct the offense with backs Bob Hoffman and Ron Dawson providing ground support and split end Don Clune, one of the league's best, severely testing enemy secondaries. Defensively, nine starters return, led by safety Steve Solow — one of the nation's top punt returners. The 1971 Quakers were hit by an unusual number of injuries; freedom from such adversity could make Gamble's optimism a reality.

Last year the Elis tumbled to their first losing season (4-5) since 1966 and, in order to climb back to the first division of the Ivy League, they must show more offensive thrust and more solid defense. Lettermen Roly Purrington and Don Pfeil lend depth at quarterback and All-Ivy halfback Dick Jauron is solid, but the offensive line could be comprised of sophomores. More sophomores, up from an undefeated freshman team, may find their way onto the defensive unit. Improvement in the passing game would take some of the pressure off Jauron but the Elis may still be a step away from the Ivy title.

Eight offensive starters return, led by QB Steve Stetson and split end Tyrone Bird while seven defensive starters come back, led by All-Ivy end Kevin Shea. A 4-2 frosh team will produce some quality players, especially quarterback Tom Snickenberger. If anything, the Big Green may have a bit of depth problem. However, the seniors on this team have lost only once in 25 varsity and freshman games and are not inclined to kick the winning habit.

POSITION-BY-POSITION ANALYSIS

Offense

ENDS — Split end Chip Regine one of the league's best but soph prospect Jeff Smith (6-3, 170) will keep him from resting on his laurels ... Tight end loses solid blocker in Nick Albertson ... Inexperienced junior Dom Starsia and soph prospect Bill Kairit (6-3, 215) must get the job done ... Could be a little shakey in the early going.

TACKLES — Very little experience here but best size Brown has had in years ... Probable starters are junior letterman John Lomicky (6-5, 239) and junior Steve Frager (6-3, 249), who is moving over from defense ... Top subs are all sophs, but also big -- Todd Youngblood (6-1, 215), Gordon Nelson (6-3, 225) and possibly Gary Howanec (6-1, 210).

GUARDS — Severely hit by graduation ... Senior letterman Pat Cafferty (5-11, 201) only experienced performer, everything else is a hodge-podge ... With the exception of junior Dick Smetanka (6-1, 207), who is moving over from tight end, everybody else is a soph ... Rick Zins (6-1, 210), Dan Potter (6-1, 210) and Howanec, if he plays here, are the most promising ... Not much size and a lot of "green" players.

CENTER — Possibly the weakest position on team ... Bruins will miss three-year veteran Mike Marino ... Job completely up for grabs between seldom-used senior Tom Sheldon (6-2, 187), junior Mike Cassidy (6-2, 207) and sophs Paul Chain (6-2, 185) and Erik Kolbell (6-0, 195) ... Unless somebody asserts himself and gets the job done, there will be many headaches.

QUARTERBACK — Potentially more talent here than in quite some time ... Senior Nino Moscardi improved greatly in '71 but still has a few flaws to iron out ... Strong passing arm but not much of a runner ... Job is his at the start ... Jardine sky-high on the possibilities of soph Pete Beatrice ... Has great arm, runs well and appears to be confident leader ... Lack of experience may slow him down at first but he should eventually make a name for himself.

RUNNING BACK — Loss of two-time All-Ivy Gary Bonner will hurt but, fortunately, Brown has more depth than ever before here ... Juniors Len Cherry and Bruce Watson speedy and shifty and experienced ... Watson may play some fullback, though ... Sophs Vince Sghiatti and Pete Cheviot rated very highly ... Position is in good shape although it would be "out of sight" with Bonner.

FULLBACK — Tom Spotts was an extremely reliable veteran for three years but Bruins may be able to compensate for his loss ... Watson a better runner than blocker but soph Mike Sokolowski man to watch ... Powerful runner who hits hard and blocks well ... Could be a good one ... Sophs Stan Pinkos and Gerry Chiara provide adequate depth.

FLANKER — Senior Dan Swartz experienced but a little erratic ... Has all the physical tools and could have a great year if he put it all together ... Thin and inexperienced, behind Swartz.

KICKER — Senior Tyler Chase, a soccer-style specialist, probably best in the league and a definite pro prospect ... Can consistently boot home field goals from over 40 yards ... Doesn't miss on PAT's ... Great weapon.

Defense

ENDS — Senior Mike Maricic (6-2, 220) one of league's better ends ... Should return to All-Ivy form of 1970 after being slowed by injuries last fall ... Other side a bit undecided ... Soph Gary Cavalli (6-5, 200), a fine prospect, and experienced junior Bob Condon (6-1, 215) prime candidates ... A little thin but available personnel more than adequate.

TACKLES — All-Ivy Bob Pangia (6-0, 225) one of the best in the east and a prime all-star candidate ... Gives position a touch of class ... Small (5-7, 197) but volatile Brian Ball candidate for other slot ... Senior Walt Haggstrom (6-0, 201), who has bounced around various positions, may finally have a home here ... Craig Harman (6-1, 200) best of the sophs ... Front-liners O.K. but depth light and inexperienced.

LINEBACKERS — Starting trio of co-captain Ken Cieplik (6-0, 200), Paul Henry (6-0, 195) and Dan Cesarz (6-0, 186) as good as any group in the league ... Cieplik should repeat All-Ivy honors ... Probably deepest area on team ... Converted fullback Dan Walus (6-1, 205) could make his presence felt ... Bill Taylor (6-0, 195), Bob Tryon (6-0, 190) and Greg Bertovich (6-1, 190) talented sophs.

HALFBACKS — The return of five lettermen insures a strong secondary again ... Rugged Tom McCaffrey and Joe Martino will man the corners ... Don Bogan an experienced reserve and Bob West, who may play a little safety, a promising soph.

SAFETIES — Junior Bob Watt potentially the best "monster back" in the league ... Definite all-star material ... Jim Kiernan experienced back-up man ... Junior Doug Jost picked up much experience as a soph at the inside safety slot ... Should do fine job ... Soph Niall Reardon top reserve.

PUNTER — Bruins graduated All-Ivy punter Jim Colby ... Soph Gary Dunn, who can boom 'em 60 yards, must develop more consistency ... Tyler Chase may be called on if Dunn doesn't produce.

Summary

Perhaps the key to the whole season will be how fast the completely rebuilt offensive line comes around. The Bruins, who expect to rely more on their passing game than in recent seasons, have some people who can put points on the scoreboard — if they have the time to operate. Coach Jardine plans to use his triple-option offense quite sparingly.

The defense, for the most part, suffered little from graduation. Experienced people are set at just about every position and, in many cases, first-class reserve material available. Co-captains Bob Pangia, a defensive tackle, and Ken Cieplik, a linebacker are standouts.

In summation, the defense will have to hold the fort until the offense jells. The attitude of the players is outstanding so, with a little luck in the early part of the season, Brown could hang a few in the win column.

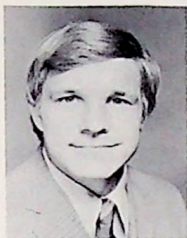

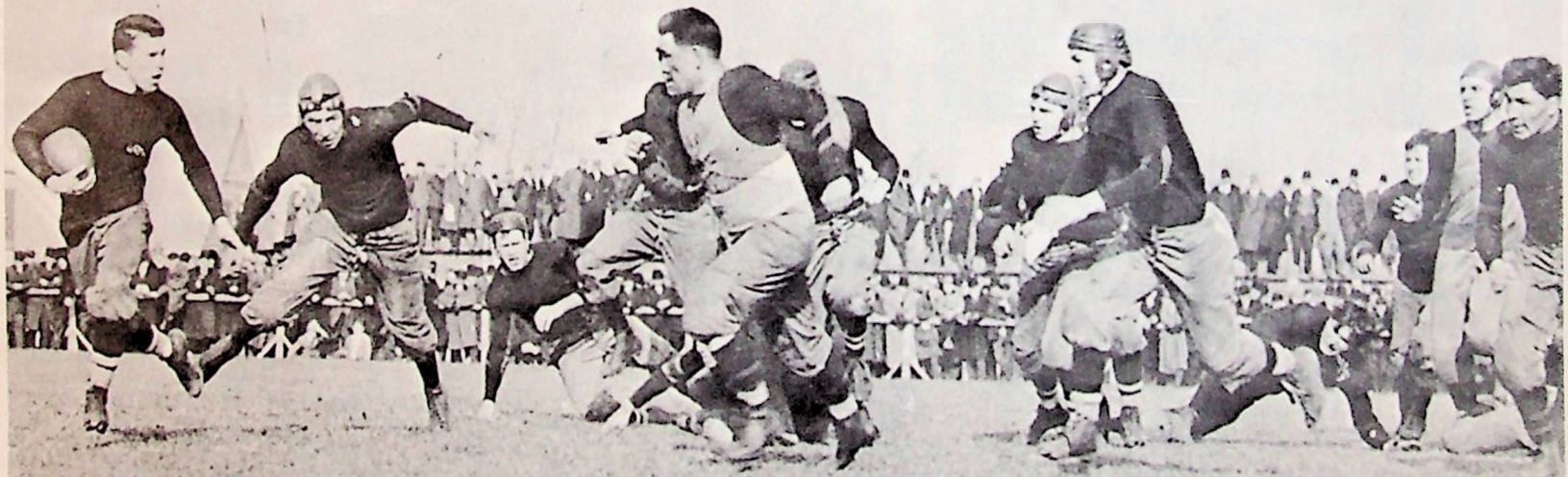

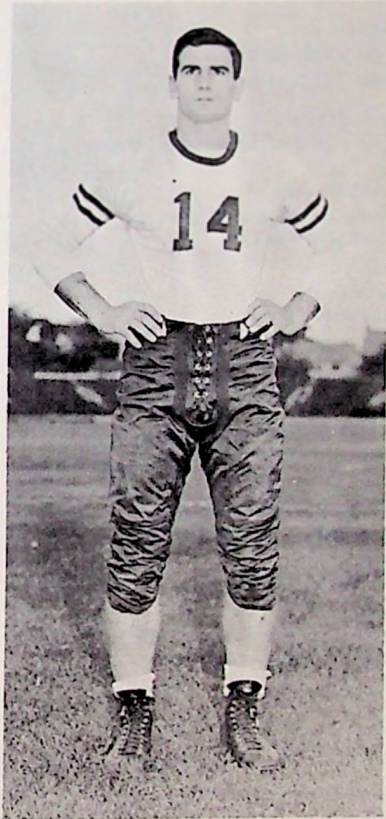

Brown's Roll of Honor

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A.C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeORMOND (Tuss) McLAUGHRY

A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Sharon, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War II. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history. His 1928 and 1932 teams lost only one game. Before leaving Brown for Dartmouth in 1941, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob, played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He now resides in Norwich, Vt.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS (Fritz) POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest Negro players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

WILLIAM EARL SPRACKLING, '12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aeriels, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910, still a Brown record, and holds the school record for field goals in a season (6) and career (10). He also owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-11 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. He is now retired from his position as president of the Anaconda Wire and Cable Company.

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head-coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N. C.

THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, the 1926 team earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarterback; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, fullback.
