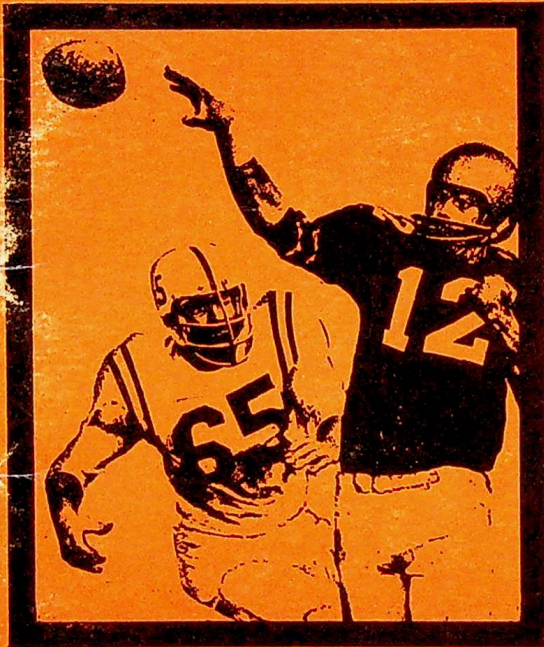

Ferdinand A. "Andy" Geiger Director of Athletics

Brown's youthful (34) Director of Athletics Andy Geiger has been at the helm since 1971.

Born and raised in Syracuse, N.Y., Geiger attended Thetford Academy in Thetford, Vt., and received his B.A. degree in physical education from Syracuse University in 1961. He rowed during his four years at Syracuse and, in his senior year, was president of the Syracuse Rowing Club.

Geiger was named freshman crew coach at Dartmouth College in 1961 and remained there until the summer of 1964 when he returned to his alma mater as assistant director of athletics. He held that position until mid-1970 when he joined the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference as an assistant commissioner, just prior to his appointment at Brown.

Geiger is a member of the board of the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen and is the founding editor of "The Oars-



man," the association's official publication for its more than 4,000 members. In addition, he is Vice-President of the United States Olympic Rowing Committee, whose chairman is Vic Michalson, Brown's crew coach. Ironically, Michalson was Geiger's freshman crew coach at Syracuse.

Brown's A.D. is married to the former Eleanor Rollings of Washington, D.C.

Robert A. Seiple Assistant Director

Bob Seiple '65, an outstanding two-sport athlete during his undergraduate days at Brown, is entering his second full year as Assistant Director of Athletics.

Seiple was an end on the football team and won All-Ivy and All-East honors while being voted the team's "Most Valuable Player" during his senior year. Although he was a defensive end when two platoon football was reintroduced at the college level in 1964, Seiple's most impressive statistics were on offense where he completed his three year varsity career with 54 receptions for 545 yards and 5 touchdowns. For this he was named to the "Brown Team of the Decade," offense, of the 1960's.

During the spring, he was a first-line middle for Coach Cliff Stevenson on the lacrosse team. In 1964 he was named to the All-New England lacrosse team and captained the Brown team in 1965.

Following graduation, Seiple worked briefly in the Brown Admission office before joining the United States Marine Corps,



where he rose to the rank of Captain. Flying in the A6A "Intruder" jet aircraft, he completed 300 combat missions over North and South Vietnam and was awarded the Vietnam Campaign Medal with five Battle Stars, the Combat Action Ribbon, the Navy Commendation Award with Combat "V", 28 Air Medals, and the Distinguished Flying Cross.

The 30-year-old Seiple spent an additional eighteen months in the Admission Office prior to assuming his present duties. He is married to the former Margaret Ann Goebel and they have two children, Chris five and Amy four.



John Anderson Head Football Coach

John Anderson, Brown's head coach, is the man who transformed the football program at Middlebury (Vt.) College from bleak to beautiful in four short years.

When the 39-year old Anderson arrived at Middlebury he inherited a faltering team which had won only eleven games in the previous five seasons. Anderson completely turned the situation around. Following a 2-6 season his first year he coached the Panthers to 5-3, 6-2 and 8-0 records his last three seasons; an overall record of 21-11. This year's undefeated season was the first in 36 years for Middlebury and only the second since their football program was established in 1893.

Anderson began his college coaching career at Dartmouth, where he spent one year as freshman coach and three seasons as offensive line coach under Bob Blackman.

He was defensive line coach for Joe Yukica at Boston College for a year prior to becoming head coach at Middlebury.

The new Brown coach is confident he can turn the Bruins into a winner. Although Brown has only had one winning season in the last 14 years, Anderson maintains that "Brown has everything it needs to win. The challenge is to get our staff organized and put it all together. I feel Brown has made a real commitment to be competitive in line with the philosophy and principles of the Ivy League," he says.

Anderson is a native of Shippensburg, Pa., and a 1954 graduate of Ursinus College. He spent ten years coaching high school football in Pennsylvania before moving into the college ranks.

He and his wife, Marjorie, are the parents of two sons, ages 15 and 4, and a daughter, age 13.

Bill Russo—Offensive Line

A 1969 Brown alumnus and a holdover from last year's Bruin coaching staff, Bill Russo was a part-time assistant in 1969 and 1970 and was promoted to a full-time position in 1971. The past three seasons Russo was the defensive co-ordinator for the Brown freshmen and, in 1972, was also the head varsity scout. In this role, last year Russo completely revised Brown's scouting system. Working with Jack Duffy, the head of the Brown Computer Services, Russo put the entire scouting program on computer.

Russo is a native of Glasgo, Conn. and an alumnus of Groswood High School where he captained the football team his senior year and earned All-League honors. At Brown, he was an offensive guard his sophomore year and a linebacker his last two years.

Russo was a consistent dean's list student, majoring in philosophy, and was a member of the committee that formulated the school's new curriculum. He is married to the former Susan Fowler of Marlborough, Conn.



Andy Talley—Offensive Backfield

Andy Talley is a young man of 29 who helped Coach John Anderson develop the Middlebury College Panthers into a potent offensive football team. Talley is a native of Bryn Mawr, Pa., and a 1961 alumnus of Haverford High School where he was an All-

East Delaware County selection in football. He played defensive halfback for four seasons at Southern Connecticut State College in New Haven, Conn., and, in both 1966 and 1967, the Owls were the Eastern Football Conference champions.

Talley remained at Southern Connecticut State after graduation in 1968 and obtained a Master's Degree in physical education in 1970. During those two years he served as backfield coach and head wrestling coach at Simsbury High School in Simsbury, Conn. The football team compiled a 16-2-0 record during his tenure while his wrestlers won the North-West Sectional Championship in 1968. That year, he was nominated for Wrestling Coach of the Year in Connecticut.

Talley is married to the former Arlene Zitnay of Hartford, Conn.



Hank Small—Quarterbacks and Receivers

Henry N. (Hank) Small has been an assistant coach at Florida State University for the past two years. He is the first quarterback and receiver coach in Brown football history.

The 25-year-old Small coached varsity receivers in his first season at Florida State (one of the nation's top passing teams in recent years), and handled quarterbacks and running backs as freshman head offensive coach last year. He was an assistant coach at Rutgers for two years prior to joining the Florida State staff.

With Coach Anderson's promised multiple offense featuring a "sophisticated passing attack," Small should be kept busy.

Small, who grew up in Livingston, N.J., earned a bachelor of arts degree in biology from Gettysburg College in 1969 and a master of science degree in physiology from

Rutgers in 1971. He was a flanker at Gettysburg for three years and a member of the 1967 Lambert Cup team. He graduated from Gettysburg as the athlete with the highest academic average.

Small is married to the former Pamela King.



Dave Ritchie—Linebackers

Before joining Anderson's staff at Brown, Dave Ritchie was an assistant coach and outstanding recruiter at the University of Cincinnati and former All-County quarterback for New Bedford (Mass.) High School. The 35-year-old Ritchie has coached linebackers and defensive tackles at Cincinnati for the past four seasons.

Ritchie, who holds both a B.S. and a master's degree in education from Cincinnati, grew up in New Bedford. He played for New Bedford High from 1952 to 1954 and completed secondary school at Withrow High in Cincinnati where he was an All-State choice at fullback in 1955. At the University of Cincinnati he played fullback and linebacker and was the leading punter in the Missouri Valley in the 1959-60 season.

He became assistant coach at Greenbrier Military School in Lewisburg, West Va., in 1962 and spent seven years there. He was head coach during his last three seasons at Greenbrier with his teams compiling an overall record of 18 wins, seven losses and two ties. He earned coach of the year honors in Greenbrier County in 1968 and the following year returned to the University of Cincinnati as an assistant coach.

Ritchie is married with three children.



Joe Wirth—Defensive Line

As assistant coach at Holy Cross in 1968 Joe Wirth handled the defensive line and the linebackers. He joined Colgate as a defensive line coach the following year. For the past two seasons he has been defensive coordinator at Colgate with direct responsibility for the defensive ends and linebackers.

The 35-year-old Wirth grew up in Pittsburgh, Pa., where he was captain of the North Catholic High School team in his senior year. He played semi-professional football in the Greater Pittsburgh League before entering the U.S. Army in 1954. He is a 1960 graduate of West Virginia University, where he played offensive center and defensive linebacker and was co-captain in his senior year.

The new Brown assistant was head coach at North Catholic High School in Pittsburgh for three years before entering the college coaching ranks.

Wirth is married and the father of six.



Freddie Manuel Jr.—Defensive Backs

Freddie Manuel, the newest member of Coach Anderson's staff, is a 1973 graduate of the University of Oregon. A hard-hitting defensive halfback, Manuel starred for three years with the Oregon football team, then turned down a "free agent" contract with the San Francisco 49's to accept his present position at Brown.

A sociology major at Oregon, Manuel was attracted to the coaching profession by his

desire to work with young people. During his undergraduate years he was constantly involved with tutorial programs, working with underprivileged children, and coordinating both academic and athletic programs for the disadvantaged.

Manuel was a star athlete at Ballejo Senior High School in Ballejo, California, where he was born and raised. During his final two years of high school he was All-League, All-City, and All Northern California on both offense and defense. In his senior year he won the coveted Golden Helmet Award as the outstanding football player in the city. Additionally, he lettered in track and basketball, making the All-Northern California team in the latter sport.

Freddie Manuel is 24, married, and the father of two children.

member of Brown's youthful staff. Goldberger was born in New York City, and attended high school at W.T. Clarke in Westbury, Long Island. As quarterback he was captain his senior year, and voted All-Conference.

At Middlebury Mike was moved to defensive halfback. He played three years for John Anderson. His senior year he was a member of Anderson's 1971 6-2 Middlebury team. Last fall Goldberger taught math at a Vermont reform school and coached part time at his alma mater.



**Howard Vandersea
Mike Goldberger — Freshmen**

Brown's new freshman football coach is a large, quietly personable man named Howard Vandersea who has played and coached on college and semi-professional levels. His assistant is Mike Goldberger, who distinguished himself as a high school quarterback and who played and coached for Brown's new head coach, John Anderson, when they were both at Middlebury.

Vandersea grew up in Northbridge, Mass., and played football both ways at Bates College in Maine. He played linebacker on defense, and center, guard and tackle on offense. He made All-Maine Conference teams three years, and was named to All-New England teams his last two years.

Vandersea's coaching career includes high schools in Maine and New Jersey, the semi-pro "Sea Hawks" of Portland, Maine, and New Jersey's "Generals" who were North Atlantic Coast champs the year Vandersea coached their defense. After a year at B.U. in 1968, Vandersea has spent the last four years as defensive coordinator at Tufts.

An immensely popular physician, "Doc" Crane has served in this capacity for Brown teams for more than a quarter of a century and has witnessed 241 consecutive Brown football games. Dr. Crane carved out a fine athletic career in hockey and baseball at Classical H.S. in Providence and at Brown, from where he graduated in 1931. He was elected to the Collegiate Hockey Hall of Fame in April of 1971 in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the sport. He introduced the protective face mask for goalies which is mandatory equipment under N.C.A.A. rules today. As further testimony of his invaluable services, he was made an honorary member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.



Frank George—Head Trainer

Frank George has been the head trainer for the Bruins since 1966. He is a 1962 graduate of the University of Massachusetts and is the District I Director of the National Athletic Trainers' Association.

Prospectus

With 28 lettermen and a veteran squad, Coach Jack Gregory is "guardedly optimistic" as he looks forward to the 1973 season. His optimism is based on the fact that for the first time since he took over the coaching reins at Kingston in 1970, the Rams will have balance in all three upper-classes. Heretofore, he had few sophomores in his initial years, less juniors in 1971 and only seven seniors last season. Among the returnees forming the nucleus of the 1973 team are senior co-captains Henry Hill, an All-New England selection at offensive tackle, and Steve Garofalo, an All-Yankee Conference pick at defensive safety. All of the 1972 starters return on the offensive line, while the defensive unit is intact but for two

positions among the regulars from last season. The backfield returnees include all three lettermen who finished the campaign at their respective positions, namely Sylvester "Molly" McGee and Paul Podgurski at halfback and Danny Whitaker at fullback. The big question-mark is quarterback where no less than six players will be vying for the position, including senior Kim Purcell, junior Paul Ryan and sophomore Steve Crone. Senior linebacker Younis Zubchevich is being highly heralded as one of the finest at his position in the East, while a number of sophomores are tabbed as players to watch. Included are quarterback Crone, linebackers Ernie Myers and Dean Julien, defensive tackles Dave Potter and Bob Cannon and tight-end Jim Jackson.

Penn has suitable talent to make a run at the Ivy League championship. Marc Mandel and Tom Pinto, both starters at quarterback, return to pass to All-Ivy end Don Clune or to hand off to backs Adolph Bellizeare, Ralph McGee or John Sheffield with the former one of the nation's more dangerous runners. Tackle Terry Frech, guard Dan Thompson and center Bob Jameson return from an offensive line which blocked for the most

effective offense stastically in the school's history. Standouts defensively are 6'6" end Bob Thomson and a triumverate of veteran secondary personnel—Jim Bumgardner, Glenn Casey, and Ken Bald. Yale head coach Carm Cozza's chief job this year is to replace All-American Dick Jauron. Jauron was the key to the offense of the last three years and now that responsibility will have to be spread around. Yale does have two excellent runners in Rudy Green and Tyrell Hennings and a fine young quarterback in Tom Doyle. If their passing game becomes more consistent Yale should have another fine attack. The offensive line is big and experienced and the defense, with a few

adjustments, could be just as strong. Men to watch are 250-pound tackle Kelly Peddicord and 235-pound tackle Dick Feryok up front and captain Gary Wilhelm at the linebacking spot. Yale's secondary, with quarterback Carl Lewis and halfback Elvin Charity providing speed and experience, should be the best Yale has had in several years. Cozza will have to juggle his personnel to plug some holes but Yale should be a contender once again for the Ivy League crown.

Prospectus

Dartmouth loses fifteen starters from the team that set an Ivy League record of four straight championships. Only three starters return on defense and four on offense and the Big Green will be its most inexperienced in ten years this fall. Despite heavy overall losses, Dartmouth remains strong at running back. Speedy Rick Klupchak, Doug Lind, and Ben Bridges should be fighting it out for the halfback positions. Senior Ellis Rowe, who has the potential to develop into one of the Ivy's top running backs, returns at halfback.

Unfortunately, the remainder of the offensive positions are wide open. With the exception of co-captain and two-time All-Ivy defensive end Tom Csatari, the defensive unit will display an abundance of young and inexperienced players. The 1973 Dartmouth team will rely on the quick maturity of a large group of these younger men. With the lack of returning veterans it is possible that as many as eight sophomores could start and their performance will, in large part, determine the fate of Dartmouth football in 1973.

Reconstructing his offensive line and developing new pass receivers are the principal objectives facing Jack Musick in preparing his eighth Cornell team. From last year's squad that had a 6-3 record and tied for third with Penn in the Ivy League, Musick has 24 lettermen split evenly between offensive and defensive performers. Only guards Ray Kowalski and Jim Popielinski return from the starting offensive line, however, and all four of the top '72 receivers (George Milosevic, Barry Rosser, Keith Daub, and John McKeown who totalled 1146 yards of the team's 1235 receiving) must be replaced. The offensive backfield should be highly proficient...Mark Allen, a two-year starter, an All-Ivy 2nd team selection last

season and one of the East's best, returns at quarterback...Last year's three tailbacks—Dan Malone, Horace Bradshaw and Rich Russo—rushed for 1517 yards of the team's 1915 (partly compensating for the NCAA record 1881 yards gained by Ed Marinaro in '71)...Sam Costa is a capable replacement at fullback for the graduated Bob Joehl. The running corps will be reinforced by an exceptional tailback in sophomore Don Fanelli (6-2, 210) who averaged 5.0 yards for an undefeated 6-0 freshman team. The Big Red's long suit appears to be the defensive unit led by linebacker Capt. Bob Lally and senior middle guard Mike Phillips, two of the East's, if not the nation's, most imposing players.

A Look at the Bruins

Talk to Coach John Anderson about his first team at Brown and one word keeps popping up with an exclamation point following it—enthusiasm!

"There are at least three reasons why team spirit is so high at this point," Anderson relates. "First, we have an unusually large number of veterans returning and all have a burning desire to win. Secondly, our undefeated freshmen know what it's like to win big so the enthusiasm they have is only natural. Finally, we've had several people who had given up football, for one reason or another, contact us about returning to the squad. Certainly, this is a healthy sign."

With a new coaching staff taking office, it's only natural to expect a shuffling of player personnel to shore up the team's weaknesses and take advantage of the strengths. Therefore, Anderson readily admits that not even a "tentative" starting lineup exists at the moment; however, he does recognize the fact that Brown has some talented ballplayers who are going to make their presence felt around the Ivy League this fall.

The number one position in football, of course, is the quarterback and Anderson is fortunate to have Peter Beatrice (Swampscott, Mass.) on hand. As a mere

sophomore, Beatrice broke or tied a total of three Brown passing records and led the Ivies in this vital department.

The Bruins would also appear to have great depth in this area, with Dennis Coleman (Darby, Pa.), a transfer who guided Arizona Western J.C. to 19 straight victories, junior Gary Martin (Royal Oak, Mich.) and soph Rich Fortunato (Montclair, N.J.), the top signal caller on that 5-0 Cub team.

Whoever is under center will have talented people to give the ball to, whether it be via the passing route or on a handoff. Junior split end Jeff Smith (Walpole, Mass.) was second in receiving last fall with 23 receptions for 346 yards and 5 TD's; ironically, he did all of his damage against Ivy teams and finished sixth in the league.

Tight end is solid, with 6-3, 228-pound Bill Kairit (Bridgewater, Mass.) and 6-0, 200-pound Gary Dunn (Branford, Conn.). Kairit, in particular, has great tools—outstanding size and strength, adequate speed and a pair of hands that can really hold on to the ball.

Anderson feels the running back position will be one of the team's strengths, with seniors Len Cherry (Lanham, Md.) and Bruce Watson (Milford, Del.) leading the way. Vince Sghiatti (Jessup, Pa.) is a shifty junior who will be given a chance to win a job while 6-0, 200-pound soph Hubie Morgan (Bronx, N.Y.) may be the breakaway threat Brown has lacked in recent years. The leading rusher on his Cub team and a promising dash man for the track team, Morgan has blazing speed and great strength.

The blocking back slot is solid, too, with juniors Mike Sokolowski (Revere, Mass.) and Pete Cheviot (Amityville, N.Y.) and soph Rick Hall (Carmel, Calif.). In addition, senior Dan Walus (Warren, Mich.) may be moved from linebacker to this position, where he has played most of his football.

The offensive line leader is second team All-Ivy center Mike Cassidy (Patton, Pa.) but the competition at guard and tackle is wide open. One thing is certain, though, the Bruins will have outstanding size up front. Players to watch are seniors Steve Frager (6-3, 270, Chestnut Hill, Mass.), John Lomicky (6-5, 240, W. New York, N.J.), and Dick Smetanka (6-1, 214, Detroit, Mich.); juniors Gary Howanec (6-1, 221, Kulomont, Pa.), Tom Agosta (6-2, 195, Detroit, Mich.) and Rick Zins (6-1, 215, Royal Oak, Mich.); and sophomores Dan Detore (6-2, 235, W. Orange, N.J.), Kevin Mundt (6-5, 225, St. Louis, Mo.) and Eliot Varner (6-2, 220, N. Massapequa N.Y.).

Brown graduated Tyler Chase, one of the Ivy League's greatest placekickers, but the team should experience no loss of quality here since soccer-stylist Jose Violante (Milford, Mass.) showed flashes of brilliance as a Cub. His most memorable moment last fall came when he booted a 50-yard field goal in a win over the U.R.I. subvarsity; Chase set the varsity record last November with a 46-yarder.

Under "defensive end" junior Gary Cavalli (6-5, 210, Nutley, N.J.) and senior Bob Condon (6-1, 214, Darien, Conn.) top the returnees while Steve Cunningham (6-6, 210, W. Sayville, N.Y.) and Phil Bartlett (6-2, 190, Esmond, R.I.) appear to be the best of the sophomores.

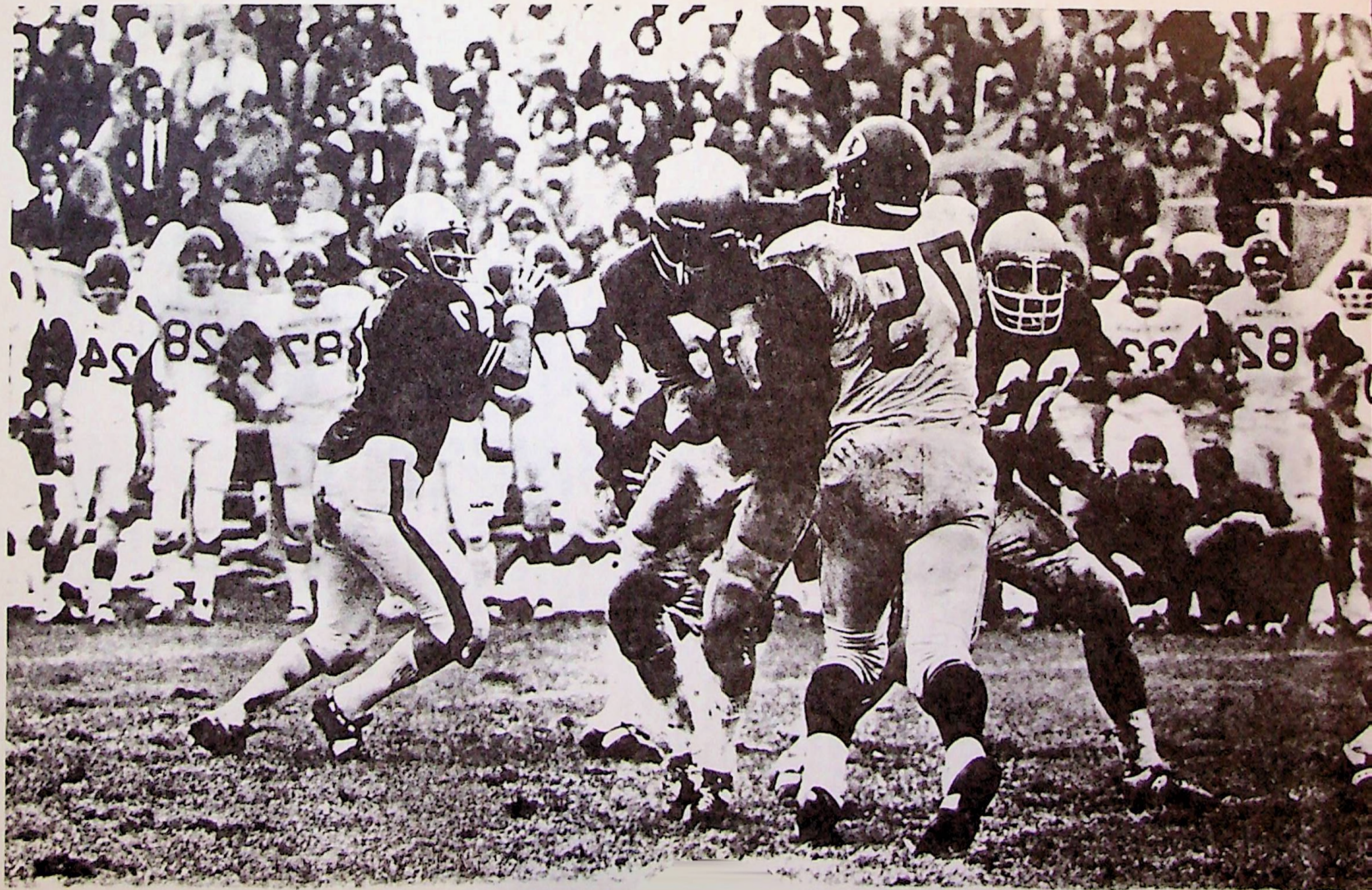
Tackle is a real problem area since three lettermen graduated and captain Brian Ball (5-7, 204, Washington, D.C.) is expected to be shifted to linebacker. In addition Tom Ford (6-0, 200, Yardley, Pa.), who starred for the Cubs at tackle, will probably be moved to linebacker because, like Ball, of his size.

Literally, then, letterman George Powers (6-0, 214, Dorchester, Mass.) is the only experienced tackle who returns.

Brown has always been strong at linebacker and 1973 will be no exception. Dan Cesarz (Westland, Mich.), Bob Tryon (Walpole, Mass.), and Gregg Bertovich (Elyria, Ohio) comprise a talented, experienced trio while Keith Powell (Downers Grove, Ill.), Stan Calvert (Clifton, N.J.), and Ames Ressa (Sands Point, N.Y.) are quality sophs. In addition, Brown will receive a real boost if junior Bill Taylor (Alexandria, Va.), who missed almost all of last season with a knee injury, regains the form he displayed as a freshman.

The secondary, a team's last line of defense, will benefit from a liberal sprinkling of veterans and aggressive sophomores. Six lettermen return—Doug Jost (Eugene, Ore.), Bob Watt (Hinsdale, Ill.), Joe Martino (Valley Stream, N.Y.), Jamie Kiernan (Chappaqua, N.Y.), Niall Reardon (N. Bergen, N.J.), and Don Bogan (Wantagh, N.Y.)—but a couple may be hard-pressed to hold on to their starting assignments. Sophs Mark Herendeen (Newton, Mass.), Tom Clark (N. Bergen, N.J.), and Bruce Convissar (Leominster, Mass.) will be pushing them hard for playing time.

Dunn, who has connected on a couple of 60-yarders, will probably handle the punting chores.

Brown Roll of Honor

National Hall of Fame

John W. Heisman, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A.C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeOrmond (Tuss) McLaughry

A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Shaaron, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War III. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history. His 1928 and 1932 teams lost

only one game. Before leaving Dartmouth in 1941, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob, played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He now resides in Norwich, Vt.

Frederick Douglas (Fritz) Pollard, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest Negro players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game (1916), and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

Edward North Robinson, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925, when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown.

He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945.

William Earl Sprackling, 12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aeri-als, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910 and, until this year, held the school record for field goals in a season (6) and career (10).

He also owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-11 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. He is now retired from his position as president of the Anaconda Wire and Cable Company.

W.Wallace Wade, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took

over the head-coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N.C.

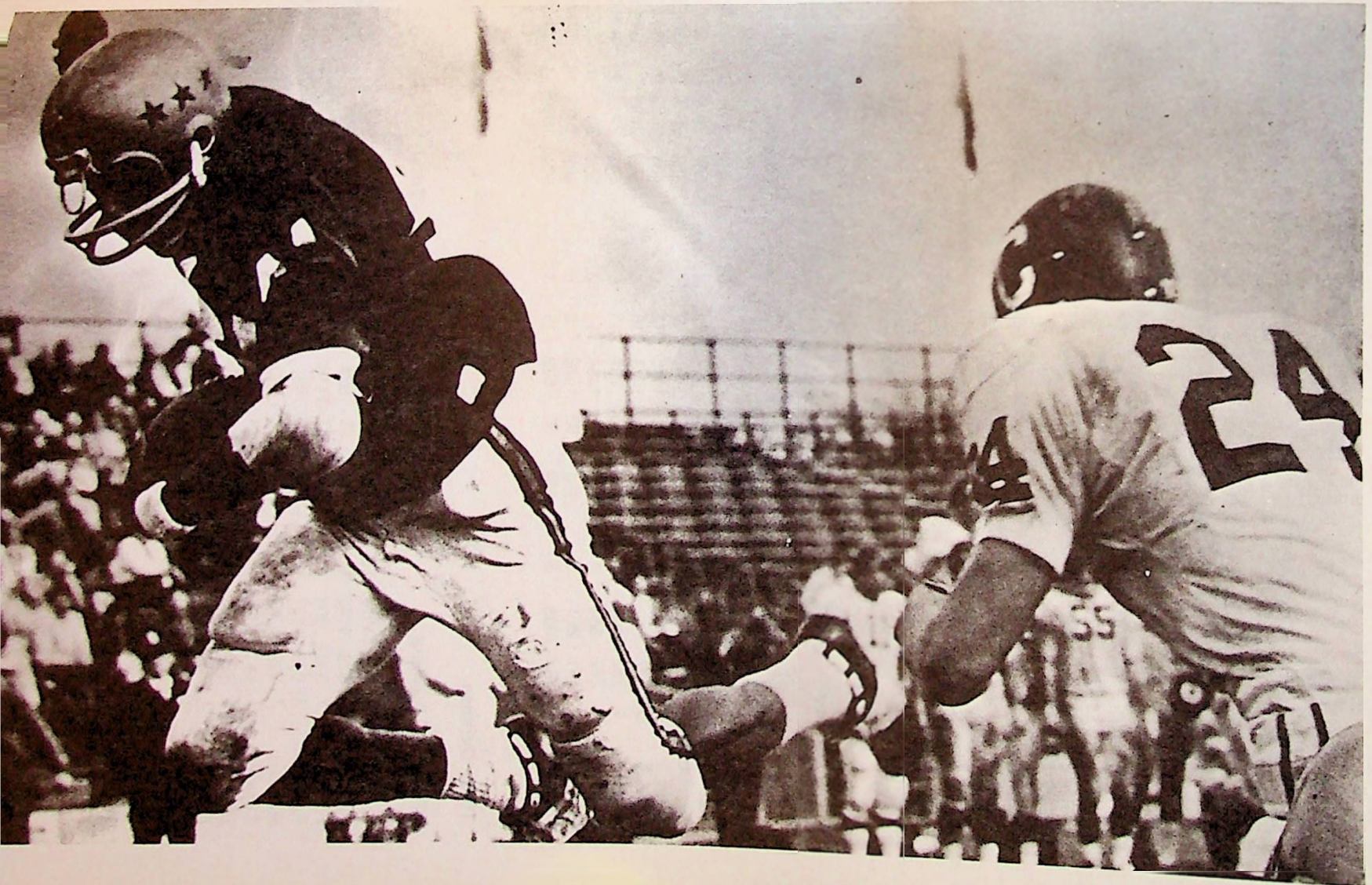
