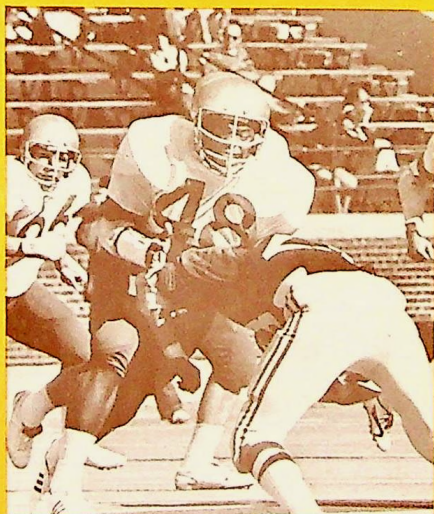

A BROWN UNIVERSITY PROFILE

Brown University, the nation's seventh oldest college and New England's third oldest, maintains a strong tradition of dedication to both undergraduate and graduate education in the humanities, arts, and sciences. While the University's two centuries of existence have involved constant expansion and adaptation of academic programs to encompass expanding spheres of knowledge, these changes have been accomplished with an overriding concern for the importance of sustaining an environment of scholarship and community with the growing university.

Brown today has a one-to-ten faculty-student ratio and offers its undergraduates opportunities to study with first rate faculty who also teach at the graduate level. A recent development of major significance at Brown was the initiation in 1969 of a liberalized New Curriculum which offered the student the opportunity to design and control the pattern of his or her undergraduate education. Considered at the time one of the most flexible and progressive academic programs to be found at any major university in the country, the New Curriculum was the result of three years of discussion and debate among students, faculty, and University officials.

This past year the University accepted the first freshman class of 25 into its new seven-year medical program. Brown's is the first full-fledged medical school in the state of Rhode Island.

ATHLETIC STAFF

F.A. "ANDY" GEIGER

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Brown's athletic director, Andy Geiger, took over the helm of Bruin athletics in 1972. His goal at that time was to make athletic programs at Brown a part of the University program and to make them competitive with the other members of the Ivy League.

Geiger's goals now include maintaining that which he has helped establish, an athletic program that is an important part of Brown's overall scope.

Born and raised in Syracuse, N.Y., Geiger attended Thetford Academy in Thetford, Vt. and received his B.A. degree in physical education from Syracuse University in 1961. He rowed bow during his four years at Syracuse and, in his senior year, was president of the Syracuse Rowing Club.

Geiger was named freshman crew coach at Dartmouth College in 1961 and remained there until the summer of 1964 when he returned to his alma mater as assistant director of athletics. He held that position until mid-1970 when he joined the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference as an assistant commissioner, just prior to his appointment at Brown.

Brown's A.D. is married to the former Eleanor Rollings of Washington D.C.

ARLENE GORTON

ASST. A.

Brown's assistant athletic director and chairman of the Department of Physical Education, Arlene Gorton, is a 1952 graduate of Pembroke College [now part of Brown]. After receiving her Master's Degree in Education from the University of North Carolina in 1954, she joined the staff at Connecticut College as a physical education instructor. In 1962 she returned to her alma mater. She served as chairman of the Women's Physical Education Department prior to being named to her present position in 1973. She is a consultant to the Providence [RI] School Department in developing a curriculum guide in physical education for the secondary level and in 1971 received an honor award from the Rhode Island Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

ROBERT A. SEIPLE

ASST. A.D.

Bob Seiple, 30, an outstanding two-sport athlete during his undergraduate days at Brown, was appointed assistant athletic director July 1, 1972. He won all-league honors in football [end] twice and captained the Bruin lacrosse team in 1965, his senior year. After graduating he worked in the Brown admissions office one year, followed by three years in the U.S. Marine Corp. He was a field sales rep for two years and then returned to the Brown admissions office in 1971. He is married to the former Margaret Ann Goebel and they have two children, Christopher and Amy.

RICHARD "DICK" SARDELLA

ASST. to the A.D.

Dick Sardella, a 1969 graduate of Bryant College, has been with Brown since 1970 when he was appointed ticket and promotions manager, positions he still holds. In 1973 he was named assistant to the athletic director. The Jersey City, NJ native was an outstanding second baseman in his schoolboy days and in 1969 served as freshman baseball coach at Bryant. He was instructor of social business courses in the Pawtucket School Department before joining the staff at Brown.

ROBERT "BOB" BENNETT

BUSINESS MNGR.

Bob Bennett has been at Brown since 1946, either as a student-athlete or a member of the staff. A native of nearby Cranston and a graduate of Cranston High, Bennett first attended the University of Maine, where he continued his athletic career in football and track. After leaving school for a spell, he entered Brown in 1946. The following spring [1947] he won his third IC4A hammer throw title, his second championship at the Penn Relays and he won the New England Intercollegiates title. In 1948 he captured the Bronze medal at the Olympic Games, held in England, finishing behind two European competitors. He joined the staff fulltime in 1965 as assistant track coach and a member of the football staff, following several years as a part-time assistant. He was named assistant to the director in 1962 and business manager in 1968.

FRANK GEORGE

HEAD TRAINER

Head trainer at Brown since 1966, Frank George was elected president of the National Athletic Trainers Association in May, 1974. A 1962 graduate of UMass, he is the first trainer from the East Coast to be elected president in the 25 year history of the NATA. George is a native of Boston and also holds a certificate of physical therapy from Boston Univ.

DR. G. EDWARD CRANE

PHYSICIAN

Brown and Dr. Crane go back a few years...together. As a Bruin undergraduate, he earned seven varsity letters in hockey, baseball and soccer before graduating in 1931. He was appointed physician at Andrews House in 1946 and at the same time became athletic surgeon for the University. Since that time he has covered nearly 300 football games and more hockey games than he can remember. A top orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Crane graduated from Tufts Medical School in 1935. He was the inventor, back in 1949, of the protective mask that is now standard for all hockey goalies.

BRUIN COACHING STAFF

JOHN ANDERSON

HEAD COACH

Ursinus '54



When John Anderson took the head coaching job at Brown a year ago, he remarked, "Brown has everything it needs to win. The challenge is to get our staff organized and put it all together."

Anderson and his staff took that challenge and responded with results, the type of results Anderson expected and the results Brown fans wished for but were not sure would happen.

In his first year, inheriting a program that had won one game in the last two seasons, the Bruins equalled their best Ivy League record ever, 4-3-0, and finished with the first winning season since 1964, 4-3-1.

Sudden changes in football programs are not new. They have happened before. In fact, they had happened before with Anderson the responsible figure. Four years previous Anderson had taken over a floundering football program at Middlebury College in Vermont.

In the five seasons before Anderson went from Dartmouth and Boston College as an assistant, to Middlebury, the Panthers had won only 11 games. His first year as head coach wasn't spectacular, 2-6. The foundation was set, however, and the results came into view the next season. Anderson's team went 5-3, followed the third year by a 6-2 finish. Not content, the Panthers responded in Anderson's fourth year with an undefeated campaign, 8-0.

Anderson began his college coaching career at another Ivy League school, Dartmouth, where he spent one year as freshmen coach and three seasons as offensive line coach under Bob Blackman.

Following his stint with the Big Green, he moved to Boston College for a year as defensive line coach under Joe Yukica. Then, in 1969, he moved to Middlebury.

A native of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, and a 1954 graduate of Ursinus College, Anderson spent 10 years coaching high school football in Pennsylvania before moving into the college ranks.

Anderson is very positive in nature. He prefers to talk about the pluses, never the negative. He is quick to point out the outstanding qualities of his players. Their problems, their shortcomings, are things that are worked on, quietly, until they become positive factors.

Brown's football program, Anderson feels, will make even bigger strides this coming season. "Our kids know our program and we know the players. Now we can really accomplish our goals," he offers. "We have a lot of starters back from last year's team. I can't see any reason why we shouldn't be a contender for the league championship."

A positive attitude? Yes. History, however, is on Anderson's side. Anderson's history, that is.

WILLIAM "BILL" RUSSO

OFFENSIVE LINE

Brown '69

Bill Russo first joined the Bruin coaching staff as a part time assistant following graduation in 1969. In 1971 he was promoted to a full-time position. For three years [1970-72] he was defensive coordinator for the freshmen program. In 1972 he took charge of the Bruin scouting program. Working with Jack Duffy [head of Brown's computer program], Russo put the entire scouting program on computer.

A native of Glasgo, Conn., Russo is an alumnus of Griswold High, where he captained the football team his senior year to the state championship while being named to the all-league team. During his sophomore season at Brown, Russo played offensive guard. As a junior and senior, he was a standout linebacker.

Russo, who holds a karate purple belt, was a consistent dean's list student, majoring in philosophy at Brown. He was a member of the committee that formulated the school's new curriculum. He enjoys weight lifting and training [in charge of Brown's weight training program], plays bridge and chess and likes to camp. He is married to the former Susan Fowler. Born: 9-47

ANDREW "ANDY" TALLEY

BACKFIELD

S. Conn '67

Andy Talley joined the Bruin football staff in 1973, following stints in both the high school and collegiate ranks. He spent four years at Middlebury College as backfield coach prior to moving to Brown. He shared a major responsibility in developing the Panther's potent offensive attack operated by head coach John Anderson. When Anderson took the head job at Brown, it was only natural for him to bring Talley to the Bruin campus.

A native of Bryn Mawr, Penn., and a 1961 graduate of Haverford High, Talley was an All-East Delaware County selection in football and played in the Delaware County all-star game. He starred for four years at Southern Connecticut State College as a defensive back. During that span the Owls were Eastern Football Conference champs twice, 1966 and 1967.

Talley remained at Southern Connecticut after graduation and in 1970 obtained his Master's degree in physical education. During those years he was backfield coach and head wrestling coach at Simsbury High in Simsbury, Conn. His wrestlers won the North-West Sectional title in 1968, for which he was nominated for Connecticut Coach of the Year honors. In two seasons, Simsbury football teams won 16, lost two.

Prior to joining the staff at Middlebury, Talley also spent a year as secondary coach at Springfield College while doing graduate work. He is married to the former Arlene Zitney, a former junior gymnastics champion from Connecticut. Born: 4-6-43.

HENRY "HANK" SMALL

QB'S-RECEIVERS

Gettysburg '69

Assistant coach Hank Small joined the Bruin football staff in 1973 following coaching stints at Florida State University and Rutgers. The Livingston, New Jersey native is the first quarterback and receiver coach in Brown's history.

One of the top passing teams in the nation, Florida State played in the Fiesta Bowl while Small was on the staff. In his first year he coached Varsity tight ends and the second year he handled quarterbacks and running backs as freshman head offensive coach. Before joining FSU he was freshman line coach at Rutgers for two seasons [1969-71].

Small earned a bachelor of arts degree in biology from Gettysburg College in 1969 and two years later received his Master's degree in physiology from Rutgers. He earned three varsity letters in football as a split end at Gettysburg and also three letters in baseball. In 1967, his junior year, Gettysburg won the Lambert Cup. Upon graduation he received the award for the athlete with the highest academic average.

Small is married to the former Pamela King. Born: 4-26-47.

JOSEPH "JOE" WIRTH

DEFENSE

W. Virginia '60

Joe Wirth joined Brown's staff in 1973 following coaching assignments at Colgate, Holy Cross and two high schools in his native Pittsburg, Penn. After receiving a bachelor's degree in physical education from West Virginia, Wirth spent four years as head wrestling coach and assistant football coach at South Hills Catholic High in Pittsburgh. Four years later, in 1964, he returned to his alma mater, North Catholic High, as head football coach.

He joined the collegiate coaching ranks in 1968 when he was named defensive line coach at Holy Cross. While with the Crusaders, he coached their wrestling team for one season. In 1969 he joined the football staff at Colgate.

This past summer Wirth added to his responsibilities when he was appointed head wrestling coach at Brown. After graduating from high school in 1952, Wirth played semi-pro football in the Greater Pittsburgh League before entering the Army in 1954. Married to the former Carole Johnson, the Wirths have six children, Tom, Joe, David, Colleen, Caraolyn and Gretchen. Born: 12-28-35

DAVID "DAVE" RITCHIE

LINEBACKERS

Cincinnati '62

Before joining the Bruin staff in 1973, Dave Ritchie was an assistant coach and outstanding recruiter at the University of Cincinnati. During his stint with the Ohio school he coached linebackers and defensive tackles.

Ritchie, who holds both a B.S. [1962] and Master's degree [1971] in Education from Cincinnati, grew up in New Bedford, Mass. He played for New Bedford High three years [1952-54], earning all-county quarterback honors. Completing his secondary schooling at Withrow High in Cincinnati, he was an All-State fullback choice in 1955. He also played fullback and linebacker at Cincinnati and twice was the Missouri Valley Conference punting champion [1959-60]. He also attended Greenbrier Military Academy for a year before entering college.

Ritchie became assistant coach at Greenbrier [Lewisburg, WV] in 1962. Four years later he took over as head coach and in three years his team's compiled an 18-6-2 record. In 1969 he left Greenbrier to join the Cincinnati staff as an assistant. He is married to the former Sharon Kaye Francia and they have three children, Phyllis Anne, Susan Elizabeth and Davey. FREDDIE MANUEL

SECONDARY

Oregon '73

One of the youngest members of the Bruin coaching staff, Freddie Manuel joined Brown's staff in 1973 following a brilliant career at the University of Oregon. Before joining Anderson's staff, he turned down a "free agent" contract with the San Francisco 49ers and the BC Lions of the Canadian Football League.

A sociology major at Oregon, Manuel was attracted to coaching by his desire to work with young people. During his undergraduate years he was an assistant wrestling coach at a local high school, worked in a tutorial program for five and six-year olds who had learning disabilities and was involved with similar projects. He won the "Most Improved Soph" award and as a senior he was named the hardest hitter on the defensive team.

Manuel was a star athlete at Vallejo Senior High in Vallejo, California. Playing both ways, he earned all-league, all-city and All-Northern California honors twice and was awarded the Golden Helmet Award as the outstanding player in the city as a senior. He also earned All-Northern California honors in basketball as a senior and lettered in track.

Married to the former Mae Nelson, the Manuel's have two children, Freddie and Danelia. Born: 7-6-49.

HOWARD VANDERSEA

FRESHMEN COACH

Bates '63

A Massachusetts native, Howard Vandersea came to Brown in 1973 from Tufts University. His coaching background also includes positions at two high schools and Boston University. He also played several years in semi-pro football.

Vandersea grew up in Northridge, graduating from high school in 1959. During his schoolboy career he played basketball, baseball and football, serving as team captain and winning MVP honors in the latter as a senior. He went on to star at Bates College in Maine, where he played linebacker and offensive guard, tackle and center. Three times he was named to the All-Maine Conference team and twice to the All-New England squad. He was in the service from 1964 until 1966. While at Ft. Benning, Georgia, he played on The Armed Service's world champion "Doughboys" football team.

His first coaching job was at Cheverus High in Maine following graduation from Bates. In 1966 he took a similar position at Long Branch High in New Jersey. Two years later he was a graduate assistant at BU. From there he moved on to Tufts in 1969 as defensive coordinator.

Vandersea, whose brother played four years with the Green Bay Packers and a year with New Orleans, played semi-pro football in Maine and New Jersey while he was in the schoolboy coaching ranks. Married to the former Sara Jean Traver, the Vandersea's have one son, Craig. Born: 9-12-41.

MIKE GOLDBERGER

FRESHMEN ASST.

Middlebury '72

Mike Goldberger came to Brown in 1973 after starring for three seasons on John Anderson's Middlebury College teams as a defensive back. Also an outstanding pitcher and outfielder at Middlebury, Goldberger directs Brown's freshmen baseball program in the spring.

The Westbury, New York native attended W.T. Clarke High, where he earned all-league football honors and also lettered in basketball and baseball. After graduating in 1968, he moved on to Middlebury where he received his bachelor's degree in history while lettering four years.

After graduating from the Vermont college, Goldberger taught math for a year at Vermont reform school and also coached part time at his alma mater. Born: 10-3-50.

ROBERT SEIPLE

DEFENSIVE EN

Brown '68

Handling double duty, Bob Seiple coaches the defensive ends during the football season and also is Brown's assistant athletic director. He was an outstanding two sport athlete at Brown and won all-league honors twice in football and captained the lacrosse team as a senior. Born: 12-56-42.

RICH SCOGGINS

GRADUATE ASST.

Wesleyan '71

A native of Massachusetts, Rich Scoggins is currently involved in graduate study at Brown. A graduate of Wesleyan, where he starred in football and track, Scoggins helps coach the Bruins offensive line and is coordinating all scouting efforts. He attended Chelmsford High in Chelmsford, Mass., graduating in 1967, after earning three football letters and four in track. At Wesleyan, he lettered three times in each sport and served as defensive captain his senior year. He was the recipient of the Silverman Award for outstanding work in chemistry, the field of study he is pursuing at Brown.

Brown finished fifth in total offense, averaging 329.0 yards per game. The Bruins were third in rushing, 1312 yards, and fifth in passing, 991 yards, giving Brown 2303 yards in total offense.

Defensively, the Bruins finished fourth, allowing 303 yards per game. Bruin foes rushed for 936 yards and passed for 1188, a total of 2124 yards in seven games. A total of 18 yards allowed kept Brown out of third place.

In the area of scoring, Brown also finished fifth, averaging 23.3 points per game. The Bruins scored 20 touchdowns [5th], 16 conversion points [5th] and nine field goals [1st] for 163 points. Brown likewise finished fifth in scoring defense, limiting opponents to 20.4 points per game. Brown allowed 19 touchdowns, 20 conversion points and only three field goals.

Brown ended up fifth in team punting [40-1371-34.3], fourth in punt returns [19-150-7.9], seventh in kickoff returns [24-359-15.0].

INDIVIDUAL STATISTICS

Pete Beatrice ranked fourth in total offense with 82 yards rushing, 799 yards in total offense. His 717 yards passing ranked fifth as he completed 59 of 100 passes, the most accurate passer in the league. **Dennis Coleman** finished 14th in total offense, 184 yards rushing and 253 passing for 437 yards. He ranked tenth in passing, 20 of 55. **Mike Sokolowski**, with 359 yards in 86 carries, finished eighth in rushing. He scored 24 points to finish 13th. **Pete Chelovich**, with 13 receptions for 163 yards and two TD's, ranked 13th in pass receiving. **Mike Dodson** ranked second in punting, 37 points for 1346 yards and 36.4 yards per kick. **Jose Violante** finished second in scoring with 41 points on nine field goals and 14 conversion kicks. He also shared the kick-scoring leadership with 41 points. **Doug Jost** finished seventh in punt returns, 10 for 36 yards.

BRUIN OUTLOOK

In one season as head football coach at Brown University, energetic John Anderson propelled the Bruins into a prominent role in the Ivy League football race.

The Bruins, according to Anderson, will be even more of a factor in the 1974 league race. Coming off their best Ivy record ever, 4-3, Anderson feels his Bruins now have the experience and the confidence to be considered a title threat.

A total of 8 offensive starters are back, along with four regulars from last season's defensive unit. Add to this the return of the Ivy League's top place kicker in Jose Violante and the Bruins number one punter, Mike Dodson.

Also joining the varsity in 1974 are a number of sophomores who gained valuable experience as freshmen with Anderson's multiple offense. "It took our players a year to learn the ins and outs of our offense. Now we should be ready to roll," Anderson offers.

The Bruins will operate a multiple offense with senior quarterback Pete Beatrice the triggerman. Beatrice, a regular as a sophomore and the top Ivy passer that season, started slowly last season, but after overcoming injuries and learning the new system, came on strong.

Joining Beatrice will be two other starters from last year's backfield, full-back Bob McNamara and halfback Mike Sokolowski. Up front, Beatrice will have returning starters Gary Howanec at tackle and guards Mark Sedgwick and Tom Agosta, along with his favorite receivers from 1973, Jeff Smith at split end and Bill Kairit.

The Bruins present a large problem for opponents. Anderson likes to keep the other team guessing. Brown uses a Veer type offense, the wish-bone, Pro "I" and upon occasion, a full house "T". While the passing and outside running game produced many exciting moments for Bruin fans last season, so did the inside running attack.

The only area hard hit last year by graduation was at the linebacker positions, where three of the four starters graduated. Two of the secondary starters also completed their eligibility. Defensively, the Bruins will return starters Bill Taylor, end; Phil Bartlett, tackle; Ames Ressa, linebacker; and Tom Clark, cornerback.

Depth will be an important plus, Anderson feels. Overall, the outlook is excellent. With the addition of several outstanding sophomores and the return of many experienced lettermen, Brown figures to field another outstanding team.

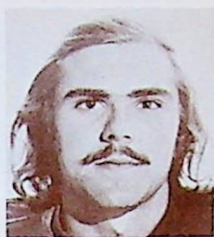

Brown's Roll of Honor

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A.C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeORMOND [Tuss] McLAUGHRY

A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Sharon, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War II. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history. His 1928 and 1932 teams lost only one game. Before leaving Brown for Dartmouth in 1941, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He now resides in Norwich, Vt.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS [Fritz] POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as one of the greatest black players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollard was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game [1916], and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season, 21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

WILLIAM EARL SPRACKLING, '12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aeri-als, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910. He owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-22 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. He is now retired from his position as president of the Anaconda Wire and Cable Company.

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colonel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N.C.

CHARLES "RIP" ENGLE

The latest member of Brown's football family inducted into the Hall of Fame is Charles "Rip" Engle, head coach of the Bruin gridiron teams from 1944 through 1949 and then head mentor at Penn State until his retirement in 1966. Engle was inducted January, 1973. Recognized as one of the top coaches in his profession, Engle guided Brown to a 28-20-4 record in six years, including marks of 7-2-0 and 8-1-0 his final two seasons. His success at Penn State, where he compiled a 104-48-4 record, was amazing. He guided Penn State to post-season Bowl appearances almost every season, or so it seemed, and he coached in all-star games too numerous to mention. Engle learned his football under the old master, Dick Harlow, while at Western Maryland. He graduated in 1930 and moved into the high school ranks, where he coached at Waynesboro High [Pennsylvania] for 11 years. He joined the Bruin staff in 1942 as an assistant to Neil "Skip" Stahley and when the latter entered the Navy, Engle was appointed head coach.

THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarterback; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, fullback.

BROWN IN FIRST ROSE BOWL

Since the late 1940's, Rose Bowl participants have been representatives of the Pacific-8 and Big Ten Conferences. It has not always been so, however. It was under Ed Robinson, a graduate in 1896 and for many years head coach, that Brown journeyed westward in 1915 to play in the first Tournament of Roses New Year's Day classic at Pasadena, CA.

The Bruins were chosen as the Eastern representative after posting a 5-3-1 mark. Those losses came via a 7-0 setback to Amherst and 6-0 to Syracuse, a 16-7 loss to Harvard and a scoreless game with Trinity. Brown outscored its opponents 167-32 that year, defeating URI 38-0, Williams 33-0, Vermont 46-0, Yale 3-0 and much heralded Carlisle 39-3.

In that first game, played January 1, 1916, Brown, with its brilliant Fritz Pollard, was apposed by the powerful team of Washington State. It came up mud on that day memorial in Brown gridiron history and Pollard was unable to cut loose as he had been accustomed to do on Eastern gridirons. WSU won, 14-0, but to Brown always will belong the distinction of having been the first Eastern team to play in the Rose Bowl.
