Couple in Court On Wall Across Their Driveway

Mineola—Louis and Sarah Quaglia of Manhasset, who are trying to get the Village of Munsey Park to remove a wall it built across the couple's driveway, had their day in court yesterday but didn't get an answer to their problem.

State Supreme Court Justice Joseph Liff reserved decision on the Quaglias' request for an order that would require the village to remove the stone wall. Liff signed an order on June 3 requiring the village to show why it should not remove the wall.

The driveway, which begins at the village line at the end of Hunt Lane, is the Quaglias' only access to the outside world. The wall has left Mrs. Quaglias' car inside her garage, and her husband's car outside-where it had been ticketed by Nassau's Sixth Precinct police for violating a village ordinance that prohibits overnight parking. Village employees built the wall June village clerk Kathleen Smith has said, because the municipality's right to deadend five of its streets was upheld in a 1937 State Court of Appeals decision.

The village wanted the streets closed against traffic from dump trucks and other vehicles of developers building homes in surrounding areas, Smith said.

Previously, the village had allowed a veterinarian who owned the Quaglia's 17-room mansion to use Hunt Lane as an access—even though the street had been legally closed along with the other four—because the man paid taxes on a parcel of land in Munsey Park.

Judge Rejects Franzese Move For Jail Leave

Brooklyn—A federal judge has rejected the appeal of crime figure John (Sonny)
Franzese for a furlough that would allow him to leave Leavenworth penitentiary to attend the wedding of his stepson.

Jacob Mishler, chief judge of the U.S. District Court in the Eastern District of New York, said the court had no jurisdiction to grant the furlough and that whether or not the furlough should be granted is a matter for the U.S. attorney general or his deputies to decide.

Mishler was the presiding judge in the 1967 trial at which Franzese was convicted of conspiring to rob banks. Franzese, who was sentenced to 50 years in prison, had asked Mishler to grant him a furlough so that he could attend the wedding on Sunday of his stepson, Michael Franzese, 23, of Roslyn, and Maria Corrao.



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
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
