A BROWN UNIVERSITY PROFILE

"It was not an accident that Brown University was founded under the leadership of the Baptists...During four decades of the 18th century, no fewer than twelve colleges were established....Most of these institutions were controlled by religious bodies: Harvard and Yale by the Congregationalists; the College of New Jersey [Princeton] by the Presbyterians; the University of Pennsylvania, King's College [Columbia] and William and Mary College by the Episcopalians; Rutgers College by the Reformed Dutch Church. It was natural that the Baptists also should desire a college of their own."

History al Brown University 1764-1914 W.C. Bronson

Founded in 1764 in Warren, R.I. as Rhode Island College, the nation's seventh and New England's third oldest college, the school was moved to Providence in 1770. Its name was changed that year to Brown University in recognition of the contributions of Nicholas Brown.

Brown maintains a strong tradition of dedication to both undergraduate and graduate education in the humanities, arts, and sciences. While the University's two centuries of existence have involved constant expansion and adaptation of academic programs to encompass expanding spheres of knowledge, these changes have been accomplished with an overriding concern for the importance of sustaining an environment of scholarship and community with the growing university.

Brown today has a one-to-ten faculty-student ratio and offers its undergraduates opportunities to study with first rate faculty who also teach at the graduate level. A recent development of major significance at Brown was the initiation in 1969 of a liberalized New Curriculum which offered the student the opportunity to design and control the pattern of his or her undergraduate education. Considered at the time one of the most flexible and progressive academic programs to be found at any major university in the country, the New Curriculum was the result of three years of discussion and debate among students, faculty, and University officials.

Last year the University accepted the first freshman class into its new seven-year medical program. Brown's is the first full-fledged modified school in the state of Rhode Island.



Robert Seiple, an outstanding two sport athlete during his undergraduate days at Brown, was appointed athletic director in June, 1975. Prior to that he had served for three years as assistant athletic director and also helped as an assistant football coach during the fall.

A 1965 graduate of Brown, Seiple starred in both football and lacrosse for the Bruins. Twice he was named to the Alllvy team as an end and during his senior year he was chosen to the All-East team and was named Brown's Most Valuable

Player. He captained the 1965 lacrosse team and earned All-New England honors that year.

After receiving an AB degree in American Literature, Seiple worked in the Brown Admission Office before joining the Marine Corps in 1966. His service time included over 300 combat missions in Vietnam. He then spent two years in private business before returning to Brown in 1971, again a member of the admissions office. In 1972 he was named assistant AD.

Bob, 32, and his wife, the former Margaret Ann Goebel, have two children, Chris and Amy.

ARLENE GORTON

Brown's assistant athletic director and chairman of the Department of Physical Education, Arlene Gorton, is a 1952 graduate of Pembroke College [now part of Brown]. After receiving her Master's Degree in Education from the University of North Carolina in 1954, she joined the staff at Connecticut College as a physical education instructor. In 1962 she returned to her alma mater. She served as chairman of the Women's Physical Education Department prior to being named to her present position in 1973. She is a consultant to the Providence [RI] School Department in developing a curriculum guide in physical education for the secondary level and in 1971 received an honor award from the Rhode Island Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Dick Sardella, a 1969 graduate of Bryant College, has been with Brown since 1970 when he was appointed ticket and promotions manager, positions he still holds. BRUIN COACHING STAFF

JOHN ANDERSON

HEAD COACH Ursinus '54



When Brown University chose John Anderson as it's new head football coach in 1973, they selected a man with previous Ivy League coaching experience who had already shown he was a winner by turning around the program he was then responsible for.

Anderson had just turned Middlebury College's floundering foot-

ball program around in four short years. He was given the same task at Brown, a challenge he met head on and with the success all had hoped he would attain.

The always positive 1954 graduate of Ursinus College spent ten years in the high school coaching ranks, followed by five years as a collegiate assistant and then four years at Middlebury.

A native of Carlisle, Pennsylvania, Anderson and his wife Marjorie have three children, Kurt, who is now attending Williams Col-'ege, Jill and Scott.

Anderson's high school coaching career included a stint under e Yukica at Central Dolphin High in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, lowed by two head coaching positions, the first at Selensgrove igh in Mechanicsburg, PA.

He began his college coaching career at another Ivy League school, Dartmouth, where he spent one year as freshmen coach and three seasons as offensive line coach under Bob Blackman. Following his stint with the Big Green, he moved on to Boston College, where he worked as defensive line coach for one year under Joe Yukica.

Then, in 1969, he moved to Middlebury, Vermont, taking over the Panther's football program. In the five previous seasons before his arrival, Middlebury had won 11 games. His first year as head coach wasn't spectacular, 2-6. The foundation was set, however, for future success. From there the program shot upward, with a 5-3 record in his second year, followed the third year by a 6-2 mark, then an unbelieveable, undefeated campaign, 8-0.

Anderson is a very intense coach, one who believes the game is played for the players, not the coaches. He takes great pride in the progress and accomplishments of his players. He believes strongly n the young men who play football at Brown and in the program hat has been established.

On his coaching philosophy, Anderson offers this: "Wherever "e coached, I've always tried to stay close to the players. All ung men at the college level have problems at some time or oth-

I'm concerned about those problems and will want to try and

solve them. On the field, I go by a structured practice schedule. Everything has to be bang-bang. But off the field, I don't like a rigid atmosphere. It's counter-productive.

"The two men I coached under, Bob Blackman and Joe Yukica, liked to play the wide open game and I do too. Putting in the flourishes during the week can help make the game a bit more fun for the kids. And on Saturday afternoons an offense that includes the razzle-dazzle can put pressure on the opponent's defenses and put fans in the stands.

"Being unpredictable on defense is just as important. We do a lot of moving around, stunting, blitzing and jumping around. We definitely are not predictable." Anderson coached defenses, however, have been predictable in their consistently high national rankings each year.

Anderson inherited a club at Brown that had won but one of 18 games the previous two years. While an Ivy League title wasn't his goal the first year, a winning season was.

Not since 1964 had the Bruins finished with a record above .500, but Anderson wasted no time, bringing the Bruins home with a 4-3-1 mark in his first year. A step in the right direction, he said.

In 1974 Anderson and his squad entered the season with high hopes. Not one to duck a question, he admitted he thought Brown would be a factor in the Ivy League. Five games into the season and with only one win, Anderson said, "We are so close, this team would win the final four."

Looking more like a prophet than a coach, Anderson's prediction as right on the money, with the Bruins winning their final four, all grainst league opponents, a feat no Brown team had ever before hieved.

Nncluded in the wins was a stunning 10-7 win at Harvard over ⇒ heavily favored Crimson before a regional TV audience. For his ∎rm's upset, Anderson was named by UPI as the national Coach ∎rhe Week.

We were so close to sharing the league championship, just two
 s and six points," he remembered after the season was over.
 thoughts were on a 7-6 loss to Dartmouth and a 14-9 loss to

Bill Russo first joined the Bruin coaching staff as a part time assistant following graduation in 1969. In 1971 he was promoted to a full-time position. For three years [1970-72] he was defensive coordinator for the freshmen program. In 1972 he took charge of the Bruin scouting program. Working with Jack Duffy [head of Brown's computer program], Russo put the entire scouting program on computer.

A native of Glasgo, Conn., Russo is an alumnus of Griswold High, where he captained the football team his senior year to the state championship while being named to the all-league team. During his sophomore season at Brown, Russo played offensive guard. As a junior and senior, he was a standout linebacker.

Russo, who holds a karate brown belt, was a dean's list student, majoring in philosophy at Brown. He was a member of the committee that formulated the school's new curriculum. He enjoys weight lifting and training [in charge of Brown's weight training program], plays bridge and chess and likes to camp. He is married to the former Susan Fowler. Born: 1-19-47

NDY TALLEY

BACKFIELD

S. Conn '67

Andy Talley joined the Bruin football staff in 1973, following stints in both the high school and collegiate ranks. He spent four years at Middlebury College as backfield coach prior to moving to Brown. He shared a major responsibility in developing the Panther's potent offensive attack operated by head coach John Anderson. When Anderson took the head job at Brown, it was only natural for him to bring Talley to the Bruin campus.

A native of Bryn Mawr, Penn., and a 1961 graduate of Haverford High, Talley was an All-Delaware County selection in football and played in the Delaware County all-star game. He starred for four years at Southern Connecticut State College as a defensive back. During that span the Owls were Eastern Football Conference champs twice, 1966 and 1967.

Talley remained at Southern Connecticut after graduation and in 1970 obtained his Master's degree in physical education. During those years he was backfield coach and head wrestling coach at Simsbury High in Simsbury, Conn. His wrestlers won the North-West Sectional title in 1968, for which he was nominated for Connecticut Coach of the Year honors. In two seasons, Simsbury football teams won 16, lost two.

Prior to joining the staff at Middlebury, Talley also spent a year as secondary coach at Springfield College while doing graduate work. He is married to the former Arlene Zitney, a former junior gymnastics champion from Connecticut. The Talleys have one son, Josh. Born 4-6-43.

LINEBACKERS

Cincinnati '62

Before joining the Bruin staff in 1973, Dave Ritchie was an assistant coach and outstanding recruiter at the University of Cincinnati. During his stint with the Ohio school he coached linebackers and defensive tackles.

Ritchie, who holds both a B.S. [1962] and Master's degree [1971] in Education from Cincinnati, grew up in New Bedford, Mass. He played for New Bedford High three years [1952-54], earning all-county quarterback thonors. Completing his secondary schooling at Withrow High in Cincinnati, the was an All-State fullback choice in 1955. He also played fullback and liinebacker at Cincinnati and twice was the Missouri Valley Conference pounting champion [1959-60]. He also attended Greenbrier Military Academy for a year before entering college.

Ritchie became assistant coach at Greenbrier [Lewisburg, WV] in 1962. Foour years later he took over as head coach and in three years his team's compiled an 18-6-2 record. He was named the 1968 Coach of the Year in Weest Virginia. In 1969 he left Greenbrier to join the Cincinnati staff as an assistant. He is married to the former Sharon Kaye Francia and they have three children, Phyllis Anne, Susan Elizabeth and Davey.

Jore Wirth joined Brown's staff in 1973 following coaching assignments at Collgate, Holy Cross and two high schools in his native Pittsburgh, Penn. In addition to his football coaching duties, Wirth has been wrestling coach since 1974.

Afteer receiving a bachelor's degree in physical education from West Virginiia, Wirth spent four years as head wrestling coach and assistant football coach at South Hills Catholic High in Pittsburgh.

In 1:964, he returned to his alma mater, North Catholic High, as head football coach, and won the Catholic Championship in 1965.

He journed the collegiate coaching ranks in 1968 when he was named detensive coordinator and line coach at Holy Cross. While with the Crusaders, ne coached their wrestling team for one season. In 1969 he joined the football staff at Colgate, where he also was defensive coordinator and Line coach

FREDDIE MANUEL

SECONDARY Oregon '73

Freddie Manuel joined Brown's staff in 1973 following a brilliant career at the University of Oregon. He turned down a "free agent" contract with the San Francisco 49ers and the BC Lions of the Canadian Football League after graduation so he could pursue his coaching career.

A sociology major at Oregon, Manuel was attracted to coaching by his desire to work with young people. During his undergraduate years he was an assistant wrestling coach at a local high school, worked in a tutorial program for five and six-year olds who had learning disabilities and was involved with similar projects. He won the "Most Improved Soph" award and as a senior he was named the hardest hitter on the defensive team.

Manuel was a star athlete at Vallejo Senior High in Vallejo, California. Playing both ways, he earned all-league, all-city and All-Northern California honors twice and was awarded the Golden Helmet Award as the outstanding player in the city as a senior. He also earned All-Northern California honors in basketball as a senior and lettered in track. Born: 7-6-49

JWARD VANDERSEA

FRESHMEN COACH

Bates '63

A Massachusetts native, Howard Vandersea came to Brown in 1973 from Tufts University. His coaching background also includes postions at two high schools and Boston University. He also played several years in semipro football.

Vandersea grew up in Northridge, graduating from high school in 1959. During his schoolboy career he played basketball, baseball and football, serving as team captain and winning MVP honors in the latter as a senior. He went on to star at Bates College in Maine, where he played linebacker and offensive guard, tackle and center. Three times he was named to the All-Maine Conference team and twice to the All-New England squad. He was in the service from 1964 until 1966. While at Ft. Benning, Georgia, he played on The Armed Service's world champion "Doughboys" football team.

His first coaching job was at Cheverus High in Maine following graduation from Bates. In 1966 he took a similar position at Long Branch High in New Jersey. Two years later he was a graduate assistant at BU. From there he moved on to Tufts in 1969 as defensive coordinator.

Vandersea, whose brother played four years with the Green Bay Packers and a year with New Orleans, played semi-pro football in Maine and New Jersey while he was in the schoolboy coaching ranks. Married to the former Sara Jean Traver, the Vandersea's have one son, Craig. Born: 9-12-41.

Mike Goldberger came to Brown in 1973 after starring for three seasons on John Anderson's Middlebury College teams as a defensive back. He was team captain in 1971. Also an outstanding pitcher and outfielder at Middlebury, Goldberger directed Brown's freshmen baseball program for two years and now serves as varsity assistant.

The Westbury, New York native attended W.T. Clarke High, where he earned all-league football honors and also lettered in basketball and baseball. After graduating in 1968, he moved on to Middlebury where he received his bachelor's degree in history while lettering four years.

Brown finished sixth in total offense, averaging 336.0 yards per game. With 1362 yards gained rushing, Brown ranked second to Yale, while the Bruins finished sixth in passing with 2352 yards. Only a five yard average or 35 yards total separated Brown from third spot in total offense.

Defensively, Brown finished second in team standings, 13 yards per game behind Yale but well ahead of the other six schools. Brown gave up an average of 254.7 yards per game. The Bruins rushing defense, allowing 733 yards in seven games, was the best in the league, while the pass defense, allowing 1783 yards, was second to Yale.

The Bruins finished second in team punting (36.7 ypp), seventh in team punt returns (4.6 ypr), and sixth in team kickoff returns (15.1 ypr).

Jose Violante was the Ivy League's top kick-scorer with six of seven PAT's, and 8 of 14 FG's for 30 points... Brown's Roll of Honor

NATIONAL HALL OF FAME

JOHN W. HEISMAN, '91

An outstanding football and baseball player at Brown from 1887 to 1889, John William Heisman became one of the leading coaches and a dominant personality in intercollegiate football during the ensuing 45 years until his death in 1936. After obtaining his law degree from the University of Pennsylvania, he launched a football coaching career at Oberlin College that extended through a long series of successes at Akron, Alabama Poly, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice. He did much to "open up" the game by use of the forward pass and the shifting line. At Georgia Tech, where he coached for 16 years, his teams of 1915-16-17 won 25 straight and rolled up 1,129 points to their opponents' 61. After retiring from coaching he became Physical Director of the Downtown Athletic Club of New York and was one of the founders and first president of the Touchdown Club. In his honor, the Downtown A.C. established the Heisman Trophy, which is presented annually to the outstanding collegiate football player in the nation. Born in Cleveland, Oct. 23, 1869, he died on Oct. 3, 1936.

DeORMOND [Tuss] McLAUGHRY

A 55-year association with football as player, coach and administrator was duly acknowledged in December, 1962, when Tuss McLaughry was inducted into the National Football Foundation's Hall of Fame. From the day he played his first football game at Sharon, Pa., High School in 1907, Tuss and football were inseparable, except for distinguished service in World War II. A standout player at Michigan State and Westminster, he began his coaching career at the latter college in 1915. He coached four years at Amherst, 1922-25, and his last team there was the highest scoring team in the history of the Little Three. He then moved to Brown, where he guided the famed Iron Men of 1926 to the only undefeated season in the school's history. His 1928 and 1932 teams lost only one game. Before leaving Brown for Dartmouth in 1941, he had the pleasure of coaching his son, John. Later at Dartmouth another son, Bob played for him. His 1948 and 1949 teams were the first in Dartmouth's history to win six major games. He coached East squads in the San Francisco Shrine game four times, the New York All-Star Game in 1940 and the Chicago All-Star Game in 1947. After retiring from coaching in 1954, Tuss continued to serve the American Football Coaches Association as secretary-treasurer. He died in 1975.

FREDERICK DOUGLAS [Fritz] POLLARD, '16

Probably the greatest player ever to perform for Brown, and ranked as of of the greatest black players ever to perform in college ranks, Fritz Pollare was the star of Brown's 1915 team which played in the first official Rose Bowl game [1916], and the '16 team which compiled an 8-1 record and ranks among the University's best. Walter Camp, whose All-American selections are regarded as the last word for the era he covered, ranked Pollard as "one of the greatest runners these eyes have ever seen." In 1916 he scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season,21-6, and scored two and set up the other in the 21-0 victory against Harvard. Born in Chicago January 27, 1894, Pollard presently resides in New York City.

EDWARD NORTH ROBINSON, '96

If any man deserves recognition as "the father of Brown football," it is Edward North Robinson. His influence spans more than a quarter of a century — from 1892, when he entered Brown and helped put the game on a sound basis as an undergraduate, to 1925 when he wound up an illustrious coaching career that covered 24 seasons at his alma mater. He won nine letters in his playing days, four in football. But more important was his activity in helping the grid game take root when baseball was THE sport at Brown. He served three separate terms as head coach, the last covering 16 years, and won 140 games against 82 losses and 12 ties at a time when Eastern football was undisputedly the nation's best, and Brown was often called upon to meet the top grid powers with undermanned forces.

Born in Lynn, Mass. on October 15, 1873, he died on March 10, 1945. His coaching record at Brown follows:

WILLIAM EARL SPRACKLING, '12

Brown's only three-time All-American, the 150-pound Sprackling is rated by many as the finest all-around football player in the school's history. As a quarterback he could beat a team in many ways. One of the game's most successful pioneers with the forward pass, he threw 10 touchdown aerials, a figure exceeded only seven times by Bruin passers since 1911. In addition, he was a brilliant runner, a heady field general and an adept field-goal kicker. He kicked three field goals against Yale in 1910. He owns the Brown record for most yards gained on kickoff returns in a single game with 147 against the Carlisle Indians in 1909. His three Brown teams won 21 games, lost 8 and tied 2. The Cleveland, Ohio, native was selected on Walter Camp's All-American teams in 1909-10-11 and in 1964 became the sixth man connected with Brown football to be elected to the National Hall of Fame. He is now retired from his postion as president of the Anaconda Wire and Cable Company.

W. WALLACE WADE, '17

A member of the 1915 Brown team that played Washington State in the first Rose Bowl game on Jan. 1, 1916, Wally Wade earned a place among the great coaches of American intercollegiate football during an illustrious career that spanned 40 years. After serving his apprenticeship as a high school coach and an assistant at Vanderbilt, he took over the head coaching reins at Alabama in 1923 and built the Crimson Tide into a major football power, winning 61 of 74 games and taking three of his teams to the Rose Bowl. Moving to Duke University in 1931, he sent two Blue Devil squads to the Rose Bowl and compiled a record of 110 victories, 36 losses and 10 ties through 1950, when he retired to become the Commissioner of the Southern Conference. In addition to his achievements in the field of coaching, he distinguished himself in service during two World Wars. He interrupted his tenure at Duke at the age of 53 to serve as a lieutenant colo. nel in the artillery during World War II, taking part in several major battles in the European Theatre. Wally was born in Trenton, Tennessee on June 15, 1892. Now retired from his Southern Conference post, he operates his 120-acre livestock farm near Durham, N.C.

CHARLES "RIP" ENGLE

The latest member of Brown's football family inducted into the Hall of Fame is Charles "Rip" Engle, head coach of the Bruin gridiron teams from 1944 through 1949 and then head mentor at Penn State until his retirement in 1966. Engle was inducted January, 1973. Recognized as one of the top coaches in his profession. Engle guided Brown to a 28-20-4 record in six years, including marks of 7-2-0 and 8-1-0 his final two seasons. His success at Penn State, where he compiled a 104-48-4 record, was amazing. He guided Penn State to post-season Bowl appearances almost every season, or so it seemed, and he coached in all-star games too numerous to mention. Engle learned his football under the old master. Dick Harlow, while at Western Maryland. He graduated in 1930 and moved into the high school ranks, where he coached at Waynesboro High [Pennsylvania] for 11 years. He joined the Bruin staff in 1942 as an assistant to Neil "Skip" Stahley and when the latter entered the Navy, Engle was appointed head coach.

THE IRON MEN

Beside being the only undefeated team in Brown history, the 1926 team earned even greater fame as the "Iron Men," so-called because the starting 11 played 60 minutes without substitution on consecutive weeks against Yale and Dartmouth, and well into the fourth quarter against Harvard later in the season. They lost their chance for an undefeated-untied season in the last game when Colgate earned a 10-10 deadlock. The team was ranked among the top 10 nationally. Its members were Captain Hal Broda and Thurston Towle, ends; Ed Kevorkian and Paul Hodge, tackles; Lou Farber and Orland Smith, guards; Charles Considine, center; Red Randall, quarter-back; Dave Mishel and Ed Lawrence, halfbacks; and Al Cornsweet, full-back.

BROWN IN FIRST ROSE BOWL

Since the late 1940's, Rose Bowl participants have been represent of the Pacific-8 and Big Ten Conferences. It has not always been so, not ever. It was under Ed Robinson, a graduate in 1896 and for many years head coach, that Brown journied westward in 1915 to play in the first Tournament of Roses New Year's Day classic at Pasadena, CA.

The Bruins were chosen as the Eastern representative after posting a 5-3-1 mark. Those losses came via a 7-0 setback to Amherst and 6-0 to Syracuse, a 16-7 loss to Harvard and a scoreless game with Trinity. Brown outscored its opponents 167-32 that year, defeating URI 38-0, Williams 33-0, Vermont 46-0, Yale 3-0 and much heralded Carlisle 39-3.

In that first game, played January 1, 1916, Brown, with its brilliant Fritz Pollard, was apposed by the powerful team of Washington State. It came up mud on that day memorial in Brown gridiron history and Pollard was unable to cut loose as he had been accustomed to do on Eastern gridirons. WSU won, 14-0, but to Brown always will belong the distiction of having been the first Eastern team to play in the Rose Bowl. Brown's starting lineup: John C. Butler, le; Raymond B. BRUIN OUTLOOK

After winning four straight Ivy League games at the close of the 1974 season, Brown football coach John Anderson is hopeful his Bruins can start the 1975 season right where they left off last fall.

Tackle Phil Bartlett (6-3, 240, senior), an All-Ivy honorable mention pick and a member of AP's All-New England team, and Paul Koza (5-11, 225, senior) return to the defensive line, along with end Kip Powell (5-11, 210, senior). Also back are several other returning lettermen, tackles Peter Eident (6-2, 220, junior) and Jim Kilcoyne (6-4, 250, senior), ends Mark Pendergast (6-1, 205, senior) and John Woravka (6-1, 200, junior), and middle guard Mike Wallace (6-0, 235, junior), who also is an outstanding wrestler. These, plus several sophs, make for good line depth, a prime factor in Anderson moving Bartlett to middle guard.

All-Ivy and AP second team All-New England linebacker Paul Serrano (5-11, 210, senior) is back, along with Tom Ford (6-0, 205, senior) and Ames Ressa (6-2, 195, senior). The latter was honorable mention All-Ivy last year. Others back include lettermen Steve Rinkus [5-11, 185, senior], Mike Bernert (5-11, 205, senior), Fred Polacek (6-3, 200, junior) and Scott Nelson (6-0, 215, junior). Polacek, however, may move to TE.

In the secondary, Brown returns Tom Clark [6-1, 185, senior], an honorable mention AP All-East pick a year ago, Mark Herendeen [6-0, 185, senior), and safety Frank Pozniak (6-0, 180, junior). Clark is a two-year starter (safety in 1973), while Pozniak and Herendeen earned their roles last year. All three, however, will have to fight off several outstanding sophs to retain their starting positions.

Offensively, center Gary Valerio [6-2, 225, senior] is back, along with tackle Dan Detore [6-2, 245, senior] and guard Eliot Warner [6-3, 245, senior]. Detore was a second team All-lvy pick as a junior and AP put him on their All-New England third team. Warner was selected to the Ivy League honorable mention team. Also back is center Mike Prairie [6-2, 225, junior], who started four games last year, and Kevin Mundt [6-6, 255, senior], who also was a part-time starter in 1974, at tackle.

In the backfield, the top two rushers return, Kevin Slattery (5-9, 175, senior) and Bob McNamara (5-11, 205, senior). Slattery, twice named to the ECAC Team of the Week and an AP All-New England honorable mention nick, gained 533 yards on the ground last year, including 160 against Columbia, while McNamara, operating from the fullback spot, ran for 279 yards. In addition, Chuck Maze (6-0, 210, junior), a halfback, was fifth (140 yards) in rushing.

Split end Bob Farnham [5-10, 175, junior] and tight ends Ken O'Keefe [6-3, 225, senior] and Bob Fitzpatrick (6-2, 215, senior) return, giving the Bruins a solid receiver corps. O'Keefe and Fitzpatrick alternated in 1974.

The Bruins may be operating with an inexperienced quarterback, or they may find an experienced senior in control. The top prospects include Paul Michalko [5-11, 180, junior], who earned the starting role at mid-season last year, only to be sidelined for the rest of the year with a shoulder injury in his first start.

Michalko's chief threat could be one of two untested juniors, two sophomores or more likely a senior transfer who is considered one of the top professional prospects in the entire nation. Bob Bateman (6-5, 195, senior) transfered to Brown this past semester when Vermont dropped their football program. Last year Bateman passed for over 1,800 yards, ranking him second nationally among NCAA Division II passers. He was named to the Allond nationally among NCAA Division II passers. Violante, twice named to the All-lvy first team, is considered one of the top booters in the country with excellent range and accuracy. Dodson is twice an Ivy League second team pick and averaged better than 36 yards per kick last year. Harold Buck (6-1, 175, senior), who handled kickoff duties part-time,

also returns.
