ISU wins 3rd straight, 19-7

IOWA CITY - Alex Giffords can't kick the habit. The Mexican-born, soccer-style kicker hammered home four field goals — tying school and Kinnick Stadium records — as Iowa State defeated Iowa, 19-7, Saturday in the sixth renewal of their intra-state college

football rivalry. It was Iowa State's third straight victory over the Hawkeyes, and each time "Le Leg" has provided the margin of victory.

Last year in Ames, the 5-foot-8 Giffords booted three field goals and two extra points in a 23-12 Cyclone stroll. And at Kinnick two years ago, his 49-yard field goal doomed Iowa, 10-7.

"That little guy did it to us again," a somber Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said.

Giffords wasn't the only leak Iowa failed to plug. Senior flanker Frankie Leaks provided a clinching touchdown in the fourth quarter, juking and zig-zagging 46 yards with a Dave Archer pass.

Giffords, who had converted 58 percent of his field goal tries coming into his final season, said he didn't expect to be a hero for the third time against lowa

"I was very relaxed and felt ready to do a number on Iowa again," said Giffords, still answering questions after many of his teammates had left the lockerroom. "But, honestly, coming into the game I didn't think it could happen again. Three years in a row is crazy. I told myself it won't happen again, but it did."

If it were not for a tenacious Iowa State defense, it might not have happened again for Giffords.

The Cyclones, rebounding from last week's 23-21

season-opening loss at Tennessee, outgained Iowa by a 3-to-1 ratio (306 yards to 102) and had almost a 15minute advantage in time of possession. Iowa State also produced a gaping margin in total plays, 77-42.

Iowa State Coach Donnie Duncan presented the game ball to Lou McCullough, who announced his resignation as athletic director last month.

McCullough, clutching the football as if it were a long-lost friend, exclaimed with tear-filled eyes, "I'll treasure this the rest of my life."

Duncan, the sweat on his face offering evidence of an intense afternoon, was not as jubilant as he was when Iowa State won at Kinnick in 1980.

"No, it doesn't get sweeter every year (ISU beats Iowa)," he said frankly. "Just the fact that we won and beat a good football team is enough. The fact that it's three straight years doesn't make it any sweeter."

The mood in the Iowa dressing obviously was much different. The loss represented only the 11th time in 94 years a Hawkeye team has started a season with two

"We were defeated by a real sound football team," Fry said. "The best team won today. I'm not taking anything away from Iowa State, but there's nothing we did that can't be corrected.

"Our defense really improved a lot since the Nebraska game, but we've got to score some points to keep them off the field. We still could go on and have a fine season, but we can't lose the faith. I'm not down on this team. We just have to execute more consistently."

Iowa State's defenders were particularly stingy in the second half, throwing the Hawkeyes for minus-14 yards

Irish down-Michigan, 23-17

From Gazette wire services SOUTH BEND, Ind. - Notre Dame, trying to erase the stigma of its first losing season in 18 years, opened its 1982 campaign with a 23-17 victory over 10th-ranked Michigan Saturday night.

Larry Moriarty and Greg Bell ran for touchdowns and senior Mike Johnston kicked the first three field goals of his college football career to lead the Irish.

The 45th consecutive sellout crowd of 59,075, plus a national television audience, viewed the first night game in the 53-year history of Notre Dame Stadium.

The Irish defense helped make it night to remember by sacking Michigan quarterback Steve Smith seven times and holding the Wolverines to 45 yards rushing. It's the first fullback who carried only 20 times 99 yards in a 14-21 loss to Purdue. run at the 59-second mark of the Please turn to page 4C: College

The Wolverines trailed 23-7 entering the final period, but made the score respectable on a 42-yard field goal by Ali Haji-Sheikh and a 39-yard touchdown pass by Smith, which bounced off the hands of Gilvanni Johnson into the hands of Rick Rogers at the Notre Dame 26. Rogers scooted the rest of the way into the end zone. Moriarty, a 223-pound senior

Change of shoes helped ISU get going

Gazette sportswriter IOWA CITY - Chalk this one up to good defense and great shoemanship.

The Iowa State Cyclones continued to dominate this state's most celebrated football rivalry Saturday afternoon, downing the Iowa Hawkeyes, 19-7, at Kinnick Stadium. But Coach Donnie Duncan's team might have never been able to do it, if it hadn't been for a switch in footwear.

The Cyclones started the game wearing ordinary tennis shoes and soon found that was a mistake. With ISU defenders unable to get a firm hold on the damp artificial turf, Iowa pounded out three quick first downs on the ground before stopping itself with penalties.

"We came out in gym shoes and we were slipping and sliding all over the place," said senior defensive end Chris Boskey, one of the heroes of ISU's third straight win over the Hawks. "That's why they moved it on us so well in that first series. Then we switched to rain shoes before the next series and it made a big difference."

The rain shoes, with a few dozen rubber cleats on the bottom, provided better traction and the Cyclones were on their way. Boskey and his teammates allowed only two more first downs after that.

"The first series we were just kind of sliding around," added linebacker Mark Carlson. "We knew it would be a little wet out there but we didn't really know how wet it was. Usually those gym shoes are okay on a turf like this but when it's wet, you need something to give you a little better footing."

Of course, the shoes weren't the whole story for the Cyclone defense. Boskey had plenty of praise for the ISU defensive braintrust, especially defensive coordinator Larry Coyer, a former Iowa

"You have to give a lot of credit to the coaches

upstairs who were calling the defensive plays," said Boskey. "You have to give Coach Coyer a lot of credit. I thought the defensive play-calling was just excellent."

Boskey, a senior who has been plagued with injuries since an honor-filled freshman season, was a dominant force on defense all day. He made five solo tackles and on one occasion, brought down quarterback Chuck Long and running back Eddie Phillips with one tackle.

"I didn't know which one had the ball," said Boskey. "I just decided it was best to throw 'em both down."

Long, who had the ball, took a four-yard loss on the play.

ISU'S PLAYERS ALL expressed comparable sentiments on being able to humble the Hawks for the third year in a row.

"It just keeps getting better every year," said linebacker George Jessen, who made nine tackles. "It's a little sweeter every year."

"Every year it's more exciting than the year before," echoed defensive tackle Shamus McDonough, who also was involved in nine tackles. "It's never an in-the-hat thing. You know it's always gonna be a battle down to the very end. This is kind of one of the stepping stones in my senior year. We really wanted to get Iowa for the third

"It was a lot sweeter to do it this time because it was the third straight time," added flanker Frankie Leaks, who scored the Cyclones' only touchdown. "I've only been involved in two of those but it's still sweet."

Carlson, who had a team-high 11 tackles, saw added significance in the win.

"We wanted to win worse than they did, that's all," said the senior from Lytton, Iowa. "We've got class people, class coaches at Iowa State and they (the Hawks) have to recognize that now.

"They can go to the Rose Bowl all they want but that doesn't mean they have a better program. This game today is proof that we have a class football program at lowa State. We've got the

proof now. "They've got to live with it for another year now and then they've got to keep it from being four in a row next year. They can't say they have a better program because they haven't beaten

Comments from other Cyclones:

• Leaks on the series of moves which allowed him to elude four Hawkeye defenders on his 46yard touchdown jaunt in the fourth quarter: "It was just an ordinary move. I try to throw some kind of move every time I catch the ball. On a short pass like that, you know when you turn around that they're not gonna be far away. You just basically try to put some kind of move on 'em. This time it worked."

rushing and allowing them only 14 total yards and one first down.

"The defense was magnificent," praised Duncan. "It not only took skill, but it took guts. We stressed at halftime that the defense had done great job and I think that was a great positive factor that carried over in the second half. We had our backs to the wall for a while in the first

Indeed, Iowa defensive end Tony Wancket intercepted a Dave Archer pass on Iowa State's third play from scrimmage and raced 26 yards down the sidelines for a touchdown. Wancket, a sophomore from Atkinson, Ill., making his first collegiate start, put Iowa ahead 7-0 with 7:18 left in the first quarter.

But there were few other bright moments for Hawkeye fans among the crowd of 59,605 (lowa's 13th straight sellout). Indeed, the lights on the Iowa side of the new \$1 million scoreboard didn't move after Wancket's theft. The first team to score won the past four meetings, but not this

Iowa displayed a brilliant ground attack after the opening kickoff, but four penalties prevented the drive from continuing. Tom Nichol's 38-yard field goal try was wide to the left after the Hawkeyes had driven 41 yards in nine plays. Iowa gained 43 of its 56 rushing yards on that first possession.

After Wancket's touchdown, Iowa State had a royal scoring opportunity when lowa's Dave Moritz fumbled Kelly Goodburn's punt and Cyclone center Jim Meyer recovered at the Hawkeye 26. But on the next play, Jerry Lorenzen fumbled and Iowa linebacker Mike Yacullo made his third recovery of the season.

Giffords' 26-yard field goal on Iowa State's next possession cut Iowa's lead to 7-3, though. The Cyclones went 52 yards in nine plays, with the highlight coming on a 19-yard pass from Archer to tight end Doran Geise.

Iowa State threatened once more before halftime, but Archer's pass to Geise was intercepted by Iowa captain Bobby Stoops at the Hawkeye 15. Although Archer threw two interceptions, he completed 9-of-17 attempts for 121

Iowa clung to a 7-3 halftime lead, but Iowa State outgained the Hawkeyes in the first half, 108-88. The main downfall for Iowa was that it was whistled for eight of its nine penalties in the first half.

An impressive, 13-play series on Iowa State's second possession of the second half led to Giffords' second field goal, a 32-yarder with 5:06 left in the third period. Archer hit two passes during the march, the most vital being a 14yarder to Geise on fourth-and-five from the Iowa

The Cyclones actually reached the Iowa six, but Larry Station and Straun Joseph sacked Archer for a nine-yard loss on third-and-goal.

Iowa quarterback Tom Grogan, who had earned his first collegiate start, was replaced by sophomore Chuck Long on the next series. But Long, who had started in the 42-7 loss to Nebraska, lasted only two series' and was sacked three times for 19 yards in losses. Tackles Chris Boskey and Shamus McDonough each got to Long on his first series.

Reggie Roby, Iowa's record-setting punter who kicked six times for a 44.6-yard average, unloaded a 45-yarder. But Iowa State responded

with another exceptional, time-consuming march. The Cyclones twice converted on long thirddown situations, the first time on sophomore tight end Jeff Wodka's 14-yard reception from Archer and the second on an 11-yard draw play by junior fullback Jason Jacobs.

After reaching the Iowa eight, Iowa State took its first lead at 9-7 when Giffords drilled his third field goal. The 25-yarder came with 12:49

Jacobs, wearing the same number (45) as did

two-time Big Eight rushing champ Dwayne Crutchfield last year, was the game's top rusher with 57 yards in 12 carries. He also took some of the pressure off tailbacks Tommy Davis and Harold Brown, who combined for 247 rushing yards last week against Tennessee. Davis had just 54 yards in 23 carries, Brown 33 in six.

Iowa's Long suffered more problems on his next series. Second-team defensive end Lester Williams, soph from Cedar Rapids Jefferson, nailed him on first down for a nine-yard loss back to the Iowa 11. Long fumbled the next center snap and linebacker Mark Carlson, who topped ISU with 11 tackles, recovered at the 11.

The Cyclones reached the lowa six again on a six-yard dash by Jacobs and Archer's four-yard aerial to Wodka, but on fourth down Giffords nailed a 24-yard field goal with 11:06 left.

Grogan was re-inserted at quarterback, but the

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Hawkeyes were just as inefficient. On the fifth play after Roby's punt, Leaks faked three lowa defenders - Devon Mitchell, Stoops and Zane Corbin — and rolled 46 yards to ice the Cyclone

Grogan not only completed just 4-of-9 passes for 39 yards, but he and Long were sacked for 30 yards in losses.

It wasn't until Grogan passed 21 yards to tight end Mike Hufford with seven minutes left that lowa got out of the minus column in second-half yardage.



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




