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# Bull's-eye! Hawks sock Northwestern

## lowa romps to 45-7 win

IOWA CITY — Poor old Northwestern's football prosperity lasted only a week.

The Wildcats, who ended the nation's longest losing streak at 34 games last Saturday, this time were ambushed at Iowa's homecoming 45-7, riddled with what Iowa coach Hayden Fry described as "bull's-eye ammunition."

It may have been gloomy weather with a brief shower, but 59,750 Hawkeye homecomers were delighted to see quarterback Chuck Long complete 9 of 11 passes and hear the patter of quick lowa feet toward the end zones in every quarter.

After a shaky start on an interception and an incomplete pass, Long hit his next nine attempts with two of them going for touchdowns — a 36-yard "play it again, Sam" to Dave Moritz and a 27-yard perfecto

to Eddie Phillips.


Owen Gill, the Baby Bull, stampeded for two touchdowns on runs of 52 and 12 yards. Stormin' Norman Granger got his TD on an 112 yard scamper and Cornelius Robertson finished the scoring with a four-yard quarterback-keeper.

Tom Nichol, whose late field goal let the Hawkeyes nip Arizona 17-14 last Saturday night, contributed all six extra points and his longest collegiate field goal. He missed his first attempt from 36 yards and then somehow booted "one of my worst kicks ever" through the uprights from 49 yards away.

That kind of scoring orgy evened lowa's record at 2-2 and set the stage for the team's first Big Ten road trip of the season — at Indiana next Saturday.



### Pressure hurt 'Cats

IOWA CITY — Pressure.

If there was one word to describe what the University of Iowa defense set out to do (and apparently did) against Northwestern Saturday, that

"They told us just to get in the quarterback's face and make him hurry a little bit," said defensive tackle Mark Bortz.

"I think we managed to do that some."

The Hawkeyes, in fact, sacked Northwestern quarterback Sandy Schwab seven times and Bortz personally batted down two passes at the line of scrimmage as they rolled to an easy 45-7 victory.

"He (Schwab) is just a freshman and it didn't look like he had much pressure on him last week (in a 31-6 win over Northern Illinois)," added defensive end Tony Wancket, who sacked Schwab for a 15-yard loss on one occasion.

"One of our main things was to put a lot of pressure on him and make him throw some bad balls." While the defense was chasing

Schwab all over the Kinnick Stadium turf, the Hawkeye offense was pounding out 463 yards. About two thirds of that yardage came on the ground as alternating running backs Eddie Phillips and Owen Gill ran wild against the Wildcats. Phillips gained 22 yards on the

Hawks' first play and finished with 95 for the game. Gill, who totaled 74 yards in the contest, followed Phillips' 22-yard scamper with a 52-yard scoring dash of his own as the Hawkeyes took a 7-0 lead less than a minute into the game.

Both runs came on good oldfashioned power sweeps.

"We run sweeps a lot, anyway," said Gill, "and when the blocking is done right, it works great. With the tailbacks we have, when you get some openings, we have the guys who can take it in."

## Ripon proves too much for Coe, 33-7

Never a screamer, Coe football coach Bob Thurness was almost inaudible after the Kohawks' 33-7 loss to play. Midwest Conference inter-division rival Ripon at Marion's Thomas Park Field Saturday.

Agonizing in defeat as he headed for the team bus, Thurness said only that "we knew Ripon is tough. They have some big people up front..

"We played good defense for three quarters. We're down only 12-7 with 13 minutes to go. But we didn't get much going offensively, and when we did we killed ourselves with mistakes."

Beaten 21-20 at Loras last week, Coe is now 1-3 in its first season under Thurness. Ripon is 2-2, its two losses totaling three points.

"I think we just wore 'em down," said youthful Ripon Coach Larry Terry. "We piled up a lot of yardage, but we continue to have trouble getting into the end zone."

The Kohawk offense produced only two first downs and 36 yards in total offense in the first half while Ripon was racking up 13 first downs and 206 yards. But the Redmen had to settle for two Dan Braemer field goals going into intermission.

Sophomore Braemer booted a 26-yarder with 1:39 left in the first quarter after Ripon stalled with a first down at the Coe 14.

He repeated from 25 yards out 48 seconds before halftime after Ripon had a first down at the Coe 7. On their first series of the second half, a successful fourth-and-1 gamble launched the Redmen on a 19-play 65-yard assault that Coe stopped on two plays at its own

But after forcing a Coe punt to the Kohawk 38, Ripon needed just one play to get the touchdown. Junior quarterback Jim Braemer — Dan's brother found flanker back Dan Summers alone in the left flat and Summers took Braemer's pass in stride for the

score. Jim Braemer's extra-points pass failed and Ripon led, 12-0, with 4:01 remaining in the third period. Undaunted by that quick TD following its stalwart

goalline stand, Coe promptly marched 70 yards to its only score. Senior quarterback Mike Meyers, out most of the second quarter with a wrist injury, led the drive. He hit Joel Holst with an 18-yard third-down pass, connected with Holst for 9 while on the verge of a sack, then

bootlegged for 10 to the Ripon 6.

Mark Vesey went in from the 3, Rims Roof kicked the extra point and Coe trailed only 12-7 with 13 minutes to

But when split end Jeff Szymczak caught Jim Braemer's third-down pass off teammate Steve Hopp's fingertips for 12 yards, he saved the Ripon thrust that put Coe away.

Whirling-dervish tailback Tim White delivered the coup de grace with an 18-yard slant off left tackle. Dan Braemer's extra-point kick made it 19-0 Ripon with 7:54 remaining.

On Coe's first play after the kickoff, Dave Gervenak's interception of a Meyers pass put the Redmen at the Coe 39. Five plays later, freshman tailback Jack Graber bolted through left tackle to score from the 9.

The final Ripon tally was a gift resulting from Coe's fourth-and-20 gamble from its own 22. Backup quarterback Bill Lohan was sacked for a 10-yard loss on the play. Aided by a Kohawk encroachment penalty, the Redmen sent reserve quarterback John Morgan over from the 2 on fourth down with 1:07 left.

### Green says Hawks are too physical

IOWA CITY — Dennis Green won't hesitate to tell you how much bigger and stronger his Northwestern Wildcats are now than when he became head coach 15 games ago.

But the former Iowa running back had to admit after his team's 45-7 loss to the Hawkeyes Saturday that his squad still isn't as strong as he would like it to be.

"They (the Hawkeyes) are still much bigger and much more physical than we are," said Green, an Iowa player from 1967-70. "The line of scrimmage was controlled by Iowa today. They dominated both sides of the line and dominated the game. Offensively and defensively, Iowa just totally dominated our football team."

Green's team was a bit dominating itself a week ago in a 31-6 victory over Northern Illinois. But, Saturday the Wildcats were victimized for 463 total yards, including 308 on the ground.

"We just faced a team that played much better than we did today," he added. "We had a chance to do some things early and didn't do it. We just made too many mistakes."

Included among those mistakes were four turnovers and several offensive line errors, which resulted in seven sacks.

"When you don't make mistakes, you have a chance to win football games," noted Green. "When you make mistakes you don't. Today we just made a lot of mistakes."

Green did add that he was satisfied with the performance of freshman quarterback Sandy Schwab, who accounted for most of the Wildcats' offense. Schwab completed 20 of 42 passes for 175 yards.

"He's doing a pretty good job; he's going to be a very good quarterback," said Green. "But he needs a supporting cast. He has the arm and he has the courage to be a good one."

Asked his opinion of the Hawkeyes, Green said "I think Iowa is a pretty good football team right now. But I also think it's hard to judge. I think Iowa is a team to watch over the next few weeks."

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI) — Cornell fullback Ron Corbett ran for three touchdowns Saturday, including a 73-yard scoring scamper, to lead the Rams to a 37-22 win over Colorado College.

Quarterback Mike Bennett passed 5 yards to Todd Ramsey and 40 yards to Dave Meier for two more touchdowns, and Cornell's other score came on a 25-yard field goal by Roger Wilson.

CC quarterback Scott Driggers figured in all three of the Tigers touchdowns, hitting Rick May with a 6-yard scoring pass, connecting on a 26-yard aerial to Tom Southall for another TD and scoring himself on an 8-yard run. CC also got a 38-yard field goal from Dave Collier.

Corbett carried 21 times for 178 yards for Cornell, which led 16-9 at halftime. CC fell to 3-2 with the loss. while the Rams evened their record at 2-2.
