Hawks nip Hoosiers in wild shootout

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — It was a day of craziness in the Big Ten, but it's hard to imagine there was a game anywhere wilder than the one Iowa and Indiana played Saturday.

In a game that included more sudden reversals than a duck in a shooting gallery, 390 yards passing by the losing quarterback and a saving tackle at the two-yard line as time ran out, the Iowa Hawkeyes outlasted the Indiana Hoosiers, 24-20, before a crowd of 46,212 at Indiana Stadium.

"This is as fine a team victory as I've ever been associated with," gasped an obviously relieved and ecstatic Iowa Coach Hayden Fry.

"That was just a bunch of youngsters making all kinds of mistakes but just overcoming them with outright hustle."

The victory left the Hawkeyes as one of only three teams still unbeaten in Big Ten play. Iowa is

2-0 (3-2 overall) while Illinois is 4-0 in the league and Michigan 3-0.

"It was a helluva good football game," added Indiana Coach Lee Corso. And unlike most games, the outcome wasn't

certain until the final tick of the clock. Iowa was nursing its 24-20 lead when the Hoosiers got possession of the football for the last time with 57 seconds remaining.

Quarterback Babe Laufenberg, who set an Indiana single-game passing record, guided his team from its own 29-yard line to within the shadow of the Iowa goal line. With time running out and the Hoosiers just eight yards from the goal line, Laufenberg completed his fifth pass of the drive — a short toss to tight end Scott McNabb at the two-yard line.

The 228-pound McNabb turned to step into the end zone for what would have been the winning score but 175-pound Hawkeye cornerback Devon Mitchell stopped him cold in his tracks.

"If he doesn't make a very fine tackle there, that big tight end falls over the goal line and scores," said Fry. "But Devon Mitchell hit him with such velocity that he just stopped him dead in his tracks."

Porter's mistake came when he doubled into the right field corner, driving in the Cardinals' second run. He was thrown out at third trying to stretch the hit into a triple. Porter could have scored from second easily later in the inning as both Hendrick and Ozzie Smith later singled.

"It was just a stupid play," Porter said. "It's a Cardinal sin in baseball to get thrown out at third base with no outs. I just lost my head and wasn't thinking. I was going on my own.



Alex Giffords, the diminutive 'keeker' from Mexico, booted himself into fourth place on Iowa State's all-time scoring list with three field goals and three PATs. He now has 183 points, jumping well beyond Dwayne Crutchfield's 170 points. And the Cyclone offensive unit, which was stymied for most of the afternoon in last week's 13-3 loss to Oklahoma, roared to 544 total yards. The defensive unit, likewise, performed well, stuffing the Golden Flashes' running game for a minus seven yards.

Cedar Rapids LaSalle's football team is making more noise each week, but nobody seems to be listening.

Unranked but undaunted, the Lancers rolled to their fourth straight victory by thumping Cedar Rapids Prairie, 24-0, Saturday night on a soupy Kingston Stadium field.

LaSalle's only loss in six games was by a 20-7 count Sept. 9 to the No. 1-ranked team in Class 3A, Cedar Rapids Regis. Since then, the Lancers have posted three shutouts and outscored four victims by a combined margin of 80-6.

LaSalle cranked out 201 yards rushing while quarterback Mark Steffen completed 3-of-5 passes for 69. The Lancers had a huge advantage in time of possession, running

58 plays to Prairie's 37. Andy McEowen was the rushing leader, churning for 65 yards and two touchdowns on 19 carries. The 6-foot-1 senior has tallied four of his six TOs in conference play and now is tied with Greg Nielson for the ECIC scoring lead.



It was tough loss for Indiana 'Babe'

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Babe Laufenberg, who had just broken virtually every important Indiana school passing record, sat alone with his head in his hands in front of his locker for many minutes after Saturday's 24-20 loss to Iowa.

At least a dozen news media people came by, waiting to interview him. They respectfully waited until he had composed himself enough to talk. It wasn't easy, but he

seemed to feel better when the words finally came out. "You broke a lot of school passing records today," a newsman finally ventured. "It was your best passing day ever. Does that mean anything to you?"

"Not really," replied Laufenberg, who attended Stanford, Missouri and Pierce (Calif.) Junior College before transferring to Indiana last season. "We lost. Yes, we lost about 21 points down around the goal line, and you can't find satisfaction in that when it means losing a

The California Babe from Canoga Park was asked about some of the key plays near the finish. They included:

• The final play in which he hit tight end Scott McNabb with a short pass only to see McNabb nailed at the Iowa two-yard line by Devon Mitchell, who also prevented McNabb from wriggling out of bounds to stop the clock. My ankle was not good, but not really bad. We used the shotgun today because I didn't have to go back on my bad ankle so much."

Indiana coach Lee Corso expressed the feeling of almost everyone when he told the news media: "It was a helluva struggle. We did almost everything except win. Yes, a helluva good game, except that one team came up about that short (extending his arms to indicate a yard and a half) from winning.

"We didn't get a touchdown inside the 10. I think you have to try and punch it across with the run when you get down there. Babe (Laufenberg) played a great game with a busted-up ankle. 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Hawkeye defender big enough

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - It never Mitchell tackling outweighed him by 53 pounds. Allhe knew was that it was a tackle he had to make

And he did. And because of it, the Iowa Hawkeyes rolled to their third straight victory, a frantic 24-20 conquest of Indiana Saturday.

"I wasn't even thinking about it," said Mitchell, a 175-pound defensive back who chopped down 228-pound Scott McNabb two yards short of the goal line on the final play of the

"I knew I was right at the end zone and I just tried to come up ashard as I could. I didn't even stop to think of who I was tackling."

Mitchell, one of a bevy of Hawkeye heroes in the exciting win, also was involved in one other play... he'd probably just as soon forget. That would be Duane Gunn's picture-perfect 52-yard touchdown pass from Babe Laufenberg on the first play of the second quarter.

Laufenberg dropped back into the pocket and lofted a long spiral downfield toward Gunn, who was being double-teamed by Mitchell' and Dave Chambers.

"I thought we had it covered," said Mitchell. "But then he just went right by me. They just threw the ball up. I thought it was overthrown but Gunn just has so much speed. He just went by me."

Gunn, who victimized Iowa on scoring passes of 58 and 71 yards a year ago, collected six Laufenberg passes for 156 yards Saturday.

Other standouts among the Iowa defenders were safety Ron Hawley, ' who came up with a key interception in the final minutes; freshman linebacker Larry Station, who recorded 15 tackles; defensive end Dave Strobel, who caused a fumble on the second play of the game and stopped Indiana's John Mineo on a crucial fourth-and-one play; and defensive tackle Clay Uhlenhake; who recovered two fumbles and also took part in an important sack."

The Hawkeye defense was never tougher than after Indiana's Mark Weiler blocked a Reggie Roby punt, giving the Hoosiers the ball just five yards from paydirt. The Hawks' halted three straight running plays, however, with Uhlenhake and Mitchell teaming up for an eightyard sack of Orlando Brown on third

"On the first play, they ran right at (nose guard) Dave Browne and he stopped 'em," said Uhlenhake. "Then they tried to go at (left tackle). Mark Bortz and he stopped 'em. The third time they tried to come around my end and Devon came up and made a really nice play."

There were as many heroes offensively as the Hawks rolled up-395 yards. But none was more impressive than fullback Norm;

Granger. Granger, injured last week against Northwestern, did not take part in any contact drills all week but managed to grind out 74 yards ! in 10 carries and scoot 63 yards for a touchdown on a third-quarter screen

"The whole right side of the line." made good blocks and I just cut straight up the middle and nobody was there," said Granger.

"I knew I had a chance to go because everybody was sealed off to the inside. Once I saw that one guy go to the inside I knew there wasn't gonna be anybody outside."

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
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
