## lowa rolls to 28-14 victory

IOWA CITY — Wisconsin began wrecking lowa's defensive reputation on the very first play Saturday, but when the offensive circus was over it was Hayden Fry who was being pinned by bowl scouts.

His Hawkeyes emerged with a 28-14 victory — their sixth in a row over the spunky Badgers — and very few of the well-chilled 58,500 fans minded the dents in Iowa's

Indeed, some of the most enthusiastic youngsters even managed to tear down the north goal posts in Kinnick Stadium.


Hayden politely declined to discuss bowl possibilities, but the

Hawkeyes assured themselves of their second straight winning season (6-4). They also clinched their fourth straight finish in the Big Ten's first division, something never accomplished before by an Iowa team.

A bowl in Iowa's future? It's almost a certainty if the Hawks can beat Michigan State in next Saturday's closer at East Lansing, Mich. Telephone conferences will be staged all week, but no bowl matchups may be announced before next Saturday.

## Lancers dance, Royals foiled LaSalle lassoes 2A crown with 24-0 cakewalk

CEDAR FALLS -- Some might call it "the luck o' the Irish." but Cedar Rapids LaSalle head football coach Tom Kopatich would prefer using one word to describe it all.

Defense! Led by a swarming defensive unit and a solid offensive attack, the skyhigh Lancers rolled to a 24-0 victory over Sibley to capture the Class 2A state championship Saturday after-

noon at the UNI-Dome. "Defense has been our strength all season," noted a beaming Kopatich between congratulatory handshakes from an assortment of followers afterwards. "We were concerned about Sibley's passing game coming in here, but it didn't frighten us. We knew what to expect from them so we prepared ourselves for it the best way we knew how.

"It's just an incredible feeling, really," added the 29-year-old Drake graduate. "This is about the best thing that can happen to anyone involved in coaching. It's a credit to the kids, the school, and the support we receive from our boosters. I can't thank everyone enough."

LaSalle, which finished its championship season with a 10-2 mark, grabbed a 3-0 lead just before the first half ended on a 32-yard field goal by Pat Loeffler. ## Regis edged by Harlan in 3A showdown, 15-14

CEDAR FALLS — The scene was so strikingly similar to one 10 years ago that it could have made a 54year-old man cry.

Indeed, it took Tom Good, 54year-old football coach at Cedar Rapids Regis, all he could muster to hold back the tears he wanted to shed for his players.

Much like it did in 1972 against Regis, Harlan rallied to defeat the Royals, 15-14, in the UNI-Dome Saturday to win the Class 3A state high school championship.

Harlan (12-0), which overcame a 12-0 deficit 10 years ago in the title game to beat Regis 14-12, stormed back from a 14-0 halftime deficit to spoil the Royals' chances of claiming the school's second grid title.

The deciding points came on what could be valled a playground

play. Senior Steve Peake's threeyard run with 8:14 remaining pulled Harlan to within 14-13.

Harlan's center, placekicker and holder lined up for the extra-point kick as usual, but the other eight players huddled at the right hash mark. Catching Regis by complete surprise, center Gene Schmitz hiked the ball sideways to end Mark Kloewer, who rolled into the end

zone for the two-point conversion. "We saw that play on television one time and thought it looked great, but that was the first time" we've ever used it," said Harlan Coach Curt Bladt, whose team finished second to Cedar Rapids Prairie last year.

Good, whose team finished 9-2, said it "was a good play . . . an element of surprise that we weren't expecting." The 23-year coaching veteran conceded afterward the loss was especially tough to swallow.

Lawrence was 3-for-3 for 41 yards during the series, including a 28yarder to senior split end Dick Breitbach on a post pattern to the Harlan one. Breitbach caught seven passes for 79 yards, coming one reception short of the 3A title game

AMES — There may be no team like Nebraska, either.





But Brown, who had not carried the ball in the previous three games, apparently hasn't been pleasing Duncan in all respects. After showering, Brown told newsmen that he had talked with Duncan after the Kansas State game two weeks ago and asked him why he wasn't playing. "Truthfully, I don't know why," said Brown. "I was late to a few things, and absent from one or two minor meetings, but I don't think it's anything major that I have to sit out three games." Brown added that he's "not at all" unhappy with his decision to attend Iowa State. "It was the best thing that I could do."

Archer threw for 116 yards, which moved him into sixth place on lowa State's single-season passing list. Archer completed 14 of 26 aerials Saturday, and his 1,298 yard total moved him ahead of Rich Mann's 1951 total of 1,297 by one yard. Archer claimed he was due for a solid performance. "I didn't have a good game against Kansas State, and that really bothered me," said Archer quietly. "We weren't successful at Kansas (a 24-17 loss last week) so I felt I had to play well today."

OVER IN THE Nebraska lockerroom, Osborne confided that his squad is in need of a rest: "It's a good thing we have two weeks before the next game. We played hard and are beat up. We were down to two healthy backs at the end of the game. Iowa State is a good football team, they played hard."

## UNI outpoints South Dakota

CEDAR FALLS, Iowa (UPI) — Quarterback Larry Miller outdueled South Dakota's Chris Daniel in leading Northern Iowa to a 41-24 win in a game that saw almost 600 yards gained through the air.

UNI raised its record to 4-5-1 with the nonconference win while South Dakota fell to 5-5 in a game that delighted the partisan UNI-Dome crowd of 12,500.

The Panthers were cruising along with a 20-6 lead entering the fourth quarter when South Dakota erupted for 18 points. But UNI answered with 21 of their own points to preserve the win. Miller struck for 274 yards passing in the game

## Independence, others interested

## Hawks' bowl chances look good

IOWA CITY — Hayden Fry was sporting an "Independence Bowl" sticker on his black sweater when he walked into the press room Saturday to meet members of the news media.

But that doesn't mean lowa is definitely headed for the Independence Bowl Dec. 11 in four or five teams." He said the scouts were also Shreveport, La.

What it may mean is that the Hawks can probably go to that bowl if they so desire. But, following Saturday's 28-14 triumph over Wisconsin, the Hawks will undoubtedly wait for all the other options to come rolling in.

If that's the case, then nothing will become definite until after the season finale at Michigan State Saturday. Should the Hawks win in East Lansing, they will close out the season 7-4 overall, and 6-2 in the Big Ten.

The fact of the matter is that right now it looks as if Iowa is in a bowl, somewhere, some time. "The Independence Bowl would take us right now if it could," said one high-ranking lowa official. "But, of course, nothing definite is

possible until next Saturday." Michael McCarthy, representing the Independence Bowl Saturday in Iowa City, confirmed his looking at both schools, but at this point Iowa is

"It looks good," he said at halftime. "Both teams are real impressive. We're looking real hard at these teams, and wouldn't preclude even the loser. We're very high on lowa."

McCarthy said his seven-man committee would make its decision soon, and was "down to looking at Tennessee, Vanderbilt, Arizona, Kansas State and Miami, Fla.

The Independence Bowl seats 50,270, with approximately 9,670 tickets going to the fans of each team. There is a television connection with the Mizlou Network.

"I told Bump (Elliott, Iowa athletic director) that we'd probably call him Sunday night," said McCarthy. He added that the bowl and lowa could "talk cold turkey if they win this (Saturday's) ballgame."

Hall of Fame scout Joe Fuller wasn't ready to say his committee was interested point-blank in Iowa, but he was on the phone just about every time lowa scored Saturday, talking to someone about the Hawks.






