Hawks take long path to 42-34 win

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - About 84,628 football fans got their money's worth here Saturday afternoon. And then some.

Oh sure, many of them no doubt went home pouting, frustrated that their Penn State Nittany Lions had gone down to a 42-34 defeat at the hands of the 13th-ranked lowa Hawkeyes.

But they'd also seen a game that featured more twists and turns and thrills and offense (with a capital O) than almost any game anyone could remember.

"They'll be talkin' about this one for a long, long time," said lowa Coach Hayden Fry, who was almost whimsical after handing the defending national champions their third straight loss.

"This has gotta be one of the longest football games in history. And it's probably one of the most exciting and best games ever played, too." Among other things, the game proved lowa quarterback Chuck Long really can throw long,

that lowa's offensive explosion against lowa State last week was no fluke, that Penn State does indeed have an offense of its own, and that the Hawkeyes, heading into next week's Big Ten clash with Ohio State, really do rate among the nation's elite teams.

"We executed when we had to to win the game," added Fry, "but it wasn't pretty as far as our defense is concerned. They (the Lions) really executed against us. They picked us like chickens."

The lowa defense wasn't the only one that went afowl, though.

"It was the poorest tackling by a team that I've ever been associated with," said Penn State Coach Joe Paterno. "In a lot of ways it was a good football game. In spots we just didn't make the plays we should make."

You could play the numbers game with this

one all day. Iowa rolled up 587 yards, the sixth highest figure in its history, and probably will lead the nation this week in total offense (561 yards per game) and scoring (46.5 points per game).

Long set Iowa and Beaver Stadium records with his 345 yards passing. The 599 yards in the air by both teams and 1,079 total yards are also stadium standards. Add to that the 254 yards passing by Penn State's Doug Strang, 131 yards rushing by Iowa's Owen Gill, 104 yards by Lion freshman D.J. Dozier and 119 yards receiving by Hawkeye Dave Moritz, and you begin to get some idea of what kind of game it was.

Yet it was a trio of third-quarter fumble recoveries by the Iowa defense which ultimately turned the tide in the Hawks' favor.

The Nittany Lions had a 28-21 lead and the football midway through the quarter when a Hawkeye gang tackle jarred loose the second of the fumbles from Dozier. Paul Hufford fell on it and the Hawks then turned to the tactic which played a major role in their last three touchdowns - the long (or Long) pass.

Cornhuskers puzzled, sorry about 84-point massacre

MINNEAPOLIS — Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne

was apologetic and players were puzzled. "I really am sorry we scored that many points," Osborne said after his top-ranked Cornhuskers humili-

ated Minnesota 84-13 Saturday night. "I hope the people up here don't think we were vindictive. We were just running basic plays," Osborne added.

The basic plays were being run by the third and fourth strings, for the most part, according to Nebraska wingback Irving Fryar and running back Mike Rozier,

who both played major parts in the melee.

Fryar caught two touchdown passes and accounted for 138 yards. Plus, he rushed for 92 yards and another touchdown. Rozier piled up 196 yards and three touchdowns. Both were puzzled why the Gopher players persisted in making disparaging remarks to the Nebraska players throughout the game.

"They'd shout junk in your face like they were out to hurt somebody," Rozier said. "They did a lot of talking. We were up 50 points and they were still talking. guess they wanted to talk, not play."

Fryar was astounded. "I couldn't believe it. We were up 40 points and they were still talking like they were

Both players said their purpose was to score but added they weren't paying attention to the scoreboard. 'We didn't score all those points. Our third and fourth strings did, anyway."

Minnesota Coach Joe Salem could only laugh. "We learned what an old fashioned butt-kicking is all about," Salem said. "We even had a couple of chuckles, but my sense of humor is different than others."

Minnesota got its only touchdown in the first half, driving 71 yards. Former Cedar Rapids Washington prep David Puk ran it in from one yard out. Jim Gallery kicked a 31-yard field goal in the first half and a 38yarder in the second.

Unbeaten Nebraska, 3-0, struck quickly and often, building a 42-10 halftime lead and going on to score the most points ever against a Minnesota team and the most a Nebraska team has ever scored against a Division I-A

Vanderbilt scores in last minute

Cyclones lose toughie, 29-26

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - In this land of country music enchantment, there was only one ballad Saturday night which fit the fortunes of Iowa State's gallant football

"Heartbreak Hotel," the song popularized by Elvis Presley, was the only way to describe the last-ditch scoring drive by Vanderbilt to escape with a 29-26 victory over the Clyclones.

The electrifying march in the final seconds, capped by quarterback Kurt Page's 10-yard scoring pass to Chuck Scott with sevens seconds left, offset a marked improvement by the winless (0-2) Cyclones.

The Commodores (1-1), who dropped a season opener to Maryland last week after stalling on the 12-yard line, got a reprieve Saturday night before a sellout crowd of 41,165 at Vanderbilt Stadium.

Iowa State, which had taken a 26-22 lead on Marc Bachrodt's 36-yard field goal with 1:48 to play, elected

to not go for a field goal with fourth down and three yards to go on the Vanderbilt 21. Instead, Cyclone quarterback David Archer scrambled with the ball after the snap from center, and was tackled at the line of scrimmage.

That set up Page's engineering of the winning drive. He lofted a 55-yard bomb to tailback Keith Edwards, who had to wait for the pass and fell over backward at the 10-yard line.

Two plays later, Page hit Scott for the TD. The drive needed only 58 seconds. It covered 88 yards in six

Iowa State Coach Jim Criner, who watched his young team drop a 51-10 season opener last week to Iowa's Hawkeyes, admitted he would have chosen a field goal attempt had he been given a second chance.

CHICAGO — Harold Baines knocked in the winning run with a sacrifice fly in the bottom of the ninth inning as the Chicago White Sox beat the Seattle Mariners, 4-3, Saturday night to clinch their first American League West Division championship.

The victory assured the White Sox of a berth in the American League playoffs against the winners of the East Division. It marks the first appearance by the White Sox in a league playoff since the playoffs were instituted in 1969.

And the division championship gives the White Sox a chance to capture their first American League pennant since 1959, when they went on to lose the World Series in six games to the Los Angeles Dodgers. The last time the White Sox won the World Series was in 1917 when

they took the New York Giants in six games.

A sellout crowd of 45,646 sent the White Sox home

attendance over the 2 million mark for the season, the first time that any pro franchise in Chicago has hit that

The White Sox entered the bottom of the ninth locked in a 3-3 tie with the Mariners when Julio Cruz drew a walk from reliever Bill Caudill, 2-8. Cruz then stole second and Rudy Law got to first on another walk. Both runners then advanced when Carlton Fisk drew yet another walk that chased Caudill.

and gave up the game-winning RBI.

No air left?

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa --Hayden Fry was winding up a happy press conference here Saturday when someone asked if he awarded a game ball to anyone.

"No, it probably hasn't got any air left in it!" he laughed and returned to the Hawkeye dressing room, one of the few happy spots here in Unhappy Valley.

Prior to that, Fry had been willing to answer most of the news media's questions. Except two of them: About the officiating and what strategy lowa used on some occasions Saturday.

"We have to play Penn State again next year," he said when asked why lowa passed on many running situations and vice versa.

"Don't ask me about the officiating. I didn't agree with most of it, but I don't want to talk about

"So what about the officiating?" came a prompt reply.

"I didn't even like the way they marked the ball," he said. Several days before this he had expressed concern because all six of the officials were from the east - not a split crew that included some from the Big Ten.

Fry said he figured lowa 'needed to be tested before getting into the Big Ten race," but he said this test showed his defense needed lots of attention.

"Our offense wasn't consistent," he observed. "We wanted to be real patient on offense and bait Penn State into playing us for the short passes. We got some big plays, like Chuck's long pass to Ronnie Harmon and the time he jerked loose and threw for a touchdown to Norm Granger.

"Chuck made some mistakes today. He's still learning, but he's an outstanding quarterback."

Fry declined to specify injuries, but said, "we got a lot of guys bruised today."

The lowa coach said, "Ohio State is well balanced and may be the best," and that was before he knew the Buckeyes had upset Oklahoma.

Sure, that big pass at end was a 'good call' for lowa

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - So what did Iowa's Chuck Long and Ronnie Harmon think when Coach Hayden Fry sent in instructions for a long pass and lowa nursing a 35-28 lead with 8:40 to go in Saturday's

"I thought it was a good call," smiled Long. "Ronnie has the speed to get open, and we'd baited Penn State early in the game by throwing a lot of short passes." How about you, Ronnie?

'I didn't care what the play call was," replied the soph from New York City. "I just wanted the football.

"When Chuck threw it, I thought it was mine all the way. Yes, No. 92 (Penn State senior Mark Fruehan) was there, too, but I think the guy who goes up hardest is going to get the ball, and I went up as hard as I could."

The play covered 77 yards — the longest scrimmage gain in Fry's four-plus years at lowa — and gave the Hawkeyes the insurance they needed in an electrifying 42-34 victory. Long had to launch it in a hurry, and Harmon and Fruehan converged on Penn State's 35yard line.

Greg Stokes couldn't have gone up much higher or tougher than Harmon, who somehow grabbed the ball, and kept it in his grasp as he came down with Fruehan trying to be a clinging vine.

Then Harmon made another move and Fruehan began slipping away. Harmon wheeled free as Fruehan seemed to relax, maybe not believing his opponent had caught the ball. Nobody else was near as the young man who wanted to be a running back trotted exultantly to the end zone.

'Penn State has a good defense," said Harmon. 'Look, they beat Georgia for the national championship last season, and you don't do that if you don't have a lot of talent and depth."

Harmon, like the other lowa players from New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, had friends and relatives here. He said 11 of them were among the 84,628.

"We're a team to be reckoned with," said linebacker Mike Yacullo quietly when newsmen asked if Iowa is for real. "We've had two winning seasons in a row.

"If you had told me beforehand that Penn State would score 34 points and we would still win, I wouldn't have believed it.

"Our offense really came through today, putting 42 points on the board. Coach (Fry) told us after the game that it wasn't pretty but it's a win and we'll take it. He said our defense was shaky and we'll have to work hard in practice this coming week."

Joe Levelis, offensive tackle, said, "Penn State started using some defensive stunts in the second half, and this enabled them to get through and put pressure on Chuck (Long). I think they were lining up with an extra guy on one side, and we didn't always pick him

"We've got to tighten up our defense for Ohio State. But this was a great one to win. We came here Friday and got a look at this stadium. It sure didn't look as if it would hold 84,000 people. Well, next week we'll have the home crowd for a change."

Hap Peterson, nose guard, labeled it "a super day any day is when you can beat a team with the class of Penn State."

"We knew we had to keep the ball to give our defense rest," said fullback Norm Granger. "We came here knowing we have a good team, but Penn State is strong and plays with a lot of enthusiasm. They never gave up. Hey, can I go now? I'm from the east here, and I've got a lot of folks to see before we leave."

Long admitted he was confused on the game's first play and that he had pulled a boner when he was called for intentional grounding a pass.

"The crowd made it very difficult to hear," he said, "but, yes, I learned a lot. Actually, we expected Penn State to be this tough today.

"On the play when the official ruled I fumbled and gave Penn State the ball, I felt sure'l was down with my forward progress stopped. The ref wasn't in good position to see.

ornerback Mark Fruehan down the middle, making a lunging grab for a 46-yard gain. Long carried it into the end zone from five yards out and Tom Nichol's extra-point kick made

In a turnaround typical of the day, Penn State charged back downfield, moving to the Iowa 21 before the defense put in another appearance.

Tackle George Little, a Pennsylvania native, roared into the backfield, leveled Strang and popped the ball onto the turf, where linebacker Mike Yacullo retrieved it.

Again the Hawks struck swiftly and efficiently. Long hit Gill up the right sideline for a 38-yard gain and Norm Granger split the Penn State defense on a perfectly executed trap play, juking out two defenders while going 23 yards for the go-ahead TD.

The Hawks produced one more bomb with about 81/2 minutes remaining in the game. On the first play after a Lion punt, Long fired to Ronnie Harmon streaking down the left side. Harmon leaped for the underthrown toss, snared it over the top of Fruehan, spun in the air, landed, and sprinted the last 35 yards into the end zone.

The 77-yard play was the longest lowa pass completion since 1973.

"Their cornerbacks were playing real tight," explained Long. "We kept looking for that play and looking for it all day and finally got it. Ronnie made a great catch."

The Lions, down 42-28, still didn't quit. Strang drove them 72 yards in nine plays with Skeeter Nichols scoring from seven yards out with 5:37 to go. Strang's pass for the twopoint conversion was dropped by normally reliable Kenny Jackson.

It turned out to be Penn State's final gasp.

The first half had a comparable number of momentum shifts plus a little controversy. The way things started out, it looked like the Hawks might fare about as well against the Lions as the Christians of ancient Long was called for intentional

grounding on the very first play, backing lowa up to its own fouryard line. Fry elected to use a quick kick on third down (Tom Grogan doing the booting) in an attempt to get out of the hole, but the Lions got the ball at the Iowa 33. Strang threw a nine-yard scoring pass to Dean DiMidio five plays later... The Hawks didn't bat an eye.

They marched 80 yards back the other way, chewing up half that distance on an impromptu scrambling 40-yard completion to Moritz. Eddie Phillips plunged into the end zone from a yard out.

The Hawks stampeded 72 yards to make it 14-7 the next time they had the ball, Gill notching his fifth TD of the season on a four-yard run.

At one point early in the second quarter, the Hawks had accumulated 227 yards to 54 for the home squad.

But nothing stayed the same for very long in this game. After being pinned back at their own 11 by a punt, Penn State launched perhaps its best drive of the game, rolling 89 yards in 14 plays. Strang threw to a diving Jackson in the corner of the end zone for the score.

A controversial fumble by Long plus an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty against Fry for protesting the call set up the third Penn State TD late in the half. Strang capped the 33-yard drive with a one-yard sneak, making it 21-14.

The Hawks opened the second half by recovering the first of the three fumbles. Long evaded a heavy rush to sling a sidearm 26-yard TD pass to Phillips moments later. creating a 21-21 deadlock.


Penn State bounced back with a 57-yard dash by Dozier, setting up an 18-yard Strang-to-Kevin Baugh TD pass which made it 28-21.

"Penn State just played a tremendous game," said Fry, whose team will take an 0-2 record into its home opener against Ohio State.


