CHAMPAIGN, Ill. — Ouch!

Iowa's swarm stung absolutely no one Saturday. An emotionally-charged Illinois football team sent No. 4-ranked lowa plummeting back down to earth, dominating the Hawkeyes 33-0 before 73,351 fans at

Zuppke Field. Although Jack Trudeau's passing yielded 286 yards and three touchdowns and a gambling 4-3 defense was punishing, a guy named Murphy might have had the

best explanation for lowa's performance. "The only way I can describe it is Murphy's Law,"

Iowa receiver Dave Moritz said. "What can go wrong

State. Not by a long shot. Instead, Illinois scored 24 points in the first 16

minutes and raced to a 27-0 halftime lead. Meanwhile, the Illini defense was unrelenting, handing Iowa its first shutout since a 28-0 loss to Washington in the 1982 Rose Bowl.

The Illini allowed Iowa only 15 net yards rushing, collecting 11 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for minus-85. Chuck Long, the nation's second leading passer, hit 12-of-27 for 224 yards. He was sacked seven times and had two passes intercepted.

"We obviously were not anywhere near the team we have been," Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said. "I don't know why, but it happens in college football. How do you figure out young men?

"We were just beaten in every phase . . . whipped by a superior football team. I'd rather lose big than one that goes down to the wire, though. I think we can get a more realistic assessment of what went wrong.

"After the game, I reminded our guys of what I said in pre-season: No Big Ten team is going to go through the season unbeaten. We'll bounce back. We have before."

Now Illinois is in the conference hot seat. The Illini, who play at Wisconsin Saturday, are 3-1 overall and tied for the conference top with Michigan at 2-0.

Iowa, which in a two-season span had won six straight games and 11 of 13, dropped to 3-1 overall and 1-1 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes are home against Northwestern Saturday.

"The tone in here is not one of tearing the lockerroom apart," Illinois Coach Mike White said. "We have to keep every game in perspective. My main concern now is Wisconsin next week because now somebody is going to try to catch us. I think the key today was that we caught Iowa at the right time."

Timing. That word seems to say it all today in college football. Illinois proved the point further.

Trudeau, who spent the last two seasons charting plays for record-setting Tony Eason, was the toast of Champaign. Before he left early in the fourth quarter, the 6-foot-4 Californian completed 23-of-32 passes. He hit three different receivers for touchdowns and

also set up four field goals by Chris White, the coach's son. White connected from 30, 20, 47 and 45 yards. Shortly after the Illinois band's banner "Illini Pay 'Em Back" was hauled off the field, the team started to

avenge last year's 14-13 loss at Iowa City. Trudeau led Illinois on a 52-yard, 11-play drive which resulted in White's 30-yard field goal with 8:50 left in the first quarter. Trudeau completed three passes to tight end Tim Brewster for 27 yards and Thomas Rooks ran three times for 20.

Iowa's offense, which ranked No. 4 nationally after three weeks, failed on downs and Tom Nichol punted 34 yards to the Illinois 46.

On the first play, Mitchell Brookins streaked past Ken Sims and Mike Stoops and hauled in a 54-yard strike from Trudeau. The Iowa defense seemed shell-shocked as White booted the extra point.



Cyclones take long step backwards, 24-17

AMES — Iowa State's football team may not have hit rock bottom, but it sure slid a long way in that direction Saturday afternoon.

Lightly-regarded New Mexico State defeated the Cyclones at low State Stadium, 24-17.

An upset? Yes. A fluke? Hardly. Actually, the Aggies could easily have won by a larger margin. Untimely turnovers and penalties kept ISU afloat. The Cyclones were clearly outplayed on the offensive and defensive lines, and that was the fundamental difference.

New Mexico State used the game's first possession to drive 80 yards and take a 7-0 lead. The dye was cast. It was an affair the Aggies were ready for, and the Cyclones apparently weren't.

"We didn't deserve to win," an angry Iowa State Coach Jim Criner said, "And obviously we didn't.

"New Mexico State was everything we said they would be," Criner added. "They showed up a lot hungrier than we did. There's not a lot more to say than that.


"They (the Aggies) are not a great football team, but they're better than we are."

Besides the score, other numbers go a long way to justify Criner's statements.

New Mexico State had 349 total yards to Iowa State's 263. The Aggies led in rushing yardage, 259-42. And in time of possession, the Cyclones only had the football about one-third of the game (20 minutes, 44 seconds).

This was not supposed to be. The New Mexico State team that came to Ames was the same one that went to Denton, Texas, two weeks ago and lost to North Texas State, 49-3.



Illini praised

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. - Iowa's only consolation in a 33-0 blowout to Illinois is the old football adage that "you are never as good - or as bad - as you look in a game like that."

The Hawkeyes had very few other positive things going for them after suffering the second worst lost in Hayden Fry's coaching regime (the worst was 57-0 to Nebraska in 1980). Who would dare suggest lowa couldn't score against the Illini in the fourth quarter after getting a first down on the two-yard line?

Yet the steamed-up Illini held Iowa out of the end zone on four fantastic defensive plays. They stopped Chuck Long twice on quarterback sneaks, fielded Eddie Phillips high in the air on his dive attempt and then frustrated Long completely on a rollout to his left.

This was the same Iowa offense that scored 51 points against Iowa State, 42 with great comeback against Penn State and knocked off No. 3 rated Ohio States week, 20-14.

llinois credit for some fine fense," said Owen Gill, who was limited to eight yards in six attempts. "However, we made it easy for them with some poor play of our own.

"Illinois seemed to blitz everybody. They certainly were ready for us. But there is still a long way to go in this season. We all have seven games left, and right now we've got to get ready for Northwestern."

What happened? Hawks not sure

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. - Chuck Long was forced to scramble all day Saturday. But he didn't fumble many questions.

"We learned from this," the Iowa quarterback said after the Hawks' 33-0 defeat at Illinois. "It taught us that we can't come into a game hinking we can beat everybody that shows up."

How could something like this happen to the fourth-ranked team in the country? An Illinois victory would not have been totally unexpected, but 33-0? How could the No. 4 offense in America score no points?

The most frequent question: Was it a letdown after three emotional wins, including last week's victory over Ohio State?

None of the Hawkeyes bought that logic: Long - "I don't think we were flat. It's just that everything that could go wrong did. When we didn't score on four downs from the Illinois one (in the fourth quarter) that was the icing on the cake. That was the way the whole day went."

Linebacker Larry Station — "It probably seems like we were flat, but I don't buy it. I was ready to play football today. Football's emotionally and physically draining, but you still have to play the next game. I just think we got beat by a better football team."

Receiver Dave Moritz — "Practices were fine, everything coming in was fine. We weren't expecting a letdown. But I sure feel flat now. We shouldn't have lost, but we did."

Illinois' Jack Trudeau riddled Iowa's secondary for 286 yards and three touchdowns. The play that got the Illini offense rolling was a 54-yard toss from Trudeau to Mitchell Brookins, who raced past Ken Sims and Mike Stoops for the

"It was a deep post pattern, Brookins got behind us and it was a well-thrown ball," Sims explained. "I was shocked. I knew they'd try to jump out quickly, but not like that.

"I kind of figured they'd throw on us, but I didn't know how early. It surprised us and caught

Long entered as the nation's No. 2 passer, but an Illini defense which ranked 10th nationally pestered him play after play. Long completed just 12 of 27 passes for 224 yards and was intercepted twice.

"Illinois did a good job taking our routes away," Long said. "I can't compliment them enough. We knew they'd gamble a lot on defense, and we prepared for it. But they have good down linemen, good linebackers and they took away our offense.

"A lot of times I should have checked off (called an audible), but I wanted to go to the pass. We moved the ball in the second half but just got some bad breaks. Things like that happen."

IT WAS A soft-spoken, dejected Coach Hayden Fry who addressed the media afterward. Questions were difficult to answer.

"They got momentum on us early and one thing after another happened," he said. "We kept helping them with mistakes. We knew Trudeau was a real good passer, but I was certainly surprised with our ineptness on offense and defense."


