Strong defensive play by goalie Joan Behrends aided the No. 3 Iowa field hockey team in its three wins against Stanford, Northwestern and California, all top 20 teams, this weekend in

'Joan was the outstanding player all weekend," said Iowa Coach Judith Davidson. "She did a great job and made some unbelievable saves. "I'm confident with how Joan is

playing now," she added. "She's reacting naturally now rather than thinking and then playing too slowly.' The Hawkeyes took on No. 15 Stanford Friday night and "squeaked" by

with a 2-1 win, Davidson said. Davidson described Stanford as a very strong team and having a powerful front line. She also attributed the closeness of the game to Iowa's passing game not working very well.

ONLY ONE GOAL was scored during the first half. With 27 minutes gone, forward Ellen Egan scored for the Hawkeyes on a penalty corner.

In the second half, Stanford scored first with almost six minutes into the period. Then five minutes later, Debra Brickey scored on a penalty shot off of Egan, giving Iowa the lead.

Davidson said her team took charge of the game in the second half. "We came out alive and dominated the second half," she said.

Iowa had 13 shots on goal during the game and Stanford made only seven. Saturday, the Hawkeyes defeated Big Ten rival. No. 9 Northwestern, 4-0. According to Davidson, beating the

Wildcats by four goals puts Iowa in a good position when the two teams meet again. If the two teams would tie next time they play, Iowa's four goals would out them ahead of Northwestern in the



lowa offense powers past 1-4 Wildcats

lowa's 61-21 whipping of Northwestern Saturday was a sweet win for the Hawkeyes, but the win was a costly one as several Hawkeyes may be sidelined with serious injuries.

"It was a costly victory," Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said. "Both of the Huffords (Paul and Mike) are out now with knee injuries. The doctors said they don't know yet how long they will be out.

Both of the Huffords have what Fry described at "sprained knees" and could be out for 1-3 weeks unless more serious problems are found when they are examined. Iowa's No. 2 right tackle, Jeff Drost, is also out and will likely miss some playing time.

"WE'LL PROBABLY HAVE to experiment some this week," Fry said Sunday morning. "We'll have to move some personnel, especially on defense, to shore up our depth. There's no question we'll have to move some people around. I'm sure (defensive line Coach Dan) McCarney didn't get much sleep last night."

Iowa used its running game only sparingly but it wasn't really needed when the Hawkeye air force took over. And once Iowa went to the air, the game was history. "We used our running game just

enough to the their defense off balance," Hawkeye Coach Hayden Fry said. "We didn't want to risk aggravating any injuries to our running backs. All of our running backs and fullbacks should be at full speed this week (against Purdue)."

QUARTERBACK CHUCK LONG went 23 of 33 for 420 yards and three in total offense. In addition, Iowa is touchdowns, breaking his own Iowa No. 3 quarterbacks, Tom Grogan and Cornelius Robertson, also had a field day picking the Northwestern defense apart in the second half.



"IT'S NICE TO be the all-time scorer," Nichol said, "but I keep saying I wished I would have had it last year when I had a terrible year kicking field goals. Grogan's done a super job of holding everytime since he's been holding for me.

Green said he didn't think the score was a case of Iowa running up the point. total. "Run up the score? I never worry about that," Green said, "If the game was over then we should have left the field. No, I never worry about that sort of thing. Iowa was playing and so were we.

Schembechler's Wolverines put together the big win in a big way Saturday, humbling intrastate rival Michigan State, 42-0, in East Lansing.

The victory left 13th-ranked Michigan tied for the conference lead at 3-0 with Illinois, the Wolverines' opponent three weeks down the road. The 17th-ranked Illini kept their league record clean with a 27-15 win at Wisconsin.

IOWA, RANKED 14TH, and 9thrated Ohio State produced a deadlock for third place in the league with identical 2-1 marks. The Hawkeyes recovered from an embarrassment at Illinois' hands a week earlier with a 61-21 blowout of Northwestern and the
