Iowa quells Wolverine bite, 26-0

Hockey squad returns to form

The Iowa field hockey team is back. After suffering through part of the season with mental errors and four close losses, the Hawkeyes are playing like the Iowa teams that have won the Big Ten championship each of the last four years.

Field hockey

The Hawkeyes soundly defeated Ohio State, 5-1, and Michigan, 9-2. Iowa also took on No. 13 Penn State Sunday and by dominating the game, pulled out a 2-1 overtime win.

Iowa Coach Judith Davidson said her team worked and played hard in all three games for the victories. "We realized we have to work for everything or we'll lose," she said. "This weekend all the things we have been working on in practice came together."

DAVIDSON FELT HER team played polished and poised hockey Sunday against Penn State. "We executed the things we work on in practice and we executed them against a good team," she said.

On paper, Iowa totally dominated the game. The Hawkeyes took 37 shots on goal during the game and had 17 penalty corners. Penn State took nine shots on goal and had two penalty corners.

Freshman Liz Tchou scored the first goal of the game at 15 minutes, 21 seconds to give Iowa a 1-0 lead at halftime.

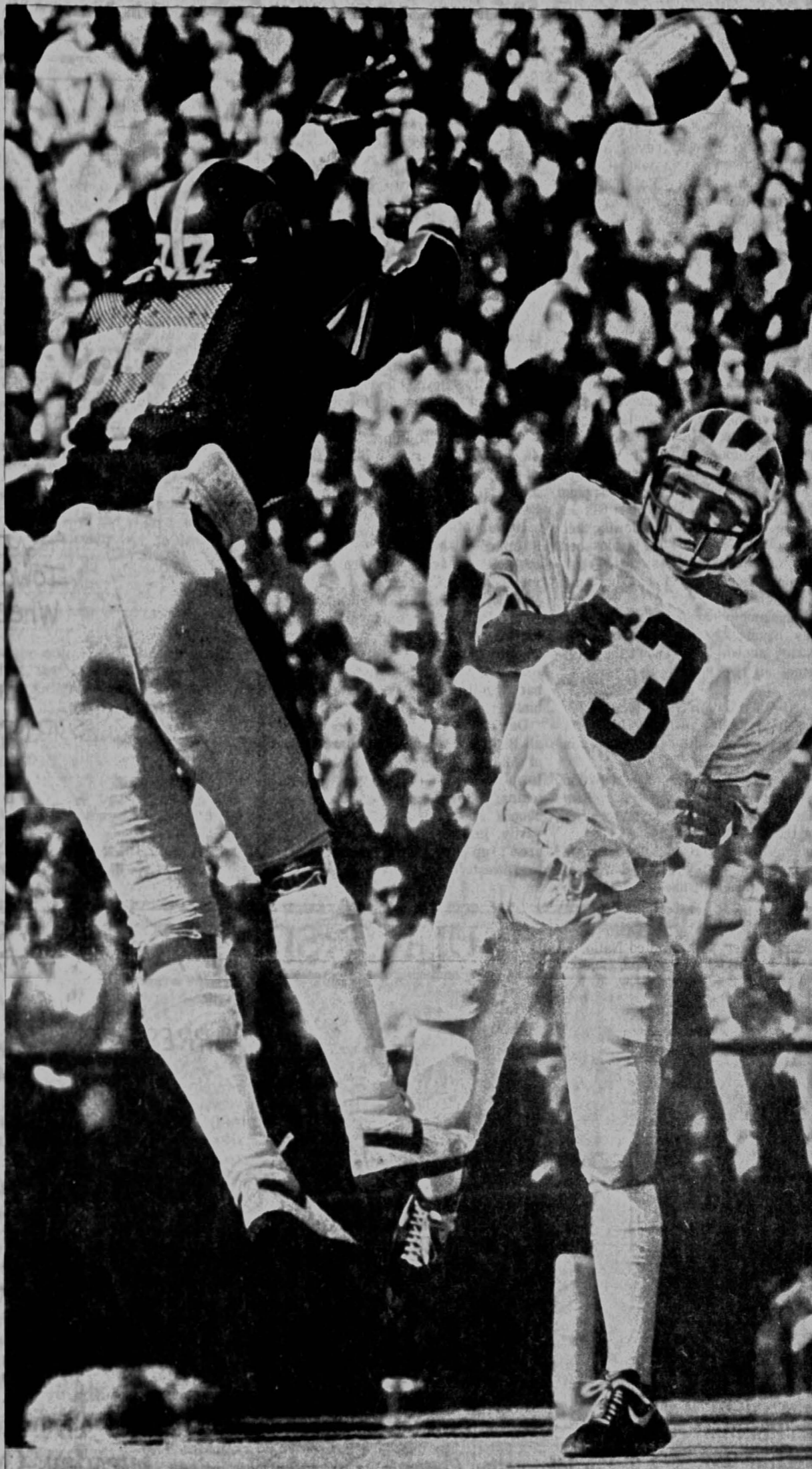
Penn State came back in the second half to get on the board. Tracy Neave scored for the Nittany Lions, tying the score at 1-1.

In overtime, Iowa also controlled the game with four shots on goal and two penalty corners. The Nittany Lions couldn't get one shot off on goal and had one penalty corner in the overtime.

THE HAWKEYES' winning goal came on a penalty corner. Kim Herrmann set up the corner for Iowa, Mary Koboldt stopped the ball and RosAnna Salcido pushed the ball into the cage for a 2-1 win.

"The team really worked for the win the whole game," the Iowa coach said.

In the Hawkeyes' Big Ten games, the scoring was spread out and a lot of players tallied. See Iowa, page 3B

For any Big Ten football team to defeat Michigan is one thing, but to keep the mighty Wolverines off the scoreboard for 60 minutes is almost unheard of.

Both rare feats were pulled off last Saturday in Kinnick Stadium.

With a national television audience watching, seven bowl scouts in attendance and 66,025 fans waving the afternoon away, the high-riding Iowa defense sent Bo Schembechler's proud crew back to Ann Arbor with a 26-0 loss, the worst drubbing ever endured by a Schembechler-coached team at Michigan.

"That was a great game," Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said with heavy emphasis on the that. "It is one of the most satisfying victories that I've ever been associated with against one of the best football programs in America."

"I KNOW IT WASN'T real pretty and we didn't really open up because we were determined not to make any mistakes," he added. "Nobody ever dreamed we'd goose-egg Michigan. It's a great feeling."

The win, Iowa's first over Michigan in Iowa City since 1962, leaves the Hawkeyes in a tie with Ohio State atop the Big Ten standings at 5-1. Michigan, shutout for the first time since Minnesota turned the trick, 16-0, in 1977, drops to 4-2 in conference play.

As has been the case in Iowa's last two victories, it was the defense that set the tone, although the group didn't even see two minutes of action in the

BUT IT WOULD be all the points the Iowa defense would need. Michigan, with sophomore Russell Rein starting only his second game of the season, was never really able to mount a drive all afternoon. Michigan gets taste of its own medicine

Iowa beat Michigan at its own game Saturday.

During the 16-year reign of Coach Bo Schembechler, the Wolverine football program has been noted around the Big Ten and the nation for its strong defensive efforts, but the roles were reversed at Kinnick Stadium Saturday when the Hawkeyes leveled a 26-0 defeat squarely on Michigan's Rose Bowl chances.

The Wolverines haven't been shut out since a 16-0 loss to Minnesota in 1977 and the defeat was the worst Michigan has suffered since a team coached by current Iowa Athletic Director Bump Elliott lost to Ohio State, 50-14, in 1968.

Needless to say, Schembechler wasn't a man of many words during his postgame conference.

"ALL LOSSES ARE tough, especially when you're struggling," Schembechler said. "Iowa's defense is good, but not that good; yeah, they're good, but not good enough to shut us out."

Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said that even he didn't expect the Hawkeye defense to hold the Wolverines scoreless.

"I didn't think so either," Fry said when told about Schembechler's remarks. "It never really entered my mind. Before the game I told the team that we were capable of beating them by a touchdown or so, but I said I'd settle for one point."

Junior free safety Devon Mitchell did that even one better when he let the air. See **Defense**, page 3B

Hawks make history with upset

History was made Friday night at the Carver-Hawkeye Arena when the Iowa volleyball team defeated 15th-rated Purdue for the first time since the birth of the volleyball program 10 years ago.

In the first game, the Hawkeyes struck Purdue as quickly as a snake strikes a victim, leaving the Boilermakers with a 12-point deficit. Iowa's largest lead was 14-2.

Purdue, however, hung on at game point, scoring six points before the Hawkeyes won the game 15-8 with a dig by senior Denise Watson to sophomore Kathy Griesheim, who set a high, outside set back to Watson for the kill (an offensive attack where the opponents are unable to play the ball).

THE HAWKEYES LOST the second and third games 15-9 and 15-4 in a slow-paced effort by both teams. "We had our ups and downs," Iowa Coach Sandy Stewart said. "The third and fourth games were kind of boring because neither team was playing well."

For a team that has been plagued with slow starts since the beginning of the season, the fourth game began much like the first game as the Hawkeyes took the lead from the beginning 10-0. And again, Purdue fought back before Iowa won the game 15-11 with two consecutive point-scoring kills by freshman Ellen Mullarkey.

Midway through the game, Mullarkey, who has been out of competition with a back injury, was substituted for Watson during front row rotations. "I think someone who helped us a lot was Ellen," Stewart said. "Denise (Watson) did a good job, but Ellen was a spark. She came in and killed four in a row."

THE FINAL GAME was more evenly matched as neither team lead by more than three points. With the score tied at 13-13, Purdue's Annette Bauer hit the ball out of bounds, giving Iowa the side-out. Purdue finally regained the serve after a long rally, which ended with an out of bounds Iowa block.

A bad pass on serve receive by the Hawkeyes, enabled the Boilermakers to capitalize on the pass, which went

over the head of Griesheim to put Purdue's Kate Crandell in position to put the ball away and lift the score to game point.

In the next rally, however, Iowa, after a succession of plays, passed the ball to Griesheim, who set up senior Julie Micheletti for the kill. With the serve, Iowa tied the score at game point after Purdue's Marianne Smith hit the ball out of bounds.

THE SCORE REMAINED tied for four rotations before Micheletti went to the serving line and served two consecutive aces to win the game 16-14.

That's when history was made. "I was really proud of our composure in the fifth game," Stewart said. "To go out and beat one of the best teams in the nation was great... I think both teams had trouble with passing. We have a tough serve and they're not a good passing team, so we tried to exploit that."

Purdue Coach Carol Dewey said her team did not play up to its potential. "We made too many hitting errors, we made too many serving errors and we were aces too many times."

Dewey also said part of the problem was playing a "less-competitive" team. "We didn't adjust very well from the beginning," she said. "It's a much smaller team than we're used to playing. After game number one, it's my expectation that we should have been adjusted."

IN RESPONSE, Stewart said many

of the so-called "larger teams" say that because Iowa is not taken seriously yet. "We got that statement so many times last year," the Hawkeye coach said. "All along it's been our teamwork. We don't count on one individual standout. And when that happens, teams win."

Coming off the Purdue upset, the Iowa squad defeated its second opponent in another five-game battle Saturday night at the arena.

The Hawkeyes squeaked by Illinois 15-9, 8-15, 9-15, 15-10 and 15-8 in what Stewart described as a lucky win. "We just couldn't get excited on the court," she said. "We were just dead. We were lucky to win. We didn't play well — we hung in there and Illinois made some mistakes."

"I HAVE TO GIVE the players credit for hanging in there, because sometimes it's easy to just give up."

Illinois Coach Mike Hebert said the loss was a combination of Iowa's composure and Illinois' mistakes. "I thought we played, frankly, very mistake prone," he said. "First of all, I thought Iowa played very well. I thought what hurt us was that we had a large number of transition opportunities... We would break down at the easiest moment and do something silly."

Even though Stewart said the Hawkeye squad didn't play well defensively, she was happy her team didn't give up.

out of the Michigan balloon with an interception of a Russell Rein pass on the Iowa 10-yard line with 32 seconds remaining in the third quarter.

THE WOLVERINES WERE in a third and goal situation on the Iowa 14-yard line when Rein dropped back and spotted Vince Bean open in the back of the end zone. Rein passed, and Mitchell, United Press International's Midwest Defensive Player of the Week, stepped in and picked off his 11th career interception.

The Brooklyn, N.Y., native looked like he was headed for the Hawkeye end zone until he was tripped up from behind by Wolverine running back Rick Rogers after a 75-yard return. "I thought I had it," he said, adding that if he wouldn't have gotten in front of his blocker he probably could have added six points to the Iowa lead. "I think that's what my problem was."

IOWA CO-CAPTAIN Keith Hunter, who was doing the blocking for Mitchell on the run, said that Mitchell simply did everything right in picking off two passes during Saturday's nationally-televised game. "This has really been the first time all season that he's broken to the ball," Hunter said. "I thought he was going to score."

The 11 career interceptions places Mitchell third on Iowa's all-time list behind Nile Kinnick's 18 and Steve Wilson's 12. Kinnick competed from 1937-39 while Wilson wore an Iowa uniform from 1966-68.

Mitchell also intercepted a Rein pass in the second quarter which led to a 29-yard field goal by Tom Nichol and a 9-0 Iowa halftime lead.

Iowa's defensive players had concentrated on making the big plays during last week's practices, Mitchell said. "We practiced all week on making the crucial plays," he said. "Our offense has big plays and so does our defense. Big plays really tear up the opposing

team." But against an opponent that has the reputation that Michigan does, it took some time for the shutout to sink in. "Michigan is the type of team that no one expects to shut out," Hunter said. "You always expect them to come up

with the big play. If Michigan is down they'll never give up." And you certainly won't get any argument from Schembechler on that. As he said on his way out of the Wolverine interview room, "Another day, another place."

ceptions on the day, the second snuffing out a Wolverine drive that had reached the Iowa five-yard line. Rein tried to hit Vince Bean in the end zone near the end of the third quarter, but Mitchell jumped in front of Bean and returned the ball 75 yards before being tripped up from behind by Michigan running back Rick Rogers.

Mitchell suffered a shoulder injury on the play and didn't return to the game. Fry said Sunday that the injury isn't believed to be serious. "The doctor told me this morning that Devon should be able to play this week (at Indiana)," Fry said Sunday during his weekly teleconference. "I doubt he'll practice much this week so he can get the full range of movement in his shoulder."

FOR HIS EFFORTS, Mitchell, who is now third on Iowa's all-time interception list, was named United Press International's Midwest Defensive Player of the Week.

Schembechler said Iowa's defensive schemes had nothing to do with the interceptions. "No, their linebackers blitzing was not unexpected by us and it didn't hurt us that much," he said. "The main reason for those interceptions was just poorly thrown balls by the quarterbacks."

Rein, who was only seven for 13 for 40 yards, was replaced by Chris Zurburg in the fourth quarter.

On the day, Michigan was only able to accumulate 187 total yards while the Hawkeye offense, playing "it close to the vest" as Fry put it, rolled up 272 yards against "one of the toughest defenses we'll ever face," Fry said. "We earned every yard we got."

WITH THE IOWA shutout, the Hawkeyes have now not given up a touchdown in 12 quarters of action. Fry inserted some reserves on Michigan's final drive and they came through to preserve the scoreless streak.

"We were hopeful that they wouldn't score," Fry said. "Our defensive takes pride in stopping people, especially a quality team like Michigan. To keep them out of the end zone with our two and threes ... was just great."

Schembechler was asked if he considered going for a field goal in the final seconds to avert the shutout. "We had no thought of going for a field goal," a disgruntled Schembechler said. "What for? We were going for a touchdown all the way."

ALMOST OVERSHADOWED by the great defensive effort was the performance of fullback Owen Gill and quarterback Chuck Long. Gill carried 16 times for 85 yards, allowing him to pass Dennis Mosley for second-place on the all-time Iowa rushing list. His total of 2,150 yards is just 27 yards shy of Eddie Phillips' school record total of 2,177 set last season.

Long, who entered the game as the nation's leading passer in terms of efficiency, did nothing to hurt his standing, completing 14 of 20 for 146 yards and no interceptions. "I could have let Chuck throw more and add to his statistics," Fry said Sunday. "But I wanted to play it close to the vest and avoid those big turnovers."

Iowa now must look ahead to a date Saturday against winless Indiana, who was edged by Wisconsin, 20-16, on a fake field goal. "I'm concerned with everybody we play," Fry said.

penalty corners. The Buckeyes took nine shots on goal and had four penalty corners.

Davidson said her team played a much better game against Ohio State Friday than they did two weeks ago when Iowa defeated the Buckeyes, 2-0.

THE SCORING WAS also spread out in Iowa's win over Michigan.

Tracy O'Brian scored the first goal of her college career in the second half. O'Brian's goal was followed with goals by Salcido and Detwiler, who were assisted by Brickey. Dawn Chamberlin scored the final goal of the game, which was also her first goal of the season.

The three wins increase Iowa's record to 11-4-2 overall and 6-1 in the Big Ten.

Disney title goes to Nelson

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (UPI) — Larry Nelson scrambled to a two-under-par 70 Sunday to win the \$400,000 Walt Disney World Classic by one shot.

Nelson finished with a 22-under-par 266, the low on the PGA tour this year, and won \$72,000.

It was Nelson's first victory since last year's U.S. Open and his seventh in 11 years on the PGA Tour.

Hubert Green, winner of the Southern Open last week, was second with a final-round 68 and a 268 total. He won \$43,200.

Chip Beck, playing in the final threesome with Nelson and Green, took himself out of contention early with a double-bogey on the second hole. He finished in a three-way tie for third with rookie Brad Faxon and Jay Haas. Beck had a final-round 72, Faxon a 69 and Haas a 68.

Defending champion Payne Stewart (69), Larry Rinker (67) and Mark Lye (69) were tied at 17-under 271.

with four birdies and two bogeys. He led most of the way but briefly dropped into a tie on the back side. He carried a two-stroke lead over Green onto the 14th tee but hit his second shot into the water and took a bogey while Green moved into a tie with a birdie.

They then took turns blowing chances to put the round away. Nelson canned a birdie putt on 15 and went two shots up when Green took a bogey. He stretched that to three when Green took a second straight bogey on 16.

Nelson then hit into a bunker on 17 and took a bogey while Green scored a birdie to cut Nelson's lead to one stroke going into the final hole.

They both hit the fairway with their drives on 18. Nelson hit his second shot 20 feet from the pin, while Green came up 30 feet away. Green ran his putt four feet past and Nelson came up two feet short. Green made his par putt and Nelson nailed down the victory by making his putt.

"It was very exciting," he said of the final hole. "I hit two good shots on 18 and then two-putted."

Hawkeyes bust Michigan mystique; Ohio State escapes to keep pace

Iowa's football team has done its own version of "ghostbusters" in the past two weeks and the results have enabled the Hawkeyes to think more seriously about a trip to the West Coast come New Year's Day.

Iowa shut out Michigan 26-0 Saturday, the first time the Hawkeyes have blanked Michigan since 1929. The win enabled Iowa to improve its Big Ten ledger to 4-1 and remain tied with Ohio State.

The Buckeyes struggled to a 23-20 win over Michigan State. Michigan and Purdue, which fell to Illinois 34-20, lost its share of the lead and dropped to 3-2.

Illinois, the defending Big Ten champion, remained in the hunt for the league title at 4-2. Illinois cannot go to the Rose Bowl this year because it is on probation.

WISCONSIN KEPT Indiana winless with a 20-16 win over the Hoosiers while Northwestern edged Minnesota 31-28 in other Big Ten games.

Iowa removed one ghost last week at Purdue, where it had not won in 28 years before it whipped the Boilermakers 40-3 last week. But the shutout over Michigan, the Wolverines first in seven years, was probably more satisfying to Hawkeye fans.

"Nobody every dreamed we could goose-egg a great program like Michigan's," Iowa Coach Hayden Fry said. "It's a big win for us. I hope Michigan wins the rest of its games and I hope we do, too. That covers it."

Ohio State got another 100-yard rushing day from Keith Byars, the nation's leading rusher, but had to hold off a strong second half surge by upset-minded Michigan State, 2-3 in the league, to stay tied for the top.

RALF MOJSIEJENKO missed a 43-yard field goal attempt with three seconds left that enabled Ohio State to escape.

"I was crossing my fingers and holding my breath on that kick," Buckeye Coach Earle Bruce said.

Byars rushed for 121 yards on 40 carries and scored a one-yard touchdown. Rich Spangler booted three field goals for the Buckeyes.

Mojsiejenko explained that his punting duties may have affected his placekicking. "There's no excuse, though, I just had a bad day," he said. "I'm lifting my head up. I just didn't make it. I start thinking too much."

Illinois' quarterback Jack Trudeau had another outstanding day, passing for two touchdowns and 321 yards in a 17 for 31 effort. But it was Trudeau's running — he gained 40 yards in five carries — that Coach Mike White was lauding after the Illini win over Purdue.

"GOOD QUARTERBACKS have to run," White said. "You don't have to run fast, all you have to do is run."

Trudeau hit David Boatwright on a 52-yard scoring pass and a 35-yarder to his favorite receiver, David Williams, for the other.

"Coming off the Ohio State game it amazed me that we started as fast as we did," added White, whose team struck for a 14-0 lead but did not blow the margin like it had against the Buckeyes.

Despite the loss, Purdue Coach Leon Burtnett was still thinking about the postseason chances for his team.

"I'll tell you what, we've still got a good chance to go to a good bowl game," Burtnett said.

WISCONSIN RELIED ON a fake field goal attempt to saddle Indiana with its longest losing streak in the school's 100-year football history.

A four-yard touchdown run by holder Bob Kobza on a fake broke a 10-all tie to allow Wisconsin to improve its record to 4-3 overall and 2-3 in the Big Ten. Indiana lost its 12th straight and seventh straight this year.

"We saw on film they left something open and it worked to perfection," said Wisconsin Coach Dave McClain on the fake.

Indiana Coach Bill Mallory, still searching for his first win, was disappointed his club could not convert in the closing minutes when freshman Ernie Jones **fumbled** on a reverse play at midfield.

"It's just a frustrating situation to come up short," Mallory said. "I'm not asking for any pity. We're just going to keep plugging."

For the third-straight year, Northwestern beat Minnesota and this time the Wildcats used a strong performance by freshman Mike Greenfield. Greenfield hit 11 straight passes at one point and connected on two touchdown passes as he hit 37 of 40 for 262 yards. Stanley Davenport's second touchdown with 3:53 left in the game helped Northwestern, 2-4 in the league, lower Minnesota's mark to 2-3 in the conference.

THE GOPHERS CAME close to ending the Wildcats' hex, reaching the Northwestern three-yard line on freshman Rickey Foggie's 46-yard throw to Mel Anderson with 29 seconds left in the game. After an incomplete pass, Foggie was sacked and **fumbled** the ball, which Wildcats' Daryl Newell recovered to end the threat.

"This loss is exceptionally difficult to take, particularly when the team makes a great comeback," Minnesota Coach Lou Holtz said. "It seems like whenever we get close, there's another hurdle."

West Virginia stuns Flutie, Eagles with dramatic second-half comeback

Boston College and West Virginia taunted each other all week — but No. 19 West Virginia had the final say in its 21-20 comeback victory over the No. 4 Eagles.

West Virginia scored 15 straight points while holding Boston College scoreless in the second half to win its homecoming game Saturday in the battle for bragging rights in the East.

On its last two possessions Boston College moved into field goal range. But each time, linebacker Fred Smalls sacked Eagles quarterback Doug Flutie to take Boston College out of position.

"I'm surprised I got him," Smalls said. "He's hard to catch. The only thing going through my mind when I caught him was a victory."

THE TALKING BETWEEN the two teams began last week after some West Virginia players said their team was slighted in consideration for the Lambert Trophy, which was awarded last year to Boston College as the best team in the East. Both teams had 9-3 records but the Mountaineers had beaten Boston College during the season.

Flutie, in turn, called the Mountaineers "bush."

West Virginia, which rallied from a 20-6 halftime deficit, scored on three field goals by Paul Woodside, a one-yard run by fullback Ron Wolfley seconds into the fourth quarter and a five-yard run by tailback John Gay. Two passes for two-point conversions failed. Gay's game-winning touchdown run came with about

five minutes to go and capped an 80-yard drive.

"I NEVER THOUGHT they could come back to beat us like that," Boston College Coach Jack Bicknell said.

Boston College scored on two field goals by Kevin Snow, a 24-yard run by fullback Steve Strachan and a 42-yard pass from Flutie to Kelvin Martin.

On its final possession, Boston College drove to the West Virginia 38 but was taken out of scoring position when Flutie was sacked by Smalls on first down for an 11-yard loss. Boston College surrendered the ball three plays later.

Flutie completed 21 of 42 passes for 299 yards. West Virginia's Kevin White connected on 17 of 30 for 227 yards and one interception.

"They came with nine men at times — something no other team ever did," Flutie said of the rush. "We couldn't get anything going on offense."

IN OTHER GAMES involving ranked teams, No. 1 Washington (7-0) defeated Oregon 17-10, No. 2 Oklahoma (5-0-1) topped **Iowa** State 12-10, No. 3 Texas (4-0-1) defeated Arkansas 24-18, No. 5 Brigham Young (7-0) defeated Air Force 30-25, No. 6 Nebraska (6-1) beat Colorado 24-7, No. 7 Southern Methodist (4-1) was upset by Houston 29-20, No. 8 Ohio State (6-1) stopped Michigan State 23-20, No. 9 Louisiana State (5-0-1) downed No. 15 Kentucky 36-10 and No. 10 Miami (7-2) defeated Pittsburgh 27-7.

No. 11 South Carolina (6-0) topped Notre Dame 36-32, No. 12 Oklahoma State (5-1)

routed Kansas 47-10, No. 13 Auburn (5-2) outlasted Georgia Tech 48-34, No. 14 Georgia (5-1) crushed Vanderbilt 62-35, No. 16 Florida State (5-1-1) beat Tulane 27-6, No. 17 **Iowa** (5-2) blanked No. 20 Michigan 26-0 and No. 18 Florida (5-1-1) took Cincinnati 48-17.

RON MILUS RETURNED a punt 42 yards for a touchdown, Mike Gaffney recovered a blocked punt in the end zone and Jeff Jaeger kicked a field goal to lift Washington past Oregon. Washington managed just three first downs and only 110 yards in total offense.

Spencer Tillman scored from seven yards out with 3:34 remaining to help Oklahoma escape against **Iowa** State. Trailing 10-6, Oklahoma began its winning drive on the **Iowa** State 40 late in the fourth quarter.

Todd Dodge threw two touchdown passes but it took a late stand by Texas to lift the Longhorns over Arkansas

ROBBIE BOSCO passed for 484 yards and four touchdowns to lead Brigham Young over Air Force. Bosco, the nation's leading passer, completed 28 of 41 passes as the Cougars extended their winning streak to 18, the longest in the nation.

A 68-yard touchdown pass from Gerald Landry to Carl Hilton opened a 19-point Houston lead over SMU late in the third quarter and left the Cougars alone in first in the SWC.

Chuck Long hit 14 of 20 passes for 146 yards and Devon Mitchell set up two scores with two interceptions to lift Iowa. It was the first time Michigan was blanked since 1977.
