Any description of Iowa State's football team and its 14-14 tie with Missouri Saturday afternoon at muddy Faurot Field would have to include all of the above

Cyclones, a near-miss in a 12-10 defeat to Oklahoma a week ago, played turnover-prone Missouri to a standstill in this rain-hampered homecoming. If anything, Iowa State ignored the fact someone had abeled it a 24-point underdog against the nation's No. 3-ranked offensive team, and the Cyclones failed to cash in the chips after starting quarterback Alex Espinoza was lost via a broken left leg three minutes into the third quarter.

Iowa State, 2-5-1 and 0-3-1 in the Big 8, regrouped with a savage defense and resurrected itself on the arm of second-string quarterback Alan Hood, who hails from St. Louis and was a spirit of hope. The Cyclones also benefitted from the sure hands of tight end tandem Dave Smoldt and Jeff Wodka.

Ties don't make coaches and players smile -- few were joking after this one - but Iowa State appeared to

The Tigers failed to make more ground than a homecoming float before 48,133 fans, and stand 3-4-1 and 2-1-1 with any bowl hopes dissolving in the Columbia mud.

"I was very proud of my football team today," said Cyclones Coach Jim Criner, whose club fought back

"I thought we played well enough against a very tough defensive team. But we should have won the game today. We played well enough and strong enough. feel very good about that, but it is still like a loss."

against Missouri here two years ago. The result didn't sit well with Tigers Coach Warren Powers, either. "This is considered a loss for us," said Powers, who

Hood, were about as even as you could get. Espinoza was 8 of 17 for 82 yards before seeing his promising season end after being sacked by Tiger


defensive end Lenson Staples. ISU trainer Frank Randall said Espinoza broke his lower left leg just above the ankle.

NCAA record keys 24-20 win at Indiana

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — The cow almost killed the butcher here Saturday.

Iowa's football team was a pretty good butcher, too - the Big Ten's best and No. 17 nationally, with a goal line that hadn't been crossed in the three previous games - and Indiana was the poor old cow that hadn't won a game.

But the Hawkeyes, although chastened in a 24-20 squeaker, now stand alone at the top of the Big Ten standings with a 5-1 mark.

Led by quarterback Steve Bradley, the heroic Hoosiers came that close to putting Iowa into the same boat with Ohio State, which fell from grace with a 16-14 loss at Scott McNabb on the two-yard line Wisconsin.







Peru State, ranked 17th in the NAIA Division II, improved its record to 6-2. Westmar fell to 2-6-1.

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
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
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
