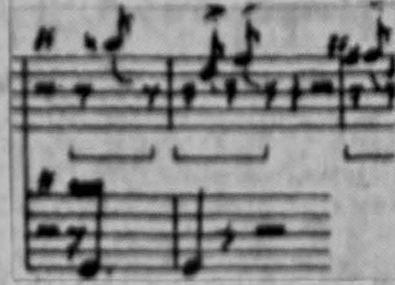

## Wisconsin, Illinois run to cross country crowns

### Women 'limp' home following 8th-place outing

Almost some key personnel, the Iowa women's cross country team limped home in eighth place at the Big Ten Championships in West Lafayette, Ind., Saturday.

Wisconsin, the No. 1 ranked team in the nation, took the first place with 27 points while Illinois was far behind in second place with 79. Iowa was eighth with 201 points.

"I'm more concerned at these major meets with our team performing up to

their capabilities and I'm still not satisfied with the performance," Iowa Coach Jerry Hassard said.

"The team place varies from season to season with the competition we're up against but what I would like to see is for our team to perform better than it did (Saturday). I'm still not convinced that this group can't run better than this."

**IOWA WAS WITHOUT** the services of freshman Laura Haggerty and senior all-American Jenny Spangler who have been nursing injuries for the past few weeks.

Wisconsin's Cathy Branta won the

overall title with a time of 16 minutes, 45.9 seconds. Her teammate Katie Ishamel, was second in 16:46. Far behind in third place was Maureen Cogan of Ohio State in 17:16.

Anne Dobrowolski was the top runner for Iowa as she finished 18th in 18:41 seconds. Penny O'Brien was next for Iowa as she finished 31st in 19:01. O'Brien was competing in her first cross country meet of the season.

"THINGS DIDN'T GO very good," Dobrowolski said. "I was in the top 10 for a while and I faded a lot near the end."

"Personally, I'm looking for an improvement," she said. "A lot of people beat me that I know I can beat. I just have to think it out and I'm not really sure what went wrong this weekend."

### Wheeler's team finishes last again this year

The Illinois men's cross country team knocked off the nation's No. 1 team, the Wisconsin Badgers, to take the Big Ten Championships last Saturday in West Lafayette, Ind., while the Iowa cross country team finished last for the second-straight season.

Illinois finished first in the meet with 58 points followed closely by Michigan with 62 points and defending champion Wisconsin with 64 points.

Wisconsin's Tim Hacker took the top

spot in the 10,000 meter race with a time of 30 minutes, 18 seconds.

Gary Wieneke, Illinois men's cross country coach, said winning the conference championship was "a super team victory for us."

"WISCONSIN HAS basically dominated the league for the last few years," Wieneke said. "Our only thought was to control our own destiny and see where the chips fell. We finished fourth a year ago and wanted to improve on that."

Ted Wheeler, Iowa men's cross country coach, said there was only one bright spot in his team's last place

finish. "Danny Waters, who we finished 25th, ran very well. After that we fell apart," Wheeler said.

Wheeler also had praise for John Meyer's 55th place finish. "The pressure was obviously intense," he said. "Meyer, along with Waters, ran very well. They withstood the pressure in trying to compete up to their abilities."

## Close win gives Hawks league lead

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — The expected blowout at Memorial Stadium appeared to be blooming following Iowa's first possession last Saturday.

Four minutes into the game when Hawkeye tailback Ronnie Harmon, who rushed for 160 yards on the day, raced 35 yards around the right end of a stunned Indiana defense for a touchdown, the Hoosier crowd, once crazed, became dazed, as a long afternoon seemed imminent.

But it was not to be as the Hawkeyes escaped with a 24-20 victory, lifting them to sole possession of first place in the Big Ten with a 5-1 conference record.

Ohio State fell from the top with a 16-14 loss to Wisconsin in Madison, Wis.

## Mallory proud of 0-8 Hoosiers

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. — Bill Mallory led his team to hold back a tear or two last Saturday.

But that wasn't the only fight he had in — he sweated it out as his team dropped its 12th-straight game, a 24-20 decision to Big Ten-leading Iowa.

"I'm having a little trouble winding down," Mallory said. "We all go on the football field for a 'W'. I'm proud of these kids, especially the seniors. They

led the way, fought their hearts out, and they are busting their tails giving us everything they've got."

**DESPITE HIS PRIDE**, Mallory was upset at his team's inability to make the critical plays. "Our people came up short. We're out to win," Mallory said. "An interception and a fumble can't help. But in coaching you have to evaluate and my evaluation is that I'm awfully proud of these guys."

Hoosier quarterback Steve Bradley, who threw for 363 yards and three touchdowns, said Indiana played its

best game of the season. "We played together as a team better than we have so far this year."

Bradley added that the Hoosiers had a special motivator for the game — last year's 49-3 thrashing at the hands of the Hawkeyes in Kinnick Stadium. "Memories like that don't go away," Bradley said. "It played a big factor in our game."

**BUT IT WAS** a tough Iowa defensive effort that stopped the Hoosiers, including a critical four-down series in the fourth quarter when Indiana was

stopped six inches from the Iowa goal line — twice.

Mallory said the Hoosiers should have dropped the Hawkeyes from the top of the Big Ten standings. "They say winning is a matter of inches and I thought there was some situations that just weren't right," he said.

The Indiana coach believed that Bradley scored on the third and inches situation. "I really thought he was in on the sneak," Mallory said.

But Bradley wasn't so sure. "I just tried to put my head down and go," he said.

## Iowa fights back to earn a tie with No. 2 Northwestern, 2-2

In front of a vocal field hockey crowd, the Iowa Hawkeyes proved itself as a top 10 team Friday when it tied No. 2 Northwestern, 2-2, in double overtime.

The Hawkeyes also defeated southwest Missouri State, 6-1, Sunday. Both games were played at Kinnick Stadium.

The tie with the Wildcats will assure the Hawkeyes a place among the top 12 teams going into the national tournament, provided they do not lose in their two remaining games.

The tie also gives Northwestern the Big Ten title alone for the first time. The Hawkeyes will finish the season in second place in the conference.

### Field hockey

The game between the two Big Ten powerhouses was very physical from the start, full of controversy and even rough at times, Northwestern Coach Nancy Stevens said.

Both coaches blamed the roughness in the game on poor officiating. "The officials lost control of the game almost from the opening of the game," Davidson said.

Northwestern took the early lead in the game when Kathy Kachmansky knocked the ball in the cage from the 16-yard line.

But Iowa came back in the second half to tie the game 1-1. The Hawkeyes were awarded five straight penalty corners and on the fifth one Kim Herrmann put the ball in the cage to score. Herrmann was assisted by Deb Brickey and Mary Koboldt.

"NORTHWESTERN DID a good job against our penalty corners," David-

son said. "To have that many penalty corners in a row, you're bound to score."

From the start of the second half, the Hawkeyes dominated the game despite strong defensive pressure from the Wildcats. The Hawkeyes took 10 shots on goal and had 12 penalty corners. Northwestern had two shots on goal and only one penalty corner.

"I felt Iowa outplayed us," Stevens said. "I think Iowa was hungrier for the win than we were."

But Stevens felt her team did come back in the overtime periods to play well.

In the first overtime neither team could score. Iowa took only one shot on goal and Northwestern took two. The Hawkeyes also had two penalty corners, but were unsuccessful.

**IN THE SECOND** 10-minute overtime period, Northwestern's Kachmansky scored her second goal of the game with six minutes remaining. But the Hawkeyes kept coming back.

called on a drive and Indiana took over on its own 14-yard line. But two plays later, the ball picked off a Bradley pass with under two minutes on the clock, ending the Hoosiers' upset bid.

"I told Coach (Bill) Mallory that he has a super-fine team," Fry said. "They could go undefeated the rest of the way. Indiana's one of the finest teams we've played. We were not flat. We were battling for everything we were worth."

a game," he said. "I wasn't worried about any records and like I said, I didn't even know about it until after the game."

The Iowa quarterback said when he woke up last Thursday morning his elbow had "swollen like a ball. I thought I was in trouble."

He added that it was because of an infection in his arm that the swelling came about. It was treated and Long said the arm felt fine when he came out for pregame warm-ups.

Owen Gill, on the brink of breaking Iowa's all-time rushing record, didn't make the trip. He suffered a bruised kidney in the Michigan game and Fry said he isn't sure Gill will be available for Saturday's game with Wisconsin, a team Fry has never lost to.

Fry said Sunday in his weekly teleconference that the team returned to Iowa City in poor physical shape. Harmon played the game with a "stinger" in his neck. "It inflames the nerves in the neck and you get a feeling of electricity all through your body," Fry said.

The Iowa coach also confirmed that Eric Hodgeman, Booker Scott and Robert Oliver weren't with the team anymore but refused to elaborate further. "It was a decision made by the young men," he said. "In fact, I have a meeting set up with all three (today) and their position coaches."

**FOLLOWING HARMON'S** first touchdown, Indiana came back and tied the score when Bradley scrambled and found tight end Dave Lija in the end zone. The first quarter tally stopped at 12 touchdown-free quarters by the Hoosiers' defense. "That's the best defense we've faced all year," Mallory said.

Each team scored in the second quarter, leaving the score tied, 14-14, at halftime.

In the third quarter, Iowa scored 18 points as Long, 26 of 30 on the day for 277 yards and two touchdowns, hit wide receiver Bill Happel on 16-yard touchdown strike. Later in the quarter, Tom Nichol added a 36-yard field goal to put the Hawkeyes ahead 24-14.

"WE KIND OF hit a little lull but we picked back up," Mallory said. Long said he wasn't aware of his record. "I never expect that going into

"It was a judgement call and (the referee) said I didn't make it."

**THE HAWKEYES WENT** on to hold the Hoosiers on the next play and Mallory said his team did everything as instructed. "I thought we could get point B in there," Mallory said. "Joe's defense is the best I've seen in 10 years. It's been a while (since Mallory's coaching days at Colorado), but Nebraska and Oklahoma compare a team."

Iowa linebacker Larry Station said

he was surprised Indiana chose to run the ball up the middle four straight downs.

"I figured they'd try something else," Station said. "They'd tried that three other times and it didn't work. It just made it that much easier to stop."

Missing the opportunity only put more pressure on the Hoosier offense, Bradley said. But the junior quarterback wouldn't quit. He connected with Chris Cook on a seven-yard pass to narrow the gap to 24-20.

**MALLORY ELECTED** to go for a two-point conversion, which, if successful, would have given Indiana the opportunity to win the game with a field goal. But Bradley's pass to Len Keneshew fell incomplete. "I don't like to make excuses, but we go for the two-point play and I don't know what has to happen for a pass interference call to be made," Mallory said.

The Hoosiers had a final chance but Bradley's pass was intercepted by Devon Mitchell.

But presently, just having the chance to win at the end of the game will be enough to get Indiana ready for a contest at Ohio State this Saturday. "We had a shot at the end and it's hard to get down when you have a shot at the end," Bradley said.

Mallory said it is that type of person that allows him to keep faith in this team. "Our kids will be back. I've got a lot of confidence that we'll fight and keep plugging away at it and sooner or later it will pay off."

Brickey was awarded the final goal for Iowa on a penalty corner. Brickey hit the ball inbounds and the ball was deflected off of a Southwest Missouri player to fall in the goal, giving Iowa a 6-1 win.

Iowa's record now stands at 12-4-3 overall and 6-1-1 in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes will finish up their season next weekend at Michigan against the Wolverines and Purdue.
