Wheeler's team finishes last again this year

The Illinois men's cross country team knocked off the nation's No. 1 team, the Wisconsin Badgers, to take the Big Ten Championships last Saturday in West Lafayette, Ind., while the lows cross country team finished last for the second-straight season.

Illinois finished first in the meet with 58 points followed closely by Michigan with 62 points and defending champion Wisconsin with 64 points.

Wisconsin's Tim Hacker took the top

spot in the 10,000 meter race with a ime of 30 minutes, 18 seconds.

Gary Wieneke, Illinois men's cross country coach, said winning the conference championship was "a super team victory for us.

"WISCONSIN HAS basically dominated the league for the last few years," Wieneke said. "Our only thought was to control our own destiny and see where the chips fell. We finished fourth a year ago and wanted to improve on that."

Ted Wheeler, Iowa men's cross country coach, said there was only one bright spot in his team's last place

nish. "Danny Waters, who finished 25th, ran very well. After that we fell apart," Wheeler said.

Wheeler also had praise for John Meyer's 55th place finish. "The pressure was obviously intense," he said. "Meyer, along with Waters, ran very well. They withstood the pressure in trying to compete up to their

"WATERS AND MEYER could have both run in the top 25," Wheeler said. "I was pleased to see Waters, a kid that wasn't recruited, compete that well. The same goes for Meyer. He gets more out of himself ability-wise than anyone else."

Close win gives Hawks league lead

BLOOMINGTON, Ind - The expected blowout at Memorial Stadium appeared to be blooming following lowa's first possession last Saturday.

Four minutes into the game when Hawkeye tailback Ronnie Harmon, who rushed for 160 yards on the day. raced 35 yards around the right end of a stunned Indiana defense for a touchdown, the Hoosier crowd, once crazed, became dazed, as a long afternoon seemed imminent.

But it was not to be as the Hawkeyes escaped with a 24-20 victory, lifting them to sole possession of first place in the Big Ten with a 5-1 conference

Ohio State fell from the top with a 16-14 loss to Wisconsin in Madison, Wis.

IOWA LITERALLY stopped a defeat dead at its own goal line and then intercepted the win for good from the 0-8 Hoosiers, whose losing streak has now advanced to a school-record 13 straight

After 22 straight completions, an NCAA record formally held by Brigham Young's Steve Young, Iowa quarterback Chuck Long's fourthquarter pass was picked off by Indiana's Jeff McBain.

The interception gave the Hoosiers daylight as they marched down the field behind the arm of quarterback Steve Bradley, who finished 19 of 31 for 263 yards and three touchdowns.

With second and goal on the lowa three-yard line midway through the fourth quarter, it was time for the Hawkeyes to give up or get tough. And get tough they did as Iowa stopped Indiana three times inside the three-yard


The Iowa quarterback said when he woke up last Thursday morning his elbow had, "swollen like a ball. I ught I was in trouble


