"I didn't know for a while if he had put it across or not, but then I heard Shane say he was short."



# Center Point cruises in 1A, 52-8



Obviously, it was a rout. Ob-






### Hope dwindles

IOWA CITY — Six Big Ten teams have a chance to win at least a share of the Big Ten title, and five of them are still in the running for the Rose Bowl.

Yes, Iowa is among them, but the light flickered and went dim by the goal line in the cold, gloomy twilight of Kinnick Stadium Saturday.

Michigan State's 17-16 upset, achieved when the Spartans officially stopped Chuck Long's twopoint try, was still another in the series of "uneasy lies the head that wears a crown" in the Big Ten this season. Iowa was the latest to feel the guillotine, and Ohio State's neck has one more exposure.


All the speculation will be ended



If you know football, you realize a team cannot change much of its offensive scheme from week to week when first-string players cannot practice. That's been happening to lowa during the three-week period since the rout of Michigan. Can you guess how much it would have meant to lowa's offense to have Ronnie Harmon healthy Saturday? Can you estimate what a difference it would have made if Chuck Long's knee would have permitted him to play the whole game instead of the second half?

And their ailments are just two of the many problems assailing the Hawkeyes at that critical time. The injury problem seems even worse for the game at Minnesota.

Sure, almost every team has injuries, many to important players, so maybe it's time for the reserves to come through for the Hawks.



if Ohio State (6-2) defeats Michigan (5-3) Saturday at Columbus. Then the Buckeyes will go to the Rose Bowl to play USC, and the other pretenders to the throne either will go to some lesser bowls or stay home.

OK, but let's suppose Michigan stalks its ancient rival and hits the jugular with an upset — as Ohio State did to Michigan in 1981, enabling Iowa to get an unexpected Pasadena trip.

What happens then?

Then Iowa (5-2-1) would be back in the hunt, but the Hawks will know all these other results by the time they kick off against Minnesota at 7:10 Saturday night in the Minneapolis Humphrey Dome.

If Ohio State loses, and Iowa wins, Iowa cops the title by a halfgame and goes to Pasadonuts.

The other title contenders are Illinois (6-3), which finished its season by defeating Indiana Saturday night. The Illini will tie for the title if Ohio State and Iowa both lose, but they are ineligible to play in the Rose Bowl.

Purdue, Michigan and Michigan State stand 5-3 with a game to go. If all win, they will tie with Ohio State and Illinois, provided Iowa loses. In that case, according to the way we read the rule book, Purdue would be the Rose Bowl team because it defeated the three other eligible teams, Ohio State, Michigan and Michigan State.

Michigan State Coach George Perles said he wasn't sure what to expect when Iowa lined up for the two-point conversion with 44 seconds left. In fact, he felt the Spartans were in the wrong defense.

"Did we expect the option? Yes and no," he said. "Yes because that's what they do down there on plays like that and no because we weren't sure what they would do with Long's leg hurting. We just didn't know for sure.

"We have two goal line defenses and we used the one that has our cornerback coming up on the play. If we had to do it over again, I don't think we would have used that defense."

Quinn, a senior from Stone Mountain, Ga., delivered the game's biggest play outside of the Spartans' denial of Long at the goal line. Quinn roared in to block Gary Kostrubala's punt with 5:37 left in the first half, setting up a touchdown pass that put Michigan State ahead 14-3.



For Simpson, which closed a 2-7 campaign, Rex Van Buskirk scored on a 35-yard run.



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
