It was also another showcase for sophomore linebacker Jeff Braswell, who added to his one-man wrecking performance against Oklahoma a month ago wins. by posting 13 tackles (four for losses), making a quarterback sack, forcing two fumbles and recovering another.

Iowa State limited the Cowboys to 76 yards on the ground, was topped in total offense by only 21 yards (263-242) and had possession almost a minute longer. But, it was that kind of day.

recovered Cowboy quarterback Jeff Hilger's fumble at the OSU 23. Three plays later, Hood scampered 10 yards to make it 7-0 with only five minutes gone. Luebbers was also a menace on defense. He had 16 stops, 14 of them assisted, and may have answered the big question of the day: How did ISU do it?

"We just eliminated their cutbacks, we slowed our pursuit and had our coaches calm us down."

The Cowboys bounced back, however, to mount a rally that gave them a record-tying nine regular-season

Hilger (who passed for 187 yards and was 16 of 25) guided his team back, thanks to a fumbled punt by Billy McCue at midfield.

Hilger immediately hit Jamie Harris for a 38-yard bomb (biggest play of the day) down to ISU's 13. Four plays later, Hilger connected with Harris on a sevenyard touchdown pass.

Iowans Couch, Puk hurt Hawks, 23-17

MINNEAPOLIS --- Bye-bye Floyd. And, possibly, bye-bye

Iowan Gary Couch raced 14 yards for a touchdown with 4:17 remaining, sparking Minnesota to a 23-17 upset of Iowa in Big Ten football before 63,479 bipartisan fans in the Humphrey Metrodome Saturday night.

While giving Coach Lou Holtz the biggest victory in his first year with the Gophers, Minnesota greatly reduced lowa's bowl aspirations. Iowa is 6-4-1 with a Dec. 1 game at Hawaii remaining, while Minnesota finished at 4-7.

"THIS IS probably the hardest three weeks of my coaching career," said Iowa Coach Hayden Fry, whose

Freedom Bowl director still interested in Hawks

MINNEAPOLIS - Lou Holtz, Minnesota coach who used to direct the Arkansas Razorbacks, said "it was good to see a hog again!" and added that he hoped the loss didn't hurt Iowa's bowl chances.

But the 23-17 upset by Minnesota probably did end the Hawkeyes' hopes of a post-season bowl. They undoubtedly would have been invited to play in the new Freedom Bowl at Anaheim, Calif., if they had won.

"Oh, no, that loss doesn't mean we're not interested in Iowa," said Tom Starr, Iowa graduate who is executive director of the Freedom Bowl Dec. 27. "I'm flying back to California Sunday morning, and will take our team-selection thing to our board of directors."

Starr had the doubtful privilege of seeing two of his bowl's top prospects lose Saturday. He watched Penn State absorb a thorough whipping at Notre Dame, then flew here to watch his alma mater spilled. BILL HAPPEL, whose father used to be Holtz's

immediate boss when they directed the Iowa freshman for the Hawkeyes. His school-record return of 95 yards put Iowa ahead 14-7, but his fumble with 41/2 minutes to go gave the Gophers" their chance for the winning touchdown.

Ironically, it was another Iowan, Gary Couch of Davenport, who scored on the very next play.

"The last punt was short and the ball took a bad bounce," Happel said. "No, the artificial turf didn't bother me, but maybe I wasn't accustomed to returning kicks, as the coaches just put me back there in practice Monday. I used to do a lot of it, of course, at Cedar Rapids Washington.

"On the long return, I just got great blocking. Yes, I saw Dave Puk, my former classmate and teammate at Washington, on that return. We're great friends."

"Bill and I played a lot of football together. That was team in 1960, went from hero to goat on punt returns a great run of his, but I guess he gave it back to us later. me out the whole time." "HE JUST told me to go in and run the way he knew I could," the Davenport product related. "Nobody touched me. No, my knee didn't hurt, but I've got some strained ligaments in it. Well, beating Iowa was a thrill, I guess, but not the greatest. Yes, Iowa did recruit me, but I never got the final word from them, so I went to-Minnesota."

The happiest of the Gophers from Iowa was Steve Puk, offensive guard who didn't even get into the game.

IOWA COACH Hayden Fry said Chuck Long was "in worse shape this week than last, but he is a competitor and he insisted on playing. We had a lot of kids hurt that couldn't practice, but they still played. But our timing was off."

Robert Smith, who came off a shoulder injury last week to catch one pass, was asked about the pass from Long that he dropped on third down in the fourth quarter. Had he held the ball, Iowa would have gone ahead 21-13 instead of 17-13 on Tom Nichol's field goal.

"I thought I had it, but it was one of those that just slipped away," Smith sighed. "If Ohio State had lost today, I think we probably would have had a lot of motivation tonight, but after they won, we really never got picked up or let down. Losing to Michigan State was a big let-down for us."

New York Times Service LINCOLN, Neb. - With his team a yard from the goal line and the outcome of another football season at stake, the fortunes of the Nebraska Cornhuskers again awaited the decision of Coach Tom Osborne. For the second time, he made the less secure choice, and for the second time, a No. 1 national ranking was lost.

With a tie all that was necessary to gain another return to the Orange



Bowl, the Cornhuskers passed up a field-goal attempt that would have tied the score in the final minutes.

took a high bounce and I thought I'd better grab it.

HAPPEL CLEARLY wasn't thinking about his record run afterward, though. In a tunnel under the Metrodome stands, Happel wiped his eyes with a handkerchief while being consoled by his father, Bill, former Iowa player and Minnesota assistant coach.

"The kick was short and it took a funny hop," said Happel, describing the muffed punt which preceded Couch's touchdown. "I didn't want to let it roll toward the goal line, but I just couldn't get a hold on it. It just slipped through my fingers."

Another Iowan played a large role in the Gophers' victory. Fullback David Puk, another of Happel's exteammates at Washington, led Minnesota rushers with 79 yards on 15 carries.

Iowa outgained the Gophers in total yards, 386-275, but Minnesota had a 197-162 edge rushing.

IOWA APPEARED to be headed for a score after the opening kickoff. The Hawkeyes moved 45 yards in 11 plays before the drive stalled at the Minnesota 35-yard line. Tom Nichol lined up to attempt a 52-yard field goal with 10:40 left in the first quarter, but Iowa was whistled for illegal procedure. Nichol, instead, punted 36 yards to the Gopher four.
