Suffolk County police said yesterday that they had smashed a 12-member ring of contractors and construction workers who had stolen and fenced more than \$1 million in building supplies from a Deer Park firm.

Det. Domenick Fragala of the First Squad said seven construction workers were charged in connection with the theft of expensive doors, windows and other supplies from the Sturtervant Mill Work Corp., 75 North Industrial Court, between December, 1983, and last November. Fragala said the supplies were then sold to the contractors at 20 percent of retail value. Investigators said some of the stolen property has been located.

The seven construction workers each charged with third-degree burglary, second-degree grand larceny and fifth-degree conspiracy, were identified by police as: Bruce Klienman, 34, of 16 Spruce St., West Islip; Moody Snider, 31, of 279 Southhaven Ave., Medford; George Marich, 31, of 417 Route 112, Patchogue; Kevin Murphy, 22, of 83 Village La., Hauppauge; Donald Schwenker, 26, of 306 West 12th St., Deer Park; his brother, Fred Schwenker, 21, of the same address, and Shelton Evans, 26, of 11 Maple St., Bay Shore.

Murphy was arraigned yesterday in Hauppauge before First District Court Judge Edward Kiley, who ordered him freed in his own custody until an April 26 felony hearing. The others were held in the First Precinct house overnight pending arraignments today in Hauppauge.

The builders, each charged with fifth-degree conspiracy and first-degree criminal possession of stolen property, were identified by police as Richard Mohring, 30, of 35 Mohring Bay Court, Bayville; Louis Milillo, 53, of P.O. Box 125, Bayville; William Addeo, 36, of 884 Smithtown Ave., Holbrook; Augusto Malandroccolo, 37, of 1303 Class St., Holbrook, and Kenneth Tamasi, 38, of 20 Malts Ave., West Islip.

Don't Mention Mob, Trial Witness Ordered

Suffolk County Court Judge Kenneth Rohl, with the jury out of the courtroom, told informant Lawrence Iorizzo he was not to mention the names of organized-crime figures or even the words, "Mafioso" or "organized crime" in his testimony.

Specifically, Rohl told Iorizzo, "you are not to use the names Michael or Sonny Franzese in connection with your testimony." The admonition came as Iorizzo took the stand amid heavy security as a prosecution witness in the grand larceny trial of Frank Castagnaro in Hauppauge.

Castagnaro is charged with 10 counts of second-degree grand larceny and eight counts of passing bad checks in connection with what the indictment charges was the theft of gasoline from Mobil Oil Corp. and OB Petroleum of Commack in 1982 and 1983. And before Iorizzo took the stand, Castagnaro'a attorney, Roy Kulcsar, asked Rohl to limit Iorizzo's testimony about organized crime because it might prejudice the jury against Castagnaro.

Iorizzo, former head of Vantage Petroluem, recently pleaded guilty to mail fraud charges in federal court and is serving a 5-year prison term. He is cooperating with federal and state authorities in a number of racketeering cases.

Iorizzo testified that Castagnaro told him of his plans to steal the gasoline from OB, saying that Castagnaro told him: "We're going to bang OB." "What did you take that to mean?" Jermyn


"Steal money," Iorizzo replied.

On another occasion in 1983, Iorizzo testified, Castagnaro said he was going to "Whack Mobil."
