# lowa lightning strikes Drake, 58-0

## Iowa-Drake go by the book

IOWA CITY, IA. - As a news story, Drake versus Iowa was strictly dog

bites man. Dog bites man hard.

College football games rarely go exactly the way they're supposed to (refer to Florida-Rutgers), but this one did. As the gamblers might say, Drake-Iowa followed form Saturday.

Unfortunately for the gamblers, the game wasn't even on the board - no bets were being taken - which should have been an omen.

The truth is, those with a vested interest in Drake or Iowa football came away from the Hawkeyes' 58-0 victory knowing little more about either team than they did before kickoff. Not that anyone expected Iowa to

take such a meager 14-0 lead into the locker room at halftime - though the Hawkeyes, in their first game, had figured on a slow start. But not that slow. Daydreamers watching the first

quarter end with no score wondered how Drake would ever be able to justify disassembling a football program that had knocked off fifth-rated Iowa. It wasn't a day for a daydream.

"The first-stringers haven't scrimmaged since the Freedom Bowl," said receiver Scott Helverson, explaining the Hawkeyes' early sluggishness.

TRUE, BUT Iowa didn't expect to leave the starting blocks like a sprinter wearing concrete Nikes. The halftime score could have - should have — been 7-0.

Drake changed from its zone defense to its man-to-man, however, and paid for it when Ronnie Harmon took Chuck Long's pass and sped 60 yards down the sideline to set up Iowa's second touchdown.

In the end, it didn't matter. Drake played a noble first half - better than anyone save the Bulldogs had a right to expect. As is often the case, the drizzle turned into a deluge and that was

The Bulldogs didn't play this game for the honor and privilege of lining up against feared Iowa. Rah, rah.

They did it not for love, but for money. Pure and simple. They donated their blood and gave their pound of flesh for a \$200,000 payday. Then they got the heck out.

In a nutshell, they played Iowa to keep their program afloat.

Iowa draws 66,000 at home. Drake 10,000 or so. The difference in quality of play is wide, but probably not 56,000 fans worth. In other words, the Bulldogs deserve more customers.

But that's another issue. The only important question Coach Chuck Shelton had to answer after the game was

whether the game was worth the pain. "We didn't take that bad a beating," he said, "so yes it was worth it."

He was talking injury count, not point total.

WITHOUT QUESTION, the twohour trip along I-80 was worth it to the home team. Hayden Fry played everyone except the public address announcer, and the Hawkeyes came away with a convincing victory and only one injury to speak of.

But don't read much more into it. The Iowa defense was wonderful. Yet Tim Ray, as solid as he is at tailback, isn't Keith Byars.

We already knew that Chuck Long could complete 21 of 31 passes the way he did against Drake. Goodness, he can do that against Michigan, Ohio State and Texas.

If you give it to them, Long and his receivers can complete that 10-yard sideline pattern the way Greg Louganis hits winning dives.

The Bulldogs gave it to them. Again and again. They had little choice.

It was either let Iowa have lots of time-consuming little gains or lots of clock-stopping big gains.

Only in football and love making is slow death preferable to the quick demise No, you can't really call 37 third-quarter points slow death. Call it a payback for the first half.


Even Fry admitted he isn't sure the old Ronnie Harmon is back after his broken leg, though No. 31 danced down the sideline like Fred Astaire with a team full of Ginger Rogerses chasing behind. Harmon still looks as if he jumped off a rock video.

But can you be sure against a Division I-AA opponent?

Shelton wasn't much help. Every Saturday, he sair when asked about Harmon, an opponent is going to rush for 61 yards against the Bulldogs. What's the big deal?

Iowa's offensive line, which had a miserable first half poking holes in Drake's defensive wall, improved in the second half but will have to stand

# Hawks score 37 points in third-period barrage

Register Staff Writer IOWA CITY, IA. -- Although the score wound up being about what almost everyone thought it would be, Iowa's 58-0 romp past Drake here Saturday didn't exactly follow the anticipated script.

The Hawkeyes found themselves in a dogfight with a pesky gang of Bulldogs throughout a low-scoring first half, unable to get their high-powered offense untracked in the season open-

In fact, the difference could easily have been only 7-0 at halftime, but Iowa scored a touchdown in the closing seconds, then left the field to hear some sharp words from Coach Hayden Fry, while many in the sellout crowd of 66,135 wondered if this was really a team worthy of the nation's No. 5 ranking.

#### Hawks Turn on the Steam

When the Hawks returned, however, they left no doubt of their prowess and superiority, burying Drake under a 37-point avalanche in the third period. It is believed to be an Iowa record

for scoring in one quarter. "I thought we'd start a little slow." said Hawkeye Coach Hayden Fry, "because we haven't scrimmaged since

last spring. But I never dreamed we'd start that slow." There was one impressive statistic to come out of the game - Drake's minus 36 yards rushing. That is a Hawkeye record, breaking a mark

that had stood for 28 years. "I was extremely pleased with our defense," said Fry of a unit that was

#### Long Displays His Skill

Iowa quarterback Chuck Long began his quest for consideration in the race for the Heisman Trophy with a performance typical of him - sharp and skillful.

Long completed his first nine passes, which were needed when the Hawks had difficulty moving the ball on the ground, and he finished by hitting 21 of 31 attempts for 248 yards and two touchdowns.

Late in the second quarter, after Drake's John Brda had missed a 52yard field-goal attempt, Long and Harmon hooked up on a 60-yard pass play that carried to the Bulldog 4-yard

Only 25 seconds remained until halftime. On third down Long passed over the middle to Scott Helverson for the 14-0 halftime lead.

"That touchdown did a lot for our confidence," said Helverson, who snared seven of Long's passes for 88

"Drake was giving us the down-and-out pass," he explained, "because they didn't want to get beat

deep. But Chuck is an expert at the down-and-out. He throws the ball before you even turn and look." Mistakes Pile Up on Drake

Drake had done a good job of keeping mistakes to a minimum in the early going, one reason the score had remained close, but the Bulldogs made one damaging error after another in their nightmarish third quarter.

Jackson is a 185-pound junior from Los Angeles, Calif., who started his collegiate career at Southern California. Going into this game, he was Iowa State's No. 2 tailback, but he perhaps wound up No. 1.

In addition to catching four passes for 30 yards, Jackson ran 17 times for 25 to become the Cyclones' secondleading rusher behind Kirk Thomas' 88 yards. "Al Watson who started at tailback



## Michigan leaves doghouse with win over Irish

ANN ARBOR, MICH. (AP) - It was a day of redemption for Michigan football and for Coach Bo Schembech-

The Wolverines, who suffered through a 6-6 season a year ago - the worst season Schembechler ever had - rebounded behind senior quarterback Jim Harbaugh to defeat 13thranked Notre Dame, 20-12, Saturday in the season opener for both teams.

"It means we're decent," Schembechler said. "We're not the dog people think we are."

Harbaugh and fullback Gerald White both scored touchdowns, but it was the Wolverines' fired up defense that really spelled the difference, coming up with six sacks, a fumble recovery and a pass interception to shut down the Fighting Irish.

"We played well and kept them out of the end zone," Schembechler said. "The only time I thought we let up was at the half, when we allowed them to get the field goal.

"People think they can run on us, but I don't know why."

suddenly ballooned to 44-0 in about 8 minutes.

Early in the third period Drake was whistled for a personal-foul penalty after running Iowa's Robert Smith out of bounds at midfield on a punt return. The Hawks scored in five plays, Harmon darting 14 yards on one of them and going the final 2 for the touch-

Drake had lost starting quarterback Ed Cheatham with a sprained ankle late in the first half, and that naturally hurt the Bulldog cause. He returned for one series in the third quarter but was ineffective and left for the day.

No. 2 quarterback Ray Gronowski's pitchout to Rod Edwards resulted in a fumble that Iowa's Ken Sims recovered on the Drake 19. Harmon soon scored from the 6.

#### 46-yard Field Goal

Rob Houghtlin, a transfer from Miami of Ohio, missed his only conversion after that touchdown - although he said he thought it was a debatable call - but made up for that several minutes later with a 46-yard field

So the count had risen to 30-0 before the low center snap to Drake punter Bob Grantham resulted in a 15-yard loss and gave Iowa possession at the Bulldog 11. Kevin Harmon, Ronnie's younger brother, scored from the 2.

By this time nothing was going right for the Bulldogs - not even a completed pass from Darryle Henry, their No. 3 quarterback, to Pete Mangold. A fumble resulted when Mangold was tackled, with Dan Wirth recovering for Iowa at Drake's 16.

Hawkeye reserves had taken over, including Mark Vlasic for Long, and several young fullbacks made some eye-catching runs. One was Dave Hudson, a 227-pound sophomore from Waxahachie, Texas, who lugged several Drake tacklers on his back for the final 5 yards to score from the 10, increasing the count to 44-0.

Helverson made an outstanding grab of Vlasic's 31-yard pass into the end zone for still another touchdown before the explosive third quarter was

Vlasic connected on four of his six passes for 76 yards, and it was his throwing that was the feature of the final Hawkeye march. Rick Bayless punched over from the 1 to finish the scoring with a little less than 9 minutes left.

Iowa's first touchdown came on an expert scrambling job by Long, who finally spotted tight end Craig Clark open in the end zone from 6 yards out early in the second quarter.

And if there were any lingering on the comeback trail orries about Harmon's successful reworries about Harmon's successful rehabilitation, it ended when he bounced off Drake tacklers and sprinted 15 yards to set up that touchdown.

### Station Interception

Cheatham teamed with Brett Peterson on a 36-yard gain, but a little later one of his passes was deflected by Iowa linebacker George Davis and intercepted by Larry Station.

The Bulldogs never did get inside Iowa's 30-yard line. Their deepest penetration was the 32, an advance that ended with Brda's missed field goal, and it was a one-sided show the

rest of the way. "I take my hat off to Drake," said Long. "Tney had a good game plan,



COLUMBIA, MO. (AP) - Mike Greenfield threw a fourth-quarter touchdown pass to Curtis Duncan and Stan Davenport ran for a pair of touchdowns as Northwestern defeated Missouri, 27-23, Saturday in a non-conference football game.

Northwestern, 1-1, built a 17-7 halftime lead as Davenport scored twice and John Duvic booted a 31-yard field

Missouri, losing its debut under Coach Woody Widenhofer, rallied in the third quarter to tie the game at 17-17 on Tom Whelihan's 35-yard field goal and an 11-yard run by senior full-

back Manny Henry.

Duvic then kicked a 42-yard field goal for a 20-17 Northwestern lead after Wildcats defensive back Todd Krehbiel intercepted a Marlon Adler pass at the Missouri 46.

#### 41-28 rout of Louisville ends Indiana streak at 16

BLOOMINGTON, IND. (AP) -Steve Bradley passed for 274 yards and one touchdown and ran 64 yards for another score Saturday as Indiana ended major college football's longest losing string at 16 games with a 41-28 season-opening victory over Louisville. The 41 points were the most scored by the Hoosiers since a 49-7 victory over Colorado in 1980.

The victory, sealed by junior tailback Damon Sweazy's 15-yard touchdown run midway through the fourth quarter, gave second-year Coach Bill Mallory his first victory with the Hoosiers and the 100th of his career after an 0-11 campaign in 1984.

Louisville fell to 0-2 under firstyear Coach Howard Schnellenberger and dropped its eighth straight game overall.

Indiana, mixing a strong ground game with Bradley's passing, dominated the second half after a 14-14 halftime tie. The Hoosiers built a 28-

14 lead, but the Cardinals tied it again on a 93-yard kickoff return by Ernest Givins and a 1-yard touchdown run by John Adams after a fumble by Sweazy at the Indiana 10-yard line. Bradley, who also rushed for 101 yards, gave Indiana its first lead on a took the lead for good on a 38-yard
