

Fry: Rankings are zip to players

At last there's some suspense in lowa's football season.

And with the Hawkeyes having won 57-3 Saturday against Iowa State and 58-0 and 48-20 the two previous weeks, it turns out the first big moment of the season may take place on the sidelines.

The question that Iowa City is waiting to have answered: Will the Hawkeyes be ranked No. 1 in this week's Associated Press college football poll?

Iowa's drubbing of Iowa State Saturday, along with No. 1 Auburn's 38-20 loss to Tennessee and No. 2 Oklahoma's narrow 13-7 victory over Minnesota, makes coach Hayden Fry's team, rated third last week, a prime candidate to take over the top spot in the poll.

In fact, Iowa drew the No. 1 spot in the USA Today - Cable News Network poll released Sunday night. Oklahoma was ranked second, with Ohio State third and Michigan fourth.

The fact that the Hawkeyes con-

tinue to lead the nation in scoring and total defense, may also influence both the sportswriters who vote in the AP poll and the coaches who cast ballots in the United Press International rankings. Iowa is averaging 54.3 points a game and has outscored its opponents 163-23. The Hawkeye defense is the nation's stingiest, allowing an average of 154 yards a game.

Fry, however, spent most of his Sunday morning teleconference discounting the importance of the

"The outside world will pay a lot more attention to it than my football players," Fry said. "We've done a lot of educating of our players that the rankings are zip. It's a bunch of people who don't really know that much about football doing an impossible job."

And, Fry pointed out, there was a stretch of about seven weeks in a row last year when a team reached No. 1 in the polls, only to lose the following week.

"It's kind of like being on the cover of Sports Illustrated," Fry said. "It brings a little bad luck to the team who is No. 1."

Long stakes Ul to lead, then enjoys it

AMES — Chuck Long may forget what the fourth quarter of a football game is like.

For the third week in a row, he got off work early Saturday as Jowa ripped off 34 second-quarter points, with 31 of them coming in the final nine minutes of the period, to deal Iowa State its worst-ever defeat in the intrastate series, 57-

In the Hawkeyes' season-opening easy wins, Long and other low regulars have spent an inordinate amount of time on the bench. Hawkeye coach Hayden Fry said he can't remember ever having his starting quarterback take only two snaps from center in the fourth quarter after three games.

Yet two snaps against Northern Illinois constitutes all Long has seen of the fourth quarter this year. And the way Iowa is playing, he may be watching a lot more fourth quarters.

Hey, I hope I never see the fourth quarter the whole year," said Long, who threw for 223 yards and three touchdowns against the Cyclones on 19-of-32 passing accuracy. "When you don't play as in the fourth quarter."

bombs with Iowa staked to a 50-0 lead was only Fry trying to get some adequate stats for Long. Fry said he wanted to take his all-Big Ten quarterback out of the game, but not before the numbers were right. When receiver Robert Smith dropped what would have easily been a touchdown pass from Long, his second such drop of the season, Fry was visibly upset on the side-


"If Robert had caught the TD pass then I can retire Chuck immediately," said Fry, who has confessed to being concerned with maintaining a high national ranking among quarterbacks for Long to enhance his chances for the Heisman Trophy or All-American


"He said Aaron said I would have the biggest letdown I'd ever had. He didn't understand Aaron wasn't the manager of his team. He didn't have other things on his mind.

With the score 41-0, about half of the 53,202 fans left their seats at halftime and they weren't all heading for the hot dog stand. As the second half wore on the number in the stands enduring the cold, wind and rain — not to mention the Isu mockery made of an intrastate rivalry — continued to dwindle. At the game's conclusion, about three and one-half hours after it started, there were probably more people in the press box than there were in kick the stands.
