Inis year, Hawks smile at end

A win, not the defense, was pleasing

This time when the game was on the line against Michigan State, it looked like Chuck Long could have run forever. Last year he couldn't eke out three yards. It was a remarkably similar scenario - but with an entirely different result Saturday at Kinnick Stadium. Much like the 1984 Iowa-MSU game, Long needed to make a couple yards to determine the outcome. This time he earned two yards with ease, faking a handoff up the middle to Ronnie Harmon and strolling undetected around the right side and into the end zone holding the ball high as if to say "Here it is chumps" to the 11 Spartans who had converged on a diving, empty-handed Harmon. Long's touchdown with 27 seconds remaining in the game enabled No. 1-ranked Iowa to overcome determined Michigan State, 35-31, but it also overshadowed the Hawkeyes' worst defensive performance in terms of yards allowed since 1980. Last year, at the same end of the Kinnick Stadium field, Long ran an option and failed to score on a two-point conversion try against Michigan State, essentially bumping Iowa out of the Rose Bowl as the Spartans won, 17-16. The parallelism between that situation and the one he faced Saturday wasn't lost on Long as he pondered the play that would determine the out-



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A better play? You can't call one

Hayden Fry, a man prone neither to indecision nor to predictability, said he had no last-second doubts.

"I wouldn't make the call if I second guessed it," he said later. So with 31 seconds to play Saturday, Iowa trailing 31-28 and the ball on the Michigan State two-yard line, he delivered Plan A to quarterback Chuck Long, who would in turn pass it on to the Hawkeyes in the huddle. Then, of course, it was a surprise. Now, the fake handoff to tailback Ronni Harmon followed by Long's bootleg to the right corner of the end zone for the game-winning touchdown is no longer a secret weapon.

The decision at dusk will let Iowa keep its No. 1 ranking for another week. Moreover, it is the kind of call that wins Big Ten titles and Rose Bowl berths. National championships even.

Long and Michigan State coach George Perles talked about the play, which came on third down

and Iowa needing one yard for a first down and two for a touchdown, in their respective locker rooms early Saturday evening. Fry put his sideline thoughts into words on Saturday and again Sunday.

"I knew what I wanted to do," Fry said. "I'm like a computer center in that I take information from the press box and information from my players on the sideline and then I make the call.

"My whole question to Chuck was was he fast enough to make it into the end zone. I asked Chuck, 'Do you have enough speed to do it?' He said sure. 'Course the fake was the thing that did it. He (Long) reverse spins, sticks the ball in Harmon's stomach and rides with him, pockets the ball here (Fry motions to his left hip), lets his (right) hand go (forward with Harmon) and looks until Harmon gets airborne, then whirls and come back around the end.

"If they had been a bunch of slow-foots out there and people who didn't run to the ball, I would have never thought of (running) it. Knowing how mean and aggressive they are, I knew it had a chance . . . (but) I wasn't positive it would work."

"I'll tell you what, I wouldn't have called it," said Long. "It's a good play, it really is. It's a gutsy play. I either had to get in or get

A better finish? Can't recall one

Man and boy, I've been watching University of Iowa football for 50 years and I believe Saturday's electrifying finish against Michigan State was the most exciting, most courageous, most rewarding, most important ending to an Iowa football game I have ever seen.

I've seen Iowa win a few football games at the finish, and lose an awful lot, but I can't recall such a dramatic finish when the odds were so long and the stakes so high.

I remember Nile Kinnick throwing two fourth-quarter touchdown passes to beat Indiana, 32-29, and two even more important fourth-quarter touchdown passes to beat Minnesota, 13-9. I recall a tremendous fourth guarter comeback to beat Oregon, 34-31, in 1949. I remember Wilburn Hollis getting a second chance and repeating a long touchdown pass to Sammie Harris in 1960 to beat Wisconsin, 28-21. I remember Mike Cilek throwing a last-minute

touchdown pass to Kerry Reardon to beat Michigan State, 19-18, at Hawkeye Homecoming in 1969. I remember Hayden Fry's first Iowa team winning 13-7 at Illinois in 1979 when it threw the Illini back at the goal line on the game's last play.

But for real live drama in front of a nationwide TV audience for a No. 1 ranked team - now or die - Saturday's episode takes the cake.

And I've said all along that for Chuck Long to be a real Heisman Award candidate he would two or three times during the season have to rally his team and find a way to win when it seemed there wasn't one.

He did just that Saturday.

When the wind was blowing cold and the lights standing out on the scoreboard in fading daylight of a long, long game, Chuck Long became the kind of man John Heisman would have loved.

All Long did was complete six of seven passes on that final drive for 61 of the 78 game-winning yards. And then he hoisted the ball in triumph as he waltzed across the goal line with the winning six points while 11 Spartans leaped to lasso Ronnie Harmon. It was, I suppose, football justice that it was almost the same spot on the field and with about the same amount of time that Long and his mates had their dreams shattered a year ago against the same team on a controversial non-call by officials.

After all, the only thing that

Cards clinch title 'in the trenches'

Having stood in their shoes one year earlier, vanquished rival Gary Matthews quickly tipped his cap to the National League East's new champions.

"It's a little bit like a payback," said Matthews following the St. Louis Cardinals' 7-1 triumph Saturday over the Chicago Cubs. "Last year we clinched a tie here."

All-Star shortstop Ozzie Smith called clinching the pennant a treasure accomplishment.

"We had to get down in the trenches and fight all year. We picked up the papers and they were always talking about the New York Mets, even when we were four games ahead," Smith said. "It's very special."

St. Louis was tabbed by many to finish last in the division instead of first.

Manager Whitey Herzog, champagne dripping from his crewcut in St. Louis' raucous clubhouse, pinpointed a crucial period for the Cards.

"(When) we left New York in September and were one game back, I was really concerned about how we were going to respond," Herzog said. "We won seven straight ballgames.

In addition to the late-season acquisition of Cesar Cedeno, St. Louis owed a giant debt of gratitude to John Tudor, who Saturday won his 21st game to lower his ERA to 1.93 and will pitch the first game of the playoffs Wednesday against Los Angeles.

The 66-year-old Robinson reigns as the winningest coach in college football history today following Grambling State's 27-7 conquest of Prairie View A & M. Iowa was the school where Robinson earned his master's degree in physical education.

Slow start dooms Regina

CEDAR RAPIDS Regina ----High spotted Cedar Rapids La-Salle to 27 first-half points, then short-circuited its comeback attempt with four second-half turnovers in losing 36-8 to the Lancers Saturday afternoon at Kingston Stadium.

"We just pretty much didn't have our heads in the game in the first half," said Regina's Joe Ve-Depo, who collected six tackles from his linebacker spot.

"It's been a problem all year," said Steve Timlin, the Regals' other linebacker. Timlin led his team with seven tackles in addition to batting down a pass at the line of scrimmage and recovering a Lancer fumble.

"We do the same things over and over. We try to win, and that's just about it. That's the name of it."

Before he could plan for this Saturday's game at Tennessee State, Robinson had to take time out Sunday morning for a phone call. Ronald Reagan was dialing long distance.

"You hold the records for most wins, but more than just wins, you have a deep interest in your young men and what they will do for the rest of their lives," the president told Robinson. "They will be better men for having a coach like you."

Robinson — 3-5 his first year at then Louisiana Negro Normal College in 1941 at a salary of 63.75 a month - thanked many people for helping him win all those games. "I owe so much to so many people," he said. "That's why it's so hard for me to claim something."

And not all expectations have been met. A victory Saturday would tie him with George Halas, whose NFL Bears won 325.

MORE COLLEGE FOOTBALL: Drake coach Chuck Shelton admits that his team's football game with Iowa State was a rematch he'd been waiting for. Shelton's 1984 squad team jumped to a 17-0 lead over to Iowa State, only to watch the Cyclones score three unanswered touchdowns to win 21-17. Drake built a 13-0 second quarter lead in Saturday's game, but Iowa State cut it to 13-10 halftime. This time his team didn't let the victory slip away. The Bulldogs put together a 14-play, 51-yard scoring drive in the third quarter to overcome a four-point Cyclone lead and avenge last year's loss with a 20-17 victory.

COURT GAMES: New York Mets first baseman Keith Hernandez has confirmed that his wife has filed a \$12.5 million personal injury petition against him. The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said in a copyright story in Saturday's editions that Susan Hernandez filed the petition this week against her estranged husband. The newspaper said Presiding Judge Robert L. Campbell ordered the documents sealed in response to a motion by Mrs. Hernandez's lawyer. The motion said the documents should be sealed because they are of a "most sensitive and confidential nature which could potentially cause great embarrassment to the parties if such information were known to the general public," the *Post-Dispatch* reported.

OLYMPICS: The Korea Times reacted with dismay in an editorial published Saturday about the International Olympic Committee's agreement awarding broadcast rights for the 1988 Olympic Games to NBC. The network, which lost \$34 million when the United States boycotted the 1980 Games in Moscow, acquired the rights to the Games in Seoul, South Korea, with a "risk-sharing" arrangement. NBC will have to pay \$300 million to \$500 million, depending on the ratings, from sales of advertisements for its planned 180 hours of coverage.

mattered was winning. The No. 1 ranking was, and is, synthetic. It's important in January, but only window dressing now. And on a day when Michigan State's offense gave Iowa fits, and on a day when Iowa twice had to show its character and come from behind, the only thing that mattered was winning. Regardless of the statistics - almost all of them in Michigan State's favor - Iowa is 1-0 in the Big Ten and a better team because of it. A great team finds a way to win the close ones. Someone said Iowa was lucky to win. I said the last touchdown drive was skill, not luck. Sure, there were, and are, things to be worried about. The defense No. 1. That's the worst mauling I've seen a Hayden Fry-Bill Brashier defense take since Jarvis Redwine and his Nebraska mates trampled Iowa 57-0 in 1980. MSU freshman quarterback Bob McCallister, unimpressive in his first two starts with 10-of-32 passing for 99 total yards and three interceptions, threw for 199 yards in the first half alone. He was terrific all day. And Lorenzo White looked considerably more like a Heisman candidate than Ronnie Harmon, carrying the ball 39 times for 226 yards. And after White got hurt, redshirt freshman Craig Johnson, who hadn't carried the ball this season, came in and gained 89 yards in just 10 carries. Iowa never was able to successfully find a way to stop the Spartans. What appeared to be just about the same plays worked over and over and over again. Fry is usually great at making some halftime adjustments that will work - on offense, or defense, or - but Saturday he couldn't. both

The Spartans took the second half kickoff and marched 79 yards for a score in just 21/2 minutes. And then the next time they got the ball they marched 79 yards for another score. All told, Michigan State had 14 running plays that gained 10 yards or more. That's a bundle.

Was it chiefly poor defensive end play? The interior line? The linebackers? The defensive backs? What was it? Is the defense that bad, now that we've reached the Big Ten? One thing that didn't help was some of the poorest tackling you're ever going to see a Hayden Fry team do.

"The long plays have really hurt us, and that's been the story this year," said Regina coach John De-Marco. "I don't know if it's play-



The University of Iowa women's field hockey team rebounded from last week's disappointing loss to Northwestern to post three victories over the weekend in Columbus, Ohio.

The Hawkeyes, ranked No. 4 in the country, posted shutouts in all three games. On Friday they scored up their first Big Ten victory, 3-0 over Ohio State, then they blasted Michigan, 14-0, Saturday before capping the weekend with a 4-0 whitewashing of non-conference foe Lockhaven Sunday.

Michelle Murgatroyd and Liz Tchou did most of the damage offensively for Iowa. Murgatroyd, a freshman, knocked in two goals against Ohio State, then came back with four more against Michigan. Tchou matched Murgatroyd's six-goal weekend with one against the Buckeyes, four against the Wolverines and one more



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

come of the game, and possibly the course of the whole season. In doing so, he had but one request for coach Hayden Fry.

"I knew it was a deja vu," Long said. "We were down in there and I go 'Oh my gosh, it's a repeat of last year.' I just said, 'Coach Fry. you can run anything you want. but don't run that option.'

"Now they (the Spartans) get : chance to think about it for whole year," Long said.

The Hawks, meanwhile, may need to do some serious thinking about how to prevent teams from breezing up and down the field against them like the Spartans did. Not since the Purdue game or Nov. 8, 1980 - the last of 19 con secutive seasons in which Iowa finished with a .500 record o worse - has a team amassed more yards against Iowa than Michigan State's 580 yards of tota offense. Purdue won that game 58-13. Nebraska, in the 1982 season opener, was the last team to total more than 500 yards against Iowa with 503. "We just had some, well . . . I don't know how many breakdowns we had," said linebacker Larry Station, who couldn't be faulted for too many personal breakdowns since he was in on 20 tackles. "We have to play better and tougher defense," Fry said. "Today they threw a lot of stuff at us we'd never seen before. They made us look like we never tackled before . . . and we didn't do a real good job of pass defense. "We were just good enough to win," Fry added. "And, maybe that's what we needed. It's kind of like our offense; we've just been scoring at will in the previous games and we really got a gut check today to move the ball when we had to, into the wind, against the clock and we were behind. And we did it.
