COLUMBUS, OHIO - All the mistakes that Iowa had avoided in the seven previous weeks of bliss, all the pratfalls, seemed to come tumbling down on them at once Saturday on a rainy day in Ohio Stadium. Iowa's great good fortune had often

seemed too great and good to be true. On this day it was. For the Hawkeyes, Saturday's 22-13 loss might have been for the best -

the style, that is, not the substance of the defeat. If Iowa's undefeated football season

had to come to an end, at least it didn't expire on an official's call or a lonely fumble with time running out or a field goal gone astray from 25 yards. The Hawkeyes died by their own hand Saturday. No question about this

one. Often when a top-ranked team loses, it leaves a mine field of ifs and buts in its wake. Not this time. The Hawkeyes left behind a trail of turnovers and lost chances, not to mention their No. 1 ranking. But they left no doubt about

which was the better team on this day. FOR A CHANGE, Iowa played a game it didn't deserve to win. For once, there was nothing magic about Chuck Long, Iowa's normally magical

quarterback. Poor Chuck was flesh and blood Saturday. He came into the game the leading passer in the nation. Saturday, he was second best on the field.

This time, Jim Karsatos was the quarterback who worked the sidelines to perfection. This time, Karsatos was the one with the superb timing device. Long left a litter of four interceptions. It could have been seven, but the

Buckeyes were too accommodating. Verily, it could have been worse. Ohio State could have rolled up 22 points in the first quarter alone.

On the first play of the game, Chris Spielman, who played a marvelous game at linebacker, dropped one that should have nestled in his belly button like a piece of lint.

He probably bobbled it out of pure shock. On the next series a pass went through Larry Kolic's hands.

In the fourth quarter, cornerback Greg Rogan had one in his midsection, but dropped it.

There was Rich Spangler's missed 28-yard field goal in the first quarter. There was his missed 29-yard field goal in the third quarter.

Amazingly, and to the Hawkeyes everlasting credit, they were still in the game almost to the end. When Hayden Fry's gamble on fourth down and 2 from the Buckeyes' 3-yard line resulted in a Ronnie Harmon touchdown run with half a minute left in the first half, lowa still seemed kissed by fate.

Indeed, at 15-7, the Hawkeyes seemed to be recovering.

ALAS, IOWA picked the wrong team with which to play giveaway. When the Buckeyes collect a turnover, they score with it. Over the season the Buckeyes had scored on 14 of the 18 times turnovers they had forced. That translated to 83 points worth of touchdowns and field goals.

Saturday, they scored after four of lowa's five turnovers.

The amazing thing about the game was that the Hawkeyes were still in it until almost the end. Had they pulled this one off, the

Hawkeyes could rightly be considered charmed. If the Buckeyes' victory taught us anything, it was that the Hawkeyes

are not the team of destiny they had seemed. They are still tied for first in the Big


Ten, they are very much in the Rose Bowl picture. But yet, the dream season they seemed to be bouncing on their laps was a mirage.





"Obviously, I thought we'd be able to make it," he said.

But when Harmon tried his luck one more time at right tackle, Spielman smeared Ronnie for a one-yard loss, knocking him out of the game with an ankle injury, and Ohio State took pos-

It was one of many standout plays by the Buckeye sophomore linebacker, who had two of the interceptions against Long while also figuring in 19 tackles.

With rain pelting down and the skies so dark that the presence of Musco's portable lights saved the day, Ohio State eventually punted Iowa back to its 13-yard line.

On first down Long passed to Scott Helverson, who fumbled the ball away to Eric Ridder at Iowa's 32. And that paved the way for a four-yard scoring run by freshman Vince Workman, one of Byars' able replacements.

The other tailback, John Wooldridge, broke loose for a 57-yard touchdown scamper in the first half that opened a 12-0 lead.

The Buckeyes had picked up a safety when Gary Kostrubala at-

tempted to punt deep in his end zone, and those points were to prove troublesome for Iowa as the game prog-

ressed. The Hawks put together an 80-yard drive in the last quarter, with fullback David Hudson slamming over from the 2, and without that safety they would not have been forced to try a two-point conversion. If the score had been 20-13, a kick would have pulled

Iowa within a touchdown. Instead, a two-point run by Kevin Harmon, filling in for his brother, was stopped short, and the nine-point difference was decisive with 8 minutes 19 seconds remaining.

The Hawks did threaten again, almost scoring on 25-yard pass from Long to Quinn Early that was broken up by Terry White in the end zone. Rob Houghtlin then missed on a 42-yard field-goal try.

When Iowa got the ball back one more time, Long was intercepted again to complete his frustrating day - his worst since throwing four interceptions against Wisconsin last year. He also was intercepted four times by Florida in the 1983 Gator Bowl.

The running of Hudson was a bright spot for the Hawks. After Spangler's 26-yard field goal opened a 15-0 Buckeye lead, Hudson contributed the key play that let Iowa get on the scoreboard before halftime.

Iowa hadn't been able to accomplish much of anything on offense, and in a third-and-eight situation. Hudson caught a short pass from Long, shed tacklers until he got the first down, then rambled on for a 21-yard line to near midfield.

The Hawks then gambled on fourth-and-goal at Ohio State's 3, declining the field goal and sending Ronnie Harmon around left end for the touchdown that chopped Ohio State's lead to 15-7 with only 28 seconds left





Buckeyes' win blurs Rose Bowl picture

What did Ohio State's 22-13 victory

over Iowa on Saturday do to Iowa's Rose Bowl aspirations? It certainly did not help them, but

according to the way the Big Ten selects its representative for the Jan. 1 game in Pasadena, Calif., Iowa remains very much in the running.

The Ohio State victory leaves the Buckeyes tied with Iowa for first place. Each has a 4-1 conference record. Michigan and Illinois tied, 3-3, on Saturday, leaving those teams tied for third place with 3-1-1 records.

Here are some of pertinent conference Rose Bowl selection rules:

 The champion is determined on a percentage basis of conference games; tie games count as 1/2 win and

• If there is a tie atop the final conference standings, the winner of the game between the two teams goes to the bowl. • If there is still a tie because the

teams didn't play or tied, the team with the best winning percentage of all games played goes.

 If a tie still exists, the most recent Rose Bowl team is eliminated.

The rules get a little more complex for ties involving three or four teams, but the tie between Michigan and Illinois on Saturday make a three- or four-way tie improbable.

The remaining schedule for the top four teams in the league looks like

Ohio State plays at Northwestern on Saturday, then plays Wisconsin at home on Nov. 16 and closes its season against Michigan at Ann Arbor on Nov. 23.

Michigan plays Purdue at home Saturday, travels to Minnesota on Nov. 16 and closes at home against Ohio State. Illinois plays in Iowa City Saturday,

plays Indiana at home on Nov. 16 and finishes at Northwestern. After playing Illinois on Saturday,

Iowa finishes with games at Purdue on Nov. 16 and at home against Minnesota Nov. 23.

Should Iowa and Ohio State win the next two games, the Ohio State-Michigan game once again would determine the Rose Bowl representative, and perhaps the champion. In 1981, Iowa and Ohio State wound up tied for the conference championship after Michigan defeated Ohio State in the final game, but Iowa went to the Rose Bowl because Ohio State had been to Pasadena more recently.

l'exas passes top Texas Tech, 34-21

AUSTIN, TEXAS (AP) - Quarterback Bret Stafford revived Texas' offense with a 3-yard scoring run and pinpoint passing Saturday as the Longhorns defeated Texas Tech, 34-21, in a Southwest Conference game.

Stafford's on-target throws against the nation's top-ranked passing defense moved Texas into position to score and chewed up large amounts of time. The Texas offense had scored only one touchdown in the last three games, but Stafford capped a 39-yard drive with a quick cut over the left side with 8 minutes 32 seconds left in the first quarter.

Wisconsin runs to Big 10 titles

ANN ARBOR MICH. - Wisconsin won both the men's and women's Big Ten cross country championships here Saturday.

Stephanie Herbst covered a 5,000meter course in 17 minutes 20.3 seconds to lead the Badger women, and Timothy Hacker ran an 8,000-meter course in 24:27.4 to pace the Wisconsin men.

The Badgers also nabbed second place in both events, as Lori Wolter finished in 17:31 in the women's division and Joseph Stintzi at 24:51 in the men's.

The Iowa men finished last, but the Hawkeye women, paced by a 17th place finish by freshmen Renee Doyle of Sioux City, placed sixth.

Purdue trailed far behind Wisconsin's 26 team points with 73 in men's competition. Rounding out the team scores were Northwestern with 129, Ohio State with 134, Illinois with 139, Michigan with 142, Indiana with 145, Minnesota with 177, Michigan State with 197 and Iowa with 271.

Wisconsin's women had 22 points, a Big Ten record. Northwestern was second with 83 followed by Illinois, Indiana and Michigan with 120 each, Iowa with 141. Michigan State with 183, Purdue with 188, Minnesota with

199 and Ohio State with 224. Doyle's times was 18:50. Freshmen Janeth Salazar and Rachelle Roberts were the only other Iowa runners to finish in the top 30. Salazar finished 21st in 18:55 and Roberts was 24th in 18:56. The other Iowa women finishers were Sherri Suppelsa, 37th in 19:25; Maribeth See, 42nd in 19:37; Tricia Kiraly, 58th in 20:23, and Kristen Waters, 59th in 20:32.
