

# IOWa escapes P

### Hawkeyes produce The Drive

Gazette sports editor WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. — It was the drive that kept everything alive . . . national championship dreams, Rose Bowl hopes and Chuck Long's quest for the Heisman Trophy.

Those dreams and hopes and quests hung in the balance in the fourth quarter at Ross-Ade Stadium Saturday, but Iowa's football team passed the test once again.


In a drive reminiscent of ones constructed in come-from-behind wins over Michigan and Michigan State earlier this year, Long masterfully marched Iowa 64 yards in 12 plays to the winning points. Rob Houghtlin's heroic, 25-yard field goal capped a 5-minute, 22-second march that gave Iowa a 27-24 Big Ten football triumph.

"It wasn't a great kick but it got the job done," said Houghtlin, whose 29-yarder beat Michigan a month ago, 12-10. "The offense has always come through and it always

IOWA BEGAN the final drive on its 28-yard line with 6:30 remaining and the score tied, 24-24.

"We all knew what we had to do, just like against Michigan and just like against Michigan State," said offensive tackle Mike Haight. "We'd been in that situation before. It turned out exactly like we wanted."

## 27-24 win puts Hawks in lead

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. -Don't tell the hair-breadth Hawkeyes anything about Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom!

Iowa's fifth-rated football team scraped and squeezed into sole possession of the Big Ten lead Saturday — thanks to Ohio State's shocking loss -- but not before barely escaping another of those illfated ambushes in Purdue's Ross-Ade Stadium.


Purdue finally ran out of clock and lost a gut-wrenching, 27-24 game in which the deciding score was Rob Houghtlin's 25-yard field goal with 68 seconds to go.

THAT SHOULD have driven the stake through the Spoilermakers' heart. But the remnants of the 57,762 crowd and a CBS-TV splitnational audience stuck around to see one last spasm under the garish lights that illuminated a late autumn evening near the banks of the Wabash. Jim Everett, Purdue's gallant

quarterback who recovered awfully well from an ailing elbow, had one more chance in his farewell duel with Chuck Long, Iowa's Heisman Trophy candidate. It was made possible when Rod

Woodson fielded the final kickoff on his 7-yard line and somehow returned it 46 yards through Iowa's frantic coverage to the Iowa 47.

Timeouts gone, Everett went to work, hitting three straight passes and reaching the 20-yard line before

the clock began chomping at him like Pac-Man. The Purdue senior got his team lined up and hurled a frenzied pass out of bounds in an attempt to stop the clock.

THE BALL SEEMED to take forever as it arched toward the sideline, and by the time it hit something near the Iowa bench the big scoreboard clock showed nothing but zeroes.

Was it really over?

Purdue Coach Leon Burnett and his followers claimed they couldn't believe there had been a stroke of

## Badgers wilt OSU's Rose hopes

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Ohio State came in

No. 3, but Wisconsin had the Buckeyes' number. For the fourth time in the last five years, an underdog Wisconsin team unraveled Ohio State's mystique in handing the Buckeyes a 12-7 defeat Saturday, snapping the nation's longest home winning streak at 20 games and damaging Ohio State's Rose Bowl hopes.

"If someone would have told me that we would beat Ohio State four out of five years, I'd tell them those were not very good betting odds," said Wisconsin Coach Dave McClain.

Now, Ohio State would need to beat eighthranked Michigan, while Minnesota would have to upset No. 5 Iowa in the conference finales for both teams next weekend for the Buckeyes to visit Pasadena.

Ironically, charity began at home for the Buckeyes, who came into the game leading the nation in turnover margin. Ohio State, which had lost only two fumbles in its preceding nine games, lost three fumbles.

"They probably would have won if it were not for the turnovers," McClain said.

The Buckeyes were leading 7-6 in the third period when quarterback Jim Karsatos fumble the snap and linebacker Mike Reid, who recovered all three Ohio State bobbles, fell on it at the Buckeye 22.

Four plays later, Wisconsin fullback Marvin Artley scored on a one-yard plunge to make it 12-7 with 3:25 left in the third period.

"You just saw a devastating loss to Ohio State University," said OSU Coach Earle Bruce.

The victory moved Wisconsin to 5-5 on the year and 2-5 in the Big Ten, while Ohio State fell to 8-2 and 5-2. The Buckeyes, who needed wins in their final two games in order to clinch a berth in the Rose Bowl, dropped to third in the conference with the loss.

The Wisconsin defense, led by linebackers Russ Fields and Craig Raddatz, stopped Ohio State on fourth-and-2 at the Wisconsin 10 on the second play of the fourth period.

won, 21-14.

After Wisconsin was forced to punt, Ohio State moved quickly from its own 41 to a first-and-goal at the Wisconsin 8. On first down, John Wooldridge gained five yards to the 3, but then backup tailback Roman Bates fumbled a handoff from Karsatos and Reid recovered with 9:45 left.

"When I get time to think about it in a few days, I'll smile," said Reid, a 6-foot-2, 210-pound

Ohio State moved to the Wisconsin 42 in the waning moments, but two Karsatos passes for Cris Carter were broken up and Wisconsin had its upset.

Wisconsin thoroughly outplayed Ohio State for most of the first half, outgaining the Buckeyes by a 3-1 margin in racking up a 6-0 lead on a pair of field goals by Todd Gregoire. Gregoire was successful from 36 yards at the 5:52 mark of the first period on the Badgers' first possession, and also booted a 19-yard field goal at the 11:05 mark of the second period.

## Suffren's long ID lifts Clones, 21-14

MANHATTAN, Kan. - The final touchdown might have been a surprise to Iowa State's players, but not the 21-14 win over Kansas State.

When Iowa State's offense took the field with 2:35 left Saturday, caught in a 14-point deadlock and 76 yards away from the end zone, none of the Cyclones were thinking about a tie. But a late field goal was on their minds.


"I thought back to last year (a 7-7 tie in Ames)," said wide receiver Hughes Suffren, "and a tie was out of the question."

And so, Suffren did something about it. On third and 11 from the 33, Suffren found a seam in the left side of K-State's pass defense, hauled in Alex Espinoza's pass and outran the defense for the winning touchdown with 1:24 left. Rick Frank followed the 67-yard scoring play with the PAT, providing the final margin.

The decision snapped a four-game ISU losing streak and helped the Cyclones climb out of the Big 8 Conference cellar all the way to fifth place.

owa State improved to 2-4 in the Big 8, escaping a tie at the bottom with Missouri, Kansas and Kansas State. Iowa State is 4-6 overall while the Wildcats slipped to 1-5, 1-9.


The Lancers had been in this grand finale three of the past four


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

## Best QB' not good enough

WEST LAFAYETTE, Ind. - Purdue Boilermakers Coach Leon Burtnett said the best college football quarterback in the nation played in Saturday's Iowa-Purdue game.

And it wasn't Chuck Long. "There's certainly no doubt who the best quarterback in the country is," Burtnett said after his Jim Everett-piloted Boilers dropped a heartbreaking 27-24 contest to Iowa.

rewrite the record books. "Pound for pound, quarterback for quarterback, I'd take Everett

"Chuck Long's a great quarterback,

over everybody in the country." In a moment of severe frustration immediately after the game, Purdue reserve nose guard DeWayne Penn yelled at some Iowa fans, "We got the Heisman candidate and y'all ain't got nobody!"

Playing for the second straight week with a staph infection in his throwing elbow, Everett still managed to be brilliant in defeat. The 6foot-5 senior from Albuquerque, N.M., completed 23 of 32 passes for 315 yards, and kept his team afloat.

We've been told all year that Long is the quarterback with the best chance to prevent Auburn running back Bo Jackson from claiming that Heisman Trophy. That may be so, but Big Jim has big-time statistics. He just doesn't have a supporting cast to go with them.

EVERETT HAS passed for 3,358 yards and 21 touchdowns this season. Long has 2,710 yards passing. However, Iowa has accumulated 4,661 yards of total offense to Purdue's 4,316 this season because Long has a far better running game to work with than Everett.

"Chuck just played a super game," said Iowa Coach Hayden Fry in the glow of being alone atop the Big Ten standings. "We needed Chuck to look good. He certainly kept himself in good shape for the Heisman Trophy. "He's at a little bit of a disadvan-

tage because he's got (Ronnie) Harmon and (David) Hudson in the backfield, and he has to mix it up. We're always out to win the football game, not build stats." "I had a lot of fun watching

Everett play," Long said. "I just wish he hadn't made it so close." Everett admitted he was aware of his QB faceoff with Long - espe-

cially since it was on semi-national television.

"I consider Chuck a great quarterback," said Everett. "Myself, I do what I have to do for Purdue. But yeah, the comparison put a little pressure on us."

THERE WAS PLENTY of pressure on Everett and his offensive teammates in the last 56 seconds of the game, and the Boilers didn't respond well.

After Rob Houghtlin's 25-yard field goal gave Iowa a 27-24 lead, Boiler Rod Woodson returned the kickoff to the Iowa 47-yard line.

Everett threw a six-yard pass to tailback Rodney Carter, but Carter did not get out-of-bounds. Since Purdue had already used all its timeouts, that was bad. Everett then threw a 12-yard pass to Mark "Turf" Jackson, and Jackson did get out at the Iowa 29 with :29 to go.

Then Everett went back to Carter, this time for nine yards. But Carter, who has 89 receptions this season, again didn't get out-of-bounds. He seemingly could have without problem, but he thought a lot more yardage awaited him. It did not.

"Rodney tried to make a touchdown," Burtnett said. "He's a competitor. The things that make him a great player are what caused him to do that. You forget sometimes they're kids. But he should have went right to the sideline." "It was just bad judgment on my

part," said Carter. "My instincts were telling me to go back when I should have went straight ahead. I think I disappointed my teammates a lot, and I want to apologize to

Of course, the clock kept running. With the seconds ticking desperately away, Everett released a deliberate clock-stopping incompletion with four seconds left.

Burtnett and his squad thought the clock should have went :04-:03-:02-stop. Television replays seemed to indicate the Boilers should have had at least one second remaining totry a 20-yard play or a field goal. Burtnett said his team would have played for the touchdown.

But the clock went :04-:03-:02-:01-:00-thank you and please drive

"It's bad enough to get it on the road," Burtnett said, "but to have it when your own clock-operator can't

stop the clock is unbelievable." Burtnett appeared to have shed a tear or two in the Boilers' dressing room before meeting the press after the game: His face was red and his voice cracked a bit.

"That loss hurts, I promise you that," he said. "I'm not in a very good mood, guys. I'm sorry. But that's a tough one."

"As an Iowa alumnus, I congratulate you, Hayden," Holmes said, "but you sure did mess up our bowl plans."

"Hayden, I'm so proud of you," added Brock, "but now we got to go back to the drawing board and find another team. I'm going to Iowa City to see your

Minnesota game next Saturday, just in case." Both men pointed out Iowa has the inside track to

the Rose Bowl now, needing a victory over arch-rival Minnesota Saturday to clinch the Big Ten title. If the Hawkeyes do beat the Gophers, does that

ironically ruin their chances of contending for the mythical national championship? After all, their Rose Bowl foe probably would be UCLA (now 8-1-1). Not much chance to put a move on first place in the polls, because UCLA was rated 13th last week.

Well, don't kiss off Iowa's chances quite yet. True, Penn State undoubtedly held the No. 1 spot by routing Notre Dame Saturday. But the Nittany Lions still have to hurdle Pitt and then beat somebody tough in a Jan. l bowl.

Nebraska, No. 2 last week, must play at Oklahoma Saturday as well as a bowl game. No. 4 Air Force was grounded by Brigham Young and No. 3 Ohio State was shocked by lowly Wisconsin.

So Iowa could finish the regular season no worse than No. 3 by defeating Minnesota, then hope for a few minor miracles to take place in the bowl season. One of those miracles, of course, would be to staunch the hemorrhage of Big Ten losses at Pasadena — if that's where the Hawks wind up.

• Rob Houghtlin, Iowa's rags-to-riches place-kicker who wasn't considered good enough at Miami of Ohio, continues to get chances to meditate and win football

games with field goals. No Hawkeye fan will ever forget his 29-yarder as time ran out against Michigan. He stood with head down in his prayerful attitude before each of his three field goal tries Saturday. He

was asked if he was praying for "some distance and direction," as he explained after the Michigan win. "I always do that," Houghtlin replied simply. "No reason to change."

I asked Scott Helverson, who caught two of Chuck Long's passes for 30 yards, if Houghtlin is always as unflappable as he seems just before vital kicks.

"Yes, Rob is a pretty cool guy - most of the time," Helverson replied. "He did get a little upset with himself after his one miss today, but he's always in control."

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
