Agent says lowa's Mitchell took payment, too

IOWA CITY, IA. - A second former University of Iowa football player accepted money from New York sports agent Norby Walters while playing for the Hawkeyes' 1985 Big Ten championship team, a university committee reported Wednesday.

Walters and his partner, Lloyd Bloom, sued former Iowa running back Ronnie Harmon, now of the National Football League's Buffalo Bills, in March, seeking \$54,000 they claim to have paid him while he was playing at Iowa. Walters told United **Press International Wednesday that** he also paid former Iowa defensive back Devon Mitchell while Mitchell was at Iowa. Walters and Bloom replater dropped the two.

The university committee, formed by President James O. Freedman after reports of the payments to Harmon became public, named neither player, citing federal privacy laws. Harmon and Mitchell have declined comment on the allegations. Committee members said they tried unsuccessfully to interview both players. **Penalties Unlikely**

The Iowa committee found evidence that two players each received four payments from Walters during the fall of 1985 in violation of university, Big Ten Conference and National Collegiate Athletic Association rules. There is no evidence anyone in unlikely, university officials said.

Under NCAA rules, if any coach or athletic department official had known the players were represented by an agent, the university would have been subject to serious sanctions and might have been forced to give up money earned from the 1986 Rose Bowl, the report said.

The report said one player received \$1,000 and the second player \$575. The committee also "speculates with some confidence now," the report said, that the money was spent on the purchase of motor scooters.

The committee said both players purchased motor scooters at about the same time they received the payshows that both Harmon and Mitchell owned scooters.

Committee chairman David Vernon said although the committee suspects more money was paid, it could not locate proof.

"It seems reasonable to assume that prior to the time they received the money both players had reached some sort of an agreement with Norby Walters about his acting as their agent in negotiations with the National Football League," the report says.

Walters and Bloom say they paid Harmon more than \$54,000, beginning in his junior year, to encourage him to become their client. Their

But, apparently, not here and now.

Nine-run outburst in first inning sets tone for day

IOWA CITY, IA. - Iowa baseball coach Duane Banks thought his team should never have shown up for a non-conference doubleheader Wednesday against Iowa State.

The 17-year coach said his players went through the motions without emotion in dropping a pair to the Cyclones. Iowa State won the first game, 12-2 in five innings, and 10-6 in the nightcap.

Banks said his team, falling to 26-22 overall, faces a tough challenge here Friday and Saturday against Minnesota for the Big Ten West Division title.

"We should never play weekday games," he said. "We stunk so bad.

"I don't see how we can beat Minnesota now. You can't bounce back in a day.

"It's sad when you see seniors playing like freshmen. It's an absolute joke during our weekday games. Our kids are not mentally tough. Our middle hitters should have stayed in the dorms, had a few beers and chased some girls; they probably would have had more fun." Iowa State shelled pitcher Steve Denkinger for nine runs in the first inning of the first game, called in the fifth inning because of the 10-run rule. Denkinger, a Des Moines Hoover graduate, walked in four runs while giving up six hits. Jeff Breeling had two hits and scored two runs for the Cyclones in the fifth. 
Rumors swirled last season about Hayden Fry quitting as Iowa's football coach to direct some other col-



In Antrim's previous experiences as a head coach, he tried to do it all and delegated very little responsibility. He says those days are gone.

"One of the major things Johnny taught me was how to delegate authority and not do everything yourself," Antrim said. "I was guilty of that. This year I'll have two assistants, and I'm going to let them do more. Coach Orr let me do a lot and I worked harder than ever before. Johnny listened to us, so I'm going to listen to my assistants."

In his previous days as a head coach, Antrim categorized himself in the Bob Knight mold. Now he'll be coaching in the Johnny Orr mold.

"I used to be like Knight, a screamer," Antrim said. "Now I've learned from Coach Orr how to be more positive. He pats a guy on the back instead of kicking him in the butt. And because of that, he's got guys who play close to the limit of their abilities."

money to Harmon for purchase of a Mercedes.

• Found no evidence that other athletes at Iowa received money from sports agents, but raised the possibility that other athletes may have been paid.

 Found that Walters had contacted two other former Iowa football players, both of whom rejected Walters' overtures to represent them.

• Found no evidence that any member of the athletic department knew or had reason to know that the improper payments were made.

 Placed part of the blame for the situation on the university, the athletic department and the community for failing "to create a sense of community to encourage the two students to develop appropriate loyalty to the university and their teammates."

 Recommended legislation making actions such as the one involving Walters and the two Iowa players a criminal act.

The committee said college officials must begin to take steps against agents on college campuses.

"It is apparent the problem of agents competing for representational rights is a major one, and one that the University of Iowa must deal with if college football is not to suffer a severe blow," the committee said.

Elliott said he was unhappy about learning that the payments were made, but "delighted to know that no one on staff knew anything about it."

Vernon also said he was confident no official knew about the payments because athletic department officials "do investigate what I would call changes in lifestyle."

Vernon said Elliott investigated the purchase of the scooters in 1985. He said while it now appears that the two players misrepresented where they got the money for the vehicles, "at least we know there was an effort made by the department to find out what was going on."

Vernon added that one coach had even commented during his interview that Harmon's lifestyle had not changed much during his years at Iowa. "The coach said 'Ronnie came in flashy and he went out flashy,'" Vernon said.

Antrim said one of the most important traits he has picked up from Orr is patience.

"He showed me you have to have patience, and give people a chance to do things for you," Antrim said. "This team was 8-20 last year. But I didn't come in and tell them they stunk. I told them they could try out next fall and see how they could do against the players we recruit or any walk-ons. Sometimes when you have enthusiasm, you're not patient enough."

Antrim is using that patience to select his staff. With the proposed NCAA cutbacks in coaching staffs, jobs are at a minimum and Antrim has been flooded by applicants. One

EL PASO, TEXAS (AP) - A woman was arrested Wednesday on charges of delivering cocaine in connection with the sudden death of Texas-El Paso basketball star Hernell "Jeep" Jackson, authorities said. Michelle Lee Cabrera, 19, of El Paso was arrested at her home Wednesday and charged with delivery of a controlled substance, cocaine under 28 grams, city police Lt. J.R. Grijalva said. Bond was set at \$500,000.

"There's a possibility of further arthat, the investigation is ongoing." Jackson, 23, a first-team all-Western Athletic Conference player, died suddenly Saturday during a charity basketball game. A preliminary autopsy Sunday was inconclusive.

There were "no visible signs of

damage to the heart that could be seen with the naked eye," Manuel Diaz, chief investigator for the El Paso County medical examiner's office, said after a 3-hour autopsy Sunday.

Cabrera was arrested by members of the police Special Investigations Group, which includes officers from vice, narcotics, intelligence and other specialized units in the department.

The probe began because of information received by police, although Grijalva would not comment.

Jackson had joined Houston Oilers football players for a game Saturday at the Fort Bliss military reservation. He had been playing for five minutes in the second half, sat at the bench and collapsed shortly before 3 p.m. He was declared dead at Beaumont Army Medical Center at 4:09 p.m.
