OK needed for hunting in ditches

Hunters should remember that they must get permission from farmers if they are planning to hunt or trap in ditches along roads.

The Iowa attorney general has ruled that easements obtained to build roads on private property give the public the right of access to go through or across the properties, but the landowners retain all other control of the land.

"If the Department of Natural Resources gets a call for an alleged infraction of this law, they will respond,

but only to help compile information for the landowner and not hand out any citations," said Richard Bishop, wildlife supervisor for the DNR.

"It will then be up to the farmer to file the complaint with the county attorney's office."

BUMPER CROP FOR HUNTERS. More than two-thirds of the roadside count has been completed for pheasant and quail, and it still looks like a bumper crop. "Pheasants are up 30 percent over last year and our people are seeing exceptional numbers of quail," Bishop said. But the increase in gray partridge numbers, sometimes called Hungarian partridge or "Huns," is the big surprise.

A bird that normally is found only in the wide-open spaces of northern Iowa has increased its range to include central Iowa. Partridge have been observed in the entire northern half of the state and in many of the state's southernmost counties, Bishop said.

Gray partridge are smaller than hen pheasants. They weigh about a birds that generally remain together.

They're spookier than pheasants and won't hold for a pointing dog even if the dog is lucky to hit a point before they flush wild. They're strong fliers | kick. when spooked; it's not unusual to see them fly more than a half-mile late in the season.

The entire state will again be open for grey partridge, pheasant and quail on Oct. 31.

"We are now in the golden years of hunting," Bishop said. "Considering all the species of game that have become abundant in Iowa, the hunting should be the best it's been since the turn of the century."

Last year, this event drew 3,500 people from three states. It featured everything from outdoor exhibits and a flea market to participation events such as clay target shooting, blackpowder shooting, BB gun shooting and archery.

Educational seminars on gun dogs, fishing, and the hunting of small spring. game, waterfowl and deer will be included again this year.

"The idea is to promote these activities and our area," said Steve Finegan, director of the board. "If there's any profit made, it'll go into Black Hawk County Conservation Board for conservation projects."

Last year, the board didn't realize a profit, but some local clubs, such as the Izaak Walton League, Ducks Unlimited and Pheasants Forever may have made some money, he said. The money goes into their own conservation projects.

Dates and times are Friday, 1-7:30 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, 11:00 a.m. - 6:30 p.m.

Admission on Friday is \$2 for adults; children under 12 admitted free. Admission Saturday and Sunday is \$3.50 for adults, \$1 for youngsters from 5 to 12; children under 5 admitted free.

NFL will hold draft for ineligible players

NEW YORK, N.Y. (AP) - Faced with the possibility of legal action, the NFL said Wednesday it will reluctantly hold a supplemental draft on Aug. 28 that will include Ohio State's Cris Carter, ruled ineligible for his senior season because he accepted money from an agent.

Carter, an All-American wide receiver, had petitioned the league for admission after admitting to Ohio State officials that he had accepted a \$5,000 loan from Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom in 1986 and subsequently accepting \$1,800 more from them.

Charles Gladman, a University of Pittsburgh running back ruled ineligible for his school for refusing to cooperate in an investigation, had also applied for the draft. Gladman has denied receiving payments from Walters and Bloom, who are under investigation by a federal grand jury in Chicago.

The NFL originally balked at their applications, but sources said Commissioner Pete Rozelle received opinions indicating the NFL had no legal grounds to keep a player from making a living.

"While we have made this decision reluctantly, it is simply not feasible for the NFL to attempt to act as the NCAA's enforcement arm in assuring college athletes' compliance with NCAA rules," Joe Browne, a spokesman for the league, said in a prepared

Sims thinks the lack of numbers will form a bond among the players. "There's been so much talk public-

ly about how we can't be any good,' he said. "I just want to see what we can do when we hit the field. I hope our lack of size can be a rallying point. We barely have two deep at every position in the offensive line. But I'll push the other guys, and they'll push me."

Steve Morton, Iowa State's new offensive line coach, is expecting big things from Sims this season.

"When you get a kid who has as much experience as Keith going into his junior year, and who is the type of overall athlete that he is, you expect a lot of good things," Morton said. "I think he's been in almost every type of situation possible in Division I football. He gives us experience, and that calming affect, that we need in an otherwise inexperienced offensive

coaches involved. Coach Earle Bruce of Ohio State restated his opposition to allowing Carter to turn pro.

"I don't think the NFL made the right decision," Bruce said. "They made a legal decision, but a legal decision and the right decision are not always the same thing.

"Here you have a young man who has taken money from an agent and done something to ruin his college eligibility and he's rewarded with an NFL contract. I think the NFL has opened up a whole new can of worms with this decision. For years, pro football and college football have had a close relationship and I hate to see anything jeopardize that."

Ohio State Athletic Director Rick Bay, while acknowledging that a lawsuit could have destroyed the agreement under which the NFL refuses to draft underclassmen, added:

"I think where we are now is at a point of sending out a message to all college football players that, if you're so inclined, go ahead and take the money and sign with an agent as a sophomore or a junior and — if you're not caught - that'll be fine."


"I'm totally against it," said Coach Mike Gottfried of Pitt. "If there is a draft, we'll have to take a very serious look at agents and pro people coming onto campus. I'll be very disappointed if they reward someone for breaking a rule and, in essence, pro football is encouraging people to leave early."

The NFL regularly has supplemental drafts, but it has also denied players the right to be drafted before their classes, most recently in the case of Texas Christian running back Kenneth Davis, who was declared ineligible after accepting money from a booster.

Davis' request to be drafted was turned down because he had already played in a college game that season and the NFL doesn't allow players to play both college and pro games the same season. He was drafted the next year and is now with Green Bay.


