Club Gets Go-Ahead To Name Cup Site

The San Diego Yacht Club won the first round of its legal battle with Michael Fay, New Zealand's challenger for the America's Cup, in Manhattan Supreme Court yesterday. But the central issue in the case — the validity of Fay's challenge — was not settled.

There was a two-hour closed-doors conference in Justice Carmen Ciparick's chambers with lawyers representing the yacht club, Dennis Conner's Stars & Stripes syndicate, the city of San Diego and the office of the New York State Attorney General. Fay's attorneys then withdrew in open court a motion to continue a temporary restraining order they had obtained against the yacht club last week.

"Without the restraining order, the San Diego Yacht Club now can go ahead with its plans for the 1991 Cup defense," Jack Zepp, an attorney for the yacht club and the syndicate, said. The restraining order had prevented the yacht club from announcing last week that it had selected San Diego as the site. That announcement is expected in a few days.

Justice Ciparick denied a request by

Fay's attorneys to allow New Zealand to intervene in a yacht club petition to

amend the Cup's deed of gift. Fay had challenged the yacht club in July to a three-race Cup series to be sailed in 90-foot-waterline boats next June on a one-on-one basis, excluding all other foreign challengers. When the club refused the challenge, the New Zealand banker / lawyer filed for a temporary restraining order.

The Cup's 100-year-old deed allows such a challenge if there is no "mutual consent" to another format. Fay contends his challenge is legal and binding and is asking the court to order San Diego to defend on his terms or forfeit the Cup to him.

The yacht club wants the court to interpret the deed in terms of more recent Cup matches and rule against Fay. Since 1958 the races have been sailed in 12-Meter sloops, which are about half the size of Fay's proposed challenger, and multiple challenges have been accepted since 1967.

Justice Ciparick consolidated both suits into one proceeding and ordered the attorneys to file their briefs by Sept. 18. She said a decision would follow in about two weeks.

Pick Six Pays Record \$273,794

An unidentified upstate bettor at a Capital District Off-Track Betting outlet yesterday collected a New York record \$273,794 Pick Six payoff.

A carryover pool of \$137,454 attracted wagering of \$242,382 statewide, but only one negotiable ticket remained after Easy N Dirty's victory in the Hudson Handicap for New York-breds completed the sixrace sequence at Belmont Park. Fiftyone tickets listing five winners were worth \$547 apiece.

The record was \$201,008, set Nov. 19, 1986, at Aqueduct.

Alabama Drops Appeal

The University of Alabama has ceased efforts to restore the eligibility of Derrick McKey, the 6-9 center who was drafted by the SuperSonics after he was declared ineligible by the Crimson Tide for accepting money from New York sports agent Norby Walters. McKey, the Southeastern Conference player of the year last season, recently enrolled for his senior year when it appeared the NCAA might restore his eligibility. But Steve Sloan, the Alabama athletic director, said efforts to restore McKey's eligibility have been terminated. Recently it was disclosed McKey had received a loan in excess of \$50,000 with the help of another agent with whom he is now associated.

25 Britons Extradited

Twenty-five British soccer fans were flown to Belgium amid tight security to face manslaughter charges stemming from the 1985 Heysel Stadium riots in which 39 persons died.

Their extradition took place despite riots Sunday and Monday in two Brussels jails to protest the alleged preferential treatment they will receive. They will be housed in a renovated prison in Leuven, east of Brussels. No trial date has been set.

Rangers Sign Bell

Defenseman Bruce Bell, acquired in the offseason from the St. Louis Blues, has signed a new contract, the Rangers announced . . . Left wing Warren Young, who slumped to an eight-goal season a year ago, signed a one-year contract with the Penguins.

Byers Steps Aside Early

NCAA executive director Walter Byers said he will turn his duties over to his successor, Richard D. Schultz, on Oct. 1, much earlier than expected. Byers, 65, who has been chief operating officer of the NCAA for 36 years, announced his retirement last year and said at the time he would work with his successor for at least a year. Schultz, the athletic director at Virginia, was chosen in June by a search committee.
