# India takes 2-0 advantage vs. Australia

Behind Vijay Amritraj and Ramesh Krishnan, India took a commanding 2-0 lead over defending champion Australia Friday in their Davis Cup semifinal on grass in Sydney.

India has never won the tournament.

Amritraj, 33, who first played in the Davis Cup 18 years ago, defeated Wally Masur 1-6, 6-3, 12-10, 6-4 after Krishnan downed John Fitzgerald 6-1, 6-2, 3-6, 8-6.

"The main thing was to attack and control the net, and I tried to do that from the start," Krishnan said. "I'm becoming more aggressive. He was a little tentative, and

I was able to put pressure on his serve. A quick start is important in matches like that."

Amritraj, playing with a vigor that belied his years, wore down Masur.

Australia, which last rebounded from a 2-0 deficit to take the Cup in 1939, has had to deal with the last-minute withdrawal of Wimbledon champion Pat Cash, who withdrew after jarring his right knee during practice Monday.

In a clay-court matchup in Barcelona, Mats Wilander defeated Emilio Sanchez 8-6, 3-6, 6-0, 6-2 and Stefan Edberg topped Javier Sanchez 6-4, 6-2, 6-4 to give Sweden a 2-0 lead. Sweden is attempting to reach the Davis Cup final for the fifth straight year, having won the trophy in 1984 and 1985.

**Transamerica Open**—Peter Lundgren defeated Tim Wilkison 6-3, 6-4 to advance to the semifinals in San Francisco.

**Virginia Slims of New Orleans**—The top three seeds—Chris Evert, Zina Garrison and Lori McNeil—reached the semifinals. Evert breezed past unseeded Anne Smith 6-2, 6-0. Garrison struggled early but beat unseeded Marianne Werdel 3-6, 6-1, 6-4. McNeil defeated No. 5 Kate Gompert 6-4, 6-4.

**Southern Open**—Ken Brown shot a 6-under 64 to take a two-shot lead over Mike Hulbert after the second round in Columbus, Ga. He was at 129. First-round leader David Frost, Hale Irwin, Vance Heafner and Billy Pierot were at 134. Brown had eight birdies and two bogeys. His biggest shot of the day came on the first hole, when he holed a 15-footer from a bunker for a birdie.

**Dunhill Cup**—Rodger Davis shot a course-record, and defending champion Australia and the U.S. survived playoffs to reach the semifinals.

Davis had an eagle 2 and seven birdies on the Old Course in St. Andrews, Scotland. He then watched teammate Greg Norman struggle through a five-hole playoff before Australia beat Canada 2-1.

Scotland scored a 2-1 victory over Ireland and England beat Spain by the same score, but the Americans had to go to a playoff to beat Japan.

After U.S. captain Curtis Strange shot a 68 and beat Koichi Suzuki by two strokes, D.A. Weibring had a 75 and lost to Nobumitsu Yuhara by six shots. Mark O'Meara beat Nobuo Serizawa on the third playoff hole after each shot a 70.

■ Paul Stevens, 33, has been named baseball coach at Northwestern. He replaces Larry Cochell, who resigned last month to go to Fullerton State. Stevens joined the NU staff in 1984 after serving as a scout for the New York Mets. He played four years in the Kansas City Royals' farm system and two seasons with the Oakland A's organization. An Oak Lawn native, Stevens played two years at South Alabama before transferring to Lewis, where he was an NAIA All-America in 1976. The short-stop and second baseman was a member of the 1973 U.S. Pan American Games team, which won a silver medal.

Northwestern also announced that Jim Suttie, 41, has been named interim coach of the men's golf team. He was the director of instruction at Medinah Country Club. Suttie succeeds Wally Goodwin, who went to Stanford. Suttie has coached at Methodist College, Brevard Community College and Eastern Kentucky. One of his players was Paul Azinger, who is the top money-winner on the PGA Tour.

■ Floyd Kerr and Kenneth "Doc" Sadler have been named assistant basketball coaches at Chicago State. Kerr was an assistant at Appalachian State last season, and has also worked at Colorado State and Colorado. Sadler was coach at County Line High School in Arkansas. He has been an assistant at Arkansas, Lamar and Houston.

■ Derrick McKey, who took money from an agent while playing for Alabama, has signed a multiyear contract with the Seattle SuperSonics. The 6-foot-9-inch forward was the ninth player chosen in the first round of the National Basketball Association's June draft. McKey was allowed early entry into the draft after the NCAA declared him ineligible for his senior year after the disclosure he had taken money from **Norby Walters**.

■ Charlie Simmer and Clark Gillies, both two-time All-Stars, were among the more familiar names left unprotected as National Hockey League teams submitted their protected lists for Monday's waiver draft. Simmer, 33, who has 331 career goals, was left off the Boston Bruins' list. Gillies, 33, wasn't among the 17 skaters and 2 goalies protected by the Buffalo Sabres. Other no-

tables left unprotected included Hartford's Doug Jarvis and defenseman Barry Beck of the New York Rangers, who is injured. The Los Angeles Kings didn't protect former Blackhawks goalie Bob Janecyk.

■ Carl Scheer, Continental Basketball Association commissioner, has ordered an investigation into the activities of the Mississippi Jets and owner Ted Stepien in the wake of allegations that Stepien ordered former coach Keith Fowler and former General Manager Mike Woten to purposely lose three games late last season.

■ Former Notre Dame lineman John Mastrangelo, who played guard for the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1947-48, died Friday of cancer in Vandergrift, Pa. He was 61.

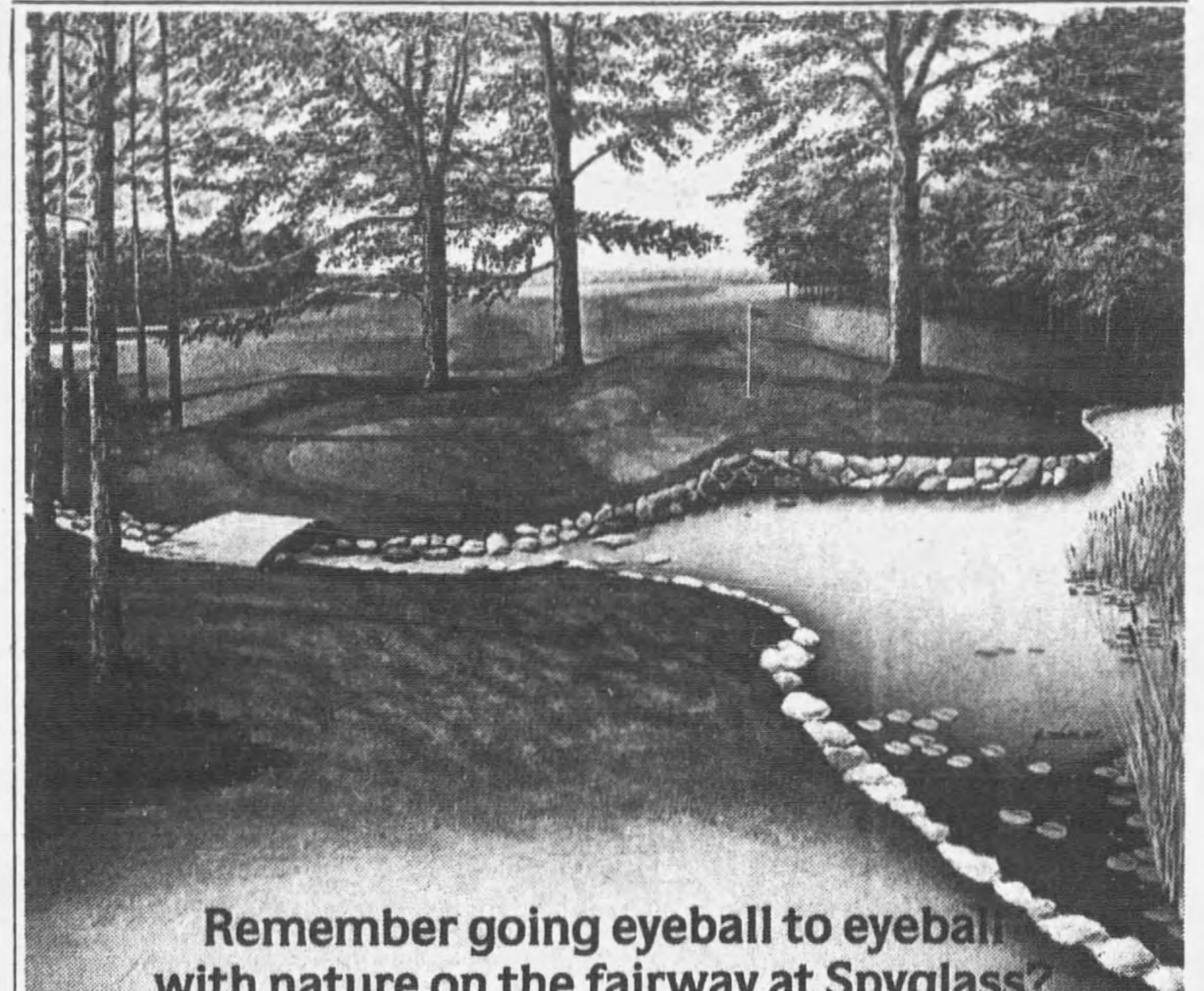
■ Bill Elliott set a qualifying record in winning the pole position for Sunday's Holly Farms 400 NASCAR event in North Wilkesboro, N.C. He averaged 115.196 miles an hour.

■ Tennis star Yannick Noah and his wife, Cecilia, a Swedish model and singer, have agreed to a separation and will file for divorce.

■ Wisconsin-Milwaukee has canceled the rest of the women's soccer season because of a traffic accident involving the team. "We just didn't have enough girls who had been released [by physicians] to participate," said Athletic Director Daryl Leonard. A van carrying the team back from a game with Purdue was struck from behind by another vehicle Sept. 19 on the Dan Ryan Expressway. Two players were hospitalized, and 18 others treated at hospitals and released. The team had a 1-1-1 record and hadn't played since then.

■ Gianfranco Rosi (42-2) upset Lupe Aquino (31-3-1) to take the World Boxing Council super-welterweight title on a unanimous 12-round decision in Perugia, Italy.

■ The U.S. beat Canada in the team event and Canada's Carolyn Waldo and Michelle Cameron won the duet at the FINA World Cup synchronized swimming championships in Cairo. Waldo and Cameron, the world duet champions, scored 98.20 points. Karen and Sarah Josephson of the U.S. were second.



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
