


### Volleyball for boys, for a day

oys played volleyball in Lost Nation on Monday, which wouldn't be so unusual except that boys do not play volleyball in Iowa.

They play volleyball in California, New York, Missouri and eight other states, but not in Iowa. Boys' volleyball is not offered in Iowa schools by the Iowa High School Athletic Association, and for some good reasons.

But when six teams from the Wapsie Conference met for a boys' volleyball tournament in Lost Nation, it was a popular event with competitors and fans. Bennett won the championship match over Lost Nation. Teams from Bellevue Marquette, Andrew, Oxford Junction and Calamus-Wheatland also competed.

"The gym was full on one side and we hold 1,200 here," Lost Nation Athletic Director Bryce Smeins said. "The reason we did it is that the conference wanted a fund-raiser of some kind and we came up with boys' volleyball.

"It wasn't too bad. There was some carrying going on but there was some good spiking and some good play. We're going to do it every year. The kids really enjoyed

Judging by the scores, it also was very competitive. Three of the five best-of-3 matches went the route. Scores in the Bennett-Andrew match were 15-12, 15-10 and 15-13.

Girls' volleyball in Iowa has grown so rapidly in the 1980s that it now is the No. 1 participation sport. The season was completed last weekend with the state tourna-

Not that volleyball isn't popular among boys in Iowa. If you were to survey a few schools, I think you'd find boys would enjoy competing.

The problem is, when could you have a boys' volleyball season? In the fall, it would clash with football and cross country. In the winter, it would compete with basketball, wrestling and swimming. In the spring, it's track, golf, tennis and baseball.

"Without question, I think the coaches and the kids would enjoy it," said Dave Harty of the IHSAA. "But we've had very little comment about a boys' volleyball season. The question, of course, would be when to have it. It's a great sport and a fast-moving game, but we haven't had that much interest expressed."

owa isn't a dinosaur here. While only 11 states have boys' volleyball, schools in 48 states (Maine and Vermont are the exceptions) field girls' volleyball teams.

For a day, at least, there was boys' volleyball in Iowa. And Lost Nation found a new and different way to have some fun.

# Levin Harmon linked to agent

Report: Hawkeye back received cash, tickets; eligibility in question

University of Iowa senior running back Kevin Harmon apparently violated National Collegiate Athletic Association rules and jeopardized his eligibility by accepting money and airline tickets from a sports agent.

Harmon received \$350 and an unspecified number of airplane tickets from New York agent Norby Walters, according to a report written by arbitrator John Culver of Washington, D.C. Culver was ruling on a contract dispute between

Kevin's brother Ronnie and Walters. The report, obtained this week by the Atlanta Constitution, said Walters and his associate, Lloyd Bloom, provided Kevin Harmon with cash and airline tickets after Walters signed Ronnie Harmon to a contract in March 1985. At the time,

Ronnie had completed his junior season with the Hawkeyes and Kevin had finished his second campaign with the team.

Any payments from a sports agent are in violation of NCAA rules and leaves questions about Kevin Harmon's eligibility. Iowa has three regular season games remaining, including a meeting with Northwestern on Saturday.

NCAA officials, who had not seen Culver's report, said if the details were true, Kevin Harmon's future as a college football player is in

"I would have to speak first with (enforcement director) David Berst, but my first reaction was if he (Kevin Harmon) received anything from an agent it immediately puts him in jeopardy," said Dave Didion, an NCAA enforcement official.

Harmon has played in all of Iowa's games this year except the Oct. 10 victory at Wisconsin. He

is the team's leading rusher with 471 yards and third-leading receiver.

IOWA ATHLETIC DIRECTOR Bump Elliott said Wednesday night the Culver report was the first time the school learned of of Kevin's involvement with an agent. The university will begin an investigation immediately, Elliott said.

"The plan of attack is to find out what's going on," Elliott said. "Some of our information is partial. We don't have everything available we


Elliott said he has met with Coach Hayden Fry to discuss Harmon's situation.

"He's quite surprised, just like I am," Elliott

Wayne Duke, commissioner of the Big Ten Conference, said the league would need more information on the case before he would comment. "We'll ask the university what it knows," Duke said.


### Marble doubtful for scrimmage at Five Seasons

Hill has been slowed with a sprained ankle, but he should be close to 100 percent, Davis said. Michael Reaves, Les Jepsen and freshman Rodell


Davis also are on the Black unit.

### Padres' Santiago everyone's pick as NL's best rookie

NEW YORK (AP) - San Diego catcher Benito Santiago, who hit safely in 34 straight games to establish a first-season record, was a unanimous selection as the Jackie Robinson Rookie of the Year in the National League, the Baseball Writers Association of America announced Wednesday.

Santiago, who batted .300, hit 18 home runs, drove in 79 runs and stole 21 bases, received 120 points, while

runner-up Mike Dunne, a pitcher for the Pittsburgh Pirates, had 66 points drawing 22 second-place

Pitcher Joe Magrane of the St. Louis Cardinals finished third with 10 points.

Two writers from each of the league's 12 cities participated in the voting which was conducted at the end of the regular season. Points were awarded on a 5-3-1 basis.

Santiago, a native of Puerto Rico, became the fifth NL rookie to be acclaimed unani-

mously. The others were Frank Robinson, Cincinnati, 1956; Orlando Cepeda, San Francisco, 1958; Willie McCovey, San Francisco, 1959, and Vince Coleman, St. Louis, 1985. SANTIAGO BROKE Jimmy Williams' all-time rookie record of hitting in 27 straight games for the 1899

Pittsburgh Pirates. The modern record had been Guy Curtright's 26 straight with the 1943 Chicago White Santiago's streak was stopped on the last Saturday of

the season by Los Angeles Dodgers right-hander Orel Hershiser.

On the negative side, Santiago made 22 errors. Santiago is the fifth catcher — and the first in 15 years — to be selected the top rookie. The others were Johnny Bench and Earl Williams in the NL, and Thurman Munson and Carlton Fisk in the American League.

The only other Padre to win rookie honors was reliever Butch Metzger in 1976, when he shared the award with Cincinnati right-hander Pat Zachary.

"It's not surprising that he hit in so many straight, but the fact that he's a rookie catcher and has so many other things to worry about besides hitting is what made it more amazing," teammate Tony Gwynn said of Santiago. "We expected this out of him, but we didn't have any

idea he had this kind of ability," Padres General Manager Jack McKeon said. "It's very difficult to prejudge a guy in April and say he's going to put these kind of numbers on the board." As much as he was impressed by Santiago's hitting

streak, San Diego Manager Larry Bowa also admired the rookie's composure as the streak continued. "He was unbelievable, the way he handled himself,"

Bowa said. "He always had time for people. The tough thing about it was how we were losing. I know he was frustrated when we lost. He came in one day and said he wished we could win some games." The Padres, who got off to a 12-42 start, finished the

season last in the NL West at 65-97.

After spending the first two months of the season looking for fastballs and swinging for the fences, Santiago adjusted his stroke for the breaking ball.

Santiago's streak, which started Aug. 25, was the second longest in the major leagues this year beind the 39-game mark by Milwaukee's Paul Molitor.

## Bayless, like most of life's winners, never quit

Throughout 7-week injury layoff, lowa running back kept chin - and hopes - up

OWA CITY — The games were the hardest part. Rick Bayless almost hated the games. Practices

were bad, to be sure, but Saturdays were the pits. That's when the injured lowa running back had to sit in the stands and watch his teammates play Kansas State, or Michigan State, or Purdue, or Indiana.

"It was depressing watching people practice," Bayless remembers. "I went to games, and it was tougher. It was worse than practice.

"I tried to go on to the sidelines and tell everybody to have a good game, but it was hard to sit there and know you want to be out there so bad and couldn't be out

At the beginning of the season, the outlook couldn't have been brighter for Bayless, a fifth-year senior from Hugo, Minn. A one-time walk-on, Bayless gained 1,150 yards last year, only the third Hawkeye to pass the fourfigure rushing barrier.

The Associated Press voters put Bayless, who also tied for the team lead in pass receptions, on the all-Big Ten first team, in a conference that featured running backs with much longer press clippings.

The university featured Bayless on the cover of its media guide. Kids all over the state shunned superstition and bought Hawkeye jerseys adorned with No. 13. But football for Rick Bayless began to unravel even

before the first game. After four years of workouts with only two days missed, Bayless suffered a bruised muscle in his thigh and was dropped to the second team behind

Kevin Harmon. Bayless, a 6-foot, 200-pounder, was just regaining his health again when his knee gave out during the lowa State game on Sept. 19.

"I planted. I felt my knee. It felt strange, but it didn't buckle or anything. I kept going three or four more steps and then laid down," Bayless says. Bayless came off the field without help.

"I could still run on the sidelines. I was running and I hadn't lost any strength. It wasn't unstable. "(The doctors) said it would be all right to go back in, but I wasn't really comfortable." Instead, he waited until

halftime. The doctors looked him over again and decided

to put an immobilizer on his right leg. "They said 'we're out in front, there's a lot of season left," Bayless recalls.

Little did anyone know Bayless would miss the next seven weeks. Surgery was suggested by the medical staff, but Bayless would have none of it. "I don't think I really had a choice. If I would have had

surgery, I would have been out (for the year), no doubt "A lot of people have what I've done and played without surgery. I felt if they could do it why couldn't I? I

think I made the right choice. I have no regrets." The ligaments in Bayless' knee were torn ever-so-

which used ineligible players by forcing them to forfeit games in which they have participated.

"With the time frame we have, there is some pressure" to investigate the case quickly, Elliott said. "The basis being if there is some kind of problem, the NCAA philosophy is you can't play a player if there's a violation."

Harmon played in Iowa's 29-21 win over Indiana last week, a game that knocked the Hoosiers out of first place in the Big Ten. Indiana Athletic Director Ralph Floyd said the Harmon case could have an affect on the outcome of the conference race.

"I don't know what the details are, but if they played with an ineligible player, it's something that should be looked at," said Floyd.

CULVER, A FORMER U.S. senator from Iowa, voided the contract Ronnie Harmon signed with Walters on the grounds the agent violated regulations of the National Football League Players Association regarding agents. The 30-page document held that Ronnie, now with the Buffalo Bills of the NFL, must repay \$5,869.47 of the \$54,924.42 that Walters and Bloom paid him through their company, World Sports and Entertainment (WSE).

The university was not punished in the Ronnie Harmon case because it was shown neither the coaching staff nor administrators were aware of Harmon's dealings with the

In the Culver report, on page five, it states "WSE also paid Mr. Harmon's brother, Kevin, \$350' sometime between April 8, 1985 and Aug. 1, 1986.

The report goes on to say "in addition to these monthly payments, WSE purchased plane tickets at substantial amounts for Mr. Harmon and also provided Mr. Harmon and members of his family with concert

On page 11 of the report, the day Niters at Legion decision states ". . . Mr. Harmon was given over \$12,157 worth of airline tickets for himself, his broth-

er Kevin and his girlfriend." Kevin Harmon did not return phone messages Wednesday night. Walters also declined comment.

Culver's office also was not commenting on the decision. A statement released by Ann Pencoe of Culver's office said: "It is inappropriate for the arbitrator's office, which acts in a quasi-judicial capacity, to comment on a decision in a case involving this office regarding the decision."

The university conducted its own investigation last spring after word of Ronnie's involvement with WSE surfaced. The university report,

dated May 1, also implicated another student, later identified by Walters to be former Hawkeye player Devon Mitchell.

The university report said "we found no evidence other studentathletes at the University of Iowa past or present, received payments from a sports agent while participating in the University's athletic

program." In the summary of its findings the committee reported that "Walters contacted two other UI studentathletes, who both rejected Walters' overtures." The names of the two never were revealed.

**IOWA FOOTBALL PLAYERS** are made aware of NCAA rules concerning agents and professional representation in a 5-page summary included in playbooks.

On the first page of the summary, one of the items reads "(NCAA rules forbid) an athlete to accept expenses or gifts of any kind (including meals and transportation) from an agent (or anyone else) who wishes to provide services to the athlete. Such payment is not allowed because it would be compensation based on athletic skills and a preferential benefit not available to other students."

Leo Davis, chairman of the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics and a member of the committee which studied the Ronnie Harmon case, said he stands by the report.

"I would like to read the (Culver) report first," Davis said. "We filed our report. I think that summarizes it. Other than that I have no comment on it."

David Vernon, chairman of the committee which issued the Harmon report, also declined comment, saying he was suffering from laryn-

The committee's report did leave the door open to possible involvement between agents and Hawkeye athletes, however, saying it did not have full access to Western Union records. Walters apparently used Western Union money orders to pay athletes.

Ronnie Harmon's agent, Martin Rauch, said in a television interview he thought Kevin's involvement with WSE was limited to a plane ticket purchased for a rip from St. Louis to Iowa for Harmon and Mitchell.

"Ronnie didn't know about the matter until after the fact," Rauch

Rauch said Mitchell and Kevin Harmon were stranded in St. Louis and Mitchell asked WSE for plane tickets to get back to school. Kevin Harmon didn't have direct contact with WSE, Rauch said.


