Czyz Appeals IBF Title Loss

An attorney for Bobby Czyz has asked the IBF to invalidate last month's light-heavyweight title bout, contending referee Carlos Padilla erred in overseeing the fight.

Czyz lost his title to Charles Williams on Oct. 29 after being stopped in

the ninth round. Attorney Dennis DiVenuta wrote in

his appeal Wednesday to the IBF that Padilla made two mistakes that benefitted Williams. DiVenuta said the first mistake

came late in the second round when Czyz knocked Williams down. Shortly after the knockdown, the bell rang and DiVenuta said Padilla never began a knockdown count, allowing the round to end.

Williams got to his feet shortly after the knockdown, but DiVenuta contends the boxer was draped over the ropes and held onto them returning to his corner.

The appeal said Padilla also erred in the third round when he gave Williams a standing eight count after Czyz hit him with a solid right that sent Williams into the ropes.

Padilla apparently ruled the ropes kept Williams on his feet and consid-

ered it a knockdown.

DiVenuta said IBF rules say a knockdown can occur only when a boxer is helplessly draped over the ropes or any part of his body other than his feet touch the canvas.

IBF president Bob Lee said he forwarded films of the fight to Bill Brennan, the chairman of the IBF's championship committee. Lee said a ruling probably would be made next week.

Curren Upsets Mecir

Kevin Curren mixed powerful serves with carefully placed drop volleys to upset top seed Miloslav Mecir, 7-5, 6-4, and advance to the quarterfinals of the \$815,000 Paris Open. Curren meets Brad Gilbert, who defeated Tomas Smid, 6-2, 6-2.

Yannick Noah, the No. 3 seed, defeated Mansour Bahrami of Iran, 7-6 (7-5), 6-4, to earn a quarterfinal spot, but it was uncertain Noah will continue in the tournament after aggravating a torn stomach muscle.

Unrated Americans Matt Anger and Jim Grabb upset third-seeded Joakim Nystrom and 15th-seeded Sergio Casal, respectively, to reach the quarterfinals of the \$525,000 Stockholm Open. Anger beat Nystrom, 6-3, 3-6, 6-1, and Grabb won, 7-6 (7-4), 4-6, 6-3.

In other third-round matches, topseeded Stefan Edberg fought off Ulf Stenlund, 7-6 (7-4), 6-3, and eighthseeded Peter Lundgren downed 10thseeded Jimmy Arias, 7-5, 3-6, 6-4.

No. 5 seed Lori McNeil beat Anne Hobbes, 6-2, 6-1, and Pam Shriver defeated Peanut Louie Harper, 6-4, 6-2, in the second round of the Virginia Slims of New England in Worcester, Mass.

Faldo Beats Strange

British Open champion Nick Faldo's three-stroke victory over the year's leading money-winner, Curtis Strange, led a team of European pros to a 7-5 win over a U.S. squad in the first round of the \$950,000 World Championship of Golf in Inagi, Japan. Faldo shot a 70, and Strange had a 73.

Greg Norman beat Toru Nakamura, 67-74, as an Australia-New Zealand team tied Japan, 6-6.

No Penalty for Iowa

University of Iowa athletic director Bump Elliott said the school probably would not be penalized if it were proven running back Kevin Harmon took money from an agent, because no one at the school knew about the incident.

University officials began investigating the former Bayside High School player after it was alleged that he accepted \$350 and airline tickets from agent Norby Walters, who earlier was linked to Harmon's brother, Ronnie, and former Iowa defensive back Devon Mitchell.

Acceptance of such benefits would be a violation of NCAA rules and could result in Kevin Harmon being declared ineligible. A team using an ineligible player could be punished by forfeiting games, but Elliott said he didn't think that was likely.

Winfield's Agent Dies

Funeral services will be held Sunday in Mission Hills, Calif., for Al Frohman, the agent who negotiated Dave Winfield's 10-year free-agent contract with the Yankees. Frohman, who had been ill for a month, died Tuesday of coronary arrest, his wife said.

Walcott Stable

Former heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott was in stable condition after undergoing surgery. Walcott, 73, was admitted to Howard University hospital in Washington earlier this week and underwent surgery Tuesday. Hospital spokesman Michael Brown said the former world champion was "resting comfortably."

Garvey, Almon File

Steve Garvey, who played only briefly after suffering a shoulder injury early this year, was among three major leaguers who filed for free agency yesterday. The others were Montreal pitcher Dennis Martinez and Mets infielder Bill Almon, bringing the total to 47 . . . Major-league salaries dropped this year for the first time in two decades according to a report published in USA Today. The average pay for 1987, including incentives, was \$402,094, compared to \$410,517 in 1986.
