

Nobody knew, nobody knows

t's a doggone good thing this Kevin Harmon business didn't go public a week later.

If your football team has to endure a major distraction, it's better to get it out of the way when you're playing Northwestern instead of Ohio State.

My, but that's a jaded way of looking at things. Yes, and so what? How can one not look at what's happened with the Harmon brothers, Devon Mitchell, the Iowa football program and the University of Iowa without a tinge of cynicism.

Thursday, we learned a University of Iowa faculty committee is investigating recent reports that UI football player Kevin Harmon accepted money from professional agent Norby Walters.

This is Faculty Committee II. The first faculty committee was appointed last March to investigate reports Ronnie Harmon had received payments from Walters.

That committee concluded former Hawkeye football stars Ronnie Harmon and Mitchell had indeed received monies from Walters before their collegiate careers ended.

Oddly enough, Faculty Committee I never interviewed Kevin Harmon, among others. Apparently, the committee asked Kevin if he would answer some questions, but Kevin declined. The committee did not have subpoena power.

WHY WAS KEVIN'S response good enough for the committee or the university? That is the \$64,000 - \$54,000 if you're Ronnie Harmon

— question. Why wouldn't someone at the university — the football coach, perhaps, or the athletic director, or maybe even the university president - have suggested to Kevin he would be doing the school a tremendous favor by cooperating with the committee?

Or, perhaps someone did just that, and Kevin still refused. Maybe the coach or the athletic director or the prez asked Kevin to talk, he said he'd rather not, and well, who could blame him. It was his brother under fire, after all.

But, even back in the spring when the Ronnie Harmon situation came to a head, some people wondered. What about Kevin Harmon? If his brother had dealt with Walters, had Kevin?

You can't blame people for making that association, especially since Kevin obviously was a player of no small talent, a potential professional prospect.

Since Kevin was going to be an important member of the Iowa team this fall, it would seem the football program and the school would have preferred to make Kevin Harmon's story public knowledge as soon as possible.

But Thursday night, Kevin's history of dealing or not dealing with an agent was uncertain, as was his future as a Hawkeye.

But if 'nobody knew anything,' is true — there hasn't been any reason to question that it is — does that qualify it as a good enough answer?

The fact is, Ronnie Harmon, Mitchell, and thousands like them are recruited from all parts of the country to attend major universities for the sole purpose of competing in the billion-dollar business of big-

Harmon, a senior running back, was linked to sports agent Walters — the same man who paid Kevin's brother, Ronnie, more than \$54,000 — in a report issued by arbi-





trator John Culver and made public this week. The report said Kevin Harmon received \$350 and an unspecified number of airplane tickets from Walters in apparent violation of NCAA rules.

Harmon could be ruled ineligible if the violations are found to be true. The university could also be forced to forfeit games if it used an ineligible player. Iowa has three regularseason games remaining, including the contest at Northwestern on Saturday.

A university committee is investigating the link between Harmon and Walters. Elliott expects the committee to report its findings to the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA prior to Iowa's game at Northwestern.

BULLARD AND INGRAM, who are sitting out a year in accordance with NCAA regulations regarding transfers, were ruled out of the game late Wednesday when university officials discovered a Big Ten Conference rule prohibiting transfers from traveling with the team.

"We took that to mean they could Iowa basketball fans got a long scrimmage only on campus," Iowa Coach Tom Davis said.

Bullard and Ingram participated in the team's scrimmage in Burlington last month, but Davis foresees no problems with the conference as a result of that game.

Horton is recovering from an ankle injury and Marble has a strained knee. The coach expects both to play in the team's final scrimmage on Nov. 13 at Marshall-

Bill Jones, playing Marble's small forward spot, led all scorers with 26 points. Jeff Moe tossed in 21 for the winners, which also got 18 points from Al Lorenzen and B.J. Armstrong. Kent Hill was credited with 17 rebounds for the Black club.

Michael Morgan led the White squad with 19 points. Freshman Rodell Davis added 16.

Davis was happy with the play of Jones, Hill and Micheal Reaves, all on the winning side. Reaves finished with 10 points.

Iowa State football coach Jim Walden would just as soon skip Saturday's "homecoming" trip to Nebraska's Memorial Stadium.

He spent four seasons (1969-73) as an assistant to Coach Bob Devaney in Nebraska and knows all too well what can happen to visiting teams in Lincoln.

His task in the 1:30 p.m. game Saturday will be especially tough. Iowa State suited just 45 scholarship players in a 42-10 loss to Colorado last week and must try to find a way to stop No. 2 Nebraska, which hasn't

missed a beat on the way to an 8-0 overall mark. In a recent 56-3 win over Kansas State, Nebraska played 105 players. Seventeen different players rushed with the ball and eight different players scored.

THE CORNHUSKERS also are 4-0 in the Big 8 and are a 481/2-point favorite to earn a victory, which would give Tom Osborne his 146th coaching win. That would break the record of wins by a Big 8 coach shared by Osborne, ex-Oklahoma Coach Bud Wilkinson and

current Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer. Switzer also will try to join Osborne on top of the heap when his No. 1-ranked Sooners host Oklahoma

State Saturday. "We'll take the same attitude we took toward That lends itself to instance after Oklahoma (in a 56-3 loss)," Walden said. "We'll play as hard as we can, see the fun of it, compare ourselves, measure up and try to improve a little bit." Osborne complimented Iowa State's effort this

"As the games have gone on they've gotten worn down a little bit. It's a little misleading to say they don't have any talent. They do have some talent. They're just

a little short of numbers." Nebraska is typically Nebraska. Six backs, including quarterback Steve Taylor, have rushed for 200 or more yards and all average at least 5.4 yards per carry.

I-Back Keith Jones leads with 650 yards and Taylor has added 455. Taylor also has passed for 802 yards and 13 touchdowns. "With my personnel, nothing's easy to defend,"

Walden said. "Power's power. They do more things on offense than Oklahoma does. It will probably be harder for us. They're just as physical and they make us cover more formations.

"In some ways it will be harder to try to stop that freight train."

Iowa State's best bet to hold the score down will be to hold on to the ball itself. The Cyclones have been able to move the ball fairly consistently, although Walden was not pleased with the effort against Colorado. Joe Henderson has blossomed this year and ranks

second among league rushers with 104.75 yards a game. Nebraska's Jones is third with 92.86 yards an outing. ISU quarterback Brett Sadek has become more comfortable with Walden's offense and wide receiver Dennis Ross ranks second in conference pass receiving

with 4.75 catches a game. Walden knows it will be tough to move against the Cornhusker defense, which ranks second in the Big 8, allowing 253.8 yards a game.

Cubs' Dawson picked as AP player of year

ICAGO (AP) — Andre Dawson, who skyrocketed to the top of the batting charts after thrusting himself on the Chicago Cubs last spring, Thursday was named The Associated Press Player of the Year.

The best player in major league baseball this year, in the opinion of sports writers and broadcasters who were asked to decide the honor, finished the season batting .287 with a majorleague high 137 RBI. Only Oakland's

total of 49. In Dawson's 10 previous full seasons with Montreal, his best power numbers were 32 homers and 113 RBI in 1983.

Mark McGwire matched his home run

"I never expected a season like this. It's the kind of year you can only dream about," he said in a telephone interview

from his Florida home. "It all boils down to getting off to a good start, getting your momentum, your adrenalin going," added the 33-year-old

outfielder, who felt it was something a player has to do for himself. With Dawson tearing up opposing pitchers and former Cy Young award

Andre Dawson winner Rick Sutcliffe off to a fast start, the Cubs contended for the National League East title. But the club began June with a swoon. By September, Manager Gene Michael resigned and General Manager Dallas Green resigned a month later.

The Cubs again finished at the bottom of the NL East with a 76-85 mark despite Dawson's outstanding play. Dawson receieved 80 votes from a nationwide poll of writers and broadcasters prior to postseason play to beat Toronto outfielder George Bell, who received 42 votes after hitting 47

homers and driving in 134 runs.

"I don't have any reason to think there would be (NCAA-ordered forfeits), because it's a situation where the staff had no knowledge or reason to suspect violations," Elliott

Members of the committee investigating the report are Leo Davis, chairman of the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics, and David Vernon, a university law professor.

Davis and Vernon were members of the committee which looked into the connection between Ronnie Harmon and Walters last spring.

Julia Davis, the other member of the committee from the spring, is no longer a member of the Iowa faculty.

The committee asked Kevin Harmon to be interviewed last spring, but Harmon declined, Elliott said. The athletic director said a staff person talked to Kevin Harmon at that time.

"In my opinion, Kevin has had absolutely no dealing with agents," Elliott said.

Elliott said Harmon may have received benefits indirectly from an agent through his brother or another party. Former Iowa player Devon Mitchell also was Walters' client.

FRY DEFENDED his leading rusher.

"Certainly, I am definitely of the same opinion that no wrong has been done and that Kevin is innocent," Fry said.

Fry also said he attended a meeting Thursday with Elliott and the university committee that is investigating the matter.

"I'm very relieved," said Fry. "I certainly feel like that Kevin did not intentionally do anything wrong, did not have direct contact with the socalled agents."

Fry said media reports about Harmon have been frustrating as his team prepares for Saturday's game.

"We just have to sit back to see what the NCAA and the Big Ten people, what conclusion they come to after they see the reports" from Iowa. "At this point I certainly feel good about it."

MARTIN RAUCH, Ronnie Harmon's agent, said Wednesday Kevin may have received money for an airline ticket through Mitchell for a trip from St. Louis to Iowa.

Harmon, who met with the committee Thursday, will remain a member of the team while the investigation continues, Elliott said. A university statement issued Thursday said "an announcement will be made as soon as possible

Bowls, NCAA take wait and see attitude

he NCAA is waiting on the University of Iowa, and the bowls

are waiting on the NCAA. That was part of the scenario Thursday concerning the Kevin Harmon case, as university officials continued their investigation into whether the Hawkeye football player received

illegal benefits from an agent in 1985 or 1986. If Harmon did break NCAA rules, Iowa must declare him ineligible. And if the NCAA decides that Iowa must forfeit games for using an ineligible player this season, the Hawkeyes' status as a bowl contender would be jeopardized.

"It's the institution's obligation to declare an athlete ineligible," Janet Justus, the NCAA's assistant director of eligibility, told The Gazette.

Justus said she could not comment specifically on Harmon, but said the NCAA is aware of the situation.

Harmon reportedly received \$350 and airplane tickets from New York agent Norby Walters. But according to Iowa athletic director Bump Elliott, Harmon might have received the benefits through his older brother, Ronnie, and through Devon Mitchell, two former Hawkeyes who had dealings with Walters.

"If the money were not given directly to the student-athlete . . . Hmmm," said Justus, wondering how that might affect an athlete's eligibility.

If Iowa does suspend Harmon, the school can then appeal that suspension to the NCAA. "We do try to move it more quickly" when an appeal is made in-season, said Justus.

"We can do it in a few days," she said. Teryl Austin, a defensive back at the University of Pittsburgh, regained his eligibility earlier this season when he repaid an agent, sat out two games and cut his ties with the agent.

MEANWHILE, OFFICIALS of three bowl games that are looking at Iowa said they are obligated to obey NCAA rulings. If forfeits leave the Hawks with a losing record, they'd be ineligible for bowls.

"We're guided by the jurisdiction of the NCAA," said A.F. "Bud" Dudley, executive director of the Liberty Bowl. "If the NCAA saw fit to make them forfeit those games, we'd have to abide by that ruling." Officials from the Peach and All-American bowls offered similar

"Regardless of the record on the field, it would be their official record," said Bill Oakley of the All-American. "You have to win more games than you lose to go to a bowl.

"We like Iowa," added Oakley. "This is strictly an intra-university and intra-NCAA matter."

Robert Dale Morgan of the Peach Bowl said, "We comply with NCAA rules, just like institutions have to. "If they are eligible to go to a bowl game under NCAA rules, they

will remain on our list." Representatives from the Peach, Liberty, All-American and

Freedom bowls are expected to attend Iowa's game at Northwestern on Saturday.

Elliott said the school had been in touch with both the Big Ten and NCAA. "They're waiting for the university's investigation," he said. Asked if Harmon could repay any

money allegedly received from Walters and retain his eligibilty, as was the case with a Pittsburgh player earlier this year, Elliott declined to speculate.

"I don't know at this moment," Elliott said. "That may come out of working with the NCAA."

"It's a little stiff today," Bayless said of his right knee Tuesday after one workout. "But as I got up this morning and walked around, it loosened up."

Also available is fourth-string running back Chet Davis, a transfer from Syracuse who has carried six times for 25 yards this year.

Four bowl scouts are expected at Dyche Stadium for the 1 p.m. kickoff. Representatives of the Freedom, Liberty, Peach and All-American bowls said they will attend the game. The Hawks still have a remote shot at the Rose Bowl, but need help from teams playing league-leaders Michigan State and Indiana.

"Iowa is still in the thick of the conference race," said Wildcat Coach Francis Peay. "They realize, as we do, that they must play well to remain a title contender. Our problems are compounded because they're a good football team that's determined, with a lot of talent."

The Hawks are 3-2 in the Big Ten, tied for third with Michigan and Ohio State. Northwestern is 1-4 in the league, sitting alone in ninth place.

Running back isn't the only

question mark for the Hawkeyes this week. Defensive tackle Steve Thomas injured a leg in the 29-21 win over Indiana last week and is doubtful for the Wildcats. Myron Keppy will replace Thomas in the starting lineup.

Fry is still deciding between Marv Cook and Dan McGwire as his punter. Cook kicked four times for a 43-yard average last week in his first action of the year. McGwire last punted in high school, and averaged more than 40 yards per kick his final two prep seasons.

Northwestern hasn't beaten Iowa since 1973.

"They've still got the same problems," Fry said. "They don't have great numbers in depth. If someone's hurt, there's an obvious drop-

Yet the Wildcats battled Iowa to the finish last year, with the Hawks sneaking out a 27-20 victory.

"It's very easy to show players on film last year's game and how well they played us," Fry said.

In a 45-33 Wildcat loss to Minnesota this year, the two teams combined for more than 1,100 yards in offense and seven fourth-quarter touchdowns.

Bill Russell starts his career with the Sacramento Kings tonight, 10 years after his previous coaching job with Seattle and with a light year's difference in attitude.

The Celtics won 11 championships in Russell's 13 years as a player, but Russell knows it's difficult to translate skill as a player into coaching skill.

Navy's Robinson to sign with NBA's Spurs

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Former Navy center David Robinson, who has kept mum his NBA plans for six months, will sign with the San Antonio Spurs today, team officials said.

Robinson, the Spurs' No. 1 draft choice, still has a two-year commitment in the Navy, but the team is eagerly awaiting his help for the future.

Spurs Chairman Angelo Drossos said Robinson's signing is scheduled for today in the Convention Center Arena, and will be open to the public.

"It's all just falling into place," said Drossos, who has been talking with Robinson and his agent for the past 10 days.

Coach Bob Weiss said he spoke with Robinson in September when the 7-foot-1 All American and his ately. family received a red-carpet tour of the city. Robinson, The Associated Press' College Player of the Year last season, had not committed to the NBA team, but Weiss thought Robinson could be signed.


"When he did leave, I felt he was open-minded and if he was open-minded I knew Angelo could get it done," Weiss said.
