All's not well in Columbus

erhaps this is not the greatest of weeks to visit Columbus, Ohio, but Iowa's football team must.

The Hawkeyes and Buckeyes play a Big Ten football game there Saturday, or at least Ohio State fans hope there will be two teams playing.

Buckeye backers are buzzing after watching Ohio State lose back-to-back games to Michigan State and Wisconsin. Their team is in danger of finishing with a nonwinning record for the first time in 21 years, and they're not amused.

George Strode is the sports editor of the Columbus Dispatch. He is someone who is in position to have a pulse on not only the Ohio State football team, but the thousands who back it.

The pulse is up, and rising. After the Buckeyes lost a home game to Michigan State two Satur

days ago, Strode received about 50 letters from Dispatch readers. Only one, he said, was in support of Coach Earle Bruce and his players.

The Buckeyes self-destructed in Wisconsin three days ago, losing to a Badger team that had won two games - against Hawaii and Ball State — and had lost five previous Big Ten games. On its eight secondhalf possessions in Madison, Ohio State had six turnovers and Matt Frantz missed two field goals, including a 22-yarder.

Many thought Bruce made a mistake by using a sweep on the play preceding Frantz's chip shot, thereby forcing his kicker to try from a severe angle. But perhaps Bruce's biggest "mistake" was following Woody Hayes.

Strode was beaten to work Monday morning by 10 letters to the editor. He also got word of someone who had hung Bruce in effigy in a front yard on the west side of Columbus, so he sent a photographer to the scene.

"Every letter I've gotten has been against Bruce except one," Strode said. "Several obviously have suggested he quit. One suggested he and (OSU Athletic Director) Rick Bay ride out of town together."

This is not the first time fans have been after Bruce, the former Iowa State coach. It's a shame, since Bruce has won 80 of 106 games at Ohio State and at least of a share of four Big Ten titles.

Bruce's worst season in Columbus has been a measly 9-3, achieved six times. He's also had 11-1 and 10-3 marks.

This is an Ohio State team that was an overwhelming favorite to win the Big Ten title. It also was picked No. 2 in the Sporting News preseason Top 20.

Expectations always are high in Columbus, but maybe even higher this season. So now the natives are even more restless.

"Football's a religion in this town. It's not a game," Strode said. "I don't care who the coach is, it's a winless situation."

Bruce is in the second year of a three-year contract. Bay refused comment to reporters in Madison last weekend and he hasn't commented this week about the team.

After meeting Iowa, OSU closes at Michigan. The Wolverines have beaten Ohio State the past two

"They're 5-3-1 right now and if they win their last two, I'd think Earle would be OK," Strode said. "But if he loses the last two, it may be a different matter. He's lost to Michigan the past two years and anybody knows that's not good for an Ohio State coach.

"It's hard for a lot of people to believe this has happened. I think this week it'll be a question of whether (OSU players) can get their dobbers up. It wasn't a loss at Wisconsin, it was a catastrophe."

Parting shot

 Organizers of the Coca-Cola Bowl, formerly know as the Mirage Bowl, considered inviting Iowa and Kansas State to the 1988 football game but did not chose them.

The game is played in Japan. One Iowa official said last weekend there had been talk with Coca-Cola Bowl people of moving the Iowa-at-Kansas State game to December 1988. The Iowa-KSU contest is scheduled Sept. 10, 1988. officials apparently were willing to pursue an invitation. Had the deal been worked out, lowa would have started its 1988 season in Hawaii and ended it in Japan.

Harmon gets NCAA green light

Hawkeye back cleared for remainder of year

IOWA CITY — Iowa running back Kevin Harmon, although guilty of poor judgment, did not violate National Collegiate Athletic Association rules in his association with a sports agent and can remain on the football team, Iowa officials said Monday.

Athletic Director Bump Elliott, in a statement issued Monday, said Harmon was cleared by the NCAA and Big Ten after a review of an investigation conducted by the university.

Harmon, a senior, was linked to sports agent Norby Walters in an arbitrator's decision issued last week in a contract dispute between Walters and Kevin's brother, Ronnie.

The report, by arbitrator John Culver, stated

Kevin Harmon received \$350 and airline tickets

from Walters. The university's investigation found no evidence that Kevin received \$350 from Walters, contrary to the Culver report. But it did find that on two occassions, Kevin received airline tickets from Ronnie, at least one of which was paid for

by money supplied by Walters. In addition, the committee found that Kevin Harmon used a plane ticket purchased by teammate Devon Mitchell, a client of Walters', using money supplied by the agent.

"(THE BIG TEN AND NCAA) have confirmed to me that they see no violation of Big Ten or NCAA rules or regulations by Kevin Harmon, and see no problem that would jeopardize his eligibility for athletics at the University of Iowa,' Elliott said in the statement.

"While suggesting that on a few occassions he displayed poor judgement, the NCAA and Big Ten concluded that Kevin Harmon did not commit any violations," Elliott said.

Harmon was given the OK to play against Northwestern last week by the Big Ten, pending the outcome of the NCAA's review of the case.


Wayne Duke, commissioner of the Big Ten, and Steve Horton of the Legislative Services Office of the NCAA reviewed the Harmon case and agreed with the university's findings.

Professors David Vernon and Leo Davis made up the university committee investigating the incident.

Vernon said Monday it was primarily a case of older brother giving money to younger brother. "I think he (Kevin) should have been more careful, but to take money from your brother

does not seem to be the problem," Vernon said. Among the material reviewed by the Big Ten and NCAA was a report written by Vernon and Davis and sent to Interim President Richard Remington.

The report, a part of which was obtained by The Gazette, said Kevin Harmon purchased an airline ticket from St. Louis to Cedar Rapids with Please turn to page 2C: Harmon



Gibbons, Cyclones confident

Top returnees, tough schedule excite ISU coach

confident and relaxed wrestling coach who met members of the media Monday afternoon at Iowa State's Hilton Coliseum?

Is this the same person who, just three short years ago while being introduced as Iowa State's fourth head coach, was an uncomfortable and somewhat shy 26-yearold?

It's amazing what a couple of years and a national championship can do for a guy.

Jim Gibbons enters his third year as the Cyclone wrestling boss confident and excited.

"We're pretty excited for a couple of reasons," Gibbons said. "Our home schedule (which includes lowa, Penn State and Oklahoma State) . . plus we have a pretty tough away schedule. It'll be a pretty tough test all of the

"AND THE PEOPLE we have coming back are good. It's exciting to have two NCAA champions returning."

Gibbons returns four all-Americans in Iowa State's quest for a second straight NCAA championship. Defending champions Tim Krieger, at 150 pounds, and Eric Voelker, at 190, are the keys to the Cyclones' success in many ways.

Krieger compiled a 29-0 mark last season and Voelker won 24 of 28 matches with two ties.

The other returning all-Americans are junior Jeff Gibbons, who was third at 134 last year, and senior Mike VanArsdale, a two-time NCAA placewinner who redshirted last season.

Schmidt, Ripken ink multi-million dollar contracts

NEW YORK (AP) - Mike Schmidt and Cal Ripken Jr. agreed to multimillion-dollar, multi-year contracts minutes before a midnight deadline to file for free agency, while 18 other players became free agents Monday, raising the total to 76.

Schmidt and the Philadelphia Phillies apparently reached agreement on a two-year contract worth \$4.5 million. Ripken and the Baltimore Orioles also settled after talking during the day about a two-year contract for about \$1.7 million.

Juan Berenguer of the World Series champion Minnesota Twins, Detroit's Frank Tanana and Houston's Jose Cruz were among those filing for free agency. Last year, 79 players declared free agency but only Andre Dawson and Lance Parrish changed teams before

the season started. ALSO, PITCHERS JEFF REARDON of Minnesota and Greg Harris of Texas and infielder Alfredo Griffin of Oakland officially demanded trades Monday. Midnight was the deadline for making that move, which,

like declaring free agency, is often a negotiating tool. Others declaring for free agency Monday were pitchers Tommy John of the New York Yankees, Joaquin Andujar of Oakland, Ed Lynch and Dickie Noles and infielder Manny Trillo of the Chicago Cubs; pitcher Mike LaCoss, outfielder Eddie Milner and utilityman Joel Youngblood of San Francisco; outfielder Ken Griffey and infielder Graig Nettles of Atlanta; utilityman Jamie Quirk of Kansas City; pitcher Mark Clear of Milwaukee; outfielder Ken Landreaux of Los Angeles; pitcher Moose Haas of Oakland, and pitcher

Greg Minton of California. Cincinnati catcher Bo Diaz, infielder Ed Romero of Boston, Baltimore outfielder Jim Dwyer, infielder Mickey Hatcher of Los Angeles, pitchers Dave Schmidt of Baltimore and Jim Gott of Pittsburgh, each of whom was eligible for free agency, re-signed with their teams Monday.


Hawkeyes' Hartlieb Player of the Week

CHICAGO (AP) - Quarterback Chuck Hartlieb of Iowa has been named Midwest Player of the Week on

Hartlieb, a 6-foot-3, 205pound junior from Woodstock, Ill., completed 25 of 32 passes for 471 yards and 7 touchdowns, the latter one over the previous Big Ten record shared by Iowa's Chuck Long and Illinois' Dave Wilson.

His performance against Northwestern moved Hartlieb into the No. 2 spot in NCAA Division I passing proficiency. He has completed 150 of 221

passes this season for 2,194 yards and 16 touchdowns. He's also 21st in Division I total offense, with an average of 210.2 yards a game.

Another Flint cager set to join Cyclones

Johnny Orr's pipeline to Flint, Mich., has not run dry.

Justus Thigpen Jr., a 6-foot-2 guard from Flint Northern High School, has made a verbal commitment to attend Iowa State. He plans to sign a national letter of intent during the early signing period that begins Wednesday.

Two of Orr's greatest players at ISU — Barry Stevens and Jeff Grayer — are both from Northwestern High School in Flint, but the Cyclone coach hadn't tapped the area since Grayer signed in 1984.

Thigpen is the son of Justus Thigpen Sr., a former college basketball star at Weber State who played briefly with the Detroit Pistons of the NBA in 1972-73.

Justus Jr. didn't crack Northern's starting lineup until midway through last season, but when he did Northern embarked on a 13-

game winning streak and reached the semifinals of the Class A state tournament. The team finished with a 22-5 record.

Thigpen averaged 16 points during the winning streak, and finished with a 9-point scoring average for the year.

"I really think Justus is one of the most underrated players in the state this year because he didn't have the stats," said Flint Northern Coach Randy Hodges. "A lot of people are going to be surprised at how good a player he is."

Two of Thigpen's teammates at Flint Northern last year signed with Big Ten Conference teams. Curtis Cuthpert, a 6-8 forward, is at Iowa. and Demetrius Calip, a 6-1 guard, went to Michigan.

Hodges said Thigpen picked Iowa State over Texas, Louisiana Tech and Central Michigan.

Gazette sportswriter AMES — Gary McCall will have to wait a little longer for his chance to return to the spotlight. The two-time state high school wrestling champ out of Cedar Rapids Washington has had to wait two long previous years for his chance to

be a top collegiate wrestler. First, after becoming Washington's first twotime titlist, McCall signed a letter-of-intent with Lousiana State, an up-and-coming program in the college wrestling world. A few weeks later LSU dropped its program.

So McCall headed for Iowa State with hopes of earning a spot in the Cyclones' line-up. He compiled a 12-7-1 record as a true freshman, but wasn't in the line-up when the Big 8 and NCAA tournaments rolled around.

Last year, McCall took his red-shirt year and hoped to gain experience wrestling unattached. A groin injury put an end to those hopes and a 7-2 record was all he was able to compile.

The favorite at 126 pounds according to Cyclone Coach Jim Gibbons, McCall was ready to make his move this year. But a separated elbow

suffered while drilling with a teammate in practice several weeks ago has prolonged McCall's move once

Still, he keeps his chin up.

"It's kind of set me back a bit, but it's not like I'm out all season," McCall said during ISU's media day Monday. "I'll be back.

"I wish I would have wrestled in the national tournament by now or the Big 8. But I'll be all

McCall missed just one dual meet during his high school career.

"That's what's kind of frustrating," he said. "But I try to look at it humorously. I'm getting all my injuries out of the way."

McCall is continuing to do condition work and

hopes to be back on the mat by the start of Christmas break. At the same time, Iowa transfer Steve Knight will be eligible and also competing


"It's tough to get in the line-up, but if you make this line-up, you're one of the best in the country," McCall noted.

are juniors should help his seniors.

"We have five or six seniors that have not probably fulfilled their goals and aspirations coming in," Gibbons said. "When you have juniors as returning all-Americans and seniors in the same room, it kind of puts a fire under the seniors. That's what we are counting on."

The seniors Gibbons is counting on are Perry Summitt at 118, Joe Ghezzi and Murray Anderson at 142, Bill Tate at 158 and Andy Cope at heavyweight.

Ghezzi compiled a 19-8-1 mark last year, but underwent knee surgery last March and missed the NCAA meet. Tate was a Big 8 champ two years ago, but had academic problems at the start of last year then couldn't beat out NCAA champ Stewart Carter. Cope has qualified for three NCAA meets, but has yet to place.

If Gibbons had to pick a starting lineup today, he said redshirt freshman Sean Watt or true freshman Dan Knight would be at 118, Summitt at 126, Jeff Gibbons at 134, Ghezzi or Anderson at 142, Krieger at 150, Tate at 158, redshirt sophomore Jeff Kelly at 167, VanArsdale at 177, Voelker at 190 and Cope at heavyweight.

Gibbons expects Summitt to move down to 118 before too long and Iowa transfer Steve Knight and ex-Cedar Rapids Washington standout Gary McCall to battle at 126 once the second semester begins. Knight won't be eligible due to

transfer rules and McCall recently dislocated his elbow and is out for five to six weeks.

Gibbons also said not to be surprised if Dan Knight sees some action this year. Knight was one of the most celebrated high school seniors in the country last year after winning all 128 of his prep matches and four Iowa state titles at Clinton.

Knight missed the summer freestyle season, however, due to shoulder surgery in the spring.

"We talked about the possibility of red-shirting him, but he wants to compete," Gibbons said. "Because he missed the summer season, he's chomping at the bit to get out

GIBBONS SAID this year will be more fun because he now knows what it takes to win an NCAA title. He doesn't want to get stuck in a rut, however.

"I don't ever want to get in a situation where I'm doing the exact same thing on Jan. 15 every year. We're trying to improve as coaches and the guys see that and try to improve as athletes.

"The season is six or seven months long . . . you need three good months of training . . . a lot of the other is down time. It's what you do mentally and emotionally to keep the guys up that's important.

"Now that we've had success the want to keep it because it's fun. I don't think we are spoiled by it . . yet. And as soon as I see it I'm going to respond."

money Walters supplied to Mitchell. "This was the only thing that came about" not directly tied with Ronnie, Vernon said. "In no way can it be inferred as Norby Walters'

attempt to sign Kevin" to a contract. The money given to Mitchell may be what the Culver report meant when it referred to the \$350 paid Kevin Harmon, Vernon said.

"I don't want to say the Culver report was inaccurate," Vernon said. "If you pay money to 'X' who in turn pays 'Y', I suppose you could infer payment was made."

THE COMMITTEE ALSO said Ronnie Harmon supplied Kevin with airline tickets on two occassions, at least one of which was paid for with money given Ronnie by Walters.

One ticket was for Kevin to return to his home in New York for spring break in 1986. The other ticket was for part of the trip in which Mitchell became involved in the fall of 1985, the report said.

One of the items in the Culver report indicated Walters' company, World Sports and Entertainment (WSE), provided Ronnie Harmon and members of his family with concert tickets.

The university committee said Ronnie provided Kevin with one concert ticket, in the spring of 1986. "I see it as one brother helping

another brother. That's about it," Vernon said. Vernon and Davis were assisted in their investigation by Ann M.
