# Victim's group leader assails U of I policies

IOWA CITY — The director of a victim's advocacy group said in a letter to University of Iowa officials this week that they must take strong disciplinary action against students who commit violence against other people.

Karla Miller, director of the Rape Victim Advocacy Program, said she wrote the letter partly because she was displeased with the university's response so far to Iowa football player Keaton Smiley's case.

Smiley, a defensive back sitting out this year with a red-shirt while he clears his legal troubles, has admitted striking a woman in his apartment last summer and has pleaded guilty to aggravated assault. He is to be sentenced Nov. 24.

In response to questions about Smiley last month, U of I officials said they cannot take disciplinary action against students for acts that are committed off campus. The officials said they cannot comment on specific criminal cases involving students because of the students' right to privacy.

"The lack of a statement and corresponding policies of any kind by anyone on or off campus fosters an attitude of helplessness and vulnerability in those victimized, and in those who see such victimization occurring," Miller said in her letter. She sent the letter to interim U of I President Richard Remington, Vice President for Student Services Philip Hubbard, Athletic Director Bump Elliott, members of the Iowa Board in Control of Athletics, coaches, the Student Senate and fraterni-

"The issue here is violence," she said. "It is perpetuated by silence and a refusal by many people, not restricted to the university, to take every avenue of recourse available to end the violence."

Smiley's trial on an assault charge involving another woman is to be held Monday in Johnson County District Court. Smiley has denied the allegations in the charge, assault causing injury, which was filed in connection with an incident at an Iowa City bar in May 1986.

# Bettendorf nips Dowling for Class 4A grid crown

CEDAR FALLS — Bettendorf capped a memorable evening for Coach Merv Habenicht by beating West Des Moines Dowling, 7-6, Friday night to win the Class 4A state football championship.

Clint Watkins scored secondranked Bettendorf's only touchdown on a 1-yard run midway through the third quarter, Augie Gutierrez kicked the extra point and the Bulldogs held off Dowling at the end to finish 12-0.

Habenicht, who has been at Bettendorf 27 years, also guided the Bulldogs to the 1981 championship. He was inducted into the Iowa High School Football Coaches Hall of Fame at halftime of Friday night's

Fifth-ranked Dowling (10-2) has been in the playoffs 13th times but

has never won a championship. Dowling's Bob Cataldo threw a 36-yard touchdown pass to Marcus Bumpus with 1 minute, 54 seconds left. A two-point try failed.

# Panthers doggedly pursue a victory against Salukis

dog which resembles a greyhound, but has long ears and silky hair. Southern Illinois' Salukis are a modern-era football team which has so far sent Northern Iowa's Panthers to the dogs.

The fifth-ranked Panthers have never beaten SIU, and need a victory tonight at 7 in the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls to grab a pair of bonus prizes.

A victory would assure UNI (6-3) an NCAA Division I-AA playoff berth and a share of the Gateway Conference title. If the Panthers fail, they have one league contest remaining, hosting Illinois State next

Southern Illinois, which is 5-0 against UNI since the series began in 1965, is 3-7 this season and 2-3 in the Gateway.

"If we can't win against teams in the second division in our league, we don't belong in the playoffs," said UNI Coach Darrell Mudra. "It's nice to say we're in position for some good things. We've worked hard, and almost every player has been watching film this week in our office. I've never seen more kids up

here looking at film."


Reminded often of UNI never having beaten the Salukis, Mudra said, "Well, never is a long time."

UNI remained the Gateway leader at 4-0, thanks to a 17-13 escape last week at Southwest Missouri State. SIU snapped a five-game losing streak against Eastern Illinois last week, winning 32-27 with a touchdown in the final minute.

The Salukis come to the Dome without red-shirt freshman quarterback Fred Gibson, who had led the team since the second game of the season. He suffered a rib injury against EIU and didn't make the trip this week. And, leading receiver Wesley Yates, who went down last week with a punctured intestine, remains hospitalized.

Senior quarterback Pat King replaces Gibson, and senior Bobby Sloan fills in for Yates.

"Northern Iowa definitely has an added incentive for this game," said SIU Coach Ray Dorr. "This is a championship game for them. We're a patchwork group, having players injured throughout the season. One thing I know, is you can't keep Northern from scoring. They don't run a complicated offense or defense. They just play hard."

UNI senior place-kicker Kevin Mote will miss his second straight game, while nursing a strained back. Mudra said he has been "very pleased" with the progress of junior Danny Helmer, who booted a 54yard field goal last week in addition to two extra points.

The Panthers' main weapons fullback Carl Boyd and quarterback Mike Smith — continue to add to their statistical portfolio. Boyd is first in the league in scoring (84 points) and receiving (41 catches for 544 yards), and needs four rushing attempts to break Kelly Ellis' school career record (626).

## Hawk field hockey team opens defense of its national crown

IOWA CITY — The Big Ten champion University of Iowa field hockey team begins defense of its NCAA title Sunday in the 1 p.m. Mideast Regional final at Kinnick Stadium against either Big Ten runner-up Northwestern or Pac-10 champion Stanford.

The Hawkeyes, seeded third in the national field, drew a first-round regional bye.

Northwestern and Stanford meet today in the first round at Kinnick,

also at 1 p.m.

The same three teams comprised the regional field here a year ago. Northwestern blanked Stanford in the opener, 3-0, then lost a hardfought 2-1 decision to Iowa.

Iowa finished 8-0-2 in the Big Ten this fall, and is 16-3-2 overall. The

Hawkeyes and Northwestern played to 0-0 and 1-1 double-overtime ties during the regular season.

The Wildcats, 13-5-3 overall, finished 6-2-2 in the Big Ten. Stanford has a 10-5-1 record.

In other regional finals Sunday, top-seeded North Carolina (17-1) plays either Old Dominion (15-4-2) or Virginia (13-5) at Chapel Hill, N.C.; No. 2 Maryland (15-4-1) meets either West Chester (18-2-1) or Penn State (14-4-2) at West Chester, Pa.; and No. 4 Providence (18-0-3) faces either Massachusetts (11-5-3) or New Hampshire (10-6-1) at Durham, N.H.

The regional winners advance to the national championship playoff Nov. 21-22 on the campus of one of the four qualifiers.

The New York Yankees have purchased the contract of former Iowa State pitcher Troy Evers from Columbus of the Triple-A International League. Evers was 13-5 last year at Class A Fort Lauderdale.

BASKETBALL — Reserve center Darryl Dawkins was reactivated by the Utah Jazz Friday after an eight-day suspension without pay. Dawkins, who left Utah after the death of his estranged wife, was placed on indefinite suspension last Saturday. Dawkins was traded to the Jazz Oct. 8 by the New Jersey Nets . . . Harry Rusan, 77, one of the original members of the Harlem Globetrotters, died Monday at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit. Rusan was a 5-foot-7 forward who averaged nearly 20 points per game with the Globetrotters between 1934-39.

FOOTBALL — St. Louis Cardinals owner Bill Bidwill, after touring Baltimore and meeting with local officials Friday, said he saw nothing to rule out the city as a possible site should he decide to move his NFL team. Bidwill met separately with Gov. William Donald Schaefer and Mayor-elect Kurt L. Schmoke, and looked over the football facilities in suburban Baltimore as well as a proposed stadium site downtown . . . Tickets to the game between No. 1 Oklahoma and No. 2 Nebraska at Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 21 are selling for as much as \$200 on the scalpers' market. John Langbein, owner of The Ticket Exchange at Phoenix, Ariz., said Friday his classified advertisements in newspapers in Nebraska and Oklahoma have generated numerous calls from potential buyers . . . The Fiesta Bowl plans to match fourth-ranked Florida State against the loser of next week's showdown between top-ranked Oklakoma and No. 2 Nebraska, The Arizona Republic reported Friday. The newspaper, in a copyright story, said Oklahoma quickly voted in favor of the Fiesta Bowl, while Nebraska took four hours to decide they preferred the Florida Citrus Bowl. Both bowl games are on Jan. 1, the Fiesta in Tempe, Ariz., and the Citrus in Orlando . . . Veteran defensive tackle John Dutton has been released by the Dallas Cowboys, the team announced. Dutton, 36, in his 14th NFL season, had been replaced at starting left tackle by Kevin Brooks.

of embarrassment to Georgia Tech. "I tried to say 'no' but they kept telling me that it would be good for me and good for them. When I gave in, I knew I was doing something that wasn't right. I felt guilty and scared," he said.

"I admitted to taking the money because I felt that the only way to resolve this was to get it out in the open."

The school did not reveal the names of the sports agents or the amount of money involved, but The Atlanta Constitution reported in a copyright story that Ingram received at least \$4,000 from Jim Abernethy and Gary Wilson of Atlanta and signed a representation contract with them.

A representation contract gives an agent the right to represent the athlete when he turns professional. Rice said the school will not appeal to the NCAA to restore Ingram's eligiblity.

INGRAM, A NATIVE of Douglas, Ga., had 79 tackles in eight games this season. He batted .426 with 17 home runs and 99 runs batted in last spring for Tech's Atlantic Coast Conference champion baseball team.

Tech officials became aware of the violations Wednesday and questioned Ingram, Rice said. "He reported signing a contract in July with an agent and receiving money from the same agent."

"I'm very disappointed in Riccardo Ingram's behavior in this," Rice said, noting that Ingram had been counseled often about dealing with agents. "I'm also outraged at the socalled agents in the unethical and ruthless way they pursue young student-athletes."

He said Ingram's scholarship would not be revoked and school officials would encourage him to complete his academic work.

Ingram is the latest of several college football players to be declared ineligible for improper dealings with sports agents. A federal grand jury in Chicago is investigating the activities of two agents, Jorby Walters and Lloyd Bloom.



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
