### Drake's play against Iowa irks Garner

Drake's basketball players have begun paying the price for what Coach Gary Garner called "a poor, sloppy game" Tuesday night in a 70-59 loss at Iowa.

"We're going to practice so hard this week that it's going to be scary," Garner said Wednesday.

"The fact that we lost to Iowa doesn't necessarily surprise me because Iowa may not lose a game at home all season," Garner said. "But I'm baffled because we played so poorly."

Forward Walter James was a bright spot for the Bulldogs, He scored 22 points and grabbed five rebounds after opening the season with a 21 points and eight rebounds in a 70-67 victory over Minnesota.

Garner also liked the 10 rebounds center Bart Friedrick had against Iowa, and freshman Curtis Stuckey collected 12 points after a 10-point performance at Minnesota. But little else pleased the coach about Tuesday's game, and he said he may make some lineup changes before Saturday night's game against Iowa State at Veterans Memorial Auditorium.

He said Iowa State will be another difficult challenge, one reason being the ability of Cyclone forward Jeff Grayer.

"Grayer is the best player in the state," Garner said. "Iowa is a bigger, stronger team, but Iowa State is quicker."


Garner also said that guard Eric Berger, who broke a bone in his foot in October, returned to practice Wednesday.

"Berger had the foot X-rayed today, and the bone is completely healed," he said. "He's already been in my office three times today, telling me he thinks he can play against Iowa State. But I don't know if he'd be able to do that because his execution and timing must be rusty."

Garner said that he plans to use Berger, a 6-foot 2-inch junior college transfer, in the Heritage-Drake Classic Dec. 11-12, "and it could be he'd be ready even sooner than that."

Garner would like the luxury of an easy game so Berger could play a few minutes, but he doesn't expect to get that. After Iowa State, Drake plays Missouri here next Tuesday.

Hennings and Miami's Daniel Stubbs are among the three finalists for the Outland Trophy as the nation's top interior lineman.

The other three Oklahoma players selected to the first team are linebacker Dante Jones, defensive end Darrell Reed, and free safety Rickey Dixon.

# Born's late effort seals win for ISU

CEDAR FALLS, IA. - Iowa State junior guard Mike Born did his part to make sure the Cyclones did not join Northern Iowa's upset-of-the-year club Wednesday night.

Born had two key baskets for the Cyclones in the final 3 minutes as the Cyclones' offense became too much in an 80-75 non-conference victory before a crowd of 10,500, the first sell-out in the 11-year history of the UNI-Dome.

It was Cyclones' fourth win in five starts. The Panthers even their record at 1-1.

The 6-foot 1-inch guard popped a three-point field goal with 3 minutes 24 seconds left that put Iowa State ahead, 71-65. He then helped seal the game's outcome by scoring another three-point play with 57 seconds left.

Born said the Panthers got confused by ISU's switch into a motion offense. "I just took off, drove down the lane and the shot was there," Born

"I don't think it's any different than I've tried to play all year," Born said. "Any in-state rival I think you get fired up a little bit more than other schools," Born added. "It's hard sometimes not to get fired up for a Kansas or an Oklahoma or Purdue


but those [in-state] rivals, you always

get pumped up for those." Born said he was anxious to show his best stuff against the Panthers, because he was considering UNI after high school but plans with former UNI Coach Jim Berry fell through.

Born ended up at Nebraska-Omaha before transferring to ISU where he sat out last season.





# Orr blasts "lethargic" Gyclones

CEDAR FALLS, IA. - With a record crowd anticipating an upset, Iowa State rallied in the second half for an 80-75 intrastate basketball victory over Northern Iowa Wednesday night in the UNI-Dome.

Trailing at halftime, 34-27, Coach Johnny Orr's spirited halftime lecture brought the Cyclones to life and sent a sellout crowd of 10.500 home disappointed.

"What I said wasn't very nice." said Orr, whose team won its 12th straight game in the series and improved to 4-1. "This is the first time I've been mad at them this year. We were a little lethargic. For some reason, it's hard to get our guys up for UNI and take them seriously. But if UNI plays all season the way they did tonight, they'll win the Mid-Continent Conference."

Iowa State's comeback was reflected in its shooting percentage from the field - 42.9 in the first half, but 64.5 percent in the second half.

"I thought it was a very poor effort on our part in the second half," Northern Iowa Coach Eldon Miller said. "We were not strong with the basketball, we were careless and we didn't play defense with the kind of intensity we did in the first half." Jeff Grayer again paced the Cy-

clones offensively with 26 points, and drew rave reviews from Miller. "Grayer is the finest small forward

# Ex-ISU player to testify about agents

Register Staff Writer CEDAR RAPIDS, IA. — The investigation into activities of sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom apparently will resume in Chicago soon and include testimony by former University of Iowa and Iowa State football players.

Lester Williams, a former defensive end at Iowa State, confirmed Tuesday he has been subpoenaed to appear before a federal grand jury and expects to testify within the next couple of weeks.

Williams said he received his subpoena two months ago, but his appearance was delayed. "I haven't been given an exact day as yet, but it is my understanding that I will be going in soon," he said.

Williams is one of about 25 athletes who have either acknowledged or been identified as receiving money from the two agents while they were still in college.

Fraud Alleged

Those players, as well as Walters and Bloom, are under investigation for alleged fraud and tax evasion. The allegations stem from the agents' effort in 1985 to make clients of many

top college football players before they turned professional.

The agents are estimated to have spent as much as \$800,000 to induce players to become their clients, even though it violated NCAA rules. Among the athletes who received

money are Williams, former Iowa running back Ronnie Harmon, and former Hawkeye defensive back Devon Mitchell. Harmon received

more than \$50,000, and Mitchell got at least \$2,000 while at Iowa.

Two other former Iowa players, Robert Smith and Larry Station, have acknowledged they were approached by Walters at Iowa, but they have said they rejected his overtures.

Other athletes reportedly under investigation for fraud and tax evasion include Paul Palmer, former running back at Temple and now with the Kansas City Chiefs; William Clay, a defensive lineman at Missouri who now plays for the Los Angeles Raiders; and former Purdue defensive back Rod Woodson, now with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Williams has previously acknowledged receiving money while at Iowa State. On Tuesday, he estimated the amount at \$10,000.

Williams and former Cyclone all-America wide receiver Tracy Henderson were clients of the agents. But Henderson has denied receiving any money before he was kicked off the team in 1984.

Williams said he believes Harmon,



# Fort Dodge court sees return of a Goodman

The Goodman family once again is making a name for itself in Fort Dodge.

Just like it was some 22 years ago, there is a Goodman scoring big for 'the Dodgers' boys' basketball team, which The Des Moines Register ranked third in Class 3-A.

It was Tom in the mid-1960s who was the main shooter. He was so good, in fact, that he was a two-time all-state selection by The Register, including first-team in 1965 as a se-

The Goodman with the long-range touch on the present squad is Jay, Tom's son. And, as for Tom, he has come home as the Dodgers' new coach this season.

"I was watching the game the other night and it was like I was turning with." back the pages," said retired Fort Dodge Athletic Director Vernon "Dutch" Huseman, who coached Tom Goodman. "Tom was exceptionally quick ... one of the quickest players I've ever coached. But from what I've seen of Jay, he might be a "ep or so quicker."

Fort Dodge High School has a tradition of rarely discarding old uniforms. Thus, when Tom was hired, he retrieved one of the uniforms from his playing days and had replicas made for this year's team. It is no coincidence Jay is wearing his father's No. 22.
