## Tulane bids Brown farewell

#### Assistant takes over program after the game

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) — Tulane hopes to open the twoweek-long college football bowl season today against Washington by making Mack Brown's departure a happy one.

Brown, after three years of rebuilding at Tulane, becomes the coach at North Carolina with the final gun at the Independence Bowl, the first major college bowl of the season.

Greg Davis, assistant head

coach during those rebuilding years, was promoted Friday to head coach, effective at the end of the game.

Through his three years at Tulane, Brown established a reputation as a glib quipster, frequently masking the bitterness of defeat with humor. In that respect, at least, Davis appears a worthy successor.

"If we beat Washington, I will humbly accept credit," Davis joked. "If we lose, I will say, 'It's a shame Mack had to go out that way.' "

Tulane is 6-5, enjoying its first winning record in seven years and its first bowl appearance in eight years. Washington, 6-4-1, is making its ninth straight bowl appearance under Don James.

The game will be televised locally by USA cable network, starting at 7 p.m.

"THE LAST TIME I faced this guy he was a lame duck," James recalled, gesturing at Brown. "He was an assistant at Oklahoma and had already accepted the Tulane

"That was in the Orange Bowl

"Yeah, and you beat our brains out," Brown responded.

Washington fields an offensive line that averages 6-foot-5 and said.

290 pounds. Tulane's defensive front is two inches shorter and averages 245.

"They are the biggest people I have ever seen in my life," Brown

He said he thought about keeping his team at their hotel, instead of letting them go to joint functions with the Washington team. "We thought we might have some people leave after they saw how big they are, but we locked them in their rooms," he

Offensively, he said, Tulane will spread and go wide open, trying to make the option work with quarterback Terrence Jones to set up the passing game to All-American receiver Marc Zeno.

"Defensively, we'll never line up in the same place twice. We'll try to make it hard for them to find us," he said.

James had a concise scouting report on Jones. "He's too quick. He has too good an arm. He's too accurate, and Mack lets him run too much," he said.

# Payton will stay with Bears

CHICAGO (AP) - Retiring running back Walter Payton will remain with the Chicago Bears next year in a non-playing capacity, Bears president Michael

McCaskey said Friday. But McCaskey declined to specify what Payton's exact position would be.

McCaskey said he and Payton would announce later the National Football League team's plans for Payton, the NFL's all-time leading career rusher.

"It's a significant role," McCaskey said. "I've had a number of discussions with Walter. We've identified a role for him with the Bear organization that will do the Bears a lot of good and Walter a lot of good. It's with an eye toward his dream of eventually owning an NFL franchise."

Payton is scheduled to play his last home game with

the Bears on Sunday against the Seattle Seahawks. McCaskey asked fans to arrive at Soldier Field 15 minutes before the noon (Iowa time) kickoff for a brief ceremony honoring Payton. The team president said

there probably would be few speeches. "It's a real challenge," McCaskey said. "Here is a man who has been a giant. It's a struggle to find words to convey all he has meant to the team as a team member and with his excellent character off the field."

One thing the Bears will not do Sunday is retire Payton's No. 34 jersey officially, McCaskey said. The team president said No. 34 will be put on the

shelf, along with Gale Sayers' No. 40, but it might be issued to someone else in the case of an emergency. "I'd like to, if possible, not issue it unless we absolutely have to," McCaskey said.

But he pointed out that the Bears have officially retired nine numbers — the highest number in the NFL - and sometimes encounter problems because of league numbering rules.

The last Bears number officially retired was the No. 41 worn by Brian Piccolo before his death from cancer in 1970.

## Judge throws out Walters' lawsuit

ATLANTA (AP) — A federal judge Friday threw out agent Norby Walters' \$500,000 lawsuit against former Auburn football star Brent Fullwood, ruling invalid a contract Fullwood signed with Walters before finishing his college career.

"We decline to serve as paymaster of the wages of crime, or referee between thieves," U.S. District Judge Charles Brieant wrote in his ruling, released in White Plains, N.Y., and reported in today's combined editions of The Atlanta Journal and The Atlanta Constitution.

Walters had sued to recover \$8,042 he gave Fullwood in 1986 before the running back began his senior season. He also sought \$500,-000 because Fullwood dismissed him and hired another agent.

The 1986 payment violated National Collegiate Athletic Association rules, but Walters contended it was not illegal and maintained the contract should be enforced.

Walters has also sued former University of Iowa running back

Ronnie Harmon for breach of con-

Brieant's ruling said, "Both sides of the transaction knew exactly what they were doing, and they

knew it was fraudulent and wrong." Brieant's ruling defended NCAA rules prohibiting an agreement between college athletes and agents.

"The agreement reached by the parties here, whether or not unusual, represented not only a betrayal of the high ideals that sustain amateur athletic competition as part of our national educational commitment; it also constituted a calculated fraud on the entire spectator public," Brieant wrote.

"Every honest amateur player who took the field with or against Fullwood during the 1986 college football season was cheated by being thrown in with a player who had lost his amateur standing," the judge said.

"Obviously, it is not too encouraging," said Tony Pannacio, one of Walters' attorneys. "But we haven't seen the decision yet, so we'll

withhold comment until we do see

Walters maintained he has broken no laws and his contracts with the athletes should be enforced.

But attorney Richard Glickel, representing Fullwood, argued successfully that public policy should not allow such inducements by

Brieant agreed, saying that the observance of the NCAA constitution "is in the public interest of the citizens of New York state, and that the parties to those agreements knowingly betrayed an important, if perhaps naive, public trust."

Glickel said it was "the first time a court, state or federal, has ever upheld the constitution of the NCAA. I consider this a significant case, and I think the NCAA will,






