SPORTS BRIEFLY

BASKETBALL — Oklahoma guard Mookie Blaylock, who set three records for steals in his first season, has been named AP Big 8 newcomer of the year. Blaylock, a transfer from Midland, Texas, Junior College, has a Big 8-record 122 steals. He averages over 17 points and dished out 179 assists

. Temple coach John Chaney is the United States Basketball Writers Association's pick for college coach of the year for the second straight season. Chaney, in his sixth season at Temple, led the top-ranked Owls (29-1) to Atlantic 10 Conference regular season and tournament championships . . . UNLV 6-foot-6 junior guard Keith James will be lost for the duration of the NCAA tournament because of infectious mononucleosis, a team trainer said . . Norby Walters, a New York entertainment executive and sports agent, pleaded innocent to violating state law through his dealings with former Alabama basketball players Derrick McKey and Terry Coner. . . Speculation has it that Eddie Fogler of Wichita State and Lon Kruger of Kansas State are frontrunners for the University of Texas coaching position.

BASEBALL — Baseball's Playing Rules Commitee agreed to implement the new rules on the strike zone and balks on a one-year trial basis, a week after having rejected the same proposal . . . Baseball players lost up to \$90 million in salaries during 1986 and 1987 because of collusion by owners, according to a study commissioned by the Major League Baseball Players Association.

FOOTBALL — Instant replay, which began as a oneyear experiment in 1986, was approved for a third experimental year by NFL owners. The one major change this year makes the instant replay official a member of the regular game officiating crew. At the owners' meeting in Phoenix, Ariz., Chicago Bears Coach Mike Ditka said "the game is done" if other NFL teams follow the lead of the Washington Redskins and offer contracts like the \$6 million. five-year deal given to Bears linebacker Wilber Marshall. The NCAA has been rejected in an effort to get tapes from Sport magazine made in support of a November article alleging a coverup by University of Tennessee officials who were investigating the school's football program. **MISC.** — The U.S. Olympic Site Selection Committee likely will recommend Atlanta and Minneapolis-St. Paul as candidates for the 1996 Summer Olympics, the Atlanta Constitution and The Atlanta Journal reported . . . Auto speed king and motor sports innovator Mickey Thompson, 59, and his wife Trudy were ambushed and killed Wednesday by bicycling gunmen who invaded their hillside estate in Bradbury, Calif., in what deputies called "an assassination." As recently as Sunday, Thompson expressed fears for his life after receiving numerous death threats, friends and associates said.

For LaSalle's dream to continue, it must contend with stopping St. Albert's Falcons, a team boasting as much scoring balance as the Lancers.


