Bloom had entered innocent pleas earlier to two misdemeanor counts each of commercial bribery, violations of the state's deceptive trade practices act, and tampering with a sports event. But after talks between his attorney and state prosecutors, Bloom agreed to plead guilty to one deceptive trade practices charge. Two other counts were dismissed, and the three others will be dismissed after Bloom testifies at Walters' trial.

"I'm not going to be testifying against anyone," Bloom told the Associated Press. "I'm just going to be telling the truth, just as I would have anyway."

Bloom was given a one-year sentence but will have to serve only a week of it, with the rest suspended. The sentence requires him to wash state trooper cars from 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day while staying at the hotel of his choice.

# Majors May Sign Olympians

Commissioner Peter Ueberroth said major-league baseball teams may sign prospective Olympic players but will not pay them, so that they may maintain their eligibility for the Games. A similar arrangement was made in 1984, when the United States finished second in the eight-team Olympic tournament. Baseball, a demonstation sport in the 1984 Games, will be an official medal competition this year at Seoul.

### Jonsson to Remain an Islander

Islanders defenseman Tomas Jonsson has agreed to a new contract believed to be for two years. After seven seasons with the Islanders, Jonsson, 28, had considered returning to Sweden but his wife and family decided they wanted to stay here.

Greenwald noted that he was in college at Syracuse at the time and cut classes to watch on television because "the ballgame was too important to miss." Hutton said a high school pal brought a radio to class, and when the perfect game became a possibility, the teacher commandeered a TV set for the class.

In Saturday night's broadcast, Hutton provided a couple of noteworthy bits:

He noted a second hitter in the lineup is having a particularly good year when he bats .280 or more because he gives himself up at the plate so often when the leadoff hitter is on base.

He pointed out that a wild pitcher such as Bobby Witt is tough on the bullpen pitchers because he is in jams so often, they have to get up and down and throw too much.

On the other hand, he huckstered too long about the Daily News contest winner after a home run, lending misplaced emphasis to the money won in the contest over the central fact of the home run by the Yankee.

Greenwald called this, Chinese calendar style, "The Year of the Balk." When the pitcher faked a throw toward a runner on second base, he said, "Witt observed an old baseball axiom not to throw to a base that is not covered." Noting that the Yankees would give out umbrellas to customers the next day, he said, "The hope is you won't have to use it until after the game."

Amid the oft-turbulent Yankee scene, there is about Greenwald, in particular, the good-humored, rocking-chair easiness reminiscent of Red Barber in his best days with the Brooklyn Dodgers. If there is any thought of changing the radio team at Yankee Stadium, maybe it means that Capital Cities, the owner of WABC, still doesn't have the right people running the station.

### A bouquet to WWOR

WWOR did an excellent pregame telecast Sunday that was devoted entirely to the controversial Dave Pallone-Pete Rose incident late Saturday night. Steve Zabriskie and Tim McCarver interviewed all the principals except the umpires, who were not allowed to appear. That, league president A. Bartlett Giamatti, is a mistake. Umpires get the short end of it when they don't give the public their side of a dispute. At worst, if Pallone admitted he was at fault in not making a prompt call, he would have gained sympathy for owning up to his error.
