CLEVELAND — Rich Yett and Doug Jones combined on a sixhitter, and Andy Allanson hit a three-run homer in the eighth inning as the Cleveland Indians defeated the Chicago White Sox 6-2 Tuesday night for their sixth victory in the last seven games.

Yett (3-2) scattered five hits over 63/3 innings and Jones earned his sixth save with 21/3 scoreless innings. Chicago's runs were solo homers by Daryl Boston in the sixth inning and Dan Pasqua in the seventh, the fourth homer for each.

Jones replaced Yett after Fred Manrique tripled with two out in the seventh. He retired pinch hitter Mark Salas on a pop fly to short center field on which second baseman Julio Franco made a fine running catch.

Rookie Jack McDowell (2-4) was the loser despite pitching his first complete game in the majors.



# Rawley's gem a bright spot amid dark days for Phillies

AN FRANCISCO (AP) — Left-hander Shane Rawley's two-hit, 3-0 victory over the sluggish San Francisco Giants was a bit of gold in a leaden season for his Philadelphia

Rawley gave up hits to Candy Maldonado and Jose Uribe, and no Giant got past second base Monday night. He walked just one batter, struck out three and retired the Giants in order five

But Rawley's gem — featuring the fewest hits he has given up in his 11-year major league career - didn't do much to boost his team's lowly 13-21 record or their last-place standing in the National League East.

San Francisco's Rick Reuschel, pitching on his 39th birthday, had a season-high seven strikeouts before a season-low crowd of 6,278. But he also gave up eight hits in eight innings, four to Mike Schmidt and two to Chris James, and allowed sixth-inning home runs to James and Lance Parrish.

"He pitched a great game," said Giants Manager Roger Craig, "but we're still not hitting." We've tried everything - changing the lineup, taking extra batting practice, not hitting, talking. The offense will come, but we've got to keep waiting.'

RAWLEY, WHO has pitched for Seattle, the New York Yankees and Philadelphia, came into the game with a 4.11 earned run average. Until beating the Braves 10 days ago, he had lost 10 straight decisions back to last year.

Monday night's performance topped a threehitter against Los Angeles in 1985. But more importantly, it was his third straight good outing.

"I've had good stuff my last three times out," he said. "But the key for me is keeping the ball inside and mixing up my pitches."

And his pitching drew praise from Craig: "He wasn't overpowering, but he pitched smart and had great control."

Since joining the Phillies in 1984, Rawley is 43-19 under the lights and 10-18 in day games. Is Rawley influenced by the sunshine?

"Everybody asks me about that," he said. "I like warm weather, but for some reason I feel better at night. Actually, there is no reason."

The last time the Giants saw Rawley, they had only four hits but beat him 2-0 on Bob Brenly's two-out homer in the ninth inning last August. He won his 17th game of the season his next time, out but dropped his last five decisions of 1987 and his first five this year.

"I was able to stay ahead of the hitters. I had total command of my pitches and changed speeds well," Rawley said.

"I don't think I was due anything. I had to go out and earn it," he said.

Explaining the breakthrough for the shutout, his seventh in the majors, Rawley added, "The difference was that I was able to put all my pitches where I wanted. I had good stuff the last four or five times out, but my location was off."

It was a big night, too, for Schmidt, who went 4-for-4 and raised his career average against Reuschel to .429.

# 10,626 athletes from 125 nations already entered for Seoul

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) -Preliminary entries from 125 nations indicate nearly 11,000 athletes will compete in this year's Summer Olympics, making them by far the biggest Olympics ever, the organizers announced

Wednesday.

After the deadline for preliminary entries at midnight Tuesday, the Seoul Olympic Organizing Committee said those nations had reported a total of 10,626 athletes and 4,266 officials coming to Seoul.

> International Olympic Committee President Juan Antonio Samaranch has said the door still is open for them to enter such individual events as swimming and track and field at Seoul, but it is too late for them to enter team sports events such as soccer.

Some of the biggest preliminary

entries for the Games here came from Communist nations with which South Korea has no diplomatic relations and which boycotted the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles, after the United States and many of its allies boycotted the 1980 Games in Moscow in protest against the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan.

The Soviet Union said it would enter 625 athletes, East Germany's preliminary entry totaled 370, Hungary's 278, Bulgaria's 271, Poland's 270 and Czechoslovakia's

China, a Communist country that did compete at Los Angeles, is entering 322.
