Ditka urges St. Louis fans to adopt Bears

Chicago Bears Coach Mike Ditka came to St. Louis Tuesday to pitch his National Football League team to St. Louis fans, whose Cardinals moved to Phoenix over the winter.

"I know one thing," Ditka said at a news conference, "this is a great city that deserves a football team."

Ditka plugged the Bears during a news conference with Whitey Herzog, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, and a representative of Mayor Vincent Schoemehl who officially proclaimed Tuesday "Adopt The Bears

Day." The gathering was held at Herzog's Cafe & Biergarten, which is run by the same company that manages Ditka's restaurant in Chicago.

Herzog indicated that he was all for the new campaign urging St. Louis football fans "not to go into hibernation" but instead "adopt the Bears." 

Walters loan, Palmer contract with agent told

1988 Knight-Ridder Newspapers PHILADELPHIA, PA. - Paul Palmer's attorney said Monday the former Temple University football star accepted money from, and signed a contract with, agent Norby alters before his senior football season in 1986.

Matt Lydon, the lawyer, said Palmer, now a running back with the Kansas City Chiefs, received an interest-free cash loan of approximately \$5,000. Lydon also said that before Temple's first game in 1986, Palmer had signed a contract granting Walters NFL contract negotiation

Palmer now is a running back with the Kansas City Chiefs.

The admissions contradict the results of an investigation Temple conducted last year. On March 18, 1987, Athletic Director Charles Theokas said Palmer had received no money from Walters during the 1986 season and that neither Palmer nor Temple had violated NCAA rules, which prohibit such dealings.

An athlete may consult with an agent, but can't enter into an agreement, accept cash or discuss monetary arrangements before his or her eligibility has expired.

David Berst, the NCAA's director of enforcement, said disciplinary action against Temple was unlikely.

"Obviously, he was jeopardizing his eligibility and the team overall at the time," Berst said. "But after he's left the institution, there's really no action we can take."

Lydon said he was negotiating a settlement with the U.S. Attorney's office in which Palmer would avoid being indicted on federal charges of mail fraud, tax evasion and obstruction of justice. The negotiations are in Chicago, the site of a continuing investigation of Walters and his associ-

Lydon said that under the terms of such a settlement, Palmer would:

 Testify against Walters and Bloom in case of a trial; Perform approximately 100 to 250 hours of community service;

Reimburse Temple for the value

of his scholarship during his senior year — approximately \$8,000. Lydon said Palmer had repaid

Theokas had no comment Monday on Lydon's assertions. But H. Patrick Swygert, Temple's vice president for university administration, defended the school's efforts.

"We conducted an investigation with the resources that were available to us," he said. "We are an institution of higher education, not an investigatory body. We have no subpoena power at Temple University. We can't compel testimony and/or

documents." Palmer, who is due to report. Thursday to the Chiefs' training camp, could not be reached for comment.
