



Morgan State set to test UNI and Dome mystique

Register Correspondent CEDAR FALLS, IA. — It is Earle Bruce's turn to rub Northern Iowa football's magic lamp, known as the UNI-Dome.

Bruce and the Panthers make their 1988 home debut at 7 tonight against non-conference opponent Morgan State of Baltimore. Northern Iowa has won its last six

home openers. And the Panthers have won 27 of their last 29 regular-season games at the UNI-Dome. Bruce will coach his first game at home before an expected crowd of


were a passenger, Charles Steele, 73, of Brooksville, Fla., and the driver, whose name was not released. Three other passengers - Steele's

Eagles' Carter promises to aid case against agents

CHICAGO, ILL. (AP) - Philadelphia Eagles receiver Cris Carter pleaded guilty Friday to charges of mail fraud and obstruction of justice after agreeing to cooperate with prosecutors investigating illegal payments from sports agents to college athletes.

Carter, 22, a second-year pro who formerly played for Ohio State, entered the plea during his arraignment before U.S. District Judge Brian Duff. "As Cris told the court this morn-

ing, he pleaded guilty because he was in fact guilty," said Carter's defense attorney, David Bohan. "He regrets his involvement and wants to put this matter behind him," Bohan said. "He has agreed to coop-

tion . . . in any way." Bohan said he had advised Carter to refuse comment on his case until it had been settled.

Carter, who has started both regular-season games for Philadelphia, was released on a personal recognizance bond. The judge agreed to let him travel for Eagles' games.

The former Ohio State star was indicted last month along with New York-based agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom, who were charged

with mail fraud, racketeering, extortion and perjury. Agent Dave Lueddeke of Sherman Oaks, Calif., was also indicted. Walters and Bloom, scheduled to

go on trial Feb. 27, are accused of of-

fering college athletes cash, cars,

clothing and trips in exchange for signed agreements allowing the two agents to represent them in professional contract negotiations. They are accused of resorting to

threats when inducements of cash or goods failed. Carter's sentencing was tentative-

ly set for March 27, Assistant U.S. Attorney Howard Pearl said. "As part of the plea arrangement,

the government has agreed to inform the judge of the nature and the extent of his [Carter's] cooperation" before sentencing, he said. At his arraignment, Carter pleaded guilty to charges that he defrauded
