

OSU's Workman linked to agent, **TV report says**

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) - Ohio State running back Vince Workman signed with a sports agent and is likely to be ineligible for the rest of his senior season, a Columbus television station reported Tuesday night.

Workman signed with San Franscisco-based agent David Lueddekke sometime after his sophomore year at Ohio State, WBNS-TV said, citing unidentified sources close to a grand jury investigation of dealings by sports agents. Workman, the Buckeyes' starting tailback, declined to comment on the report after he returned to Columbus on Tuesday night from Chicago, where he testified before a federal grand jury investigating Lueddekke and agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom. WBNS said that Ohio State Athletic Director Jim Jones was shocked by the report and said if Workman had signed with an agent, he would be ineligible to play for the Buckeyes. "I have to talk with (Ohio State Coach John) Cooper and Jim Jones tomorrow and then talk to the press some time later," Workman said. Jones said after the report was broadcast at 11 p.m. EDT that he had not spoken with Workman since his return from Chicago and did not know of the allegation until it was reported by WBNS. He said he planned to question Workman about it today. "There was no way to know anything about this because it was a grand jury matter and was secret," Jones said. According to the report, Workman signed with Lueddekke after the 1986 season, in which he rushed for 1,030 yards. Workman led the Buckeyes rushing last season.
