Armstrong, Gill key pieces in lowa-Illinois puzzle

B.J. Armstrong and Kendall Gill will have two of the best seats in the house tonight at Assembly Hall when Iowa visits Illinois in Big Ten basketball. How long they stay in them might decide who

Armstrong, Iowa's star guard, is nursing a sore left

leg. Gill, his counterpart at Illinois, is returning to action tonight after missing six weeks with a broken

Neither will start.

Tipoff is scheduled for 9 p.m. on ESPN (cable channel 14 in Cedar Rapids).

Armstrong, who missed last Saturday's loss at Michigan, did not rejoin the club until Tuesday night after attending the funeral of a family member in

Tennessee. "I'm sure he's going to play tomorrow night," lowe Coach Tom Davis said after practice, although he

said he didn't know how much.

Freshman Brian Garner will start in place of Armstrong. But as Illinois Coach Lou Henson noted, "They're not the same team without him."

Gill hasn't played since breaking a bone in his foot Jan. 22 in a victory over Georgia Tech. He practiced Monday for the first time.

"He looked good yesterday," Henson said Tuesday. "We're going to play him as much as we can." Illinois was undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the country when Gill went down, and has rebounded to No. 4 after adjusting to his absence.

"I think Gill is going to have some long-term impact on the team," said Davis. "But how can they play much better?"

Gill averaged 15½ points in the first 17 games of the season.

Regis gains 9th berth in boys' state tourney

It will be a Royal state tournament after all. Sixth-ranked Cedar Rapids Regis found the formula for playing 32 solid minutes and captured a season-long prize Tuesday night.

The Royals, who needed second-half rallies in their past two tournament outings, grabbed the · early advantage on No. 5 Dyersville Beckman and never retreated in a 65-60 Class 2A substate boys' basketball victory at Kennedy gym.

Senior guard Jason Kelly, held scoreless the first half, drilled home 11 second-half points - including nine in the fourth quarter. Teammate Tom Petsche's basket and Kelly's three-point goal ignited a gamesealing 11-4 run in the final six minutes.

Regis (19-4) handed Coach Dick Breitbach his 199th career victory against 76 defeats, as the school garnered its ninth state appearance. It will be the seventh Royals unit under Breitbach to play at Veterans Auditorium in Des Moines.

The Royals' first-round state foe will be Pella (17-6) Tuesday at 8:15 p.m. Regis drew the tournament's No. 3 seed-


Regis is one of the few schools to have a boys' and girls' squad qualify for state in the same season. The Regis girls first advanced in 1979 and are unbeaten this season.

"It's like a 10-year reunion for us all," said Breitbach. "We talked about getting both teams there this year, and we did it. I couldn't be more pleased."

Regis' boys last appeared at state in 1987, finishing runner-up.

LIGITICAL SILUE GUARIE as Spirit put an end to Kirkwood's quest

Gazette sportswriter-MASON CITY — The Spirit of Southwestern found the way to stop Kirkwood's Laura Holtman, and the reward was a return trip to the national junior college women's basketball tournament.

The sixth-ranked Eagles fell, 69-58, Tuesday night in the NJCAA Region 11 final and became the ninth Top 20 team to miss the trip to Tyler, Texas.

Holtman, the Eagles' all-time leading scorer with 1,128 points over two seasons, was held to two points as Kirkwood lost for the first time in 29 outings and saw its quest for a national tourney berth brought up short.

Southwestern of Creston improved to 27-5 with its 15th consecutive win.

"Well, we didn't do it," said a disappointed Kirkwood Coach Joyce Bilow.

The Eagles were seeking their first-ever regional title, but instead took home the runner-up plaque.

Harmon testifies \$2,500 in cash used to lure him to sign early

CHICAGO (AP) - Agent Norby Walters spread \$2,500 in cash on a desk in front of Ronnie Harmon to persuade him to sign a contract that violated NCAA rules, the former Iowa running back told a federal jury Tuesday.

But a defense attorney said it was Walters, not Harmon, who was on the losing end of the deal. Harmon, now with the Buffalo Bills, was the first witness in the fraud trial of New York-based agents Walters and Lloyd Bloom, in the courtroom of U.S. District

Bloom and Walters are charged with racketeering, mail fraud, wire fraud and extortion in what authorities contend was a scheme to defraud colleges and universities by signing athletes as clients before their college eligibility had expired.




After he signed the agreement with Bloom and Walters — which was postdated until Jan. 2, 1986, after Harmon's college eligibility expired — the agents paid him the \$2,500 and sent him \$250 a month, Harmon said.

"We're talking about business. The product is Ronnie Harmon," Walters said in a March 10, 1985, conversation that Harmon said he tape-recorded. The tape was played for jurors Tuesday.

"Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom, we want to represent the selling of that product," Walters said on the tape.

Harmon said he was contacted by Bloom in his junior year, and that the agent told him by phone that "this was my lucky day . he wanted to represent me."






