Register Correspondent CEDAR FALLS, IA. - Mark Schwab wore a "can't miss" label for winning national wrestling titles when he enrolled at Northern Iowa in 1985. Three years later, the talk was that Schwab's career was over.

Schwab underwent the first of nine operations on his left knee in February 1988. He wasn't expected to walk normally again, much less show the same ability that allowed him to win 106 of 107 matches and four state championships at Osage High School.

But Schwab, now a junior ranked 12th nationally at 118 pounds, has bounced back to earn one of Northern Iowa's eight spots in the NCAA wrestling tournament beginning Thursday at The Myriad in Oklahoma City.

"As soon as someone tells you you can't do something, it animates you in a way," Schwab said. "I couldn't stand missing another year."

Mike Schwab, who is coaching at Northern Iowa after a standout career for the Panthers, has noticed a change in his younger brother.

"He's a lot more positive person now. With all the negatives he's had, you'd think he'd be more negative," Mike Schwab said. "It's helped him mature as a person a lot quicker than he normally had to."

After going 49-9 and placing fifth nationally as a freshman, Schwab was withheld from competition to get ready for a shot at making the free-, style team in the 1988 Olympics.

Back for the 1987-88 season Schwab was 17-0-2 and top-ranked at n 118 pounds heading into an all-star meet at the UNI-Dome. His loss to Jack Cuvo of East Stroudsberg was the last time Northern Iowa fans would see him wrestle until January.

The surgeries began shortly after the loss to Cuvo. Schwab developed a b: staph infection in the knee and emer-

"I thought [the knee problem] was closing so many doors to my future," Schwab said. "Everything I've ever done and everything I thought I'd ever do revolved around wrestling."

Northern Iowa Coach Don Briggs said Schwab wants to show his skills haven't atrophied even though his knee carries ugly reminders of the agony he went through. "He's out to prove that he can still be an all-American," Briggs said. "With his mental toughness, he could still win it."


The operations have left Schwab unable to fully extend his left leg or bend it to a 90-degree angle. "It's closed my offense down a little bit. I don't scramble as well as I used to, but you can make up for that in other areas," Schwab said.

Schwab said he wasn't happy placing fifth as a freshman, but didn't understand what being an all-American was. "I thought I had three more chances. Pretty soon, one of those was gone last year and I wasn't sure about this year," Schwab said. "Being an all-American would be real nice, considering I wasn't supposed to be back wrestling."

He gives much of the credit for returning to action to his family and to Dr. Mark Mysnyk, a former wrestler at the University of Iowa and now an Iowa City orthopedic surgeon. Mysnyk said Schwab's strong will also

"It's a tremendous tribute to him. I admire what he's doing so much," Mysnyk said.

Mysnyk knows what Schwab went through. He, too, was told his career

was through after injuring his neck in the 1976-77 season. Mysnyk came back and in 1979 won the McGivern Award, given annually to the most courageous Hawkeye wrestler.

Schwab has known the feeling of being the nation's top wrestling recruit and being ranked first nationally at his weight, but it's not enough.

'It's nice to be ranked No. 1 because a lot of things go through other people's heads," Schwab said. "I've been ranked No. 1, but I haven't won a national title."

Schwab said throughout his long return to action, the actions of his BASEBALL coaches and teammates confirmed why he chose Northern Iowa.

"This is a loyal program and that's why I came here," Schwab said. "These guys are like the foundation of a house. Everyone's a brick and they just stick right together."
