Palmer testified he signed initially with the agents in June 1986 and received about \$30,000 from them before he signed with the Chiefs.

After signing with the Chiefs, Palmer said, Bloom asked him in July 1987 to invest \$125,000 in a fledgling credit rehabilitation company and that the two men would be equal partners. Lloyd's company was to provide credit information to debtors attempting to clean up bad credit ratings.

After the initial \$125,000 investment, Palmer put an additional \$20,000 into the company, Levy said.

Palmer also testified Bloom promised to invest \$125,000 in the business. At the same time, Palmer testified, Bloom intended to establish an agency to represent entertainers.

That agency, Palmer said, apparently had one client, Terry Copley, an actress, for only a few months. Levy, whom Bloom hired as ac-
