#### 300,000 fans: Do-able dream?

Iowa Cubs President Ken Grandquist has been asked the same question many times.

"Attracting 300,000 people to Sec Taylor Stadium has been a dream ever since Dick Easter, you and a few others purchased the team from A. Ray Johnston in 1983," the questioner said. "Is the dream fading?" Silence.

"Not at all," Grandquist said. "I think 300,000 is possible if the promotions and the weather go right."

The questioner, almost rudely, interrupted.

"But this year is different. With Prairie Meadows competing for your

entertainment dollar, can you still expect to draw 300,000 people?" More silence.

"I know for a fact we're going to lose some people to the track - at least this year," Grandquist said. "But I'm still confident 300,000 is a reality."

If the Iowa Cubs attract 300,000 this year, 33,155 more than the record set last year, then I-Cub General Manager Sam Bernabe and his staff should be the minor-league front office of the year.

Even if Buffalo attracts its second straight 1-million-plus, which it probably will, Bernabe and his hard-working staff should be in line for at least some kind of an award.

Why? Because they are operating under less than ideal conditions. Con-

A) Prairie Meadows, the new horse track in Altoona, is in its first year, which means there will be a number of gawkers and/or horse racing veterans champing at the bit to compare the new track against the more established Ak-Sar-Ben in Omaha,

Prairie Meadows and Iowa Cubs home games conflict 46 times. That's two-thirds of the I-Cubs' home campaign.

B) Sec Taylor Stadium isn't suited to host 300,000 people a season comfortably. The outfield bleachers down the third-base line, for instance, point to the State Capitol building beyond the center-field fence. It's a postcard setting, or as former major-league star Jimmy Piersall says: "It's the best background in baseball."

Great, if every ball is hit to the outfield, but that isn't always the case. People in those left-field seats would rather have an eye toward the game, not Terry Branstad's office.

C) The Greater Des Moines Grand Prix will clog downtown streets July 7-9, which just happens to coincide with an Iowa Cub home stand.

"What do you think?" Mr. Average asks his wife. "Shall we go watch the Iowa Cubs tonight? Or shall we go to the Grand Prix?"

Says Bernabe: "The track, and Grand Prix, to a certain extent, now are included in conversation when people are talking about entertainment. All we can do is hope to get the people who leave us to come back sometime during the season."

Is there hope? You bet. Witness the Omaha experience.

The Omaha Royals, triple-A affiliate of the Kansas City Royals, drew a paltry 175,329 to Rosenblatt Stadium in 1985. Bluffs Run, the dog track in adjacent Council Bluffs that can be seen from the stadium, opened a year later and, surprise, the Omaha attendance increased — to 255,290 in 1986; 262,215 in 1987 and 308,025 last year.

Ak-Sar-Ben to the west. Bluffs Run to the east. Yet, the Royals' attendance continues to grow.


"It's an altogether different crowd," Omaha General Manager Bill Gorman said. "The opening of Bluffs Run happened at the same time Gus Cherry took over as president of our club. Because of his new direction, and possibly because of the competition that might come from Bluffs Run, we added to our staff and marketed more aggressively."

The Iowa Cubs have done much the same. They have added a second fireworks night, with the possibility of a third. The Famous Chicken and comedian Max Patkin will perform.

Grandquist even thought of bringing Chicago Cub broadcaster Harry Caray into the stadium for a night. He even had a sponsor to cover much of Caray's \$14,000 fee.

But holy cow, he won't be here. Unlike Prairie Meadows and the Grand Prix, Caray's schedule didn't mesh with that of the Iowa Cubs.

## Ak-Sar-Ben faces Meadows, head-to-head

Register Staff Writer About 20 years ago, when Tom Brock was the general manager of Omaha's Ak-Sar-Ben race track, he was asked about the future of horse racing in Nebraska.

"We'll be all right as long as they don't barricade the bridges coming over from Iowa," Brock said.

The bridges might not be barricaded, but what has happened in recent years serves the same purpose.

With the opening of the Bluffs Run dog track in Council Bluffs three years ago and the Prairie Meadows

horse track in Altoona this spring, Iowans have been given an opportunity to do their gambling much closer to home.

Ak-Sar-Ben, once the only game of its kind in a wide area of the Midwest, has suddenly found itself in a fight for survival.

Today begins a new battle, the first head-to-head competition of Thoroughbred racing between Prairie Meadows, which has two weeks remaining in its spring meeting, and Ak-Sar-Ben, which is starting an 85-day run.

"We recognize that with the opening of Prairie Meadows, many racing fans will stay home, rather than drive to Omaha," said Tim Schmad, Ak-Sar-Ben's assistant general manager.

"But when harness racing starts at Prairie Meadows in a few weeks and goes most of the summer," he said, "we foresee a different scenario. We think a lot of Iowans will still want to come to Omaha, as they have in the past, and spend a day at Thoroughbred races."

Schmad said Ak-Sar-Ben officials are encouraged by the results of simulcasting — televising races from one track and betting on them at other tracks in Nebraska.

"We anticipated that the simulcast-

## Non-slim Sims shows his versatility for ISU

AMES, IA. — Maybe you've heard the old question-and-answer routine about the huge football player:

Q. What position does he play?

A. Any one he wants to play. No player fits that description any better than Keith Sims, the 6-foot 4inch, 300-pounder who has started 30 straight games for Iowa State.

Sims, who will be a fifth-year senior next fall, has shown his versatility in spring practice by performing well at center - his third position as

a Cyclone. Before being moved there, Sims had been an offensive guard and a tackle.

"I had never ever played center before - not in high school or anywhere else," Sims said. "The coaches had toyed with the idea over the winter. Then, when Chris Mussman was injured, I decided to give it a try." Sims and Coach Jim Walden have

been pleased with the results. "We know he can handle the job,"

Walden said. "Being a center is different," Sims said. "I still have some techniques to I'll stay at the position next fall, but I've been happy with my progress."

Sims has had minimal problems snapping the ball, but said the blocking is different than being either a tackle or guard.

"I'm one-handed when the play starts because I've got to snap the ball," he said.

Sims does only the short snaps to the quarterback. The long snaps are handled by Dave Benoit. Sims and the other Cyclones are

preparing for Friday night's Cardinal-Gold intrasquad game that winds up spring practice.

Sims is now the second-heaviest player on the roster. The only bigger Cyclone is 310-pound offensive tackle Gene Williams. Before now and next season's Sept. 9 opener against Ohio, Sims hopes to drop some weight so he can play at 290 pounds.

"I've been running and watching what I eat," he said. "Even though I

Fedders, an offensive lineman, will earn a degree in finance in July. That's reason for any student to celebrate, but Fedders' accomplishment is more noteworthy than most.

Even with all the time taken up by football, Fedders will graduate a little more than three years after he en-

Fred Mims, an assistant athletic director at Iowa, said Fedders' graduation will be the earliest ever by an athlete at the school, which has been shaken by revelations that two of its former players took courses such as watercolor painting and slow-pitch softball to stay eligible.

"Greg getting through in three is remarkable, especially with the pressures and time demands of all the Please turn to Page 3S | things he's involved in," Mims said.

"There's only one or two other cases that I can think of like Greg's in the general student population.


"As a whole, university students don't graduate in four years. The four-year graduation period has been obsolete for some time. In athletics, we work to get as many through in 41/2 years as possible."

The 6-foot 4-inch, 275-pound Fedders still has two years of football eligibility because he did not play as a freshman in 1986. He said he will attend graduate school the next two years and plans to go to law school. To graduate early, Fedders took 15

or 16 hours per semester and another six hours each summer. He will take 10 hours this summer to complete work on his degree.

# as integrity is questioned

Manager has questions, few answers about probe

© 1989 New York Times MONTREAL, QUEBEC - Pete Rose was seated against a wall Monday in Olympic Stadium several hours before the Cincinnati Reds' game against the Expos.

His legs were crossed; his left arm rested on the back of the chair, and he held his head in a hand. The manager of the Reds was not looking too good, or sounding very well, either.

"Stay away from me," he said with a weak smile.

Although the Reds will still be in first place in the National League West standings when they begin a two-game series tonight against the Mets at Shea Stadium, it would seem understandable after the troubles Rose has endured in the last 10 weeks that he would be feeling low.

#### "Purely Physical"

But this was purely physical, he assured, not mental. "I've had a cold for four days and haven't been able to shake it," he said. "Now I think I might have the flu."

Rose has had his troubles: Weeks of unceasing reports and suspicions and charges in print and on the air that he did or did not gamble on baseball games, that he did or did not cheat the Internal Revenue Service of earnings from gambling, that he did nor did not have business associations with convicted bookmakers and drug dealers, that he is or is not broke because of paying gambling debts.

"I can cope with almost anything," Rose said. "One of the reporters from the networks said he had just been called back from the Middle East to cover my story. He said that just a few days before he'd been playing chess with Yasser Arafat. I said, 'Well, I won't play chess with you, but I will play checkers.'

#### Discounts Accusations

"For the first month, it was kind of amusing, all this stuff. I don't mean funny, but I could laugh at it. Now I'm still reading these accusations every day in the papers. Every day! Who dreams this stuff up? Where in the hell do they get this stuff from? Who can believe it?

"I read where I owe \$700,000 to a bookie. No one has ever before accused me of owing anyone a dime. Then I read where my so-called bookmaker, this Ron Peters, owes me \$300,000. He don't owe me nothing. I met the guy one time in my life, and I never even spoke to him on the phone.

"Then I read where I lost a million dollars to him in betting. Yet the guy is broke and he's selling his restaurant. And you see these headlines: 'FBI informant says Rose bet on baseball.' Who's the informant? The same guy who said something else about me last week. It was either Janszen or Gioiosa or Peters."

Rose was speaking about three of the principal characters associated with him in reports: Paul Janszen, who is serving time in a halfway house for tax evasion; Thomas Gioiosa, who is facing federal drug and tax-evasion charges, and Ron Peters, who is awaiting sentencing on drug and tax-evasion charges.

"I worked out with Janszen at a health club, and I took Gioiosa in when he was 17 years old and he lived with me for a year," Rose said.

"I haven't had anything to do with Gioiosa in several years, and when I found out about Janszen's drug connections, I got away from him. I haven't talked to him in a year and a month; no, a year and two months."

Rose said he hasn't gone to a race track this season - he was an habitue - and only went to a dog track three times during spring training. "And I haven't missed it," he said. "But some



progress in football - he has never taken part in spring practice - but taken part in spring practice — but Alabama-Birmingham 10, Birminghe he says that academically, they have Eastern Kentucky 8, Tennessee 1 hurt him even more.

Fedders, who has a 3.48 gradepoint average, had arthroscopic knee surgery as a freshman and underwent two back operations during a 10month period in 1988.

"The last semester, when I had my second surgery, I had a 3.58 GPA going in and I ended up with only a 3.0 for 12 hours," Fedders said.

"Academically, being injured hurt more than it helped," he said. "It's been kind of disappointing, because it seems like when I'm practicing and playing, my grades have been better."

Fedders also was a good student at Le Mars High School, where he was president of his class and a member of the National Honor Society. But some in his hometown said he wouldn't be successful at Iowa, so Fedders set out to prove them wrong.

"A few people said I'd never play at Iowa and if I did play, it wouldn't be very much," he said.

Fedders was one of six players who appeared at Coach Hayden Fry's spring media conference to speak in defense of the Iowa program, which was tarnished during the trial of sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom in Chicago.

Testimony at the trial showed that former Iowa players Ronnie Harmon and Devon Mitchell took numerous courses in recreational sports to stay eligible, and that Harmon was on academic probation three times during his last two years in school. That led to the formation of a university committee to review the performance of Iowa athletes.

Fedders said the trial testimony gave a misleading picture of the Iou program.

"I feel like we've done everything to stay within the requirements," he said. "To be falsely accused of something is ridiculous. People here have worked real hard on academics.

"A positive image is what we've always tried to portray, and I think that's what we have."


