## Walters, Bloom seek new trial

Attorneys for convicted sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom contended Tuesday they were improperly barred from crossexamining mobster Michael Franzese about his involvement in several murders. "The jury was prevented from getting the full picture of Franzese's background, his propensity to lie, his bias and his motive to testify falsely," the attorneys maintained in written arguments for a new trial.

The motions were filed before U.S. District Judge George Marovich.

Walters and Bloom were convicted last month of luring amateur college athletes to sign postdated professional contracts and threatening them with violence if they tried to renege.

An admitted capo in the Colombo organized crime family, Franzese testified he was Walters' business partner and provided "muscle" for him in dealing with entertainment and sports clients.

Now serving a 10-year prison sentence, Franzese was a critical government witness in the trial.

Defense attorneys say Marovich erred in not letting them question Franzese about murders he disclosed to the government after he had been given immunity in the Walters and Bloom case.

Walters, who lives in New York, and Bloom, now a resident of Sherman Oaks, Calif., are to be sentenced June 19. They face a maximum 55 years in prison and \$1.5 million in fines.
