AReporter's Report: A second Chicago lawyer will be involved in prosecuting former Adm. John Poindexter in the Iran-contra case. He is Howard Pearl, who is resigning as an assistant U.S. attorney to become assistant to Dan Webb, the independent counsel in the case. Pearl and Webb recently were on opposite sides in the conviction of sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom. . . . Mayor Daley, who wants to be squeaky clean on fund-raising, has sent reminders to all city directors and commissioners that no tickets for his Monday night rally may be sold by city employees on city time. THAT TODDLIN' TOWN: NBC's peacock will be in all its glory next weekend when many of the network's stars will assemble here for the official opening of the NBC Tower. NOW HEAR THIS: Attorney Robert Clifford, retained to represent Frank Moore, 15, an alleged victim of police brutality, is taking a novel approach in the case. Early on Monday, he will open a probate estate that would allow him to obtain investigative material with court approval. He then will appear before Judge Ben Novoselsky to ask such approval for all

communication tapes, police and paramedics reports and other files dealing with the case. This tactic allows Clifford to get the info rmation without filing a lawsuit against the city. Whether there eventually will be such a suit will be determined by Clifford's investigation of the evidence.

THE WASHINGTON WHIRL: President Bush, under great pressure to sign a bill easing restrictions on abortions, has hinted he will do so, although his personal convictions run otherwise. But before the president will sign on, he wants some clarification of language dealing with the reporting of a rape and to whom it is reported. A bipartisan weekend session is expected to resolve the problem. . . . Chicago's Daphne Wood Murray will be sworn in by President Bush on Tuesday as a director of the Institute of Museum Services, a federal agency reponsible for improving museum services. Murray is the granddaughter of Robert E. Wood, long-ago chairman of Sears, Roebuck.
