Appeals court overturns convictions of sports agents

CHICAGO, ILL. (AP) - A federal appeals court on Monday overturned the racketeering convictions of sports agents Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom, who were accused of signing college athletes to contracts before their eligibility expired. The 7th U.S. Circuit Court of NORBY **Appeals** reversed WALTERS the convictions on a legal technicality and did not address the mail fraud.

racketeering or conspiracy counts. That left open the possibility of retrial, but prosecutors could not be reached Monday evening to determine if they would try again for convictions.

A decision on a possible retrial rests with U.S. Attorney Fred Forman, who was not in office when either the investigation or the trial began. Former U.S. Attorney Anton Valukas, who headed the investigation, is now in private practice. Assistant U.S. Attorney Howard Pearl, who handled the investigation, also is no longer with the prosecutor's office. Walters, 58, of New York, had been

sentenced to five years in prison. Bloom, 30, of Sherman Oaks, Calif., was sentenced to three years.

U.S. District Judge George M. Marovich said his decision to sentence them to prison was influenced by the involvement of the agents, particularly Walters, with an organized crime figure.

In its ruling, the appeals court said Marovich improperly refused to call certain testimony to the jurors' attention during his instruction to the panel.

Defense lawyers argued that Walters signed athletes based on advice he received from his New

York lawyer. Representatives of the law firm testified to substantiate Walters' assertion.

Walters' trial lawyer wanted this testimony called to the jury's attention during the judge's instructions to convey that the defendant had not intended to break the law.

Marovich refused to include it in his instruction. The appeals court overturned the convictions on that point.

The appeals court also said Bloom should have been given a separate trial, as he had requested.

If the agents are brought to trial

again, it must be done separately, the appeals court said.

"I love everybody! God bless the judges!" Walters shouted into the telephone from his New York home just minutes after he learned of the reversal. "I believe justice was done," he said.

Stephen Molo, one of three Chicago lawyers who represented Bloom, also praised the decision. "We are delighted," Molo said. "We believe justice has prevailed in this case."

Walters and Bloom were convicted April 13, 1989, after a five-week trial. The government said the agents paid college athletes thousands of

dollars to sign secret representation contracts before their eligibility had expired, a violation of NCAA rules.

The agents also were accused of threatening to break the legs of some athletes to keep them from disregarding the contracts.

The government said their pattern of doing business cheated universities out of scholarship money through the NCAA violations, which made the athletes ineligible for college athlet-

Serve up top tennis

Drake University President Michael Ferrari made a bold statement late last week and it wasn't in regard

Walden: Fry runs foul screen play

The Iowa State-Iowa football game isn't until Saturday, but already a flap is developing between coaches Jim Walden of the Cyclones and Hayden Fry of the Hawkeyes.

The problem concerns game films the coaches use to scout each other's team.

Asked to give a scouting report on Iowa, Walden said, "I can't give you any information on them. I don't know a soul they have on their team. They have some fine players. I just wish I could see them.

"I don't have the film of Iowa's game last Saturday with Cincinnati. Coach Fry will have to explain that to you.

Walden made those comments during a Big Eight Conference coaches' teleconference call Monday morning. Later, in an interview, he added:

"Coaches always make an agreement before the season that they will exchange one game film. Originally, I was supposed to send Iowa our film of last Saturday's game with Minnesota, and Fry was supposed to send me the film of his team's game against Cincinnati. "The film exchange was supposed to be made Sunday. But I found out last Friday that Iowa had the film of our game Sept. 8 against Northern Iowa. Because they already had their one film, it was my decision not to make the film of our game with Minnesota available to Fry." Asked how he knew Fry had the Iowa State-Northern Iowa film, Walden said, "I know because I know. You'll have to ask Fry where he got that film." Fry didn't return a reporter's telephone call Monday to answer questions about the matter. Walden said he tried to contact Fry about the matter, but his calls weren't returned, either. Northern Iowa Coach Terry Allen said he didn't send a film of the Panthers' game against Iowa State to Iowa's coaches. Walden said he doesn't plan to ask Cincinnati's coaches for a recording of the Iowa-Cincinnati game because it would arrive too late to do him any good. Walden said he didn't send a scout to watch the Iowa-Cincinnati game. Bob Elliott, an Iowa assistant coach, scouted the Iowa State-Northern Iowa game. Walden told The Associated Press that he believes Iowa also has received a film of Iowa State's game against Minnesota. "I'm sure he got it from his buddy at Minnesota," Walden said, referring to Minnesota Coach John Gutekunst. George Wine, Iowa's sports information director, told The Associated Press that Walden precipitated the flap by saying he wouldn't send a film of the Minnesota game. "He made that decision first," Wine said. "If he wasn't going to fulfill the agreement, then we weren't going to send our film. "It's not very complicated."

Injury list shrinks a bit at Iowa State

Tailback Blaise Bryant and quarterback Chris Pedersen won't play Saturday, but the outlook for some other injured Iowa State football players is better.

"Tight ends Paul Schulte, Craig **Mahoney and Hussein Warmack** aren't healthy," Coach Jim Walden said Monday, "but all three should be able to play some. Maybe we can get 20 plays out of each of them." On Sunday, Walden said it was unlikely that Schulte and Warmack would play. Schulte has an Achilles tendon injury. Warmack had stitches taken in a thumb. Mahoney suffered a broken wrist against Minnesota, and had been bothered by a hamstring injury before that. "I still don't think Dan Watkins will be able to play Saturday," Walden said. Watkins, a linebacker, ruptured a tendon in a finger against Minnesota. Walden said little has changed on the condition of Bryant and Pedersen. Bryant suffered a deep shoulder bruise against Minnesota. Pedersen sustained strained knee ligaments in a knee against the Gophers. "Neither will play this week," Walden said. "Bryant possibly will be out for two weeks, and Pedersen for three or four. The only good news is that Pedersen's knee isn't any worse than we at first thought." Walden said freshman Bob Utter will start at quarterback against Iowa. Sophomore Sherman Williams will open at tailback. Walden said that if Pedersen misses more than four or five games, he would give some thought to holding the quarter-

• Gone from a 3-16 fall-spring record in 1988 to 16-15 last season. "We were competitive against some of the top 10 schools, too," Knapp said. "We played (Southern California) when they were No. 1 and lost, 5-1, but we had two matches that were close in the third set."

 Increased the number of tennis scholarships offered from two to the National Collegiate Athletic Association maximum of five.

 Obtained the services of an indoor facility, and is likely to have an on-campus facility in the future.

 Increased the recruiting and travel budgets, which were all but nonexistent. Knapp won't provide specific figures.

 Had its first NCAA qualifiers last season in the doubles team of Michael Nisell and Doug Faillia. They lost in the second round, but had people scratching their heads regarding the whereabouts of Drake, Knapp said.



BIG EAST EYES HURRICANES. Big East Commissioner Mike Tranghese said the University of Miami of Florida is the focal point of the league's expansion plans. "If we're going to expand and play football, we're going to start with Miami," Tranghese said Monday. The nine-team league has been trying to develop an expansion plan to satisfy Syracuse, Pittsburgh and Boston College, the conference's football independents. Those three schools reportedly are interested in joining a football conference, but are reluctant to give up the Big East's basketball interests.

SHAW BACK IN BOSTON. Brian Shaw said Monday he's happy to do now what he had endured a bitter court battle and \$50,000 in fines to avoid - return to the Boston Celtics for the NBA season. The Celtics, eager to regain their point guard after he spent a season playing in Italy, announced that Shaw would rejoin them under a contract he signed in January. The dispute began after he signed while in the first year of a two-year contract he had with Il Messaggero of Rome, then fought to return to the Italian club for next season. A federal court decision June 26 ordered Shaw to end the Italian contract and allowing him to play only for the Celtics, and he was fined \$50,000 for defying the order and meetings between lawyers for both sides.



"I heard Greg was coming (to Upper Iowa) and I wanted to get away from home. I decided to come, too," said Roth, who was not recruited. Roth wasn't a starter at Franklin High until his senior season.

Besides Roth and Panzl, the Livonia connection consists of four freshmen - wide receiver-punter Mike Patzsch, running back-punter Mark Little, defensive back Mike DeCarlo and fullback Brian Drabicki.

Roth, who played some last season, has completed 30 of 49 pass attempts for 407 yards and two touchdowns. One touchdown pass was a 31-yarder to Little Saturday, when the Peacocks defeated Buena Vista, 44-20.

Falcons' Glanville warned: Either shut up or pay up

PITTSBURGH, PA. - NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue has warned Atlanta Falcons Coach Jerry Glanville that he will be fined if he continues criticizing opposing coaches.

Glanville, the coach, called Oilers **Coach Jack Pardee** "a total jerk" after the Falcons' 47-27 victory against Houston on Sept. 9. JERRY He also made a flip-GLANVILLE pant remark to a group of Texas sports writers after declining to answer their questions.

"I sent (Glanville) a letter warning him," said Tagliabue, who attended the Steelers-Oilers game Sunday night. "I reminded him that at the league meetings in March, the competition committee, as well as the 28 clubs, told me to crack down on what they believed was unsportsmanlike, uncalled for, flip comments by coaches. "And so I sent him a reminder and made it clear if it happens again, he's going to be fined. And not just Jerry Glanville ... (it's) any coach in the league who makes statements like that.'

Dickerson, placed on the non-football injury list Aug. 29 after refusing to take a physical, had nothing to say following a three-hour meeting at the NFL offices. His lawyer, Arn Tellum, made a brief statement. "We believe and hope the commissioner, after reviewing the facts and considering the law, will find the Colts' decision to place Mr. Dickerson on the non-football injury list was improper and will reverse it," Tellum said. Dickerson, the seventh-leading rusher in NFL history with 11,236 yards, cannot be activated until Oct. 17, in time for an Oct. 21 game against Denver. Dickerson has had an injured left hamstring but says the injury has healed. In addition to placing Dickerson on the list, the Colts suspended him for four weeks. If nothing changes, he would lose about \$600,000 of his \$1.45 million salary.



contracts with Walters and Bloom were former Iowa football players **Ronnie Harmon and Devon Mitchell.** The two agents had been accused of defrauding the University of Iowa through their actions.

But the agents were acquitted on the charges involving the two former Iowa athletes as result of the disclosure of the athletes' academic transcripts. During the trial, defense lawyers challenged the charges involving the Iowa athletes by contending the school had failed to require their athletes to make satisfactory academic progress toward a degree.

As part of that effort, defense lawyers had Harmon's and Mitchell's transcripts submitted into evidence. Those transcripts disclosed questionable academic records, which led University of Iowa officials to order a review of the school standards dealing with student athletes.

After the trial, University of Iowa **President Hunter Rawlings described** the transcripts as "ludicrous."

Tagliabue said the "jerk" crack prompted him to write Glanville.

"Last year, we had coaches calling other coaches names and we had coaches criticizing fans, in the case of Cincinnati and Cleveland," he said. "The competition committee . . . really came down strong on that at the
